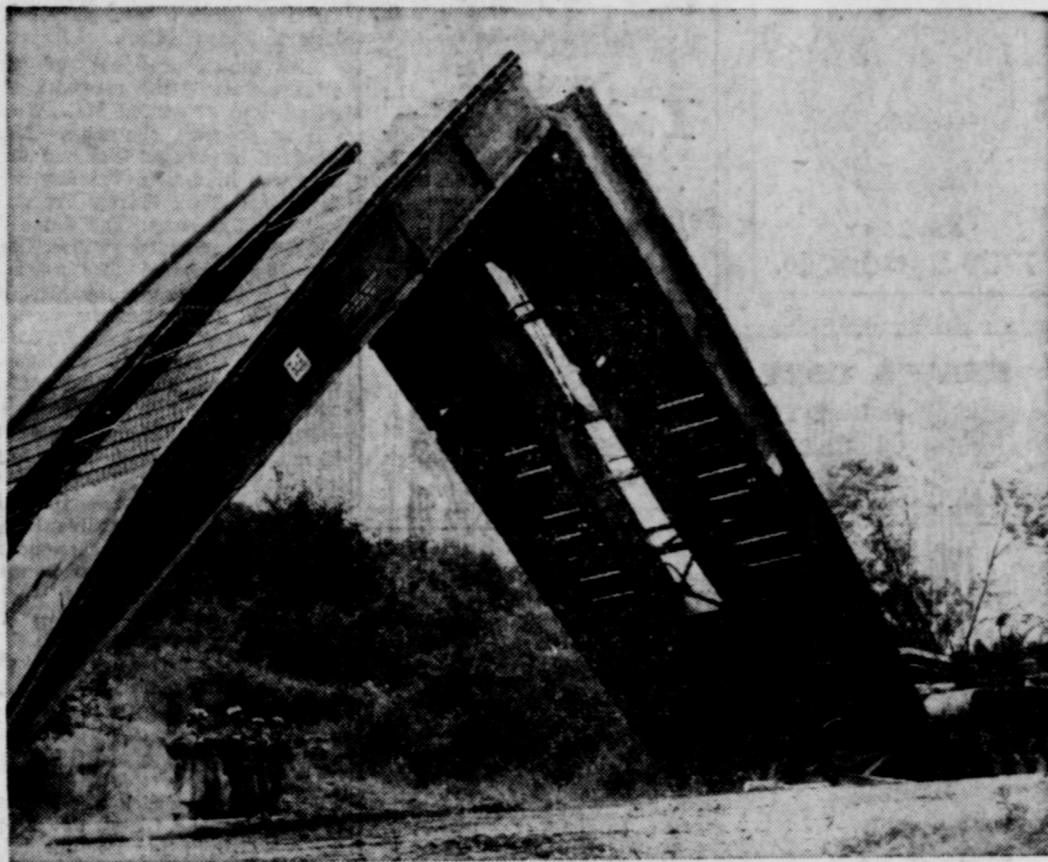

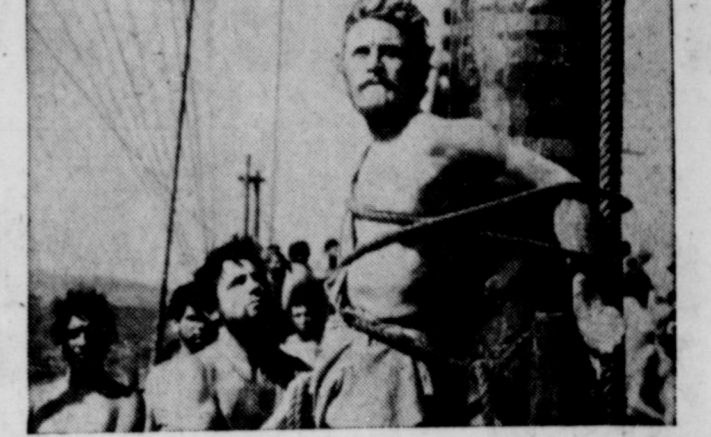

Thursday Afternoon Club Hears Review, 'White House Profile'

Mrs. Ben Hamner led the program on the book, "White House Profile" by Bess J. Furman at the Thursday Afternoon Club meeting at the Woman's Club. She gave a description of the structure of the White House, its rooms, their sizes, and its physical appearance in general. She introduced Mrs. Turner Colie who gave the White House story and its varied occupants, their changing tastes and interesting bits of their personalities beginning with Adams and telling of those to Andrew Jackson. Mrs. Robert G. Perkins told about Andrew Jackson and all the presidents and their wives who inhabited the White House through the regime of Abraham Lincoln. The remainder of the club and their wives, daughters and hostesses were divided between Mrs. Clyde Young and Hamner, bringing the interesting record of the White House and its occupants to the present time. President Adams gave a prayer for the mansion, as follows: "I pray heaven to bestow the best blessings on this house, and all that hereafter inhabit it." Many years later, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt had this prayer carved on the mantel of the fireplace in the state dining room. Dolly Madison was hostess and later advisor to the official hostesses through several regimes; and various occupants added their influence to the decorations, color schemes and furnishings through the years. 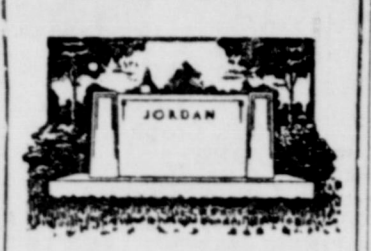

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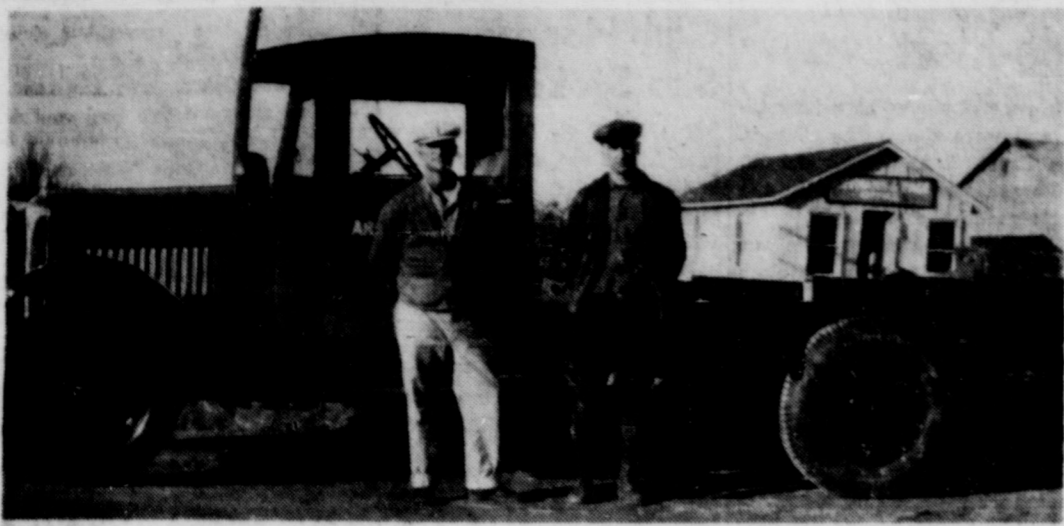
