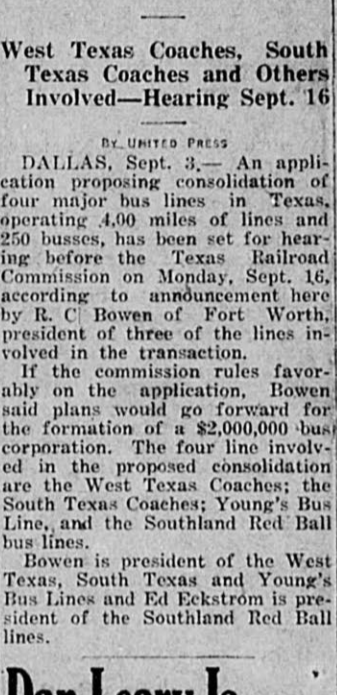

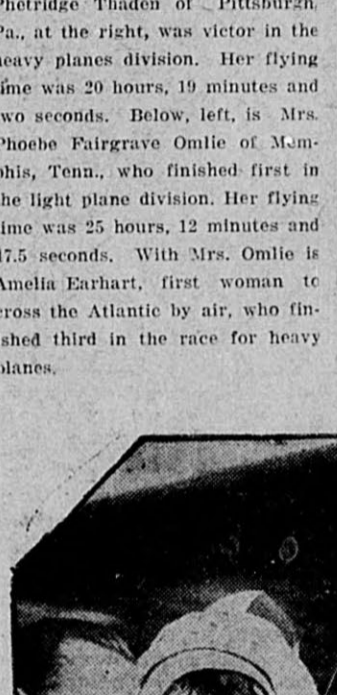

(Abilene News.)
 You never can judge a man by his appearance. He may look dumb, and be a perfect genius.

An Austin newspaper says that when Captain Ira Eaker, who won fame as pilot of the Question Mark, the first plane to gain fame in a refueling endurance flight, and one of the best known aviators in the country now, was so modest and retiring while attending ground school at the University of Texas in 1917 that nobody paid any attention to him. He gave no outward sign of the latent genius within him.

Lindbergh was already a flier with many hours to his credit before he entered the army school at San Antonio—so awkward and apparently so dumb that he was made the butt of many rough jokes.

Just the other day a college professor gave two groups of pictures to several score men and women. One group showed young men who had rated exceptionally high in mental tests. The other group was of young men who rated very low in the same tests. The men and women to whom the pictures were submitted were asked to differentiate the brilliant and the stupid groups. A majority picked the stupids for the bright ones.

TECHNICAL JUSTICE.

(Fort Worth Record-Telegram.)

Out in California a banker was on trial for grand larceny, forgery and conspiracy to cheat and defraud. Brought to trial, a jury was selected. After it was sworn in, one of the 12 found out that one of the witnesses was so related to him that he feared that his opinion might be prejudiced beyond the weight of the testimony. The judge agreed with him and ordered a replacement from the original venire. The attorneys for the defendant objected—apparently perfunctorily—but the judge ruled that the right to do so was legal, the actual taking of testimony not having begun.

The trial proceeded with the new juror empaneled, the defendant was found guilty and sentenced to the penitentiary. The case was appealed and the second district court of appeal in California reversed the conviction and quashed all existing charges against the defendant.

The reason it gave was that the situation of a juror after the trial was accepted and sworn in equivalent to "double jeopardy" which is trying a defendant twice for the same offense. Therefore, the man who was convicted of theft, forgery and conspiracy to defraud is now a free man and without the clutches of the law, for no greater reason than the attempt of a juror to be conscientious.

Submitted as an example of how far afield the American people are from the operation of abstract justice. If it further accents the need for complete reform, so be it.

WHY NOT TEXAS?

(Fort Worth Record-Telegram.)
 On Aug. 14 the state of California began to enforce six new motor vehicle laws. They were in the nature of particularization of some already in existence and were intended as corrective in some instances and protective in others.

Four of them have direct application to the already existing law on the liability of the driver of a motor car. The addenda are intended to make it easier "to eliminate reckless and financially irresponsible drivers from the streets and highways, and will insure that judgments lodged against drivers for negligence or recklessness will be paid." The fifth is for regulating the use of

the horn—it stipulating explicitly that "the horn shall be used only as a reasonable warning." This sixth automatically expires all existing drivers' licenses and provides for re-issuances, within a reasonable time, in the cases of those who do not show a too great record of carelessness or recklessness. In those instances, provision will be demanded for a greater personal liability.

cause being a purported conversation between Leahy and the defendant, Henry Helms, after the former had returned from Georgia, town after the hearing on his plea of insanity, as detailed by a witness offered by the State. This testimony revealed the result of the Leahy case and was the only manner in which such evidence was permitted to go before the jury.

In paragraphs three, four, five and eight the defendant's counsel complains of the argument by the State's counsel. In the first place the assignment of error as contained in these paragraphs quotes scattered sentences of the argument of the State's counsel, which if correct and taken alone, might be considered objectionable and damaging. However, the defendant's counsel, who opened the argument, was allowed great latitude and not required to confine himself strictly to the record and much of the argument of the State's counsel was in reply to and justified by the opening argument.

In the second place much of the argument complained of in these paragraphs was justified from the record in the case. The court made an honest effort in the trial to prevent improper testimony or argument to go before the jury and finds no merit in the matters complained of in that connection.

