## City Wide Clean-Up Plans Set

Eastland always shows a pretty face, but this year there's a great number of special reasons for Eastlanders to become really excited about the Annual Spring Clean-Up.

For instance, there's the visit scheduled for June 7, of United States Senator Lloyd Bentsen who will be honored with a county-wide barbecue in Eastland on that date.

And naturally, the Eastland High School Ex-Students who will be gathering here beginning June 19 for a weekend of Reunioning would like to see a cleaned-up, spruced-up city.

If further cause is needed, the city is hoping to show an extra-special self for the Bicentennial Celebration.

Therefore, the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club in cooperation with the City of Eastland and the Eastland Bicentennial Committee, headed by Emmett Lasater, has announced the beginning - **SPRING CLEAN-UP** for Thursday, April 17, according to an announcement by League President Mrs. Austin McCloud and League Beautification Chairman Vicki Connel.

Citizens are urged to make the extra-effort so that city trucks may start picking up extra loads of trash and discards after that date. The League will officially plant their downtown planters on that date, and the City Trucks will begin in the Hillcrest Addition, working eastward. It isn't necessary to call City Hall, because trucks will work eastward and randomly check to make the extra pickups.

Through the councils, neighborhoods are being encouraged to perform block projects such as the planting of one or more of a selected variety of shrubs in each front lawn.

The committee also is soliciting the help of groups such as boy and girl scouts, Campfire Girls, garden clubs, church groups and professional organizations.

He said the cost of projects must be assumed by the individuals or groups involved, adding that the Bicentennial Committee is not a fund raising organization.

The banquet held inside the national guard armory followed pumper racing with a fine plate of barbecue for everyone. The banquet lasted almost two hours and after all speakers were finished and slide displays on fire fighting equipment had finished, firemen from through out Texas adjourned for their towns to take a little more knowledge of the job they do back with them.

## Beautification

Eastland Bicentennial Committee kicks off its neighborhood beautification project by appealing for citizen involvement.

The project, directed by the Heritage Committee of the Bicentennial Committee, is to enlist the services of organizations, businesses and individuals in doing projects such as clean-up campaigns and tree plantings.

"The project is being started now to take advantage of the spring planting time", Emmett Lasater, bicentennial coordinator, said.

"By doing so the projects should be in full bloom and ready for the celebrations in the summer of 1976."

He said the project is a do-it-yourself effort.

Projects suggested by the committee include hauling away trash, and other unsightly material, repainting and planting of grass, flowers, shrubs and trees.

## Carbon Youth Killed In Accident

A 15 year old Eastland County youth was killed and his 18 year old brother was in satisfactory condition Sunday night when their homemade dune buggy ran off a dirt road Sunday afternoon four miles southwest of Carbon.

Pronounced dead on arrival at 4:55 p.m. Sunday at Eastland Memorial Hospital was Jody Gerald Tucker of Star Route, Carbon. His brother, Gary remained in the Eastland Hospital Sunday night with multiple lacerations.

Department of Public Safety Officer Rusty Condry of Eastland said Jody was driving the dune buggy west on a rural gravel road and apparently lost control.

The vehicle slid off the left side of the road and ran into some bushes but remained upright. Condry said the eldest brother was thrown from the vehicle but the 15-year-old was pinned inside.

He said the accident occurred about 4:30 p.m.

Services were at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church.

The Rev. George Weeks officiated assisted by the Rev. Eric Lovell.

Burial was in Pleasant Hill Cemetery under the direction of Holly-Rhyme Funeral Home of Cisco.

Born August 13, 1959, in Gorman, Jody was a student. He was a member of the Long Branch Baptist Church.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Tucker of Long Branch; one sister, Rhonda Tucker; his brother, Gary and his grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Walter Denton of Cisco.

## Countians To Receive Reduced Insurance Bills

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells Tuesday announced realignment of seven counties in his 22nd senatorial district that could reduce home owners insurance bills.

These counties are not frequented by as many tornadoes or subject to fierce winds and hail as the other sections of the plains and Panhandle, Creighton said.

State insurance board chairman Joe Christie has reclassified the counties of Montague, Jack, Young, Wise, Eastland, Brown and Stephens from the state insurance board's north-northwest territory into the board's central rating territory, Creighton explained.

