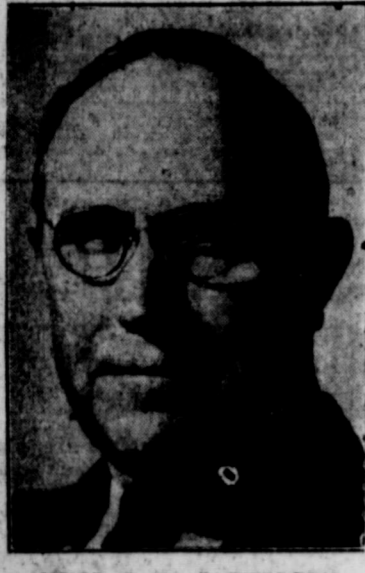


Judge Patterson's Rites At 4 Today



JUDGE B. W. PATTERSON

Judge Burette W. Patterson, widely-known long-time West Texas jurist, who came to Eastland County in 1880, died at 2:50 a.m. Wednesday at Eastland Memorial Hospital. Judge Patterson had been in the hospital seven weeks and failing health dated back 2 1/2 years.

Eastland had been his home 22 years. Born in Stone County, Ark., Sept. 7, 1871, he was the eldest child of a pioneer Arkansas couple, John F. and Sally Patterson. The family moved from Arkansas to Breckenridge, Tex., in 1879, and on to Eastland in 1880, then, in 1881, to Cisco.

Judge Patterson grew up in Cisco. He attended the public schools there and was valedictorian of his high school class. He was educated further in Baylor University and the University of Texas, receiving the LL.B. degree there in 1893, when he was graduated cum laude.

He was admitted to the bar of the Supreme Court of Texas the same year. That September, he was appointed city attorney of Cisco, and he engaged in the practice of law there until 1910, when he moved to Paul's Valley, Okla., returning to Cisco nine years later. He was elected judge of the 88th district court of Eastland County, for the term beginning Jan. 1, 1933. Judge Patterson held this position, by succeeding elections, until the court was abolished in September, 1945.

A long-time member of the Eastland First Baptist Church, Judge Patterson taught the Highways-Byways Class there until his health failed. He was a member of Masonic organizations including the Knights Templar, Scottish Rite and Shrine, and was a past noble grand of the I.O.O.F. Lodge and a past chancellor of the Knights of Pythias.

Judge Patterson was a charter member and former president of the Cisco Lions Club and a life member and former chief of the old Cisco Volunteer Fire Department. He was a member of both the Texas and the Eastland County Bar Associations.

Even after Judge Patterson decided that he was incurably ill, he liked to be active. After having to give up yard work, which he enjoyed, he set about fixing up a workshop for "tinkering" on the second floor of his home-garage. He loved to visit with his friends and to engage in church work.

Judge Patterson was married to Miss Sarah Davies in 1894. To this union was born a daughter, Norma, now Mrs. Dave P. Carlton of Houston.

He was married again in 1936, to Mrs. Helen Mantion Grimes, of the home address, who also survives. The judge also leaves a step-daughter, Mrs. V. L. Beakey and her daughter, Helen, of Fort Worth; and two sisters, Mrs. W. E. Warren, San Angelo, and Mrs. Clyde Karkalis, Cisco, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at the Eastland First Baptist Church at 4 p.m. Thursday, with the Rev. Harvey Kimbler, pastor, conducting. He will be assisted by Dr. Jasper Manton, pastor of Trinity Presbyterian Church, Dallas, a brother of Mrs. Patterson.

Interment will take place in Oakwood Cemetery, Cisco. Hamner Funeral Home will be in charge of arrangements for the services.

Light Turnout For Vaccine About County

Polio vaccinations were considerably less over the county in the past week's program than earlier in the year, according to reports to County Health Officer Dr. L. C. Brown, who had anticipated as much.

Incidentally, less serum was available. The county, this time, was able to obtain only 540 doses, whereas around 770 littlefolk took the inoculations the first time.

In Eastland, formerly 150—representing Scranton, Olden and Eastland— took the shots. This time, from the same areas, 62 took them.

"If others eligible report to my office, they may have the serum as long as it lasts," said Dr. Brown.

