Welfare Drugs Must Be Paid To Pharmacist

On September 1, the Vendor Drug Program, under Texas Medical Assistance will go into effect. All persons who receive free drugs from the state will be required to obtain a new prescription for the first refill after September 1 and new plastic identification cards will be issued to be presented to the pharmacist at the time of the first pharmacy services.

Formerly, the drug cost was included in a monthly welfare check sent to the recipient, but under the new Vendor Drug Program, the pharmacist will be paid directly by the Texas Department of Public Welfare. Persons who presently receive necessary drugs will be required to complete two forms and return to the state department. The forms are the Texas Medical Assistance Record, which are to be kept in the recipient's possession and will contain records required to be kept by the pharmacist and doctor and the plastic identification card.

The new Vendor Drug Program was enacted by the 62nd Texas Legislature.

It will not be necessary to give a name when calling in on the Action Line, unless desired, as long as the information given is accurate, said a member of MCIB.

Gressett said the purpose of the organization is to improve the services provided by local Chambers of Commerce to the communities of West Texas which they serve through three main programs, Training programs for Chamber staff personnel, exchange of community promotional and development ideas, and a program assistance to local Chambers of Commerce not having a staff are the three objects of the association, according to Gressett.

He concluded that any person employed by a West Texas area Chamber of Commerce in the chief administrative position, whether their title be secretary, manager, executive director or executive vice president, is eligible for membership.

Fry And Cox Celebrating One-Man Operation Grown Up

A firm, which was established in Muleshoe in 1921, has kept pace with the growth of Muleshoe and will celebrate 50 years in business here during this week, Fry and Cox Implement and Hardware Co. began as Blackwater Valley Blacksmith Shop in a 20x30 foot wooden building at the corner of Main Street and American Blvd. where St. Clair's parking lot is presently located.

T.B. Fry, who established the firm in 1921, was the stepfather of Jim Cox and the late Jack Cox, who owned and operated the business, Edwin Cox, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Cox, is presently associated with the operation. Jack Cox died in 1963, and his brother, Jim, has continued the operation since that time.

Fry began teaching the Cox

brothers in his shop when they were small boys and they both worked with him during their school days.

In 1931, Jack was taken in as a partner with his stepfather and during that same year, a machine shop was added to the business. The business continued to grow and in 1935, Jim bought into the first, after having been associated with the former E.R. Hart Company for a few years.

Voluntary Gifts Valued Whether 7 Cents Or \$100

A new division for special gifts-large donations was organized at Friday's executive board meeting of Friends of the Muleshoe Area Library. Jerry Hutton was named to head the special gifts division and to lead a committee who will contact persons and firms for larger donations.

Hutton will work in conjunction with FOL vice president and general membership chairman Jeff Smith.

The board heard reports of the current advance fund drive, for which volunteer workers and voluntary donations from individuals, clubs, organizations and businesses are continuing.

FOL's executive board also voted to end the process of mailing cards to acknowledge gifts by check, other than by request of donors or if a cash gift or memorial is received. This action was taken due to the increase in postal rates.

FOL also voted to present no more honorary memberships and ruled that multiple contributions reaching a total of \$100 must be combined as one gift for recognition by the library on the permanent plaque.

Also discussed were the sale of the old library building, a membership drive and bids on equipment. One FOL member told of leaving in Irvin St. Clair after having explained some of the need for equipment for the library. A young Spanish boy who stood nearby listened closely and when the FOL member left the store, the boy followed. He asked the FOL member about the need for money and commented, "My family and I use the library and it helps us a lot. We don't have much money, but I would like to give you all I have." He offered seven cents, all he had in his pocket.

Two Instrument Dealers Slate Local Display

In order to make instruments available to beginning band students, and to have a chance to discuss with the prospective band member the proper instrument, Jim Harvey, and Lon Britley, band directors at Muleshoe High School and Junior High School, have invited two music companies to set up an instrument display in the Muleshoe High School cafeteria on Monday, August 23 from 5-10 p.m.

The band directors explained that the display will be a convenience to the parents of the band students of Muleshoe, and this display has no connection with the school or its directors. According to the band directors, the companies offer a Rental-Purchase plan through which a student may rent a new or used instrument for two months for approximately \$20. At the end of the two months, the student may apply the rental fee to the cost of the instrument if a decision is made to purchase.

