WIND AND SMOKE - - High winds and grass fires north and west of Eastland Tuesday plagued the sky and kept firemen jumping. Shown here between the pumping rig and a storage tank (about 50 feet back) is the burning remains of a shed building, one of two destroyed at the Petco compressor plant west of town. Volunteers and regular firemen did a job in containing the fires under very adverse conditions. In another fire, a barn loaded with hay and implements was completely destroyed by the blaze which began at 11:45 a.m. and which was not brought under control until 2:30 p.m. The barn, located on FM 101 five miles northeast of Eastland, was owned by Norman Richardson of Ranger, Richardson said he estimated his loss at approximately \$15,000. Destroyed was a tractor, auger truck, the barn and about 8,000 bales of hay. One unit from Eastland and two from Ranger answered the alarm.

A fire, located four miles west of Eastland and south of U.S. 80, endangered the Petco Company's gas compressor plant for 45 minutes as strong winds fanned a grass fire in the direction of the plant. Two storage sheds near the plant were destroyed, along with about five acres of

An additional out - bound mail dispatch for Eastland is in effect until Dec. 31, reports Postmaster Marcus O'Dell, who urges mail patrons to take advantage of the added service by having mail at the post office before 4 p.m.

The extra 4 p.m. dispatch goes directly to Fort Worth, and greatly facilitates earlier delivery, he said. Other dispatches are at 5:20, 6:15 and 11 p.m. Since these dispatches go either to Stephenville and or Fort Worth for sorting, the postmaster reminds again that the destination "City" in addresses will not work, and will cause delays and possible





Heat Spoils

AUSTIN - - It's no wonder that so many people claim not to like venison, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials. They wouldn't like steak either if it was handled as badly as some

'We still see hunters hauling their kill home on the hood of their car. This may be classical, but the heat from the engine spoils the meat," said

According to experienced meat handlers, heat is the enemy of meat. It is so important to dissipate heat, even body heat, that a deer should be field dressed as soon as the hunter is able to recover and

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has a leaflet entitled, "Now That You've Killed It", which tells how to field dress a deer. It is free upon request.

Field dressing a deer entails removing the internal organs and draining as much blood as possible from the animal. Care should be taken not to puncture the organs since this will taint

The skin of the deer should be removed as soon as possible since this holds in body heat. The deer should be hung head up for about twenty minutes immediately after field dressing to allow the blood to

However, when allowing the carcass to cool, the deer should be hung head down since blood collecting in the hams spoils the meat. The carcass should always be hung in the shade and covered with a sheet or cheesecloth after it is skinned

If the weather is cool, the carcass can be covered and transported for short distances on the trunk or roof of the car In warm weather, it is best to cut up the carcass and ice it

COLLEGE STATION - -Leisure with dignity, the art of leisure. Whatever the label, it's something that should be developed if society is to handle a new lifestyles with some sanity, an Indiana University professor educator said here Monday. The plea came from Dr.

Janet R. MacLean, professor of recreation and parks administration, and a speaker during Texas A&M University's 27th annual Turfgrass Conference (Dec. 4 - 5.)

Retired persons and those with longer weekends and vacations are living indicators that it takes education to become a full time member of the leisure class,' "and we haven't done the job," she said.

"We will never really be able to enjoy our leisure at any age until society as a whole has accepted the idea that what one does in his leisure can be as meaningful and rewarding as what one does in his work," Mrs. MacLean explained.

Where is the increased spare time coming from?

MacLean predictions for the year 2000 indicate a lower labor force participation - - 39 four - day work weeks and a conservative 60 percent of the year as available leisure.

There are 700 firms with 100,000 employees on a four day, 40 - hour work week. Some are experimenting with the three day, 12 hour week. The new General Motors calls for

"Retirement to what?" the professor asked. "I may be operating from a

prejudiced point of view, but I firmly believe that, for many age groups, expenditure of leisure may ultimately condition not only the quality of life but survival itself in terms of psychological balance and physical well - being," emphasized.

'If selling the idea that leisure is as prestigious and rewarding as work, what about standards?

"Will doing your thing, no matter what the side effects, be acceptable? Who pays to give each the opportunity to do his thing?" were questions posed by the speaker.