Vaccinations for this territory were administered at Eastland Memorial Hospital, with Drs. L. C. Brown, R. E. Townsend, R. C. Ferguson and M. A. Treadwell physicians in charge of the inoculations. Mrs. Townsend, Mrs. Tj. Arther and nurses at the hospital assisted, it was announced.

"This," said Dr. Brown, "probably is the last free vaccine, unless Congress appropriates more money for it."

Burleson Supports Revision Of Status Of Forces Treaty

Need for revision of the "Status of Forces Treaty" is pointed out by Congressman Omar Burleson, in a release he has furnished this paper. Says the Congressman:

"No doubt most people have heard of the 'Status of Forces Treaty.' Article 7 of this Treaty makes American troops stationed in countries belonging to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization subject to criminal laws of the country where the troops are based.

"Under this Treaty with these particular countries, American military personnel can be tried in foreign courts for any crime of which they might be charged. The laws of the particular foreign country apply.

"The same provisions of course apply to any foreign military personnel which may be in this country. Although there are few of military status in the United States, our criminal laws would apply to them should they commit an offense.

"There is unquestionably a need for revision in this Treaty. Our military personnel serving abroad certainly are entitled to have the 'chicken feed.'"

No charges had been filed at press time against two Negroes in Eastland County jail this morning following a highway collision slightly east of Ranger Hill Tuesday night which claimed the life of Mrs. Frank Champion, 67, of Ranger, and seriously injured two others.

Mrs. Champion died in Ranger General hospital Tuesday night at 10:10 p.m. after the car in which the Negroes were traveling failed to negotiate the curve at the top of th hill and crashed into a car driven by Mrs. W. C. Ferguson, who was also seriously injured in the crash.

Also seriously injured was Stanley A. Hunt, 38, of Langburg, Michigan who had hitched a ride in the Cadillac driven by Richard M. Franklin, 20, and Sylvester Dancer, 31, both of Midland, who received only minor injuries.

Cisco Youth Is Hurt In Morton Valley Wreck

A Cisco youth received serious injuries when the car he was driving failed to make a curve in the highway near Morton Valley and overturned several times.

In a Fort Worth hospital with serious injuries is Wilburn McKinney, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McKinney of Rt. 1 Cisco. He underwent surgery at Harris Memorial Hospital.

Reports from the hospital indicated that McKinney's spine was damaged, but that the damage was corrected by surgery.

He had regained consciousness but was unable to move his feet. Physicians were hopeful that the paralysis was temporary, it was reported. He also received a badly lacerated ear in the accident. There were no broken bones.

According to investigating officers the 1954 Oldsmobile belonging to McKinney rolled over two or three times after it left the highway on the curve. Gordon Donaway, also of Cisco, was riding with McKinney at the time of the accident and received only minor hurts.

The two were taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital following the accident. McKinney was moved to the Fort Worth hospital and underwent surgery.

Run-Away Girl Is Given Home In Eastland

The 18-year-old Eastland County girl who ran away from the home of her foster parents, whom she claimed were too harsh with her, has another home, in Eastland. And Sheriff J. B. Williams has breathed a sigh of relief.

She had taken up abode at the county jail and appreciated an opportunity to stay there, during the transition.

Before going to the residence of a county couple, after running away from home, between Cisco and Eastland, she had lived in the woods two or three days.

"A childless couple in Eastland have given her a home and are going to send her to school," said the sheriff. "I believe it will work out all right."

Military Funeral Planned For Korean Victim

Final rites for a Korean soldier, Master Sergeant Harold Lloyd Main, who died in a Korean prison camp May 12, 1951, will be held in Gordon at the First Baptist Church at 2 p.m. Friday.

Sgt. Main was captured near Pyongyang Nov. 30, 1950. Full military honors will be accorded the remains of both World War II and the Korean War, with a chaplain and firing squad from Walters Air Force Base near Mineral Wells performing at the services.

The remains of the deceased is to arrive in Strawn early Friday morning. Burial will be at Russell Chapel southeast of Gordon.

