New High School Building Project Studied At Cisco

The Cisco School board has instructed the building committee to begin laying the groundwork for a new high school building and to be prepared to present something concrete at the next board meeting October 10.

A budget of \$269,995.61 for operating the Cisco Public Schools for the 1955-56 school year was discussed and adopted at the monthly meeting of the trustees. The budget will over-spend the estimated receipts by some \$6,500, it was reported to the board by Arlin Bint, superintendent.

He said that the deficit would come from a small reserve built up in the past three years as a buffer.

He also pointed out that under the present requirements and under the present tax situation the deficit would be some \$9,000 to \$10,000 for the next school year. Mr. Bint pointed out that the \$6,500 deficit was brought about by the state requiring more local participation in the school program and not by increased spending.

The overall state school picture, brought about by student inflation, he said, caused the state to saddle the schools with an additional load of some \$9,000,000 for the 1955-56 school year and that Cisco's part of the figure was in the neighborhood of the \$6,500, and that no additional local revenues had been provided.

Well Started On Bell Farm Near Cisco

Lyman and Woods of Breckenridge have moved on location on the Earl Bell farm, owned by Oscar White, east of Rising Star for a test scheduled to the Armitage at 800 feet. Falling at that depth it is planned to drill to the 3,300-foot horizon.

The annual Eastland City Golf Tournament is being held at Lake-side Country Club here.

Qualifying rounds will be shot through Sunday. It will be a leisurely tournament, with match play to be reeled off within the next three or four weeks.

Play is open to all Eastland golfers.

Four flights of perhaps eight players each are anticipated.

Everett Plowman is defending champion. To take top honors last year, he defeated Bill Sikes.

He has won the championship trophy two years in succession and if he captures it this year, it will be his permanently.

Motor Vehicle Inspection Is Opening Today

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the Public Safety Commission has set September 15, 1955, through April 15, 1956, as the new Motor Vehicle Inspection period for state motorists.

Garrison pointed out that this will give Texas car owners a full seven months to report to one of the more than 4,000 licensed inspection stations in the state for a safety check of their vehicles.

Two Regular Producers Staked In County

Delpaso Oil Co. of Clint, Texas, completed No. 1 Morton Estate as a regular field producer one mile northwest of Olden in Eastland County. It is in Warren Lyman Survey 2.

Daily potential was 78 barrels of 40 gravity oil, flowing through a 20-64 inch choke with 400 pounds on casing and 135 on tubing, from open hole at 1,444-39 feet.

Six miles south of Ranger, Frank Love and Co., of Wichita Falls completed No. 7 Robert Fox as a regular field producer. It is in Subdivision 30, McClennan CSL Survey 2.

Daily potential was 18.90 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 20 percent water, pumping from open hole at 1,238-41 feet.

Staked in the regular field two and a half miles north of Pioneer was El Macho Oil Co. of Dallas No. 1 A. B. Smoot.

Slated for 2,600 feet with rotary, it spots 2,330 feet from the south and 7,700 feet from the east lines of George Click Survey, Abstract 52.

EHS Goes Double Service for Into 2nd Traffic Victim Kin Of Nearby Resident

Crippled and battered, Eastland's Red and Black Mavericks take on the over-sized Bearcats of DeLeon Friday night. The game will be played over there.

Already minus the services of three star players, the Mavericks lost another one Tuesday afternoon when halfback Dick Corbell almost lost an ear. It took 20 stitches to close up the injury and it is not known how long Corbell will be out. He had been moved from end to a backfield position to help fill in the vacancies left by Cates and Upchurch who had been injured in the Cisco game.

As previously reported, Upchurch is out for the season with a sprained ligament in his knee. Cates, who suffered a sprained ankle in the Cisco game, has seen little work this week but might possibly be able to see limited service Friday night.

Wayne Durham, one of the outstanding Maverick linemen, will be out of service with a sprained ankle. Jimmy Martin, another back, who sprained an ankle this week in scrimmage, may be back in the line-up Friday, and may not.

In spite of all the injuries and in spite of the great weight advantage of the Bearcats, Coach Carrol Shelton feels the Mavs will turn in a better game this week than last. He rates the Mavs as about the same as Dublin, who lost to DeLeon last week 21 to 6, but he indicated the Eastland lads are capable of playing a better game than that if they will.

