### Dr. Peoples EHS Homecoming Speaker

Noted pastor and educator Dr. C.E. Peoples will be principal speaker at the Eastland High School Homecoming religious services Sunday - morning, June 22.

Dr. Peoples attended Eastland High School two years, playing on the basketball team and representing the school at the District track meet in Abilene in shot put and discus.

He graduated from Clarendon College, where he played on an undefeated football team and won the outstanding debate award.

He received his Bachelors, Masters, and Bachelor of Divinity Degrees from Southern Methodist University. While there he coached debate and taught government. He also did graduate work at Columbia University and the University of Texas.

He was coach one year at Tahoka High School, coach and high school principal one year at Texline, and superintendent of schools one year at Texline. He served four years as a minister in East Texas and then for 38 years was president of Lone Morris College. During his administration an entirely new plant was built, eleven major buildings and twelve brick homes for teachers. The endowment grew to \$1,700,000.

Dr. Peoples has been president of the Texas Methodist College Presidents' Association, the National Methodist Junior College Association, the Texas Junior College Association, and the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of the Jacksonville Rotary Club.

He is a permanent member of the Lone Morris College Board of Trustees and chairman of the Endowment Committee.

Dr. Peoples married the former Miss Gladys Labenski of Dallas. They have two daughters Mrs. Nelda Darrell of Owensboro, Kentucky, and Mrs. Vernon Weddle Jr., of Los Angeles, California.

Additional plans for the Sunday service will be announced in the future. Mrs. Varge Daniel and Attorney Bill Hart are in charge of this committee.

#### BICENTENNIAL NEWS

Timely comments on the rider of 1775 are in order. PAUL REVERE was the son of Apollon Rivoire, a French refugee, fleeing because of religious persecution. Louis XIV died the year the Rivoires left Hugon not France. He was born January 1735 - - the first day of the year and was baptized PAUL REVERE.

Paul got a sufficient education at school in the shop and around the wharfs of Boston. He earned money as a bell ringer at Christ's Church and in later life made the famous Paul Revere church bells, some of which still ring in New England belfries. In the silversmith's shop he worked skillfully.

On the eighteenth of February, 1756, Gov. Shirley addressed the young artisan as 'gentleman' and gave him his commission as 2nd Lt., in the artillery train. The unit saw service against Crown Point. That spring he was a part of the long, struggling line of horses and men - - fighting against the French.

Paul married Sary Orne. He joined the Masons and there met James Otis, Joseph Warren and others so important in the early days of the Revolution army excitement. The important meeting with Sam Adams and John Hancock has been portrayed recently in the Johnny Tremain TV series. By now Paul was a master silversmith 22 years old.

The famous ride which Longfellow immortalized tells the story of "Twas the 18th of April, seventy five" when he rode to alarm the already forewarned minutemen - - of Middlesex County. Some details in the poem are not true - - but the fact that he was able to escape his captors near Lexington and warn John Hancock to flee from his hideaway (for one of the main reasons of the British trip to Lexington was to capture Hancock and Adams.)

And on the 19th of April the first battle was fought at Lexington Green and late at Concord at the old North Bridge. The statue of the Minuteman, by Daniel Chester French, stands guard today - - a replica in stone of the Capt. Isaac Davis who commanded the Action militia and who was killed at the Bridge. The TV and the magazines and the newspapers will carry the details of the great celebration of this weekend.

### Sewer Plant In 30 Days Of Completion

Eastland's new sewer plant will be completed in about 30 days members of the Eastland Lions Club learned Tuesday in a program that took them to the site southeast of town for an inspection.

Wilburt Simmel was program chairman and introduced City Manager Lewis Tiner who gave a verbal rundown on the project, at the Ramada Inn meeting site before departing for the site.

Vice President Ray Pryor presided in the absence of President Otis Coleman and business included the final election of officers for the coming year.

Work at the site is about a week behind schedule due to bad weather, but the contractors lack only minor cleanup, the erection of a chain link fence and other minor work before the system is turned on. The project was started in 1969 and Eastlanders voted in September of 1971 to issue \$92,000 in bonds as the then 45% part of constructing the then projected \$198,000 project. Delays came which were both helpful and costly. The government participation increased to 75% but building costs rose, so the finished project will run some \$350,000. Bids were opened in April of 1974 and the government rejected the low bidder on a technicality, so the second-low bidder took the job.

"And we're going to be putting this into operation just at the right time", Manager Tiner said, "because the requirements from the Water Quality Board and the Environmental Protection Agency grow more rigid each day."

