'Centennials Are Punctuation Marks Of History'

"Centennials Are Punctuation Marks of History". So spoke Gov. Pat Neff in 1936 when Texas was 100 years old.

The corner stone of the First United Methodist Church of Eastland bears the date 1875. Rev. J.C. Weaver, a Methodist minister, held the first divine service in the town in the unfinished log hotel being put up by Isham Finch. It was located on the southeast corner of the square. (P. 87, Hist. of Eastland Co., Langston).

The first church organized in the county, of which there is anything known, was in the neighborhood of the Allen Ranch and was effected by Rev. William Monk, a pioneer preacher, who attended his first Texas Annual Conference in 1854. In 1865 Mr. Monk was on the Palo Pinto Mission, which included Eastland County. With a few members he organized a Methodist Church in the Allen and Davidson Ranch. The members were Peter Davidson, his wife and four children and Robert Newberry and Uncle Bobbie Martin, with their families.

In 1872 he was Presiding Elder on the Stephenville District. In 1873 he attended a Quarterly Conference at McGough Springs. Rev. Levi Collins was the missionary and had organized a little church there, which Rev. Monk says "I suppose it was the second organization in the County". (p. 197 Mrs. Langston's Hist.).

It was in the summer of 1875 that the election was held to move the courthouse from Merriman to Eastland. August 2 the vote resulted as follows: Eastland 67, Merriman 9, McGough Springs 44, Center of Co. 5 and scattering 2. It was in this period that the First Methodist service was held.

As late as 1877 there was no law-not a peace officer in Taylor County-none nearer than Eastland, Coleman or Albany. Strange to say they were not needed often and if needed, they usually arrived too late. First regular mail line was from Eastland, twice a week to Buffalo Gap and to Belle Plain-county seat of Callahan Co. Corley Brothers of Eastland had the contract.

In 1882 the first mention of the Ladies Aid of the Methodist Church of Eastland appeared in the Eastland Record and the festival being planned was to raise money for a neat fence around the new cemetery. A copy of the paper is in the Archives of the Library. The first known map-before the railroad days is also on file-a late 1875 or early 1876 map.

Where was our church? From the records in possession of Mrs. Fred Davenport we quote: The Methodist Congregation met in a little log cabin which was in the south part of town near the Leon River. Men carried their guns to the services and two men stood guard for fear of an Indian raid. Later they worshipped in a log cabin in the north part of town on what is known as Moss Street in this day and time. In 1880 services were held in the upper room of the old Connellee Mill House. This building housed the Corner Drug Store and now is Mode O'Day.

The Eastland Methodist Church was organized Feb. 23, 1878 and J.B. Warren was the presiding elder. The first trustees of the church were J.H. Calhoun, J.A. Blaylock, C.O. McEacheren, W.L. Lovelady, J.M. Crisman, J.T. Davidson and Wm. Brown.

J.H. Calhoun served as secretary and treasurer of the Eastland Circuit. On May 8, 1882, four lots,

were purchased for \$5.00 from J.H. Huddlestone and two more lots were purchased from Huddlestone October 10, 1882.

On December 8, 1883, two lots were purchased from \$50 from C.U. Connellee by the following trustees: J.L. Steele, C.R. Johnson, C.O. McEacheren and J.H. Calhoun.

The first building on these lots was just one long room built by G.B. Keahey. Later the little white church with a spire and belfry was built on the same lot and this frame building was razed during the boom and the present building was erected on the same lot.

Coyote Control Program Underway

The coyote control program in Eastland County is well underway with the aircraft portion of the program already completed.

A government trapper is now in the area and his services are free for a month. Afterwards, if enough interest and results have been shown to justify a full time trapper for the area, his salary will be paid - one half by the government; one-fourth by the commissioners court; and one-fourth by the land owners who utilize his service.

Landowners and ranchers who haven't signed up for the program may contact Jim Choate at the First National Bank in Cisco. The program is being sponsored by the Eastland County Independent Cattle Raisers' Assn. through the United States Parks and Wildlife Service and the Rodent and Predatory Animal Control Service.

Do You Remember

As is customary in most communities there are aggressive children with vision and an eager desire to explore avenues of gaining things of value. And so it was in the beginning of the oil field activities in the area. A young boy in a rural community observed the trains of wagons traveling from town loaded with oil field material and returning along the road with noload on their wagons.

This boy had heard that money was easy to come by under the increased oil seeking conditions even if his pockets were empty and he had not yet discovered just how the people came into possession of the easy money. He supposed the skinnners on the wagons must have a lot of money since they had to work so hard.

While helping his mother gather fruit from the orchard, the boy developed what he thought would be a good idea to get some of that money for himself. He discussed the idea with his mother who also thought it might work and gave him permission to load his little red wagon with fruits. He pulled the loaded wagon to the public road where he displayed the fruits in plain sight of the people passing down the road.

Could It Happen Again?

He did not have to wait long until a wagon train came by on their way back to town. The first driver stopped to buy fruit from the boy. The other drivers came up and soon all his fruit was gone and he had money in his pockets. Soon the boy was selling watermelons, cantaloupes and apples in addition to the peaches, plums, grapes and apricots. By now, his dad helped move the fruit and melons to the selling site by wagons pulled by horses.

