County Bar Extends Unanimous Approval Seaberry Candidacy

The Eastland County Bar Association, meeting in Eastland Tuesday, unanimously endorsed the candidacy of Virgil T. Seaberry, widely-known Eastland attorney, for the position of vice-president of the Texas State Bar Association.

The endorsement, signed by President Earl Conner Sr. and Jack W. Frost, "respectfully urges the lawyers of Texas to elect Mr. Seaberry" to the post.

Official comment of the county bar association follows:

Whereas Hon. Virgil T. Seaberry Sr. of Eastland, Tex., has been nominated as vice-president of the State Bar of Texas and the members of the Eastland County Bar Association know him as a man and as a lawyer more intimately than some of the lawyers of Texas, therefore we the Eastland County Bar Association, in session assembled, unanimously represent to the lawyers of Texas who are not personally acquainted with him that he is an unusual capable and successful lawyer whose character and integrity are above reproach; that he has served the State Bar well as chairman of the board of directors; that he is interested in the welfare of the lawyers of Texas, knows their problems and is able and willing to spend the time and effort necessary to properly serve in said capacity. We respectfully urge the lawyers of Texas to elect Mr. Seaberry vice-president of the State Bar.

Texas lawyers will elect their association officers by mail ballot in May.

County Stands Good Chance To Lead State In Turkeys

Eastland County is now at least third in the State of Texas in the production of turkeys, and stands to become the leading turkey producing county in the state within a few years if its present growth continues, Don Kincaid, local turkey grower, told members of the Lions Club Tuesday.

Kincaid said that about 250,000 turkeys will be raised in the county this year, with a value of more than \$1,000,000. He said turkey growers in the county are rapidly increasing in numbers with fifteen new ones signed up recently to raise between 500 to 5,000 birds each this year.

Kincaid said the Kincaid turkey hatchery here is setting 14,000 eggs a week, and that a total of 1,500,000 eggs would be shipped from here to 38 out of the 48 states, as compared to 900,000 eggs last year.

Kincaid explained that turkey growers in Eastland County usually received premium prices for their birds since large buyers have found a concentration of turkeys here and are willing to pay a premium in order to fill all their needs in one spot.

Kincaid said there is a strong possibility of a turkey processing plant locating in Eastland sometime in the future and that it would amount to an industry of sizeable proportions if the town would put forth the effort to get one.

Lion Earl Woody, of Texas Electric Company, had charge of the program Tuesday, and introduced Mr. Kincaid.

New Electric Scoreboard Is Up At Stadium

The new electric scoreboard has been installed in Maverick Stadium by the Coca Cola Company and has been attracting considerable attention of Eastland football fans.

The scoreboard was purchased by Eastland citizens in a popular subscription campaign last fall with the Coca Cola Company donating a substantial part of the cost.

The board is located on the east side of the south goal posts, instead of on the west side as was discussed in the beginning.

Coca Cola officials say the board is far from being in its completed form, as the electrical working apparatus will not be installed until next fall.

Texas Company Being Enlisted, Tompkins Says

Chief Tompkins, Navy recruiter, here earlier this week, announced today that a special company of red-blooded Texans, sailing under the banner of the "Texan" Company, will be enlisted in April by the Navy in an intensified program to obtain the best quality men for service with the fleet. This company will be enlisted on April 24, 1956, and leave immediately for recruit training at San Diego, California.

Young men who enlist in the "Texan" Company will travel with their buddies and close friends, do recruit training with them, and return home on leave with them in early July. "Boot" training will last about nine weeks.

High school graduates are especially desired for the "Texan" Company. Most of these men will be sent to Navy schools where they will learn to operate and maintain highly complicated machinery and weapons. This training is necessary in order to meet the forthcoming needs of the nuclear-powered ships and supersonic jet aircraft of our new Navy. Upon graduation from Navy schools, these men will be assigned to important jobs on ships that will (Continued on Page Three)

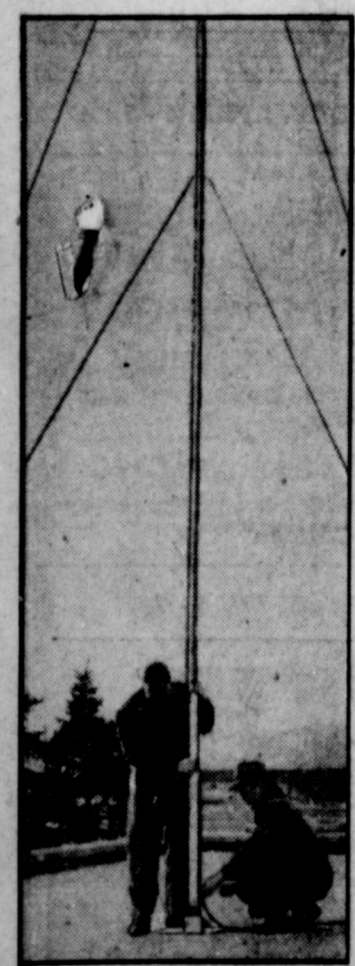

"To every one of the 683,132 Texans who voted and worked with us in the hard campaign of 1954, I extend my thanks and gratitude. I urge each of you, and all Texans who believe in the triumph of honesty and morality, to join us in this crusade for a new administration in Texas."

High school individuals or teams may advance as far as the state meets, but grade school and junior high contestants compete only on the district level.

These rules are set by the Interscholastic League of Texas.