The city has been paying some \$1,100 a month for the past 18 months on the bond debt, and has only eight years to go, so the payments have been made even during the paper work and construction period.

Virtual completion of the teaching staff and approval of the 1975-76 school calendar were among top items on the agenda for the Eastland Independent School Board of Trustees this week.

Seniors will consider approval of a Senior Day for a trip to Six Flags a major item too.

The Board canvassed the recent election and declared John Morren re-elected to Place Four and John Nevill elected to Place Five.

All trustees were present except Nevill who was out of town and Jim Wright. In the organization meeting Monday, James Reid was re-elected president; Morren, vice president; and Wright, secretary.

The board accepted with regret the resignation of two fifth grade teachers, Miss Opal Hearn and Mrs. Betty Cooper, both of whom are retiring. Bob Blair and Mrs. Charlene Burkett were hired and probably will be assigned to the fifth grade classes.

The board approved the media services plan with the Region Education Service Center, and adopted the quarter system for next school term.

Also hired is Don Griffin who will be in charge of the vocational mechanics program - which will be expanded in addition to the present vocational agricultural program. The present building facilities of the shop will be doubled (at a cost estimated at \$9,998.66 to be paid for by the state), and expanded programs to vocational subjects designed to help students find jobs if they don't plan to go on to college.

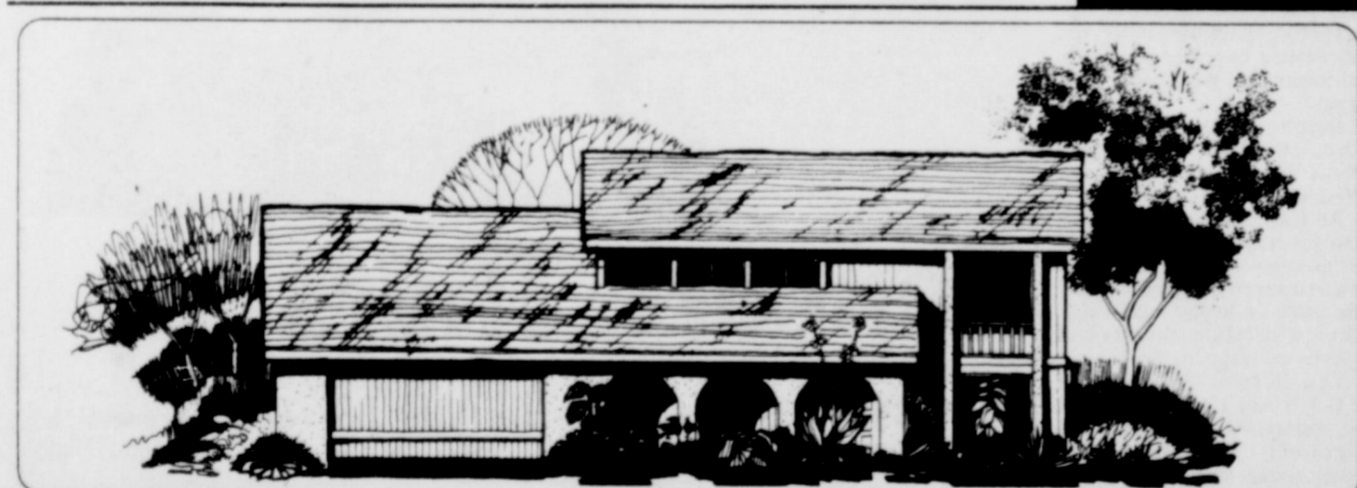

# Jubilee Activities Schedule For Near Completion

A complete schedule of activities which will for more than four days has been released by the Cisco Frontier Jubilee, which will be held from April 17 through April 20. The Jubilee is a combination of the former Cisco Folk Life Festival and the Cisco Junior College Ranch Week, and it is designed as a kick-off for Bicentennial activities for the Big Country.

Although the Jubilee doesn't officially get underway until Thursday, April 17, the students of CJC will get a head start by holding a weiner roast, tug-of-war, and street dance on Wednesday evening, the 16th. The campus activities will get underway at 6:30 p.m. and last until midnight.

Thursday, the official Ranch Day at CJC will begin bright and early with a 7:30 chuck wagon breakfast-cooked and served outdoors. Various kinds

of games, contests and entertainment will follow for most of the remainder of the morning. At 11:00 a.m. there will be a chili cookoff on the "main drag" of the campus, and chili specialists from "anywhere and everywhere" are invited to come and enter the competition. CJC Athletic Director "Ace" Prescott is in charge of the cook-off.

