Planning For Tornado Depends On Individual

In spite of extensive community preparedness planning for the tornado "season" - at its worst in April, May and June - the greatest responsibility for guarding against injury or death lies with the individual.

People have to watch out for themselves. No matter how effective early warning systems become, property and lives can only be saved if people know what to do and do it quickly and calmly, according to the Texas Insurance Information Center.

Texas is in the tornado ally and each year more than 100 tornadoes are spotted in the Texas skies. Last year 118 tornadoes were reported and ten people killed. Because this state is so susceptible to twisters, Texans should be especially aware of the danger of tornadoes and take certain precautions in advance.

For this reason, the insurance industry joins civil defense, weather service officials, and interested organizations each year as the most dangerous tornado months approach to remind Texans of appropriate safety procedures in the event of a tornado.

The safety rules for tornadoes are simple and have remained pretty much unchanged over the years. The key word is "low".

In homes and office buildings, the lowest floor is the safest. Go to the basement if there is one. If not, a small room or closet in the central part of the structure is safest. Bathrooms offer good

protection because the water pipes which run through the walls help to reinforce the structure, making it better able to withstand the tremendous force of winds and flying debris.

If the bathroom has an outside wall or windows, it might be better to seek shelter in a centrally located closet or hallway since flying and shattering glass is a deadly peril. Taking cover under heavy furniture such as a tipped over upholstered couch or chair is also advised.

Factories, auditoriums and other buildings with wide, free-span roofs are not desirable as shelters.

Most deaths associated with a tornado are caused by flying debris and most injuries are due to being struck in the head or chest. For this reason, care should be taken to protect the head and chest no matter where shelter is taken.

Automobiles and mobile homes are dangerous places to be during any strong winds, but especially during a tornado. Both should be abandoned in favor of more secure shelters.

In open country, when escape seems impossible, get out of the car and run toward the approaching storm. Then, lie face down in a ditch or the nearest hollow and cover your head and neck with your arms.

Immediately after the storm has passed stay put for a few minutes. If you are in a building make sure gas lines are intact before lighting matches. Remember there is a danger of electrocution from lightning and downed telephone lines.

Make sure it is safe before using either the telephone or any electrical outlet. Tune in to a local radio station for survival information.

If you must travel for help, keep an eye out for debris, downed power lines and flash floods. The water supply may be contaminated, so boil all water used for drinking and cooking until you receive word from officials that the water supply is safe. Check with local civil defense officials if you have any questions.

Plan with your family in advance so everyone will know what to do if a tornado threatens. If you home has a good centrally located "storm shelter" or basement, stock it with a spare flashlight, radio and spare batteries along with a first aid kit.

Important papers including insurance policies, wills and titles should always be stored safely where they cannot be damaged by water or fire. Insurance companies always recommend that policy holders regularly inventory their property and keep the inventory in a safe place. An up-to-date inventory can help speed claims whenever there is a loss. Forms to assist in making such inventories are available through insurance agents or by writing the Texas Insurance Information Center, 1011 Congress, Suite 501, Austin, Texas, 78701.

The message is an old one but is worth repeating, especially this time of the year: proper action before and after a storm can save lives and property.

GORDON SPOT

Numerous calls are being received from area home owners who are losing a part or all of their tomato and vegetable garden at this time. In almost every instance, home owners are complaining that the lower leaves on their tomatoes and Irish potatoes are showing small angular brown spots with concentric rings around them. This shows up first primarily on the older leaves and the spots usually don't exceed about a quarter of an inch in diameter. When we get a period of high humidity in the spring of the year, this disease can kill a considerable amount of the foliage on both tomatoes and potatoes. We call the disease, for lack of a better name, Early Blight. It is usually caused by the fungus, *Alternaria*. On both

the potato and the tomato plants, weekly sprayings with one of the Maneb type fungicides will do a very good job of controlling this disease. The material, Chlorothalonil is also quite effective on this disease problem.

A small amount of bacterial leaf spot is also showing up on some tomatoes. This is characterized by a very small, brown, water soaked, circular area, and an eighth of an inch or less in diameter on both the leaves and on the fruit. It will look like a rough fleck on the fruit. The Maneb type fungicide will not control this problem on the tomatoes. However, a copper fungicide, such as one of the copper hydroxide types (Kocide) applied at weekly intervals in the home garden will do an excellent job of controlling this disease.

As always, we must remember, in plant disease control the key is prevention! We cannot kill a plant disease as we kill an insect. We must anticipate the weather conditions, such as warm and high humidity necessary for the plant disease to occur. We must then put on a preventive fungicide in order that the disease will not become a problem in our garden.