Shelton says that the Mavericks need more than anything else is aggressiveness, the spirit to take the fight to the enemy rather than to sit back and wait for it to come to them. He says the Mavs are well equipped — they have a good line and they can run and pass and kick — but they've got to show more get-up-and-get to realize the most out of their abilities.

There was a lot of sloppy playing last week and the coaches hope most of the mistakes have been corrected. They have watched movies of the game and have worked on their errors and should be an improved club by Friday night.

Of course, the injured players will be missed, and may spell the difference in a good showing and a bad one, but it will be a game worth going to see.

School officials hope as many people from Eastland will make the trip as can possibly get away.

At Least Two More Years In "A" For EHS

Eastland will definitely remain in Class A football for at least another two years, according to the latest information sent out by the Interscholastic League Re-classification Committee.

Assignments for all districts, from AAAA down to B, were made on the basis of the average enrollment in the last four grades during the 1954-55 school year.

Class A reclassifications fell under the average enrollment of 125-225, and that included Eastland. The new conference assignments are good for a two year period, which means that Eastland will be in Class A during the 1956-57 year, and during the 1957-58 year.

After that, enrollment requirements will take a sharp drop. If Eastland has an enrollment of 200 or better in the 1956-57 school year, the school will be in Class AA in 1958-59.

Conviction For Gorman Man In US Check Case

Abilene, Sept. 15 — After pleading guilty to two charges of forging and passing two U.S. Treasury checks, David Jake Underwood, 42, of Gorman, was sentenced to a year and a day in prison here Wednesday by Federal Judge Joe Ewing Estes.

Underwood admitted in court that since 1951 he had forged and cashed 39 government disability checks made out to his brother, Rayford, who has been in a Wichita Falls hospital since Oct. 28, 1948.

The U.S. district attorney said that numerous other checks sent had been cashed by the man's father prior to his death.

Dr. Kincaid, 82, pioneer Crowell physician, and his 79-year-old wife were killed when their auto struck a tree 2 1/2 miles east of Thalia on U. S. Highway 70.

Dr. Kincaid, 82, was driving. The road was under construction, and he apparently swung off the road to the right, then lost control of the auto as he brought it back on the highway. It smashed into a tree on the opposite side of the road.

Dr. Kincaid was president of Crowell State Bank.

Survivors are a son, Merl Kincaid of Crowell, and two daughters, Mrs. Harvey Turnbough and Mrs. Dale Grimes of Lubbock, and seven grandchildren.

Mrs. Nix left immediately for Crowell upon receipt of word of the fatal accident.

Army Aviation Needs Certain Qualified Men

Army aviation, which has some of the latest developments in aircraft, is in need of qualified men to fill vacancies in the repair and maintenance sections.

Technical training in four-month courses is available for high school graduates who meet the rigid qualifications for the aircraft field.

Included among the Army aviation equipment is the new Convertiplane, a helicopter type plane with rotors on the wings. Once in flight, the rotors will shift from a vertical to a horizontal position, converting the helicopter to a regulation airplane.

Commercial aviation has been interested in the Army experiments with the convertiplane since aircraft of this type may be the answer to the landing problems of airfields with limited runway space. Recent test flights proved the capability of the aircraft, which was developed at Fort Worth, Texas.

Information on a career in Army aviation may be obtained from the U.S. Army Recruiting Station, Breckenridge or local draft board, each Wednesday and Thursday, in Eastland.

New Program of Navy Explained Regard School

It was recently announced by the Navy that (HS-AN), airman training is offered to high school graduates under the new High School Program sponsored by the U.S. Navy Recruiting Service. Young men or women who desire training as airman may apply by presenting their high school diploma upon application for enlistment at the nearest Navy recruiting station.

Airman training is of a highly technical and specialized nature. Upon entering the Navy all applicants are sent to a recruit training center with the option of going to San Diego, California, or Great Lakes, Illinois, for nine weeks of indoctrination and basic training, guidance and classification. Upon completion of this phase of training, airman training is then administered through service schools located at Norman, Oklahoma, Memphis, Tennessee, Pensacola, Florida and Corpus Christi, Texas.

Airman service schools provide training in the following fields: Aviation Machinist Mate, (AM), are responsible for keeping the engines and other mechanical equipment of aircraft in perfect working order; Aviation Electronics Technician, (AT), maintain and repair all airborne radio and radar equipment; Aviation Ordnanceman, (AO), prepare and load bombs, torpedoes and rockets for naval aircraft; Air Controlman, (AC), directs all ground and air traffic from control towers; Aviation Structural Mechanic, (AM), maintains all structural parts of aircraft.