The Ranch Day Barbecue will be held at noon on Thursday, and then everyone will head for the CJC rodeo arena for the college's annual rodeo which will begin at 2:00 p.m. One interesting new event to be added to this year's Ranch Day Rodeo will be a Calf Dressing Contest pitting teams of boys and girls racing to get ordinary clothing on young calves. Other traditional rodeo events will be staged, and possibly a calf scramble as well. CJC Inter-

collegiate Rodeo Team sponsor Tommie Pope is chairman of the Rodeo Committee.

The also traditional Ranch Day Dance will be held Thursday night from 8:00 until midnight. The dance will be in the CJC Student Union Building, and music will be provided by a live country-western band.

The newly-named "Cow-Country Museum" will officially open its doors to the public on Thursday, and the museum will be open throughout the remainder of the Jubilee. Housed in the College Hotel Annex, former Victor Hotel, the museum will feature Americana antiques of various sorts as well as one of the most extensive branding iron collections in existence. CJC History Department Head Wesley Valek is in charge of the museum's development.

Friday, April 18, will find more games and contests going on at college hill-including a pie eating contest at 12:00 noon. At 1:00 p.m. the Folk Life Festival will officially open in the CJC Agriculture Building, the former National Guard Armory across the road east of the CJC campus. The arts and crafts display will be sponsored by the Cisco Civic League, a women's club, and will be in its second year. Some of the offerings by area craftsmen will include a horseshoe nail artist, food preservation, a blacksmith, miniature crafts, lye soap making, candlemaking, quilting, home remedies, china painting, antiques, and tin can art. The festival will be open continuously until 10:30 p.m. on Friday, and then will be in operation from 10:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. Saturday, and also

from 1:00 to 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, April 20.

A Friday highlight will be the "Big Country Review" stage show to be presented by the Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles at 7:30 p.m. at the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on the CJC campus. The variety show will include stage band music, dance routines, comedy sketches, and production numbers from famous Broadway musicals. The show will last slightly over one hour, according to directors Douglas Fry and Pat Owens, and will be "the best entertainment bargain in town."

Saturday will be one of the biggest and fullest days of the Cisco Frontier Jubilee. It will begin with a "mini trail ride" originating at Lake Cisco Park. Trail riders will be treated to a free breakfast at 7:30 a.m. at the park and the riders, wagons and "hangers on" will make the two mile ride into Cisco in time for the Jubilee's parade, which is set to begin at 10:00 a.m. The parade will form on the north end of town near the railroad on Third Street at Avenue D and will terminate at Avenue D and 13th. The parade will feature bands, riding clubs, antique cars, floats, decorated golf carts, drill teams, rifle teams, the six white horses of the famous Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band and their riders, a twirling corps, wagons, a covered wagon, and several other entries. One of the main attractions of the parade will be the CJC Wrangler Band and Belles, with the Belles performing a dance routine in front of the Cisco Chamber of Com-

merce offices at Avenue D., and 6th Street. The Texan Stars Drill Team of Tarleton State University will also be featured, with music provided by the CJC Band. The parade will have a children's division, with prizes for the best-costumed children, best-costumed pets, and best-decorated non-motorized mechanical vehicles such as bicycles, tricycles or wagons. A big crowd is expected for the 10:00 a.m. parade.

Another Saturday morning activity will be the first annual Cisco Junior College Jubilee Golf Tournament, to be held at the Cisco Country Club beginning at 8:30 a.m. Ralph Glenn, who is in charge of the tournament, has invited all public school and college personnel in the Big Country area to participate.

Several downtown activities are planned for Saturday. Among them will be a cow chip throwing contest, sack races, cow calling contests, a Beech-nut Chewing Tobacco spitting contest, and an old fiddlers' competition. The Cisco Lions Club will serve a "Son-of-a-gun Stew" downtown on the street at noon.

"Blazing Guns at Roaring Gulch", subtitled "The Perfumed Badge", will open a three performance run at 3:00 p.m. Saturday afternoon in the auditorium of the Cisco City Hall. The tongue-in-cheek melodrama will also play at 8:15 p.m. Saturday and at 8:15 p.m. Sunday evening. It is the initial

Ascot Oils Inc. of Shreveport No. 1 Gorr is a planned 4,500-foot test for the area two miles northwest of Cisco.

It spots 1,940 feet from the south and 2,035 feet from the west lines of Section 508, SP Survey, A - 1474.

