## School Site Election Polls Open at 8 a.m.

Open at 8 a.m. today for the referendum site selection vote—and vote is expected.

Voters will have choice between an 11-acre tract and a 30-acre tract.

On Feb. 10th voters in the district turned out 650 strong to endorse the \$525,000 bond issue election (by almost three to one), but decide today where the new school will be located.

Voting place will be the lounge on the first floor of the courthouse and the polls will be open until 7 p.m.

Qualifications will be the same as for the bond election—a voter must be of legal age, possess a poll tax receipt or be legally exempt, live in the district, AND have property (real or personal) rendered for school taxation.

Both tracts of land lie along Sadosa St., south of the city, and whichever is chosen will be the site for the elementary building. The proposed new gymnasium will be built on the present West Ward grounds, immediately west of the junior and senior high schools.

The vocational shop, also to be built from the bond money, will probably be on high school hill, possibly utilizing an existing structure.

Architect Dan Boone of Abilene and his firm are presently drawing preliminary plans for the new facilities.

The ballot today will be a simple one and should be easy to mark and to count.

## Park Plambeck Files Appeal Bond Monday

Park P. Plambeck of Cisco filed an appeal bond Monday at 10:50 a.m. in the office of District Clerk Roy Lane.

Judge Turner Collie ruled against Plambeck in a suit filed against the Cisco Independent School District and heard Feb. 18 in the 91st District Court in Eastland.

Plambeck is seeking to declare the September 8th \$700,000 Cisco school bond election null and void, alleging voting irregularities.

The case will be appealed to the 11th Court of Civil Appeals.

It will be the second trip to the appeals court for the case. Judge Collie ruled once before in favor of the board after hearing arguments by attorneys, and Plambeck appealed to the higher court.

The Appeals Court reversed Judge Collie's decision and returned the case to 91st District Court to be tried on its merits. No indication of appeals has been filed yet in the other Cisco school case brought by Bill Mitcham asking for a mandamus. Judge Collie also ruled in favor of the board on Feb. 18th in that case.

## Services Held Wednesday For W. B. Overbey

Funeral services for William Basham Overbey, 54, of 215 N. Ostrom were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in the Hamner Funeral Chapel.

Interment was in the Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Hamner Funeral Home.

Mr. Overbey died Sunday in the Eastland Memorial Hospital after suffering a heart attack.

He was born May 16, 1908 in Cisco the son of the late H. C. Overbey and Mrs. Elizabeth Overbey.

Survivors include his mother and four brothers, Harold of San Diego, Calif., T. W. of Hobbs, N. M. and Claude and Albert, both of Eastland.

## TROUT ANSWERS

### 'No' for a City Building Code 'Yes' to Summer Water Rates

"Yes, we need a summer water rate," and "No, we don't need a building code in Eastland," were two of the replies of Commission Candidate Dale Trout.

"It is a known fact that under the management of a past commission, citizens here were offered a summer water rate, with the water to come out of small mudhole north of town—after a tremendous drought," he said.

"It stands to reason that a summer rate could be given now utilizing the wonderful lake with a 35-mile shoreline southeast of town of town (Lake Leon)," Trout says.

"I'm for studying the water rate and if the city finances would justify such a reduction, put it into effect as soon as possible, and start beautifying our city with flowers and greenery."

Trout, co-owner and manager of Central Drug, is one of six candidates who have announced for the April 2nd city election.

Others are Roy Lee Smith, Dr. M. A. Treadwell, Frank Deaton, James Smith and Bruce Pipkin.

"The city is too small for a building code," Trout said. "If such a code were devised for Eastland, it would be an open invitation to unions to come in and raise rates. The individual property owner should be allowed to do his own work as he can, to better our city."

Replying to a question about more traffic control, Trout said: "Yes. Any measure that can be readily applied to protect life and property in Eastland is worth study and putting into effect."

"Placing of a base station in the fire department headquarters for citizen band radio facilities for the Volunteer Fire Department, should be agreed upon by the commission and the fire chief as facts are presented by the people asking for such facilities."

"Every citizen interested in the education and welfare of our children, should assist the school board in every way possible," Trout replied to a question about assisting the school board in re-locating the new elementary school.

Setting up a county study group, composed of representatives from the various towns "is definitely good, sound judgment," he said.