When the fruit was out of season and no longer available to sell, the boy continued looking for some way to make more money. His older brothers had captured a couple of coyote pups a few weeks ago and the boy had trained the half grown coyotes to the leash. He asked his dad to let him go to town with him one day along with one of his coyote pups. His dad agreed and let the boy out of the buggy and the big newly built hotel. As the boy walked through the lobby with his beautiful coyote on a leash, he drew much attention of the many men milling around the lobby. One man offered \$10 for the pup. The boy took the ten dollar bill, gave the leash to the man, then walked out to meet his dad.

Second well has been completed in the Little Cedar (Strawn) Field 13 miles east of Breckenridge in Stephens County.

It is C.B. Hazel of Ranger No. 2 A.C. Speer Estate, spotting 1,400 feet from the north and 467 feet from the west lines of Section 20, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Daily potential was 108 barrels of 43 gravity oil, plus 38 barrels of water. Flow was through a 16-64 inch choke with 400 pounds casing and 110 pounds tubing pressure.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 2,989 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 750-1.

Location is 933 feet south of No. 1 Speer, the field opener. Spade Operating Co. of Abilene will drill No. 2 Joe Jackson in the Jackson (Strawn) Field nine miles west of Caddo.

The planned 1,800 foot venture is on a 29 acre lease. It spots 650 feet from the north and east lines of Section 90, Block 4, T&P Survey.

Jackson Oil Co. of Ranger staked location for No. 4-G Robert Jackson eight miles south of Caddo.

It is a planned 1,850 foot venture for the Jackson (Strawn) Field. Drillsite is 778 feet from the north and 934 feet from the east lines of the south half of Section 77, Block 4, T&P Survey.

The lease is composed of 120 acres. A proposed 250 foot venture was staked in the regular field seven miles east of Moran on a 160 acre lease.

The project is E.D. Anderson, Dallas, No. 1-B Virgil Morris. Site is 150 feet from the north and east lines of the southwest quarter of Section 40, Block 7, T&P Survey.

Location has been amended for a proposed 4,600 foot wildcat four miles northeast of Caddo.

It is Bettis, Street & Stovall Inc. of Graham No. 3 Phillip M. Pitzer. New site is 2,850 feet from the north and 5,080 feet from the east lines of Section 9, Block 4, T&P Survey, A-311.

Everett Sumerlin of Wichita Falls will drill No. 1-A Drake in Eastland County Regular Field. The planned 3,500 foot venture is located 10 miles south of Strawn on a 20 acre lease.

It spots 755 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of E.M. Gray Survey A-144.

Eastland Pigeon Club Particapes In Race

Thirty-one pigeons belonging to members of the Eastland Pigeon Club participated in the Texas Center Race which was flown from LaFayette, La., Saturday, May 10, 1975. Lofts from all over Texas participated. The pigeons were released at 7 a.m. Saturday morning with the wind from the north, northeast at six miles per hour and under partly cloudy skies. The weather developed an ugly attitude and because of this change poor flying conditions prevented any birds to be clocked on the day.

Floyd Frady clocked the first bird Sunday morning at 8:16 a.m. when a red check cock bird timed in at 774.58 yards per minute after having flown an airline distance of 421.398 miles or 741,660.48 yards.

Charles Bode was second with a red check hen bird that clocked 747.48 yards per minute after flying 438.5 miles or 771,777.6 yards.

Thad Kelley was third with a red check cock bird that flew 590.18 yards per minute for a

distance of 439.61 miles or 773,727.68 yards. Curtis Young and Mike Collins had not clocked the birds at the time the clocks were read.

The Texas Center Race is flown each year to finish the old bird racing season. It is the race most members look forward to because of the challenge in getting the individual birds prepared both mentally and physically. Each member can truly say they are proud of their birds.

Life Of Christ Production Begins June 6 At Kendrick Amphitheater

Beginning June 6, 1975, a new production begins in the Kendrick Amphitheater and will be presented each Friday and Saturday night at 9:00 p.m. from that date through August 16, 1975.

The complete life of Christ, the same production that is presented on Easter Sunday, will be repeated throughout the summer as a tourist attraction, not only for this area, but for the State of Texas and the Nation.

The decision to render this production stems from the 11 years of the Easter Pageant Presentation, which is now known nationwide. We, the Kendrick family, feel this is a great reward for the 11 years that have been put into the Easter Pageant, and also feel it is a giant step for this area, as bringing in tourists to these small towns.

At this year's production of the Easter Pageant, two families were in attendance that had driven the distance from Memphis, Tenn., just to view the presentation and return to their homes, a 12 hour drive one way. This made the third year these families have made this trip. Upon their return home, the Kendrick family received a very inspiring letter and sizeable donation from this group to go towards the furthering of the pageants and the museum, as do many of those attending each year.

An admission charge will be made to the presentations, as the entire cast and all involved with the presentation will be on a paid salary. The admission will be: Reserved Seats, \$3.00; General Admission, \$2.00 and children under 12 \$1.00.