The lease is composed of 160 acres.

Hollensworth Oil Co. of Cisco will re-enter to 4,000 feet an abandoned wildcat two miles north of Cisco.

It is No. 1 Hollensworth - Gautier, located on an 80 acre lease. Site is 2,350 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 499, SP Survey.

Laurel Energy Co. Inc. of Dallas staked No. 1 Margie as a regular field project three miles northeast of Rising Star.

The planned 4,000 - foot venture is on a 230 acre lease. It spots 1,989 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of Section 31, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

## Water Quality Board Hearing Held

Three new waste control order applications, as well as amendment requests by the Texas State Technical Institute's James Connally Campus at Waco and the City of Eastland, are scheduled for study at a Texas Water Quality Board public hearing to be held April 11 at 9 a.m. in Room 618 of the Stephen F. Austin State Office Building in Austin.

TSTI is asking for an increased flow of treated domestic sewage effluent from the school plant which is located on the southwest side of James Connally Air Force Base in Waco. Proposed discharge is not to exceed an average flow of 1,000,000 gallons per day, and the treated wastewater is to be released into Lucky Branch, Tehuacana Creek, and the Brazos River.

The City of Eastland is seeking to amend an existing permit to use a portion of the treated domestic sewage effluent, about 14 percent, for irrigation, with the remainder to be discharged into the South Fork of the Leon River, Leon Reservoir, the Leon River, Little River, and the Brazos River. The discharge is not to exceed an average flow of 400,000 gallons per day.

Application is being made by West Flour Mill, Inc. of West for a waste control order pertaining to process generated waste water and rainfall runoff containing wastes from five laying hen houses with a capacity for

220,000 birds. The facility is located one mile southeast of the City of West, and the wastewater will be retained and utilized for irrigation.

John Nash Ranch of Austin is applying for a permit to control rainfall runoff water containing wastes from a 2,500 - head swine operation located four miles south of Georgetown and east of IH 35.

The facilities include three farrowing houses and four feeder pig houses which drain into an earthen lagoon, and wastewaters produced as a result of the operation will be disposed of on approximately 2,000 acres of pastureland by means of a trailer mounted tank.

Accurate, Inc., located at 900 Sagebrush Drive in far north Austin just outside the city limits, is requesting a waste control order for the discharge of a maximum flow of 75,000 gallons per day of industrial wastewater consisting of rinse and cleaning water from the metal finishing plant. The water is used to rinse and clean metal between cycles in the process of anodizing, conversion, zinc and cadmium plating. Discharge will be made into an unnamed tributary of Walnut Creek, Walnut Cree, and the Colorado River.