In the event, the band directors decide the student would be better with another instrument, the rental price will also apply to the purchase price of a different instrument. Also required, said the band directors, will be the Belwin First Division Band Book One for their instrument for beginning band students.

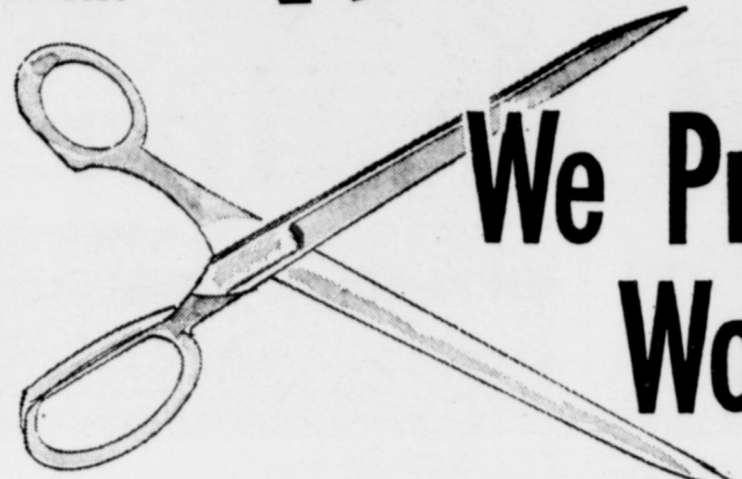

A MESSAGE
... About Vendor Drugs

On September 1, the Vendor Drug under Texas Medical Assistance will go into effect.

Payment will then be made to your pharmacist by the state, on behalf of eligible recipients.

This new procedure, which was enacted by the 62nd Texas Legislature, will be administered by the Texas Department of Public Welfare.

Those of you who in the past were provided funds for necessary drugs through direct grants will, on Sept. 1, begin a new process for receiving this benefit.

You will receive three forms from the state department:

1. Form #86A, Texas Medical Assistance Record, which you will keep in your possession, and which will contain the records required to be kept by your pharmacist and your doctor.
2. Plastic Identification Cards, which you will present to your pharmacist at the time you obtain pharmacy services.
3. Medical books which you must bring with your prescription to be filled.

Under this new Vendor Drug program, a new prescription will be required for the first refill after Sept. 1. We will be glad to assist you in obtaining a new prescription by telephoning your physician.

Our prescription record system makes available to you a complete itemized record of your original Prescriptions and Prescription Refills for each year or for any given period.

It will be advantageous for participants in the State Welfare Program to come by Damron Drug and discuss this program prior to September 1, 1971.

Mental Health Funds Boosted For Treatment

Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health-Retardation Center, Plainview, will establish a regional treatment center for juvenile delinquency and drug

abuse with a grant approved this week by Governor Preston Smith. Counties served by the center will include Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Motley, Parmer and Swisher. The award, \$196,480, comes from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U.S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas. It will be matched by a local in-kind contribution valued at \$80,047.

Adjudicated delinquents from the nine-county region served by the MH/MR Center will be accepted into the program, which is geared to drug abuse and its residual health problems.

The juveniles will be admitted into the day hospital and will have individual and group therapy under supervision of the staff psychiatrist.

Extensive use of volunteers and community services are to increase the chances of returning the child from his anti-social behavior into the norm of society, explained a spokesman for the Center.

The award was among 39 action grant applications and one for a planning grant considered by the Criminal Justice Council at its monthly meeting. Applications totaled \$3,455,547.

Prowlers Top Police Activity

A number of Muleshoe residents have been plagued by prowlers and window peepers during the past week, according to reports at the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center.

Most of the prowler-window peeper calls are concentrated in the southern sections of Muleshoe.

Also in the southern sections of town, several dogs and cats have been reported to have died from poison put out. Law Enforcement officers have warned persons leaving poisons out for dogs and cats, that small children and toddlers often pick up food items and chew on them as they are too small to be aware of the possible consequences.

In other police activity during the week, one person was jailed by the Texas Highway Patrol and charged with drunk and one person was charged with being drunk by the Bailey County Sheriff's office.

City police officers jailed two persons, charged with being drunk; one person for drunk and disturbance; one person for driving while intoxicated and one person charged with vagrancy.
