## Ranger's Foe, Quarter-Final, Being Chosen

Ranger's defensive team arose to new heights Thursday afternoon as the Bulldogs dominated the scoring, statistics and ball to down the Albany Lions hopes of gaining the state Class A football finals this year.

The bulldogs' deadly ground defense plus the bull-like runs of Fullback Tommy Sutton who spearheaded Ranger's three touchdown drives moved to a 20-6 upset bi-district win over the lighter but plucky, fast, and high scoring Lions.

However, it was Jerry Wharton who for the tenth consecutive contest this year walked off with the MVP honors in the first period as he received two touchdown passes from ace pitcher, Quarterback Paul Hinds.

Ranger's defensive line, which from end to end, threw up a massive wall around the fast Albany backfield, allowed their adversaries only 75 yards on the ground in the first half then tightened up in the second and the hard-pressed Lions gained only 20 yards. Evidently Ranger's defensive line was figured heavily in Albany's pregame strategy as the outlet for their speedy backs to filter and score practically at will.

The diminutive, aggressive Lions had one consolation in their favor. They were the first to score on the Bulldogs in the last five games and were the first team that has scored through the air on the Bulldogs all season.

For the Bulldogs, the victory came as a team effort on the clear, crisp fall afternoon that saw 4,000 fans pour into Bulldog Stadium, but on at least three particular occasions with the Bulldogs leading 14-0 on the strength of their first period burst, the light.

## Analysis Farm Bureau Work Is Told for County

The annual analysis on the status of the Eastland County Farm Bureau was tabulated at a called meeting of the bureau directors in Eastland.

Mitchell Campbell, president of the County Farm group, introduced visiting personnel from the Texas Farm Bureau board, B. J. Gist, District 7 director, Abilene, and Leon M. Lane, field representative, T.F.B., of Waco.

Mr. Lane, who was the principal speaker, commented on past surveys in 1950 and again in 1952, which revealed how the Farm Bureau program has progressed, then compared these statistics with the present status in 1955. Changes occur from year to year, and it is fine for an organization such as the Eastland County Farm Bureau to take an inventory, Mr. Lane pointed out.

He commended the local group in reaching their quota of 325 members in 1955 and the fine work evidenced during the recent insurance campaign. A 375 quota has been set for 1956.

Lane and Gist spoke briefly of the plans for a state-wide animal health committee whose objective is to make people aware of the necessity of healthy livestock on farms and ranches within the Texas boundaries.

## Concrete Is Poured on Colony Creek Bridge

Work proceeding on Connection Between FM's 570 and 571

Pouring of concrete on the bridge over Colony Creek on the Eastland - Cheaney road improvement has been completed.

The bridge spans a distance of more than a hundred feet. This structure is in the project which is a connecting link between Farm-to-Market Roads Nos. 570 and 571.

The road project is a two-pronged arrangement, Eastland to Cheaney and Cheaney to Ranger. It runs east and west about a mile or a mile and a half north of Lake Leon.

The bridge itself is about 8 or 9 miles from Eastland. The road construction area begins where the pavement ends, 6 miles east of Eastland.

## Figures Given On Signing for Draft In Texas

A total of 5,863 Texans registered at local draft boards in October, Local Board No. 36, Petroleum Building, Eastland, has been advised from headquarters in Austin.

Federal law requires men to register on their 18th birthday, or within five days thereafter. Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, pointed out.

Under present regulations and policies, no one is drafted under age 21 in Texas except volunteers or delinquents. But the law obligates males to register at 18.

Since the present draft law was enacted in 1948, all males born since August 30, 1922, have been and are now required to register, except those not yet 18.

A man who fails to register, upon prosecution and conviction, is subject to fine up to \$10,000, or five years imprisonment, or both.

Mr. Karkalits had been suffering from a heart attack and pneumonia. He was taken to the hospital at 3 p.m. Tuesday after becoming ill at his home.

A pioneer resident of Eastland County, Mr. Karkalits had been active in many spheres. He was chairman of the board of deacons of the Baptist Church and held many Masonic positions and was a member of the Lions Club, with perfect attendance record until the week of his illness. He was secretary of the Cisco Independent School Board offices at the time of his death.

Surviving are his wife, a daughter, Miss Louise Karkalits of Cisco, and three sons, B. W. Karkalits of Hamilton, C. S. Karkalits Jr. of Amarillo, and Lt. Col. Jules P. Karkalits of Arlington, Va., and two grandchildren. He also leaves two brothers—the Rev. Orien Karkalits of Huntsville and Tom F. Karkalits of Fort Worth—and a sister, Mrs. Frank Walker, of Cisco.

Funeral services, with Hamner Funeral Home in charge, were arranged for 3 p.m. Saturday at Cisco First Baptist Church, with Dr. H. M. Ward officiating, and burial following in Oakwood Cemetery, Cisco.

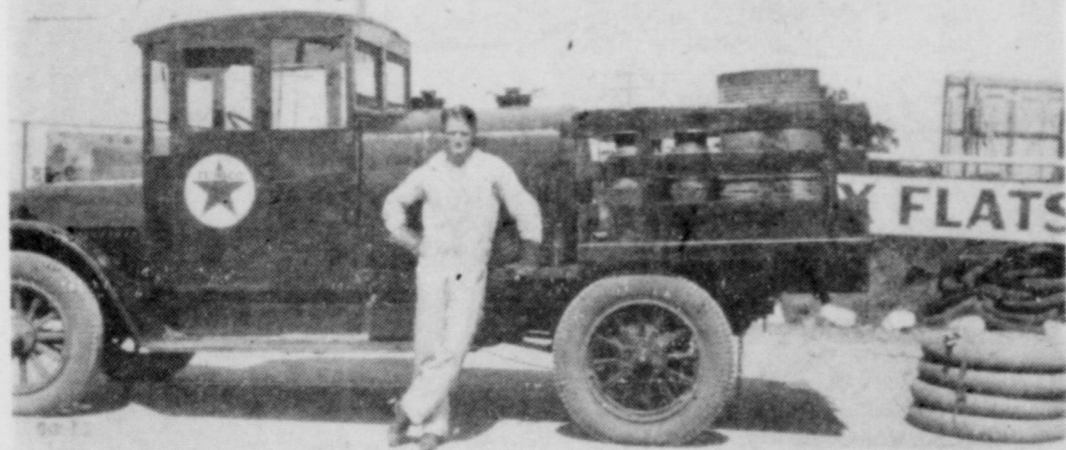