"The city should publish a financial statement at least three times a year," Trout believes.

He answered a couple of questions on promoting the city when he answered thusly concerning an annual Eastland picnic: "An annual Eastland get-together, sponsored jointly by the civic clubs with assistance of the city would be a wonderful thing and I think the first one should be this summer to promote the recreational facilities here. Such an event would draw attention to our wonderful Lake Leon, with thousands invited to visit the great bass lake and our city."

"Making Eastland a better city is of prime importance to each and every citizen and we need to remember that 'every time we promote the city, we're promoting ourselves.'"

Asked about the city charter, Trout said, "Not being as familiar with the charter as I should, this question can only be answered after I've had an opportunity to study it, and certainly if it is out-dated, then I'd be in favor of up-dating it."

"We are called a small town. Let's not be like so many small town people and be complacent, but always strive for progress in our 'so-called' small town," he said.

"Being on the city commission is very important to me and I don't believe anyone can say what they definitely will or will not do until a problem is presented to the commission. This I will do, if elected," he concluded.

### Final Rites For O. L. Hooper Are Held Tuesday

O. L. (Hoop) Hooper, 61, district distribution superintendent for Texas Electric Service Co., died at his home at 506 Daugherty St., Eastland, at 11 p. m. Saturday following a heart attack.

An employee of Texas Electric for 38 years, Mr. Hooper had lived in Eastland for the past 28 years.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2 p. m. at the First Baptist Church in Eastland, with the pastor, The Rev. Huston Brewer, officiating. Burial was to be in Eastland Cemetery with Hamner Funeral Home in charge.

Born July 16, 1901, in Lena Pauh, Okla., Mr. Hooper came to Eastland from Big Spring in 1932. He married the former Cora Mae Ryan an Oklahoma City June 28, 1922. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

District Manager Frank Sayre said of Mr. Hooper: "He was a devoted and loyal friend to all of our employees and to the public. Texas Electric Service Co. has lost one of its most loyal and best employees in the death of Mr. Hooper. His friendship and association with the company will be long remembered."

Survivors include the wife; two sons, Wallace L. of Dallas and Wesley of Hurst; one daughter, Mrs. Dora Dean Chigo of Guymon, Okla.; six grandchildren; three brothers, Willis of Los Angeles, Calif., Emmett of Big Spring and Elmer of Dallas; and two sisters, Mrs. P. D. Burns of Snyder and Mrs. Ray Sue of Cisco.

# Annual Livestock Show 'Ready to Roll' Friday

Competition will be the keenest and interest the greatest when the 1963 edition of the Eastland County Livestock Show begins unfolding in Eastland with judging Friday morning.

The total entry list has already topped 650 animals—putting the show in the top bracket of county shows in the state.

Months of grooming and preparation will come to a climax for hundreds of 4-H Club and FFA members and individuals with the giant show this weekend at the new show grounds, located north of hay-dite plant, just off Highway 80.

Ross Wilson of Gorman, president of the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, has announced that this year's show will be the biggest and best ever.

To cite one area where competition will be stiff, Assistant County Agent Roger Blackmon has announced that there are almost 50 head of steers vying for top honors in this year's show.

It's a spectators' sport, and the public is being cordially invited to come out and match their wits with the judges.

All animals are to be on the show grounds, properly entered and in their stalls prior to 10 p. m. Thursday, so that classifying and sifting can get underway at 8 a. m. Friday.

Judges are top-flight, Wilson said, and are as follows:

Sifting and classifying, Jake Joyce of Coleman; angora goats, Garland Cody of Breckenridge; Sheep and fat lambs, C. T. Parker Jr. of Ballinger; dairy cattle, Curtis Richardson of Denton; fat steers, Heston McBride of Lingo; fat hogs, Dr. Ray Anderson of Fort Worth; swine, Dr. Anderson; and beef cattle, McBride.

Animals shown in the Cisco Livestock Show last weekend will be entered in the county show, and another indication of the popularity of the show is the entry of 67 animals by the Ranger FFA Chapter alone.

Ben McKinnis of Eastland is general show superintendent, assisted in that job by Wilson. Park Plambeck of Cisco heads up the swine division (both classes), assisted by Ben Lancaster and Jimmy Horn, both of Eastland.

