Security Field Man Coming To Eastland Monday

E. Glenn McNatt, field representative of the Abilene Social Security office, who will be in Eastland at the driver's license office in the City Hall at 10 a.m. Monday, today gave some pointers on the farm phase of social security.

He presented it as a question-and-answer:

Question: What is a farm operator's responsibility with regard to filing a social security report of the wages paid to his farm workers?

Answer: Beginning January 1, 1955 the Social Security Law covers farm workers who are paid at least \$100 by a farm operator. In these cases, the farm operator will withhold 2 per cent social security tax from wages paid to the farm worker.

The farm operator will add 2 per cent as his share, and will file an annual report with the Internal Revenue Service. The report will show the names of each employee who was paid \$100 in cash in the year, his social security number, and the total amount of wages paid.

If the total tax liability of the farmer on his hired help totals as much as \$100 by April 1, July 1, or October 1, he will deposit that tax money with Internal Revenue but will not report names of employees until time for his annual report. The farm operator will keep a permanent record of the name and social security number of all his employees.

PCA's Annual Meet To Be At Stephenville

The 21st annual stockholder meeting of the Stephenville Production Credit Association will be held August 10 at the city park in Stephenville. Stockholders from the 10 county area will elect two directors. The terms of directors C. M. McCain of Eastland County and T. W. Winters of Hamilton County expire this year. Carryover directors are Cal McCurdy of Deatur, president; James Crouch of Purleson, vice president; and Claude Winston of Glen Rose in Somervell County.

The nominating committee met in Stephenville July 11. J. M. Foreman of Comanche County was elected chairman and the other members of the committee include Clyde Boren of Erath County; Zeb Kirkland of Hamilton County; Mitchell Campbell of Eastland County; Melvin Little of Wise County; W. A. Crawford of Tarrant County and C. M. Parks of Johnson County.

The nominating committee selected both McCain and Winters and nominated R. E. Seay from Comanche. Mr. Seay has previously served as a member on the Production Credit Board of Directors. Prior to his resignation in 1956 he was president of the association. Mr. McCain from Eastland has served one term of three years and Mr. Winters has served nine years.

Comanche and Eastland Counties, under the management of Jim Bumpass and Dick Wesson, will be in charge of the meeting August 10. C. E. Irby of DeLeon has been appointed as general chairman to conduct the activities. Highlights of the meeting will be the barbeque dinner with H.P.'s Catering Service of Stephenville in charge. A free picture show will be provided at the Majestic theater for all children while the meeting is in progress.

To stimulate attendance the association is giving a television set as first prize and several other attractive items. The annual meeting attendance trophy will be on the block — this trophy goes to the office having the highest per cent on membership attendance. The trophy was won last year by the Eastland office with 65.5 per cent of its members from Eastland on hand; Erath County was runner up with 61.2 per cent.

New Armory Outlook Brightens at Cisco

Circumstances are shaping up favorably for a new armory for the Cisco National Guard Unit, according to Gen. H. M. Ainsworth, chairman, Texas National Guard Army Board, Austin.

General Ainsworth has written Capt. F. N. Sayre of Eastland, commanding officer of Cisco Battery, that he has "received a telegram from Washington assuring me that the House and Senate have passed the necessary amendments making it possible for us to continue our construction program.

"It must now go to the president for his signature," he continued, "but in due time we will be able to reactivate the program we had before and if the board adopts the same schedule as heretofore, then Cisco should come up for construction in the fiscal year of 1956."

A sizable and attractive building is projected as an armory there. The present structure on the property would be retained, in which to house vehicular equipment of the battery.

Purse, Top Producer Guarantee Success of Ranger's 4-Day Rodeo

Final touches are going on the plans for the four-night showing of the 12th Annual Ranger Rodeo being sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce Aug. 10-13.

Pens and chutes have been repaired for the event and decaying portions of the grandstands have been replaced with Redwood.

Scheduled for the show that is being produced by one of the nation's top rodeo personalities, Everett E. Colborn of Dublin, are some of the top performers ever billed on rodeo programs.

Glen Wood, a 29-year-old Oklahoman and favorite among the sport's world, will announce the four-night show. Wood began to follow his career while in college as a championship debater. With a major in radio he worked his way through college as a part time announcer and sportscaster.

Being an all-state track man in high school and playing football and basketball gave him a knowledge of sportscasting which he pursued professionally after college.

