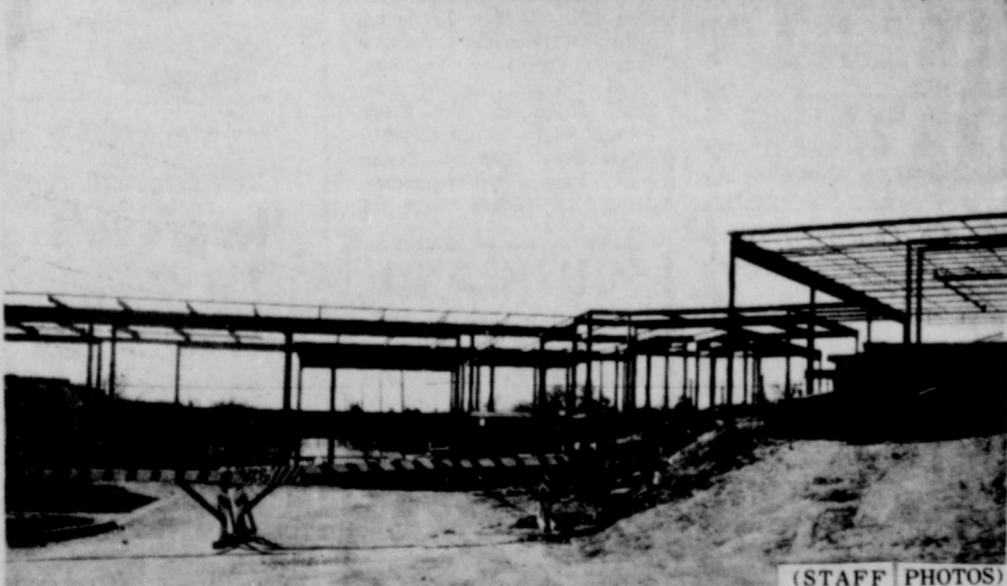
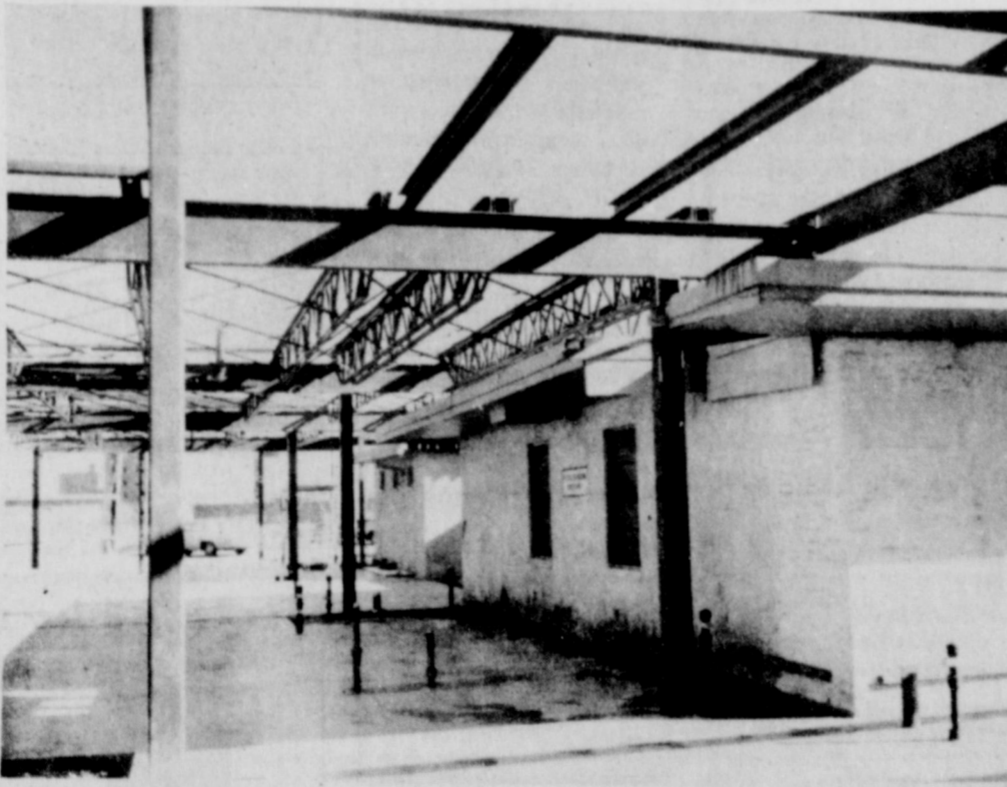

## Christmas Holiday Is Quiet, Bright Here

Christmas was peaceful and quiet in Eastland and the county in general. As the rhyme says "not a creature was stirring not even a mouse", and in the city not much was stirring either on Christmas eve and day.

Nothing was stirring except children and adults who were enjoying the good weather and playing with and trying out Christmas presents.

The Eastland Fire Department reported that no alarms were turned in. "We're thankful and pretty lucky this year", said Fireman and Police dispatcher Jimmy McCoy. "We're glad Christmas was quiet and beautiful this year".

Both the Eastland City Police Department and the Eastland County Sheriff's office reported that everything was quiet to their knowledge.