Rangers Meet Nation's No. 3 Team Tonight

The untested Rangers of Ranger Junior College — their ranks spotted with green freshmen, have an opportunity to gain national prominence tonight in Paris when they meet the Paris Junior College Dragons, the nation's No. 3 junior college team.

A perennial powerhouse among Texas junior colleges, Paris will field 19 returning lettermen this year from a team that was defeated only once last season. Their

one loss was inflicted by Arlington State, 6-0.

A nation football poll has rated the Dragons No. 3 nationally.

Extensive, stiff workouts on the college practice field here has taken only a small toll injury-wise. However, some of the losses will be felt in the Rangers' opening game.

Cleo Thomas, 177-pound fullback from Mineral Wells has been sidelined for two or three weeks with a shoulder separation. During the first practice session, Thomas blasted for a 75-yard touchdown on his first carry and injured his shoulder only minutes later as he made a tackle on defense.

A hard, fast runner, Coach

Stan Burnham was counting on the Mineral Wells athlete as a mainstay in the Ranger offensive attack pattern.

Elton Ables was also idled with a rib injury. A freshman, Ables was in competition for a starting position in the quarterback slot. Jim Bob Roberts, 181-pound starting center, was inactivated a few days with an injured ankle. He is expected to be ready for the Paris contest however.

Defense has been the main theme in the Ranger workouts this week in long practice sessions beginning at 2 p.m. and ending after 5. Naturally offense was not entirely ignored.

The coaching staff, however, is

not pleased with the results of the afternoon workouts.

After a scrimmage Tuesday night under the lights, Burnham said, "We're making too many mistakes. Our timing is bad, our passing is poor and we can't hold onto the ball."

The coach staff was in harmony in agreeing that there was not sufficient time to build a team in only 15 days.

Assistant Coach Pat Thomas said, "Any year that you run the split — for the first time with a group of new boys and a new coaching staff, you are going to look sloppy. You need a year when you have 18-20 returning lettermen and 20 to 25 good newcomers then you don't have too much to worry about."

"We just haven't had enough time together," Assistant Coach Tom Hestand added emphatically.

Burnham said, "This is the cleanest bunch of boys I have ever seen anywhere, and they all have plenty of natural ability, but until we have more time to work

together, we won't make too much showing."

The coaches were not in any way playing the part of a defeatist, but each felt that time was definitely not in their favor, and there was no way to tell what might do in their first encounter.

Checking over the list of some 50 aspirants, Burnham designated two possible starters for each of the 11 positions.

Weight of the gridgers are in parentheses.

Lonnie Wood (182) or Floyd Hacker (190) will get the call at quarterback. Harold Cartwright (164), Sherman Adcock (150), Don Davis (142) or Eddie Morris (174) will be the main contenders for the halfback slots.

Either Ed Bawcom (184) or Buddy Hightower (187) will get the fullback call.

Up front, it will be either Jim Mangum (219) and Dan Mitchell (200) or Albert Roelse (182) and W. H. White (175) at ends. Tackles will be Eddy Joe James (227) and Billy McCurry (217) or Joe Rosentritt (235) or Dan Power (242).

Indications are that either Charles Smith (220) and Buddy Caddell (165) or Teddy Henderson (179) or Bill Shear (173) will start in the guard slots.

Jim Bob Roberts (181) or Don Wiggins (190) will start at center.

Courage To Take Risks

Pioneering never ceases. Nuclear-energy discoveries have brought a new frontier. And a question arises: Is private industry ready to take costly risks?

AEC Chairman Strauss says, "American companies, and groups of companies, in various parts of the United States stand ready, as of now, to build six commercial atomic power plants with a total capacity of 765,000 kilowatts and have them completed within the next five years, at a total cost of nearly \$250,000,000. 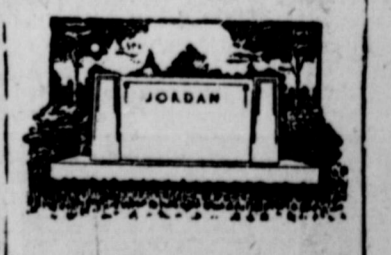