Sgt. Main entered the Army in March, 1941 and served with the Texas 36th Division the remainder of the war. He was separated in Oct. 1945 but reenlisted in 1947.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. A. C. Scarborough of Gordon; three sisters Mrs. C. L. Cozby of Ranger, Mrs. Lois Beardon of Sierra Blanca, Mrs. Elizabeth Sanders of Fort Worth; two nieces and two nephews.

He was born April 5, 1918 in Bell County and was at one time a member of the Ranger American Legion Post. Sgt. Main was 33-years of age at the time of his death.

Here's a Silver Lining for Shower Planners

BY EDNA MILES

If you're the one in the crowd who undertakes to give most of the showers for brides-to-be, you're probably running out of ideas for table decorations about now.

A simple do-it-yourself project will put you back in business for the next bridal shower. Make a parasol centerpiece of silver lace-paper dollys and sashen ribbon, then carry out the theme with place mats in silver lace paper.

To make the parasol, you'll need three 5-inch dollys, one sheet of 24-inch lightweight cardboard, sashen ribbon, cellophane tape, an 8-inch paper plate, a 20-inch-long round curtain rod and candle holders.

Now, cut a half circle of cardboard, 24 inches in diameter. Measure eight scallops along the curved edge, each four inches long. Cut off extra pie-shaped piece at ends, leaving six scallops.

Cut three slits at bottom point, each 1/4 inch long. Roll cardboard into cone shape and tape down, allowing one scallop to overlap. Next, cut five 13-inch lengths of sashen ribbon and attach ends with tape to inside of cone between each scallop. Fasten other end of ribbon to outside of parasol at point of cone, tape down.

Cut dollys in half, tape straight edge to inside edge of cone, pleating as you go. Slit straight edge of dollys so they will fan

open. Fasten small bows at each scallop, pin on. Wind ribbon around length of curtain rod, tape down at each end. Insert rod in cone and tape it down. Now, wrap the two-inch point with tissue paper to insure enough thickness to support the parasol when cone is inserted in a low candle holder. Tape the candle holder to an eight-inch paper plate and cover plate with six bows in either a single or varied colors.

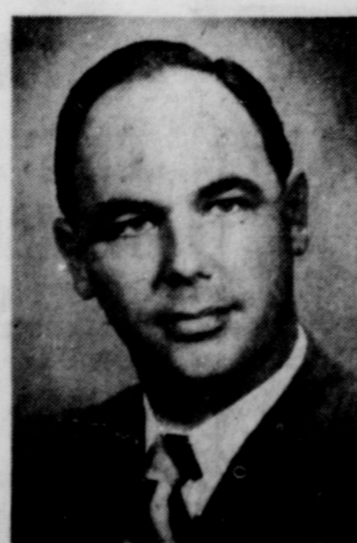

(Continued from Page One) guarantee of the type of justice which this country provides and which we guarantee to all other citizens. It is not a matter of their avoiding punishment for their crimes they might commit, but all the freedoms and opportunities under our government should be applied to them. Few boys are in foreign countries of their own accord.

"Bills to revise the "Status of Forces Treaty" are now before the committee on which I serve and of course I am supporting the measures.

"The Department of Agriculture has announced a more liberalized loan program.

"In areas designated by the Secretary of Agriculture, loans will be made for reseeded and the establishment of grasslands and other approved conservation and land-use practices, including soil and water erosion control measures. There will be a loan program for improvement of existing farm buildings and for the purchase of additional land needed to enlarge a farm to a family-type size.

"Loans also might be made to purchase livestock, farm equipment, equipment repair, seed, fertilizer, feed, insecticides, farm supplies, and for payment of interest and taxes. The borrower will have to qualify in a number of ways to be eligible for such a loan. It is expected that the regulations will be issued in the near future. After this is done, county committees of the Farmers Home Administration will determine the eligibility of applicants.

"It has only been in the last two or three years that people from the less arid sections of the country have thought very much about water supply. Many of these people were usually amazed at those of us from the drier areas because we talk so much about the need for water and soil conservation. More recently these people have become aware that water conservation is becoming a nationwide problem.

"By the time this is published, we will likely know more about the meeting "at the summit" in Geneva, Switzerland.