Residents of these counties will be given the opportunity to purchase insurance at the lower central territory rates.

"We're really delighted with the action of the insurance board", he said.

A number of Eastland Countians joined a delegation from the seven-county area in appearing before the State Insurance Commission in a public hearing in Austin recently requesting the realignment.

In a telephone conversation with Sen. Tom Creighton's office Wednesday morning, Eastland Chamber of Commerce Manager James Wright determined that the change will become effective June 2.

Those attending the Austin Commission meeting were Chamber Executive Bruce Pipkin, Manager Wright, Mayor W.Q. Verner, City Manager Lewis Tiner and County Judge Scott Bailey.

The helicopter plan works better than the poison program used several years ago, we're told. It is now being used in area counties and, we understand, efforts are being made to obtain the program for our county. It is a federal program that costs very little to the area's benefiting.

Coyotes and wolves are so thick that it's not unusual to see one or a pair trot across the road in front of you when you drive out in the country. You'll hear them howl if you camp out at night. The need for controlling is very real, according to ranchers. Raising goats and sheep is almost a thing of the past. The young are killed and eaten by coyotes almost as fast as they are born.

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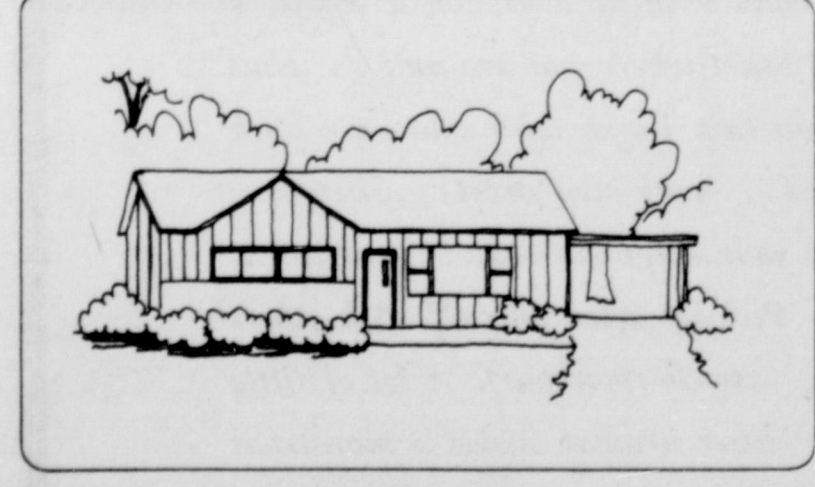
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**EASTLAND MEMO:**

When not eating he is at his sentry post on a branch above the feeder, guarding his food supply from some encroachment, which to me has not been apparent. Since his debut, the Hummingbird population has grown to a few pair, and more feeders have been hung in the yard. If you have feeders for them, your guests are waiting.

On Easter Day while walking at the eastern boundary of Eastland, a Scissortail surprised me, darting from right to left, perching on a nearby tree. What a welcome and beautiful sight on a festive day. This was a single sighting, with his mate not in evidence. We should have the familiar sound of these graceful fly catchers soon, added to our spring accessories. We have had reports of other Scissortail sightings in the area.

During these last few days we have noticed also the vague new growth on the mesquites, and that should settle the "spring" question, although the temperature is not cooperating. The new leaf growth, much of it pale green, makes the small migrating birds difficult to detect at present, while at the same time, the newly arrived Brewer's Blackbirds and Grackles are very much evident in increasingly raucous groups, congregating in our yard.

All of this simply stated means another rewarding spring season is here, for all it can mean to us. The birds, flowers and budding nature around us makes the time much richer and enjoyable.

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Articles indicate that the general cattle market was strong to higher again this week, and a headline shows that "Lamb Prices Hold Steady to Stronger".

The lamb market across the country reflected continued packer difficulty in obtaining adequate numbers.

Mohair market has strengthened again with some adult mohair selling to \$1.65 a pound. In Texas the market was reported 50 cents to \$1 higher on both slaughter and feeder lambs.

