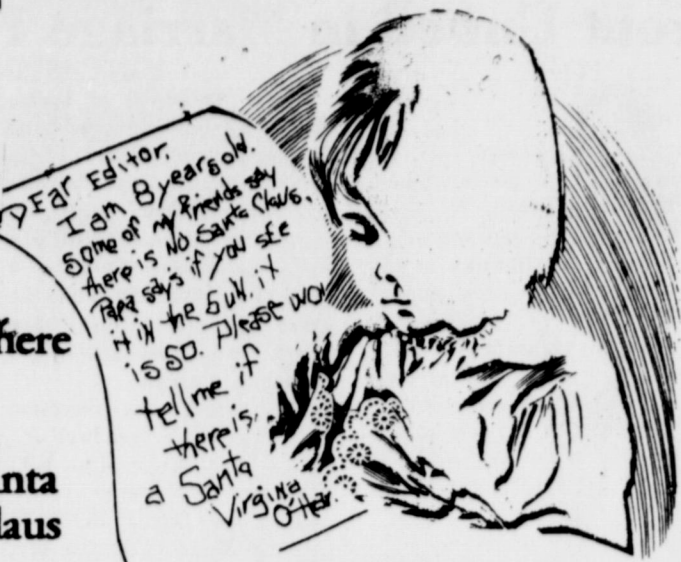

### There Is A Santa Claus

"Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginia. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

"Not believe in Santa Claus? You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the

chimneys on Christmas eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

"You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

"No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, may ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood."

Many years have passed since the editor of the New York Sun sat down to answer a letter from a worried eight-year-old reader. It had shaken her whole world to have someone tell her that there is no Santa Claus. The reply, originally published as an editorial in the Sun, so completely expresses the spirit of Christmas, that it has become one of our most beloved Christmas classics. The editor was Francis P. Church.

Mr. McGowan noted that the rate for the first three minutes of a station-to-station call to Vietnam is \$9, while a person-to-person call for three minutes costs \$12. Each additional minute for both kinds of calls costs \$3.

"If possible, we suggest that arrangements be made to have the serviceman call home," he said. "Trying to reach a serviceman quickly by calling from the United States is extremely difficult, since military people are likely to be on duty or stationed in remote areas."