It will soon be time to spray pecan trees for casebearer control. This is usually about the last week of May. You are invited to a meeting and field day on pecan disease and insect control Friday morning, May 21. It will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland. Dr. Cliff Hoelscher who is Area Entomologist, will speak on pecan insects and their control. A second speaker will be Dr. Thomas Lee who will speak on control of pecan diseases. He is Area Extension Plant Pathologist. Dr. David Hopper, Area Extension Horticulturist will discuss establishment and care of a new pecan orchard.

After lunch we will have a pecan field day at Charles Walker's pecan orchard south of Eastland on Highway 6. We will examine trees for insect and disease problems. Everyone is invited.

Texas Pork Producers Board will hold its first biennial election on May 31, 1976. The current terms of five board members will expire. Any person living in Eastland County who is engaged in the business of producing hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote. The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all voters. Any producer who did not get a ballot may pick one up at the County Agents' office.




Delicate yellow squash-- hi on the list of favorite summer vegetables--is arriving in quantities at produce markets now and will be available in home gardens in the near future.

BAKED SQUASH GOULASH
4 slices bacon
1 large onion
1 medium sized summer squash or

1 green pepper
2 cups tomatoes, fresh or canned
salt, pepper and sugar.

Cut the bacon in small pieces and fry it. Add the onion sliced thin. Cook the onion until yellow. Add the squash cut in thin cross-wise slices. Add the pepper, cut in small pieces, the tomato, salt and pepper, and sugar. Mix thoroughly and turn the mixture into a casserole. Cover and bake it in a moderate oven for one hour.



while James was a congressman in the U.S. House of Representatives. In 1801, James and Dolley moved to Washington because he had been appointed Secretary of State under Thomas Jefferson.

President Jefferson had no wife, so he asked Dolley to be his first lady. This began Dolley's reign as the Queen of Washington society, which was to last for many years.

When James was elected President in 1808, Dolley began having elaborate receptions which were held throughout James administration.

After his term in office, the Madisons retired to private life on their plantation, Montpelier. James died there in 1836 after a lengthy illness.

Dolley then took it upon herself to organize James notes on the Constitutional Convention of 1787 into a book. I admire her for this because it was an enormous task. Dolley worked constantly on the book and refused to rest. She finally had a nervous breakdown because of overwork. She had bad eyesight, and the work on the book made it worse.

Dolley was always ready to help the needy. This was illustrated by the kindness she showed Aaron Burr in 1804. Burr shot Alexander Hamilton in a duel. Dolley then did everything in her power to help Burr regain his standing in politics. She chose to help an old friend in need, although it could have hurt her husband's political career.

Dolley loved children, and they loved her. Her home was always filled with young nieces and nephews and their friends. Dolley demonstrated her love of children as well as her generosity in helping to establish the first orphanage in Washington. She was the first

directress of the institution. She took it upon herself to cut out hundreds of garments for the city's destitute children.



is Dolly Madison. I would choose Mrs. Madison because of my great admiration for her. She was noted for her charm and tact. Even people of different views could meet at ease in her presence. Her good humored laughter eased many awkward situations. She always had a kind smile and a pleasant word for everyone. She gave freely of her time, money, and most importantly, of herself. She was always willing to help a friend in need. Even when she had little, she gave freely. She was always a beautiful and charming hostess who dazzled Washington with her stylish clothes and brilliant manner of entertaining.

Dolley was born in Guilford County, North Carolina, in 1768. She was the third child of very strict Quaker parents who allowed her no frivolity. She longed for beautiful clothes and ornaments, but her parents told her she was sinful for desiring earthly things. She spent her childhood on a plantation in Scotchtown, Virginia, then her family moved to Philadelphia in 1783. She married a Quaker lawyer, John Todd Jr., in 1790. She and John had two sons, but John and one son died in 1793. After her husband's death, Dolley went to live in her mother's boarding house. There she met Aaron Burr and fell in love with him, although he did not love her. It took her many years to forget Aaron. She met James Madison shortly after her brief courtship with Aaron. Mr. Madison was very quiet and studious, and he was seventeen years older than Dolley. She decided to marry him although she knew she would be expelled from the Society of Friends because James was not a Quaker. They were married in 1794.

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


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

PISTACHIO MARBLE CAKE

1 box yellow cake mix (2 layer size)
1 box Pistachio Instant Pudding mix
4 eggs
1 cup water