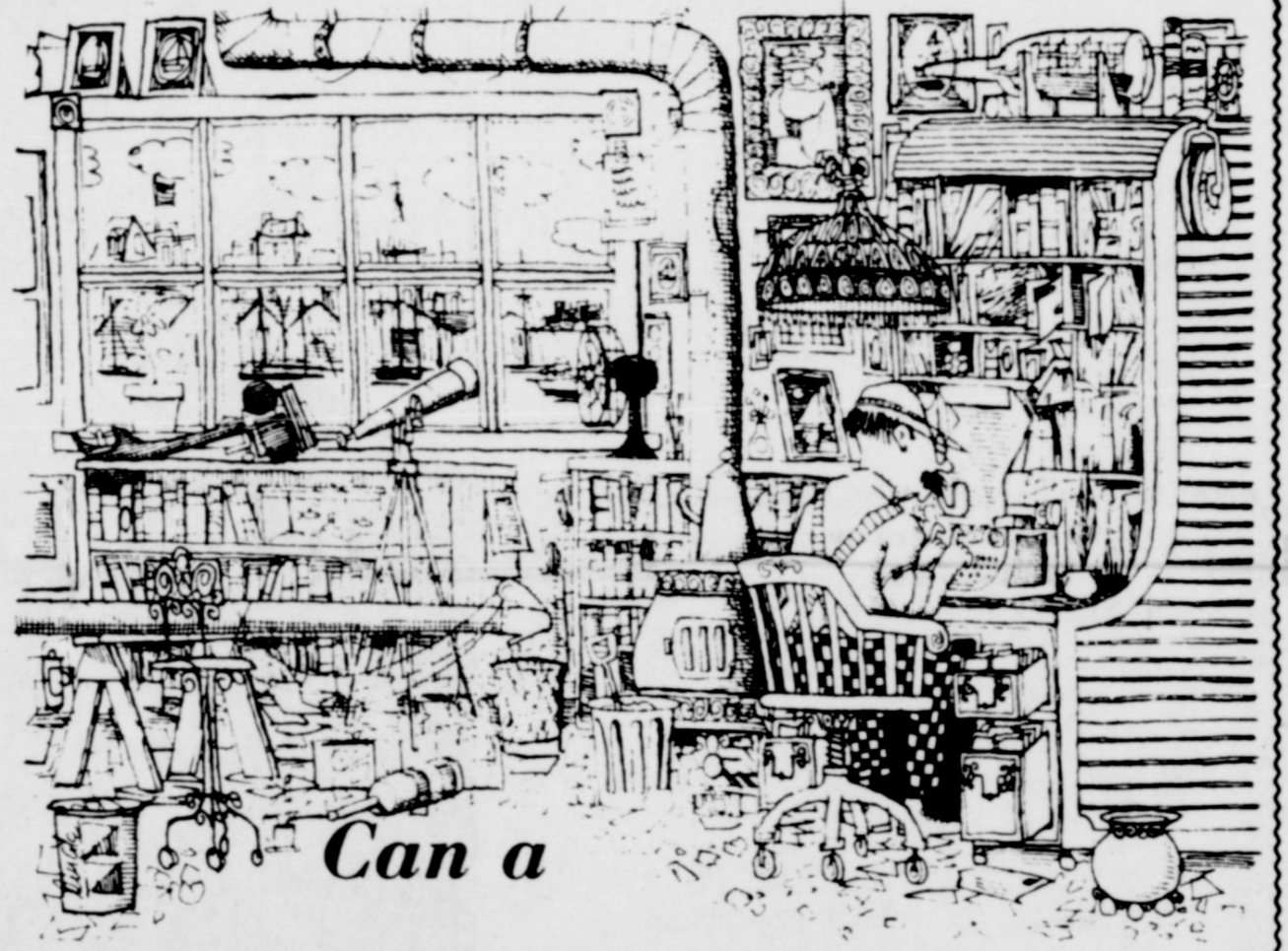

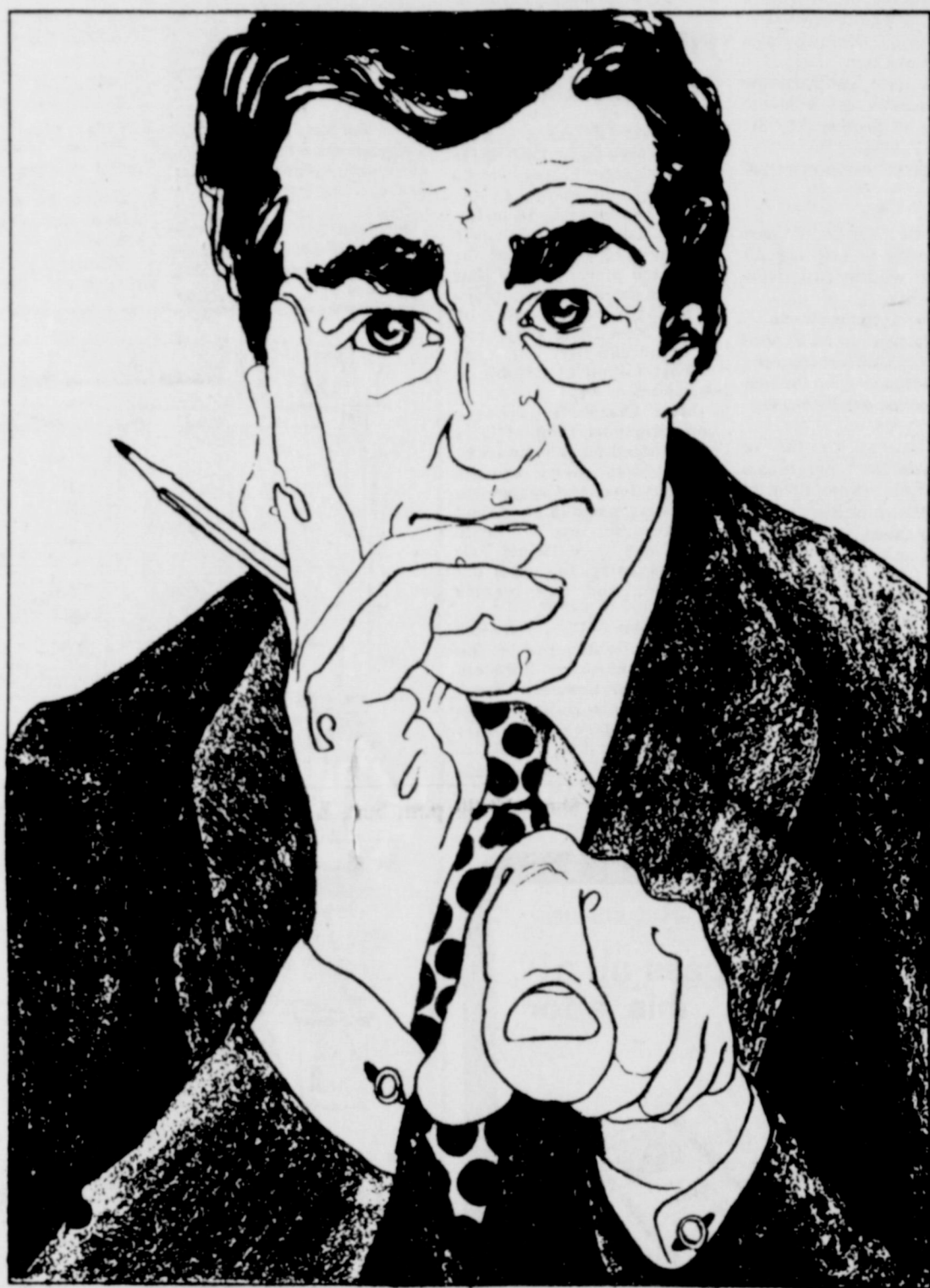

**Budding And Grafting School Set**  
Friday, April 18, is the date for the annual Eastland County Pecan budding and grafting school.  
The Cisco Chamber of Commerce invites both men and women from throughout West and Central Texas. The Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers are co-sponsors of the annual event to be held at Cisco Junior College. It will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts auditorium.  
During the afternoon session the group will practice the patch bud and inlay graft at a nearby pecan grove.  
Dr. Earl Puls, Jr., Extension Horticulturist, will be the instructor. He will use visual slides with his discussion. Field demonstrations will be given during the afternoon and participants will have the opportunity to practice their skills. Local pecan growers will assist with the practice session and demonstrations.  
Dan Childress, President of the Pecan Growers Association, said the association will have budwood, and graft wood of some of the better varieties such as Choctaw, Mohawk, Wichita, Sioux, Shawnee, Caddo, Cherokee, Cheyenne and Tejas for sale. Some budding and grafting supplies including shears, knives and budding tape will be sold at the school.