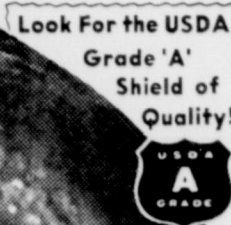

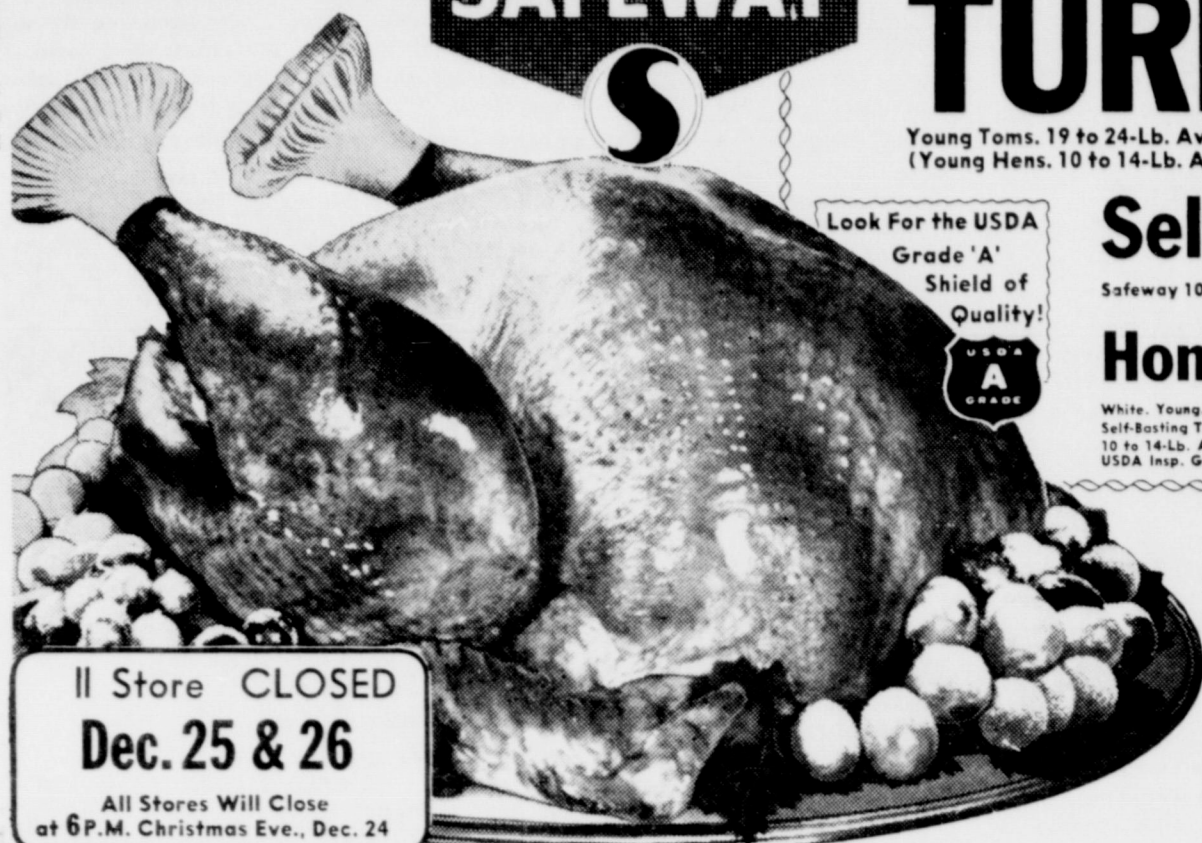

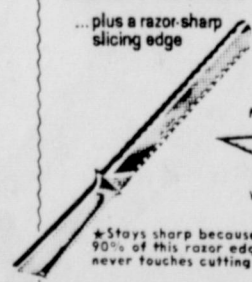

To prolong the life of Christmas Plants you receive this year as gifts, follow these hints. Christmas plants include the poinsettia, azalea, begonia and chrysanthemum.

First, keep the plants in as much light as possible.

More plants die from over watering than by lack of water.

Water plants when needed. Insert a freshly sharpened pencil in the soil. If the pencil is clean and dry when removed, the plants need water.

Plants do best if the night temperature is about 60 degrees F., so either turn down the thermostat or move them to

a cool room at night. During the daytime, do not place your plants near the heating unit. They should also be placed

where they will not be exposed to sudden temperature changes caused by doors opening to outside temperatures.

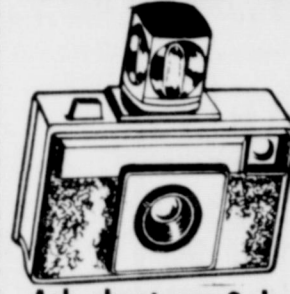

# Gordon pot

It has been an unusual year. Mrs. T.E. Castleberry of Eastland reported that her pear tree has a second crop of pears. The tree bloomed again in the fall and now has small pears. Several others have reported plum trees blooming in the fall.

The peanut growing season was unusual to say the least. Until July 20th, the crop prospects were extremely poor, but rains began in late July and by September growers were saying the crops looked the best ever. Rain continued and created conditions for

diseases. The rain continued through the fall and delayed harvest. Because of diseases and delayed harvest peanuts began coming off the vines. When harvest had finished the yields were the lowest in several years. Most growers reported they left more peanuts in the field than they were able to harvest.

The 1972 Edition of the Farmer's Tax Guides are now available in the county agent's office. These guides are provided to help you prepare your 1971 Federal Income Tax Return. Tax rules of importance to farmers are explained, and examples are used to show how they apply to actual situations.

This year's edition covers the new Asset Depreciation Range System and new rules for voluntary withholding of income tax on agricultural labor, and for depositing income and social security taxes. Also included is a reminder to farmers of their possible liability for Federal Use Tax on Highway Motor Vehicles. Filled-in samples of the Federal Income Tax Return, Form 1040, Schedule F- Farm Income and Expenses, and other schedules used by farmers are shown on the first few pages.

The guides are free and may be picked up at the Extension Office. A farmer's Income Tax School has been planned for January 7, 1972. More details on place and time will be given at a later date.

We have a new person on our county Extension staff. Mrs. Shirley Shirley of Cisco is now working as secretary for us. She works each morning in the Home Demonstration Agents office and each afternoon in the Agricultural Agents office. With Shirley's help I believe we will be better able to serve you.