The sheep and goat raisers, and to some extent the cattlemen in losses of young calves, continue their running battle with the predatory animals. A Texas A&M University report shows that the estimated annual losses caused by the coyote to the sheep and goat industries are \$1,834,617 and \$427,000 respectively. The study notes that the timber wolf and Texas red wolf have declined sharply but that coyotes have actually expanded both their numbers and their range in recent years. The coyote evidently has been able to adapt to co-existence with man through an ecological or evolutionary process.

A coyote helicopter round-up is being considered in Eastland County after a program has reported success in neighboring counties. For instance, 185 coyotes were killed in 42 hours in Callahan County, and 200 coyotes and one bob cat in Stephens County in five days.

Eastland County livestock raisers are interested in the federally-funded project.

 The children in the community school then were given a "recess period" in mid morning and mid afternoon. This gave them a time for exercise and an opportunity to relax their minds from their studies. When the weather permitted, the children grouped by age and size in the school yard. The older boys generally played baseball. The older girls gathered in groups at the park tables and benches to watch the boys play ball and to tell each other their secrets. There would be middle sized boys playing marbles while others would play "mumble peg". This game was played with a two or three bladed pocket knife. The long blade was opened to a ninety degree angle while the other was opened completely. The long blade was stuck in the ground and the player flipped the knife with his fingers. If the knife flipped up turning over and over and came down sticking the open blade in the ground without falling over, the player was given a score. The smaller children sometimes played "drop the handkerchief". All the kids but one

**Tornadoes - April, May And June**  
 COLLEGE STATION - Texas had the dubious honor of leading the nation in the number of tornadoes last year with 116. Another tornado season is at hand. "Most tornadoes occur during April, May and June during the late after noon although they can occur at any time of the year or any time during the day," points out Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Most tornadoes occur in the South and between the Rockies and the Appalachians. "With a total of 944 reported tornadoes in the United States last year and 361 resulting deaths, 1974 was the worst year for tornadoes since 1925," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist. Although the average annual number of tornadoes reported has quadrupled in the past three decades, the number of tornado fatalities has been decreasing. This is probably due to better methods of sighting tornadoes, warning systems and advance preparation for tornadoes, notes Keese. Tornadoes usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about 10 minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour but wind speeds in the funnel of the tornado get up to 300 miles per hour. "Because tornadoes are so erratic, it's hard to tell just where or when they will occur," points out the engineer. He stresses the importance of having a well rehearsed plan for quick action if a tornado is sighted. The National Weather Service issues a "tornado watch" when atmospheric conditions are favorable for tornadoes. A "tornado warning" is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar. "If a tornado watch is announced, stay tuned to a radio or television for weather advisories. A tornado warning demands action, so you should quickly move to a basement, cellar or civil defense shelter," advises Keese. "Keep a battery-powered radio handy in case power is lost." If your home doesn't have a basement or cellar, go to the lowest level in the center of the home or get in a closet or small

room or under heavy furniture, suggests the engineer. Open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes. "Stay away from windows and buildings such as gymnasiums and auditoriums with wide free-span roofs. If you live in a mobile home, move to a shelter area. If you are caught in open country, move away from the tornado at a right angle to its path or lie flat in a ditch or ravine," he adds. "Do not stay in your car if you cannot safely evade the tornado by driving away from it or at right angles to its path." If you sight a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law enforcement officer, but do not tie up the phone with unnecessary calls. "After a tornado, always wear thick-soled shoes and gloves in cleanup work and watch for broken gas pipes and downed electrical wires," warns Keese. "Don't light matches or smoke in or near a building that has been hit by a tornado until you are sure there are no gas leaks." "Furthermore, stay away from disaster areas unless you're helping with rescue and cleanup operations."

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**Budding And Grafting School, April 18**  
 The 22nd annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School will be held at Cisco Junior College April 18, according to an announcement by DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent. The school will be sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Earl Puls Jr., Extension Horticulturist will give an illustrated lecture during the morning session. This will begin at 9:30 a.m., in the Harrell Fine Arts auditorium at Cisco Junior College. Dan Childress, president of the growers association, said an afternoon demonstration and practice session will be held at a nearby pecan grove. Participants will have the opportunity to practice their skills. Childress said the association will have budwood, graft wood and budding and grafting supplies for sale. Gordon estimates that over 1900 people from Central and West Texas have attended the school and learned to graft and bud pecans during the past 21 years.



