History Of First Baptist Church 710 NORTH SEAMAN ST

By Mrs. Vivian Jones The events that transpired in the life of any nation or group of people, whether secular or religious, are refreshing and revealing to recount. The historical events of the past are essential to keeping alive the heritage for which each individual is or should be proud.

The religious life of Eastland would be incomplete without the history of First Baptist Church. It is therefore, befitting that we pause here and record as best we can, some of the joys, sorrows, trials, struggles and successes we encountered in the process of our development so that those who follow will have brief resume of the background and growth of

First Baptist Church. Realizing that we would be handicapped, somewhat in gathering facts. figures and positive dates because persons who were in the organization of this church have either passed on or moved away to parts unknown and contacting them would be highly improbable, so from the lips of a few oval and faithful members we were able to gather some facts.

The First Baptist Church was organized September 20, 1920, under the guidance and missionary endeavors of Rev. Miles W. Jenkins, who pioneered in founding and building churches throughout West Texas. It was through his efforts and with the help of the then Mayor Garrett, a purchased. The first church was located in the Four Hundred block of North Bassett Street. This was during the great oil boom of the early

On September 20, 1921, first anniversary was celebrated with dedication and cornerstone laying. Rev. W.M. Greer served as first Pastor from 1920 to 1922. Mr. Abraham Peterson and Mr. T.G. Glen served as first deacons. Mr. S.H. William, the first Superintendent of Sunday School., Mrs.—Bertha Lave as first President of the Missionary Society Later Mr. Joe Goodman was added to the staff of deacons

In early 1927 the present site was purchased and the church was moved with great difficulty down the creek bed and across to where she now Two more deacons were added - Bro. A.L. Dunn and Bro. W.M. Roberts. A loan was acquired and some improvements were made

From 1923 to 1935 First Baptist worshipped under the leadership and guidance of the following pastors: Rev. E.E. Lave, Rev. C.A. Harvey. Rev. John Phelps, Rev. Joseph Brown and Rev. W.M. Bowden. It was during Rev. Bowden's pastorate that Rev. A.L. Dunn was called to the ministry and was ordained.

The membership increased and plans were made to rebuild. The members worked diligently and upon completion of the present structure, entered the new building the first Sunday in June. 1937. Rev. Bowden, having resigned two years before and Rev. A.L. Dunn being called to lead on this group after Rev. Miles W. Jenkins filled in for a few months. Rev. Dunn pastored more than sixteen years. New pews were purchased and

Following Rev. Dunn's resignation, Rev. J.L. Norris of Mineral Wells was called to lead. He served four years and was called to other fields of

Rev. O.B. Shaw of Fort Worth served as pastor. A parsonage was purchased and was later enlarged when Rev. Sandford Norris was pastor. The sanctuary was redecorated and carpet was added. Upon the resignation of Rev. Sandford Norris, Rev. J.L. Norris was recalled. Under his guidance and leadership the indebtedness was paid. The church purchased an organ and remodeled the parsonage. Also the Educational Committee for Scholarships was organized. And much has represented in all phases of District, State, and National work It may be remarkable to note that in all the fifty - three years, only

elve men have pastored and two of these pastored twice.

Brown Plant Answering Power Needs

FAIRFIELD - - The mere mention of strip mining usually brings loud protests from even the mildest ecology conscious

But a visit to the Big Brown Steam Electric Station that three Texas electric companies have built and put into operation in Freestone County will convince the most serious ecologist that strip mining can be carried out with little or no damage to the soil and coun-

Some 40 city officials of West Central Texas will verify this statement after visiting the new plant last week on invitation of Texas Electric Service Company. They made the trip by bus, spending some three hours touring the generating station and mining

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Hey, listen to that beautiful music.'

"He says it's a violin."

The plant near Fairfield is pioneering the use of lignite, a low grade coal, that is strip mined to fire the generating machinery that has added a 1,150,000 kilowatt charge to the power circuits of Dallas Power and Light Co., Texas Electric Service Co., and Texas Power and Light Co. And it is in its second year of operation with relatively little fanfare.

Freestone County's lignite beds lie in veins five to nine feet thick and run from near the surface to some 40 feet deep. The deposits under some 11.500 acres of East Texas land owned by the Texas Utilities Co., which was created by the three firms, is sufficient to operate the plant for 40 to 50 years.

The project, which had been on the drawing boards for a good many years, is helping supply the increasing demand for electricity without calling on the overloaded gas and fuel oil industry. Other generating stations operated by the utilities are fired with gas and

Dick White, a young engineer who formerly held a responsible post with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Agency, is director of environmental research for

Industrial Generating Col., the operating vehicle for Texas Utilities Co.

White conducted the West Central Texas group on their tour of the plant. He said that visitors number at least 100 per week, including engineers and ecologists from throughout the nation, Every Sierra Club chapter in the country has visited the plant and applauded the project.

The visitor is shown how the lignite is uncovered, the topsoil and other layers of earth set aside: then, loaders pick up 350,000 pound scoops of lignite that 14 trucks move to the plant site over privately owned roads. The trucks haul up to 700,000 pounds per load. The lignite is mined in wide rows. After a strip of coal is removed, the earth is put back into the hole, the topsoil restored and the ground is seeded with coastal bermuda and treated with 300 pounds of fertilizer per

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three cuttings of hav this year and the company has 14,000 hales on sale for sale to out - of - county people. This sale policy was set for the benefit of local hay producers.

White and his staff will begin a reforestation program this winter, and this will call for planting trees and grasses native to the region. Plans call for the reclaimed land to be sold off every few years, White said, as the company does not want to retain land not used.

The lignite is unloaded by the trucks in a stockpile area from which huge conveyor belts move it through pulverizers to go into the furnaces as a fine powder. The plant's two 400 - foot smoke stacks are equipped with electrostatic precipitators that are so effective that any smoke arising contains less than two percent of anything but pure

A bonus of the operation is the ash and aftermath of the burned lignite. White said the ash that falls down, one - third of the total volume, is saleable as road - building material. And the balance of the residue is sold as a cement additive.

That the lignite plant is considered a success can be judged by the fact that two other generating stations are under construction to utilize other lignite deposits in East Texas. One is at Mount Pleasant and it is due to begin operating in three years, and a larger plant near Henderson will be operative a year or two later. Texas Utilities is also building a nuclear power plant near Glenrose. The Fairfield plant uses

water from a company own lake to cool its steam machinery. Fairfield Lake, built by the firm, covers 2,500 acres and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Agency was given a park site for \$1 for a 25 year period. Studies have shown that the cooling process is not harmful to fish and wildlife in the lake and area.

The plant's Environmental Research Center has a group of noted Texas University professors on its advisory staff. The company provides cash grants and living quarters for two graduate students to be in resident at all times to carry out study and research for the projects as required for graduate degrees. These studies are used in environmental work in the plant area. They have covered such subjects as animal population inventories, vegetation cataloguing, data on aquatic populations in the lake, soil analysis to help in reclaiming the land, reforestation, smoke stack output, and so forth.

It is significant, perhaps, to note that this project that represents an investment of more than \$125,000,000 was financed without loans or grants from the government.

Another bonus for the project is its effect on the Fairfield Community. It has provided 325 jobs to date and is improving the general ecology and condition of the land as well as the

F.N. Savre, TESCO's division manager at Eastland, headed the group visiting the plant. Visitors included city officials from Carbon, Eastland, Ranger, Graham, Breckenridge, DeLeon, Dublin. Gorman and elsewhere in the region. State Representative Joe Hanna of Breckenridge was a special guest.

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