The Eastland ambulance services likewise reported a peaceful Christmas. The Arrington Funeral Home made only two ambulance runs to the Eastland Memorial Hospital. Dale Bakker of the Bakker Funeral Home said "It was a real quiet weekend, just wonderful; for the first time in seven or eight years we didn't work this Christmas".

Eastland Memorial Hospital Administrator Helga Tiner said the hospital was full, but quiet. Death took a holiday this year in Eastland, there was no death or dying on the highways in the county.

Good weather gets a big credit.

Sgt. Jerry Mathews of the area Department of Public Safety said there were no major accidents nor deaths. "As far as I know, it was a quiet Christmas".

Traffic was light during the day, then picked up with a rush during the afternoon.

Service station operators said their traffic was about half that of last year.

Buses were running a few hours behind schedule Christmas afternoon. And in the evening they were running double because of the added passenger load. Apparently less people were driving, because of the shortage of gas and the holiday closing of stations.

Christmas night a steady stream of car lights could be seen on the Interstate, snaking their way toward Dallas - Fort Worth on the east and Abilene on the west.

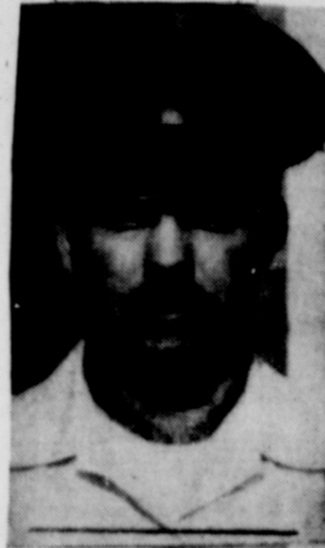

## Off-Election Year Coming Up

1974 will be an off - election year, just two years away from the big national and state elections of 1976.

What offices will be coming up for re - election in Eastland County?

According to County Clerk Johnson Smith and the Texas Constitution the following public offices come up for election next year:

All five of the County's Justices of the Peace.

County commissioners in Precincts 2 and 4.

The county clerk, the county treasurer, the county School superintendent, and the county surveyor.

Coming up for election again will be the office of the criminal district attorney, since in 1972 the election was for an unexpired term.

Also the office of County Judge will come up for election.

And the District Clerk for the 81st Court will again be chosen.

In State offices, one of the judgeships of the Civil Court of Appeals for the district will be up for election.

Candidates for the above offices must file by the first Monday of February, 1974.

"All is in the book, in the statutes of the State Constitution", said Smith.

Announced and registered candidates must either pay a filing fee or present a nominating petition with the adequate number of signatures.

Filing fees for Justices of the Peace in Eastland County are \$50 since the population falls under 200,000.

All other county offices have a \$150 filing fee, except that of the Criminal District Attorney, which is \$400. Also at \$400 is a candidacy for the Civil Court of Appeals.

According to the Constitution of the state of Texas for 1973, the signatures on a nominating petition must be equal to two percent of the entire vote cast for that party's candidate for Governor in the last preceding election. For districts, counties and precincts this must not be less than 25 nor more than 500.

However no person shall sign more than one petition for a candidate for public office.

Under the constitution, the primary will be held on the first Saturday in May.

There will be primaries for parties that garnered 20 percent or more of the vote in the last election for governor of the state.

Parties whose candidates received from two to 20 percent of the vote may either nominate by primary or convention.

## One Percent Discount On County Taxes

County Tax Collector Nancy Trout reminds Eastland County Residents that they may still receive a one percent discount if they pay their county taxes before January 1.

Tax returns may be filed until July of next year.

Residents who paid their taxes in October received a three percent discount, those in November a two percent discount, and those in December a one percent discount.

"They are coming in slowly", said Ms. Trout.

Get taxes out of the way before the new year and you won't have to worry about forgetting, she suggests.

Traveling around I have been in many different places for many Christmas's. What makes Christmas, the people around you and memories of past times.

As an adult the suspense of getting is replaced by the spirit of giving, by the enjoyment of bringing happiness to another. That is how I measure Christmas now, now that it does not mean the same to me as a child.

know and hold dear? The smell of cedar trees and the feel of angel hair hang in my memory.

The tree would be fur, spruce, pine, pinion, from the mountain slopes. The North country Christmas would be frigid, more lively and intense...the change of season making the blood circulate, bringing it to laughing cheeks and faces.

Instead of walking out in the pasture with Pop and your cousins, picking and cutting a tree, fresh smelling a free, the children of Salt Lake city walk with their families through gigantic Christmas tree lots. Stamping their feet with the cold, breath frosty, looking for the perfect tree to buy. A tree that would be dry to begin with, sucked of life, long from the earth.

Instead of making pies and presents, picking through the mail order catalogues or shopping at small and personal town stores at a slow leisurely pace, there would be the crush of crowds. Lights flickering on and off, Santa's with red on the corners, carol singers and salvation Army bands. The hustle and bustle of the last minute rush, shoppers lined up in large department stores, hurrying to pick something up.

There would be a different feeling, a different excitement, while lost in the crowd, the Christmas would be more lavish, more expensive, but not the same. The spirit of making