C. E. Bridge is in charge of the dairy cattle and George Steele and Joe Criswell head the beef cattle and fat steer divisions.

The annual parade sponsored by the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse will wind its way through the streets of Eastland Friday beginning at 2 p. m.

Eastland schools will have a holiday Friday in celebration of the stock show.

The annual sale will follow the show and will again be held at Eastland Livestock Auction Sale Co., east of Eastland on Highway 80.

## Allen D. Dabney Sr., Local Attorney, Dies

Allen D. Dabney Sr., 85, prominent Eastland attorney, died Wednesday at 12:30 a.m. in the Eastland Memorial Hospital where he had been confined since suffering a concussion and fracture of the skull on Jan. 23 in a fall at the Eastland County Courthouse.

Funeral services will be held this morning (Thursday) at 10 a.m. at the Hamner Funeral Chapel with interment in the Eastland Cemetery.

Officiating the services will be Don H. Morris, President of Abilene Christian College, assisted by John H. Bannister, minister of the Skillman Avenue Church of Christ, Dallas.

Born August 27, 1877 in Brenham, Tex., he spent his childhood days on a stock ranch in Comanche County, and his manhood taught school at May, Tex.

After graduating from the University of Texas law school he began his long and colorful career as a lawyer in Rising

Star, moving later to Eastland in 1909 when he was elected Eastland County Attorney.

Mr. Dabney was a known throughout Texas legal circle as a "fire and brimstone" speaker, often using the Bible in reference to the jury. He forte was that of a Defense lawyer.

However, on one occasion, he was hired as an additional State Prosecutor in the famous "Hanging Skelton Case" in the early 1930's. The case involved the prosecuting of a defense end who had been charged with the murder of an individual whose skeleton was found hanging from a mesquite tree near Rising Star. He assisted the County Attorney Grady Owen in handling the case.

A devoutly religious man, Dabney had served on the Board

County Judge Scott Bailey has certified candidates for school board posts in six districts in the county and for county trustees.

Lloyd L. Bruce of Ranger and J. D. Lauderdale of Cisco, both incumbents, are the only candidates on the county level who have opponents.

Bruce, a veteran school man, is opposed by C. F. (Frank) Coats of Cisco for county trustee at large, and Lauderdale faces Aubrey Easter for the Precinct 4 (Cisco) spot.

Jay Koonce is unopposed for the Rising Star county board seat.

Two places are to be filled in the Carbon district. R. O. Duncanson and Paul Norris are both seeking re-election, opposed by Gailon O. Warren, A. E. Guy and J. D. Griffin Jr.

R. M. Pack is unopposed for re-election to the Desdemona board, as are S. C. Cotton and

Roy Holly in the Rising Star county race.

Four places to be filled in Scranto, with Incumbents Louis Morgan, Elvy Taylor and R. F. Starr seeking re-election and R. E. Thompson vying for one of the spots.

Pat Mosley has announced for one of the two spots on the Olden board. Both J. C. Everett and J. D. Harrell are seeking re-election.

In Gorman, Arnold Butler, Othel Clark and E. N. Higginbotham seek school board posts. Former holders did not announce.

Districts with less than 500 enrolled, file candidates' names for certification with the county judge.

In Eastland, whose school does not file for certification, Dr. Ferguson Lund and Dr. J. O. Jolly are unopposed for re-election.

**IN COUNTY First Traffic Fatality Recorded This Week**

George Washington Chambers, 24-year-old Plains, Tex., Negro, was Eastland County's first highway fatality for the year.

He was dead on arrival at Graham Hospital, Cisco following a two car head-on collision at 12:50 a.m. Saturday, 5.2 miles west of Cisco.

Two other accidents also occurred on Friday and Sunday.

M. C. Brown, 25, of Odessa, was driving a 1955 Buick in which Chambers and three other Negroes were passengers.

Driver of the second car, a 1963 Thunderbird, was Oliver Clark Morrow of Big Spring.

Seriously injured were Brown, who suffered multiple lacerations and abrasions around the head and arm and broke ribs; J. T. Hunt, 19, Odessa, who received severe lacerations and a brain concussion; James Arther Chambers, 22, of Wortham, who is recovering from cuts, bruises and a broken leg; and Roy Chambers, 10 year old stepson of the deceased, who received

bruises and a broken leg.