## Do You Remember

As the children grew to adulthood in the early days of the century, there existed a spirit of competition. From the youngest pupil to the oldest, the individual loved to think of himself or herself as excelling in some form of competition. They liked to think of themselves as being better than any other in something.

The teachers recognized this in the small community schools and organized the activities of the school to provide competition in such a way as to permit the development in gifted skills of the students. One arrangement called for a contest in spelling. This was called a "Spelling Bee". Each Friday afternoon, a class would compete with each other in spelling until a champion speller emerged from each class.

On the next Friday afternoon the champion from each class competed in a "Spelling Bee" until a champion of spelling emerged for the whole school. This winner then would be pitted on a certain prearranged day against winners in neighboring community schools. To win this contest would always be a great honor for the individual and the school he or she attended.

Another competition was arranged for those students to compete in arithmetic. Problems in addition, multiplication and division were given and the participant who completed the problem correctly first won the contest. This procedure continued until a champion was developed for each class then continued until the winner was named for the school much the same as the "Spelling Bee".

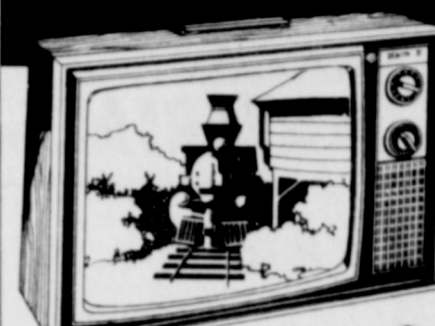

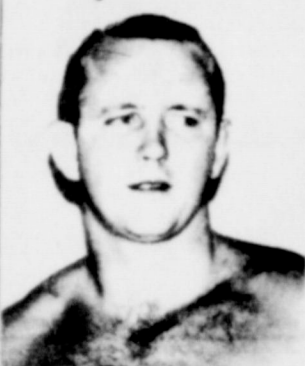