"In paragraph seven counsel for the defendant complains that the jury was permitted to separate during the trial. The facts are that the jurors were kept together throughout the trial of the case as in criminal case, charged by the court to remain together throughout the trial, and only on one occasion as far as could be ascertained by the court were the jurors separated. On this occasion, after the noon hour, the jurors were ordered to the courtroom and when they had filed in it was detected that there were only eleven jurors present. When this fact was ascertained the court immediately instructed the sheriff to retire the jury to the jury room, which was done, and when the jury reached the jury room it was ascertained that the missing juror was locked in a toilet in the jury room, that he had no opportunity of conversation with any person or any person with him. Immediately thereafter the jury was brought in a body to the courtroom and proceedings continued. With this exception the jury was constantly together in the care of an officer.

"The motion for a new trial in this case was not filed until after the defendant Henry Helms had been returned by the sheriff of Eastland county to the penitentiary at Huntsville, and as the court finds that there is no merit to the motion as filed, and as the statute of this state does not provide for such proceedings, the court does not feel justified in requiring that the defendant be returned from the penitentiary to be present at a hearing on this motion.

"It is therefore the opinion of the court that the motion is not entitled to further consideration and it is so ordered."

Establish New Aquatic Records

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 3.—Two state aquatic records were shattered at Deep Eddy here yesterday when 300 swimmers and divers met in the annual contest of the Texas Amateur Athletic association, sponsored by the Austin chamber of commerce.

The state record for the 400-yard swim held before the overhand stroke of Barney Bowling, Austin, who clipped off the distance in 5:40.7. The old record was 5:52.2. Phillips Kerrville, was second.

The other record breaker was Babe Ruth Dillard, Fort Worth swimming instructor, who swam the 400 yards for Junior girls in 6:31.8. Lillian Shepherd, Houston, was second.

Man Is Beaten To Death; Police Seek Man, Woman

AMARILLO, Sept. 3.—While authorities of two counties, Potter and Randall, and Amarillo police were searching for three men and a woman suspected of the fatal beating of Sam T. Hutton, 50, Dallas carpenter in South Amarillo last night, the body was being held at a local undertaking establishment.

According to J. A. Peterson, also of Dallas, who was injured by the attackers, the two men had gone to a place just over the line in Randall county, while three men attacked them and Hutton's neck was broken.

Becky Rogers To Plead Insanity

FORT WORTH, Sept. 3.—Insanity will be the plea of Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers when the fourth attempt to try her for the robbery of the Buda State Bank in 1928 is made at New Braunfels next week. She again will be defended by her husband, Otis Rogers, Fort Worth lawyer.

Woman's Nude Body Found

MORRIS, Ill., Sept. 3.—A fantastic theory of a "perfect crime" involving murder by a non-traceable poison or gas and the preservation of the body for a month by refrigeration was reconstructed by detectives here today in the investigation of the mysterious death of a woman, whose nude body, carefully sewed in a burlap bag, was found beside a highway near here yesterday.

Attempted solution of the mystery called in all the science of criminology, psychology and medicine. The theory of murder, founded on only the slightest clues, was waded in every stream and depicted the murderer as one who for weeks had hidden the body of his victim.

Young Heflin Arrested Again

PHOENIX CITY, Ala., Sept. 3.—Charges of public drunkenness and violation of the prohibition law today were lodged against J. Tom Heflin, Jr., son of the famous Alabama "dry senator." He will be brought to trial tomorrow in recorder's court.

Young Heflin and a companion, B. M. Haines of Standing Rock, Alabama, were arrested last night after they had come zig-zagging into town in an automobile. Police said the course of the car indicated clearly that its driver was under the influence of liquor.

Haines was said to have been at the wheel. He failed to stop when ordered, but later the machine was halted and searched. Police said they found three bottles of "home brew," in a sack in a trunk built onto the rear of the machine.

The liquor will be analyzed to determine the exact alcoholic content. If found to be non-alcoholic the defendants will still be liable for having in their possession "a beverage resembling alcoholic liquors."

OIL NEWS

TULSA, Ok., Sept. 3.—Total crude oil daily average production in the United States decreased 4-345 barrels to 2,528,213 barrels compared with the week before, the Oil and Gas Journal reported today.

Oklahoma production reached 735,315 barrels, an increase of 10-395. Addition production in the Oklahoma City field caused the state's increase, the Journal showed.

With a total daily average production of 1,652,563 barrels, the Mid-Continent field increased 7,718 barrels.

Daily average production in West Texas slumped 2,164 barrels with the gauges showing 374,990 barrels.

California, for the most part, was responsible for the nation's decrease. California declined 13,500 barrels with average production of 875,000 barrels.

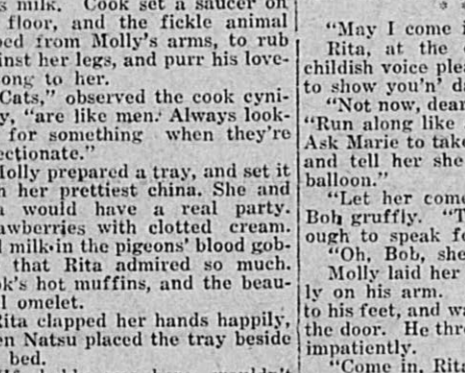

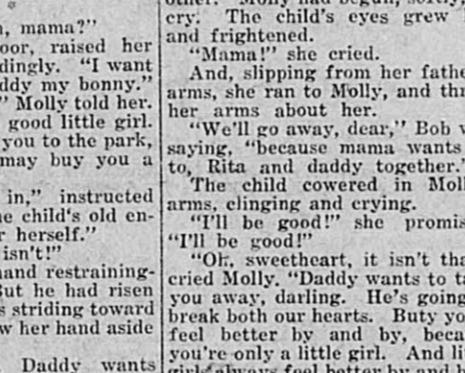