Morrow, 50, received serious cuts on the face and a broken jaw. He was transferred to Baylor Hospital in Dallas on Sunday and is reported in satisfactory condition.

Both automobiles were listed as total losses, Jack Therwanger, patrolman said.

The Friday accident occurred at 2:30 a.m. 4 miles west of Cisco at the Truck Harbor.

Douglas Raymond Danford of Fort Worth was traveling east in a Chevrolet pickup truck tractor. He lost control in loose gravel and slammed into a marked truck tractor and semi trailer driven by Robert Glacken of Metairie, La.

Approximately \$150 damage was reported to the pickup and \$300 to the semi trailer, Patrolman E. M. Rogers reported.

The third accident, in which no one was injured, occurred Sunday at 5:15 p.m. five miles west of Cisco on Highway 80.

Jerry Frank Legan of Hamlin, a student at Tarleton State College, Stephenville, was driving a 1955 Plymouth and was in collision with a 1959 GMC truck tractor and semi trailer loaded with lettuce and driven by Harry Boazer of Jackson, Miss.

The truck, which is owned by American Cyanamid Co., Jackson, Miss., was traveling downhill in the right hand lane.

In attempting to pass, Legan lost control of his car on slick pavement and collided with the truck's battery box and left front fender.

Minor damage was reported to both vehicles.

**Eleven County Accidents Occur During February**

A total of 11 accidents occurred on Eastland County Highways during the month of February, according to a report from the Department of Public Safety.

Two persons were injured in three personal injury accidents but no fatalities resulted.

According to the report eight personal damage accidents were reported.

Damage on property accidents for the month totaled \$1,875.00.

No fatalities occurred during January and February in 1962 as well as 1963.

Total accidents for the first two months in 1962 was 18 compared to the 23 in the same period this year.

Several personal injuries this year compares to the five last year.

The 13 property damage accidents in 1962 totaled \$10,375 while this year's 16 totaled \$23,860.

### Travel Map Now Free To Public

AUSTIN — The strikingly colorful 1963 edition of the Official Highway Travel Map of Texas is ready for the asking.

Designed to show Texan and tourist alike how to discover the Lone Star State's vacation "fun-tier," the Texas Highway Department publication is free to the public. Copies may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Travel Division, Austin. It is also available at the 25 highway district offices and eight Tourist Bureaus operated by the department. County tax offices have special cards for ordering copies of the map.

Within the year, 750,000 or more of the free maps depicting Texas delights in vivid full-color photographs will find their way to glove compartments all over the United States — and the world.

Keyed to the swelling Texas tourist industry — up 14 per cent in visitor volume last year — the new travel map urges users to "Discover Texas — Today's Fun-tier." The map and its "fun-tier" theme are links in a promotional package of publications and other materials aimed at enhancing the image of Texas as a vacation paradise.

Purpose of the map is to stimulate travel in Texas by both Texas and visitors, and to make it easier for motorists to get from place to place. Scenic and cultural diversification of Texas is capsuled in a message by Governor John Connally urging prospective visitors to "visit our historical sites, vacation playgrounds, inland lakes and Gulf Coast beaches — our mountains, plains and piney woods — our cities and towns. The Texas Highway Department will be happy to provide you with any information you may need for your visit."

Eighteen full-color photographs illustrate the Governor's description of Texas' varied vacationlands. Depict-

ing activities ranging from big-league baseball to bass fishing, the photographic cross section and easy-to-read map comprise a useful showpiece of the many splendored charms of Texas.

The 28 x 36-inch map shows that highways have been growing with Texas and contributing to the growth of its tourist industry. Multi-lane-divided highways miles now completed and indicated on the new map total 2,808 miles.

Nearly 50,000 miles of highways are shown on the current map. Some 22,000 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market roads are shown and all Interstate, U. S. and State highways are indicated. Located on the new map are 354 Roadside Safety Rest Areas. The 1963 map lists 1,837 towns and cities. Major routes in the states twelve largest cities (over 100,000 population) are shown in inset maps. Cities covered: Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock, San Antonio, Waco, and Wichita Falls. Elevations and population symbols are also given for cities.