After an 18 month stint with the Armed Forces Radio service in the Pacific island, Kwajalein, he returned to the states and once again began his rodeo announcing. He was also a World War II

quest for announcing consists of National P.G.A. Golf Tournaments, horse shows, Shetland shows, baseball, boxing, wrestling and stock car races.

Comie for the show will be Don King, a Gainesville cowboy who recently turned bullfighter a n d clown.

Charlene Calvin Beal, Shawnee, Okla., will appear at the rodeo in exhibitions of trick roping and Roman riding.

One of the most spectacular events at the four day affair will be the Quadrille, a square dance routine, led by Colborn. The Quadrille is a precise movement complete with music and is accomplished only by trained cowboys, cowgirls and their trained mounts.

The money purse or cash awards is always the drawing card to any rodeo—an incentive for contestants to travel miles around to compete in various shows.

For Ranger's World Championship show, winners will carry away well stocked money sacks.

A total of \$3400 is being made available for winning competitors in the show.

Five events, calf roping, bulldogging, bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding and bull riding will pay \$600 to each of the winners. Prizes of \$200 will be given winners in the cutting horse contest and the girl's barrel race.

Landowners and Soil Conservation Service technicians worked together in finding suitable locations for these ponds to include soil that will hold water, a suitable drainage area into ponds, and suitable spillways to function properly when ponds are full and discharging flood water.

Farm ponds were completed and final checks made on the farms of C. A. Perry seven miles southwest of Cisco, Robert D. Donovan eight miles northwest of Cisco, Billy Bacon three miles south of Cisco, J. V. Heyser Jr. five miles southwest of Nimrod, Virgil Massingill one mile east of Eastland, Sallie Bishop ten miles north of Gorman and W. H. Cooper six miles northwest of Cisco.

Terraces and diversion terraces were run on the farms of Emery L. Booth of Cisco, Virgil Massingill of Eastland and W. T. Booth of Cisco.

Terraces and diversion terraces were completed and final checks made on the N. A. Brown farm Cisco, Bill Childers farm five miles north of Cisco and Clyde Benton farm six miles south of Eastland.

Robert D. Donovan is giving 800 acres of his range land, north of Cisco, a summer deferment to increase the vigor and spread of his higher producing native grasses.

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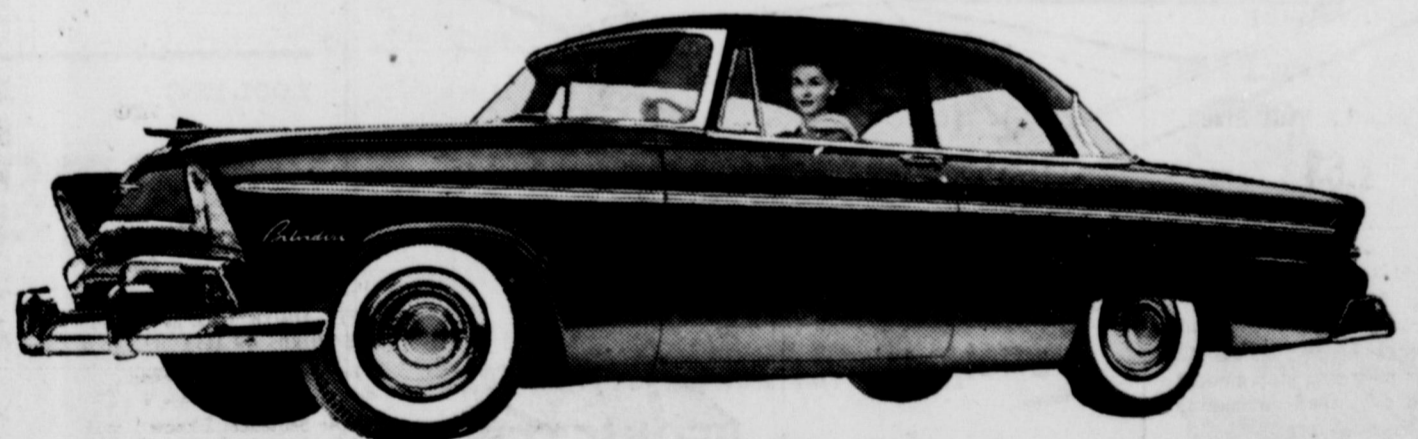
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Miss Miller, Bride-elect, Is Feted At Gift Tea In Abilene