The pecan show had more entries than we were expecting. The last count revealed that we had 200 entries. This compares with 219 last year and 200 in 1969. The judges said they believed this was the largest county pecan show in the state in 1971. They were also very impressed with the quality of the pecans.

Our winning entries competed with other county winners in the Central Texas Regional Pecan Show last week at Arlington, Texas. The regional show was held at Six Flags Mall on December 15, 16, and 17th.

Her recipe calls for two pounds (8 cups) of pecan halves - a sure favorite of pecan growers. Patti has been in the Cisco 4-H club for one year. She has completed

projects in clothing and horticulture.

Reserve Grand Champion was won by Donna Derryberry, Cisco 4-H club girl. Donna's prize winning recipe is Fresh Apple Pecan Cake with Pecan Glaze. Donna is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Derryberry.

### CANDIED FRUITCAKE

Patti Weathers

First, read through entire recipe. These are the ingredients needed. Make no substitutions. All measurements are level. Assemble all ingredients and let stand at room temperature 1 hour.

3 packages (8 ounces each) or 1

package (1 pound) and 1 package (8 oz.) imported pitted dates.

1 pound candied pineapple (half green, half yellow) plus some green for decoration  
1 pound whole candied cherries, plus some for decoration  
2 cups unsifted all purpose flour  
2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 large eggs  
1 cup sugar  
2 pounds (8 cups) pecan halves, plus some for decoration  
Light corn syrup

### To Make Cake:

1. Use two 9" x 3 1/2" loose bottomed tube pans or two 9" x 5" x 3" loaf pans; or use one of each. With pastry brush, grease pans well with softened butter or margarine. Set pan on piece of brown paper and trace around edge and inside of tube. Then cut out tracing and fit in pan. Cut a strip the right length and width and fit around side of pan. For loaf pan, cut bottom and all side sections separately.

2. Turn on oven; set at 275 degrees

3. Use shears dipped occasionally in cold water, cut dates in half crosswise. Cut 1 pound pineapple in course pieces. Put fruits in large bowl with 1 pound cherries.

4. Spoon flour lightly into measuring cup for dry ingredients and fill heaping full. Level off with metal spatula. Put in sifter with baking powder and salt and sift onto fruit.

5. Mix fruits and dry ingredients well with fingers, separating pieces of fruit so that all are well coated with dry ingredients.

6. With electric mixer or rotary beat, beat eggs until frothy.

7. Gradually beat in sugar. Add to fruit mixture and mix well with large spoon.

8. Add 2 pounds pecan halves and mix with hands until nuts are evenly distributed and

coated with batter.

9. Pack into pans, pressing down with palms of hands. If necessary, rearrange pieces of fruit and nuts to fill any empty spaces.

10. Decorate tops with rows of whole red candied cherries, thin slices of green pineapple and pecan halves.

11. Bake tube cakes about 1 1/4 hours; loaf cakes 1 1/2 hours. Tops of cakes should look dry but will not brown.

12. When tube cakes are done, let stand in pans on cake racks about 5 minutes. Cool on cake racks, then invert on serving plate. Turn pan right side up, brush with corn syrup and cool completely

Let cakes in loaf pans stand in pans on cake rack about 30 minutes before inverting on oblong cutting board. Peel off paper, turn right side up and brush with corn syrup. Cool.

### To Store Cake:

Wrap cake in foil or plastic wrap and store in cool place. A plate isn't necessary, stored this way, cakes will keep several weeks. If frozen, then wrapped well and stored in freezer, cakes will keep almost indefinitely.

### FRESH APPLE PECAN CAKE WITH PECAN GLAZE

3 cups chopped raw apples  
1 1/2 cups all veg. cooking oil  
2 cups sugar  
3 eggs  
2 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1 t. salt  
1 t. soda  
2 t. baking powder  
1 t. vanilla  
1 cup chopped pecans

Peel apples - chop (set aside) Pour all veg. cooking oil into a large mixing bowl. Add sugar, and eggs and beat well.

Sift flour with salt, soda, and baking powder. Gradually add flour to creamed mixture. Add vanilla. Then fold in apples and pecans.

Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes in an oiled pan with flour.

Glaze  
1 1/2 cups sugar (powdered)  
3 Tablespoons water  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
Drizzle over the cake and sprinkle pecans over the glaze. Do not mix pecans with glaze.