"Regardless of all the smiles and new honeyed words of the Russians, there is nothing to erase the words of a high-ranking Communist made twenty-four years ago. Dmitry C. Manuisky, speaking to the Lenin School of Political Warfare, had this to say: "War to the hilt between Communism and Capitalism is inevitable. Today, of course, we are not

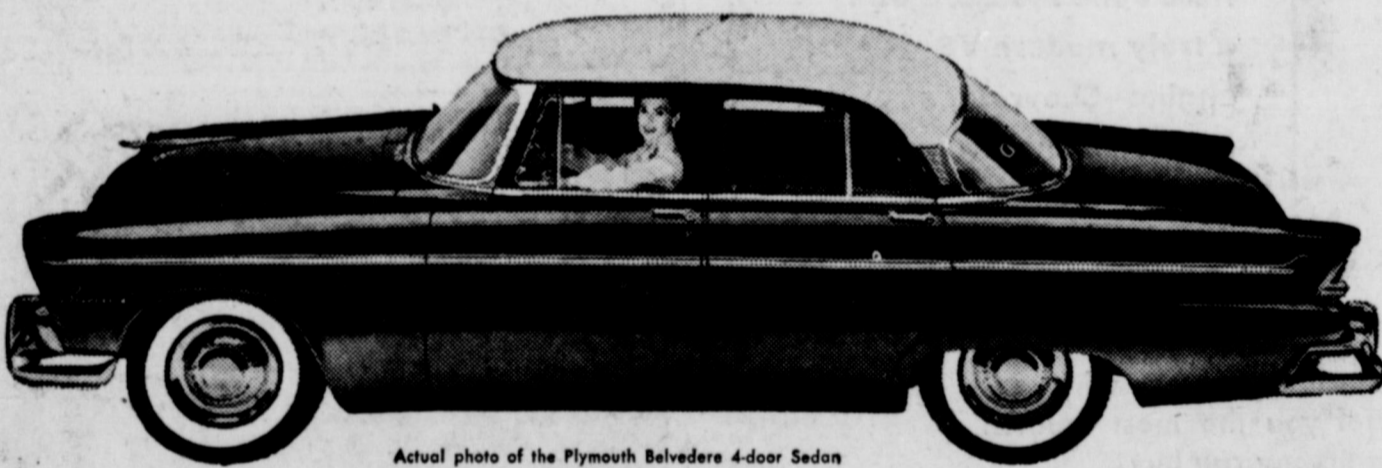

Gresham has practiced law in Houston since 1930 when he was admitted to the Bar.

A former State Bar director, he was elected to the board in 1946 for a two-year term. This year he is chairman of the State Bar Conference Committee with the Medical Profession.

Haste Makes Waste Follows Ancient History

"Haste makes waste" is a copy-book as familiar to most of us as a pair of old shoes. And its no wonder, for the idea is a very old one in our culture.

The sentiment appears as early as the First Century, A. D., in the writings of Plutarch. And the phrase, "Haste maketh waste," apparently had been in the English language a long time when, in 1546, it was published in a collection of English proverbs and colloquial sayings.

When any folk saying survives through the years as this one has, the reason quite possibly may be that the saying expresses some basic truth.

Certainly we can find plenty of truth in this old, simple phrase when we apply it to our modern, complex traffic picture. For on our streets and highways haste often makes waste.

According to the Texas Safety Association, nearly 3 out of 10 drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents in 1954 were violating a speed law — either exceeding stated speed limits or driving too fast for conditions. And this figure of course, does not include accidents which resulted only in injury or property damage.

So it might be said, in traffic, that speed wastes lives. And that it also wastes work time and health. And that it runs up an annual bill of damage to property.

Then too, it has been established that fast speeds of motor vehicles take more gasoline and oil, wear out tires faster than would the same distance traveled at slower speeds.

Haste really does make waste in traffic, which is an excellent reason for everyone to support the traffic safety program on speed control, "Slow Down and Live," which is being sponsored locally this month by the Texas Safety Association.

National symbol of this program is the Hasty Bug, a bee-like creature, always in a state of nervous haste. It's a dangerous, and costly, way to live — and drive.