A Folk Life Festival Held For Second Year At Cisco

A Folk Life Festival, being held for the second year, will highlight a four-day celebration tabbed the CISCO FRONTIER JUBILEE April 17-20 in Cisco, which will also feature the opening of an Americana Antique Museum, stage productions, a western parade, and many other activities.

The four-day celebration will kick off Bicentennial activities in the Cisco area. Cisco Junior College is combining its traditional Ranch Week activities with the Cisco Civic League's Folk Life Festival, and, along with other community participation, an extensive four days of a "step back in time" are planned.

Will Rogers, the King Ranch, 3 Sixes, XII, Charles Goodnight, Jesse Chisholm, Matador Land and Cattle Company, Pitchfork, and Governor Ross Sterling are some of the better-known branding irons that may be viewed at the Americana Antique Museum opening in the lobby of the old Victor Hotel during the Cisco Frontier Jubilee.

The branding irons, as well as bits, spurs, stirrups, a Calvary saddle, boots, and other "Old West" items were part of the Newton Prince Estate. These items, some dating back to the 1800's, were in Mr. Prince's museum in Nowlan County. After Prince's death, the estate was disposed of, and in 1936, the American Legion in Cisco bought the collection of more than 450 branding irons, with the intention of starting a museum in Cisco.

Some of the best laid plans go astray, and likewise, the museum never got off the ground. The collection was donated to Cisco Junior College five years ago.

This past fall Dr. Norman Wallace, president of Cisco Junior College, appointed Wesley Valek, instructor of history and government at the college, to begin organization of the collection. The collection will be placed in the Cisco Museum, and will be ready for viewing during the Cisco Frontier Jubilee, April 17, 18, 19, and 20.

"Blazing Guns at Roaring Gulch" (or "The Perfumed Badge") is a melodrama that

will be shown during the festivities. The play will be held on Thursday and Saturday nights, with a Saturday matinee.

The Folk Life Festival, sponsored by the Cisco Civic League have invited area craftsmen to participate. Some of the offerings will be lye soap making, a blacksmith, a variety of crafts, china painting, tin can art, food preservation, quilting and old time remedies. These are only a small sample of the booths sponsored by area clubs and individuals.

Cisco Junior College is offering its first annual Invitational Golf Tournament, to be played on Saturday, April 19.

Trail riders will ride into Cisco around 10:00 a.m. to join the parade participants.

The Civic League and Cisco Junior College have combined their annual celebrations "The Folk Life Festival", and the college's "Ranch Day" activities for a rip-roaring four-day affair. Fun and excitement are in store for all of the adventuresome who dare wander into Cisco, and find themselves face to face with the "Old West".

1975 Official State Travel Map

AUSTIN - A dramatic new section on Interstate Highway 10 as it traverses the scenic Hill Country near Kerrville graces the cover of the 1975 Official State Highway Travel Map, now being distributed.

The Texas Highway Department expects demand for the updated 1975 map will exceed one million copies. "Once for ounce," Tom H. Taylor, director of the department's Travel and Information Division said, "the Highway Travel Map is the best friend a Texas motorist can have."

The new map shows recently opened sections of the Interstate and other highways maintained by the Texas Highway Department. Motorists will find symbols which identify safety rest areas, and distinctive symbols for those with comfort stations, including several completed during the past year.

Thirteen special insets on the reverse side of the map chart major urban freeways and arterial streets through the state's business metropolitan areas.

The map remains one of the most requested items of almost six million pieces of descriptive literature about Texas distributed annually by the Highway Department.

Almost half of that volume, 2.8 million pieces, are produced by the Highway Department itself. The remainder is supplied by chambers of commerce and local visitor industry organizations.

The map and other descriptive literature about Texas is distributed through the Department's 11 tourist information bureaus and visitor centers and in response to hundreds of thousands of mail requests annually.

Even with the uncertain energy situation last year, the Highway Department answered 185,174 mail requests for descriptive literature about Texas.