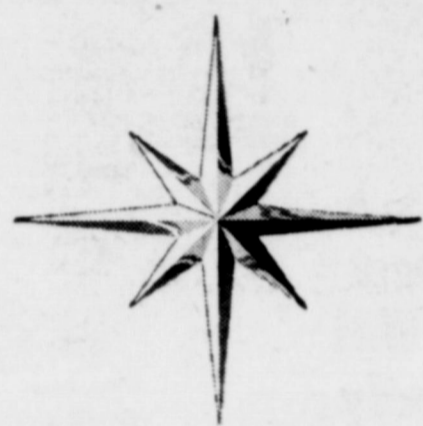

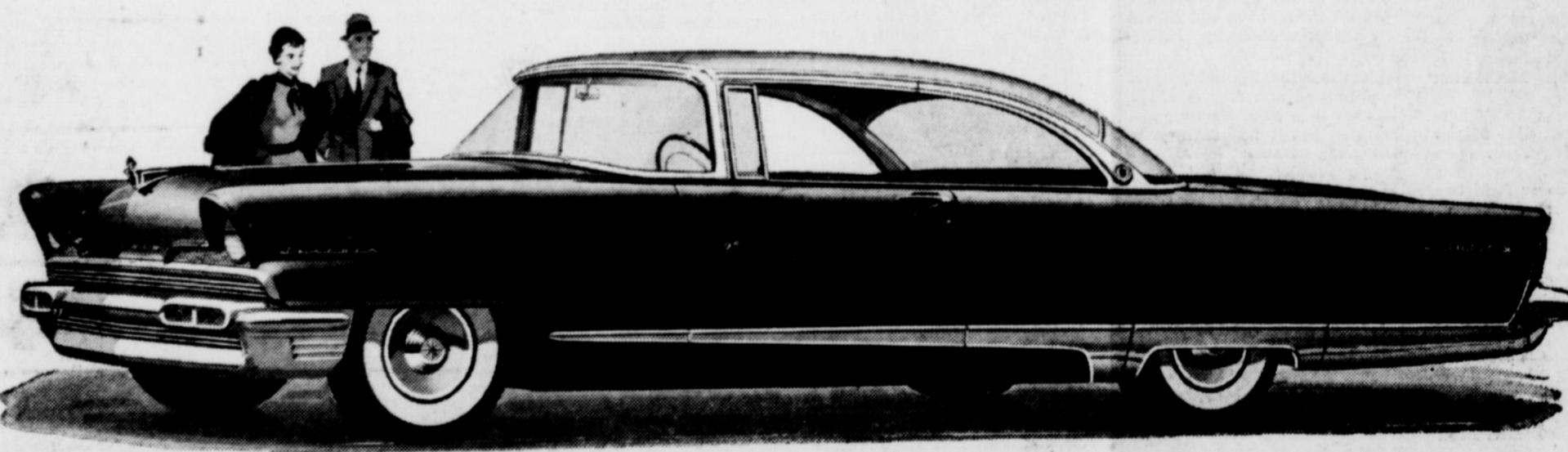

Luscious Blueberries Star in Desserts Other Than Pie

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

THOSE luscious, giant, cultivated blueberries, most of them from Michigan, can put color and flavor into your salads and desserts.

Blueberry Ice Cream Sauce (4-6 servings)

Simmer 1 pint (2 1/2 cups) cultivated blueberries in 1/2 cup water for about 5 minutes. Add 1 1/4 cups small, dry bread cubes, without crusts; 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind, and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Place on lowest heat for 20 to 30 minutes. Serve with vanilla ice cream, plain cream, or sweetened, whipped cream.

Blueberry Ambrosia (6 servings)

One-third cup boiling water, 4 sprigs mint, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 cups fresh cultivated blueberries, 1 to 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut. Four boiling water over mint and steep for 5 minutes. Strain. Add sugar and stir until dissolved. Cool. Alternate layers of blueberries and coconut in serving dish. Pour mint sauce over fruit. Chill. (Note: For variation use fresh fruits, such as apricots, pitted Bing cherries, grapefruit, honeydew melon and cantaloupe.)

Blueberry Plantation Salad

Crisp lettuce, cottage cheese, large, cultivated blueberries; fresh peach half, salad dressing. Arrange crisp lettuce leaves on individual salad plates. Place scoop of cottage cheese on each leaf and heap blueberries on top. In the center of the plate put a fresh peach half, cut-side up, and fill with berries. Serve with mayonnaise or any favorite fruit salad dressing.
