Pecan Show Set to Open

The 19th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show gets under way this weekend with the largest Pecan Queen Contest ever at the opening Thursday evening.

A total of 29 girls will compete for the coveted title of Miss Eastland County Pecan Queen Thursday evening at the Eastland High School Auditorium. The contest begins at 8 p.m. and the public is invited. Tickets are 25 cents in advance and 50 cents each at the door.

The Pecan Show proper will be in the lobby of the county courthouse and the best time to see the show is Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. Dan Childress, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association reports.

The processing of pecar entries begins at 8 a.m. Friday. When members of the sponsoring Growers Association and Eastland Chamber of Commerce volunteers begin shelling of the entries.

Quality of the entries is expected to be extra good this year, even though the quantity of the total county harvest is believed to be some 20 percent below normal. County Agent De Gordon reports. Estimates are that some 250,000 to 300,000 pounds is the yield this year, and the average price is 60 cents per pound in the orchard. A million pounds of pecans

were grown in this county in 1968, and the past two previous years has seen from 700,000 to 800,000 pounds harvested.

Insects and a late freeze are blamed this year for the lack of volume in the crop, officials report.

Others offering assistance in the annual show are Eastland Chamber of Commerce President Jeff Glazner and Vice President Marcus O'Dell, Growers Association Treasurer and Chamber Member Ben McKinnis; and Nolan DeFord, who always takes an active part in the show.

Church of Christ Sets Special Service

A special service will be held at the Church of Christ, Daugherty and Plummer Sts., Sunday, Dec. 12, beginning at 6 p.m., when Roy Deaver, Director of the Brown Trail School of Preaching at Hurst, will be the speaker, J.E. Pennington, minister, has announced.

The general public is invited to attend this special service at which Mr. Deaver will present special training program and show slides of his work at the school.

Mr. Deaver is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H.W. Deaver of Morton Valley and received his college training at Abilene Christian College. He has ministered at Haskell and Vernon and was president of Fort Worth Christian College at one time.

The Brown Trail School of Preaching was established in 1965 and now has a faculty of 11, with a two year intensive study and training program for training gospel preachers. All are full-time and in school for two years, on a five-day schedule, seven hours per day.

13 UP & 13 DOWN!

Now Eastland's Mighty Mavericks stand at the Gateway, to knock for entry into the hallowed Hall.

The knocking comes Friday night in Weatherford when the Mavericks face the Jacksboro Jackrabbits in the State Semi-Final Playoff.

En Masse, Eastland will take its hopes to the Parker County seat and look for one more victory in the long string that will keep the Mavericks undefeated, and ready for THE BIG ONE.

Eastland's been down this path before, once. It was in 1956, after a much-less spectacular season that Eastland swallowed hard with a defeat at the hands of Stinnett.

"History won't be repeated this season," the Mavericks and their fans declare this week. Tickets went on sale Tuesday and were moving out fast. They'll be available until Friday at 1, at the high school.

There's a touch of history in names: Jacksboro barely beat Linden-Keldare (a consolidated school) last week in the quarter-finals while Eastland bested Childress, 22-0.

Back in 1956, the story went like this: Eastland rallied after losing its three non-district games to Cisco, Ranger and Cross Plains to sweep through the 10-A race and then turned the tables on 9-A Cross Plains, in the bi-district.

Undefeated, untied Henrietta barred the way in the regional and perfect-record Henrietta fell to Eastland.

Then Linden, the team which had eliminated rampaging White Oak in the bi-district round, sat across the path of the Mavericks in the Quarterfinals. Linden, too, was a victim of the red and Black.

Agony claws my mind. I am a statistic. When I first got here I felt very much alone. I was overwhelmed with grief and I expected to find sympathy.

I found no sympathy. I saw only thousands of others whose bodies were as badly mangled as mine. I was given a number and placed in a category. The category was called "TRAFFIC FATALITIES."

The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheeled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," I pleaded. "All the kids drive." When the 3:30 bell rang I threw my books in the locker. I was free until 8:00 tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot excited at the thought of driving a car and being my OWN BOSS. Free. Free.

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off - going too fast. Taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my FREEDOM and having fun. The last thing I remembered was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard a deafening crash and felt a terrific jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly, I awakened. It was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out all over. Strange that I couldn't feel anything.

The next week the Mavericks lost to 1955 runnerup Stinnett, 55-20. Ten of the 11 Eastland starters were seniors, seniors who were freshmen when

High School Counselor Charles Marshall handed me a typed letter the other day at school. As I was reading this letter it occurred to me just how real this could actually be. It's title "IN LOVE WITH LIFE" or "HOW IT WOULD BE IF I WERE KILLED IN AN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT"

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Carroll Shelton took over the Maverick reins.

Stinnett went on to win State that fateful '56.

What about '71?

GIL GAETA has been named Outstanding Offensive player for his tremendous blocking efforts in the Childress game. Head Coach Shirley Frazier reports.

RON McCLESKEY and MIKE JONES get the nod for defensive play in that game. Mike claimed an even dozen individual tackles with half as many more assists, and Ron stopped Bobcat advances on ten key plays and helped out on a good number of others.

"Our kids realize that in Jacksboro, we've finally got an opponent," Frazier says. They know that those who make it to the finals are the best, and that we'd better have all our horses hooked up this week, or we won't be in the finals.

The Jacksboro team is a big, good team; 200 pound average from end to end; and eager, the coach warns.

"And their boys are experienced in playoff competition. They just go some place every year - they don't win 'em all, but they're accustomed to playing in the finals."

Please - somebody - wake me up! Get me out of here. I can't bear to see my mom and dad so broke up. My grandparents are so racked with grief they can barely walk. My brother and sister are like Zombies. They move like robots in a daze. Everybody. No one can believe this. And I can't believe it either.

Please don't bury me! I'm not dead! I have a lot of living to do! I want to laugh and run again. I want to sing and dance. Please don't put me in the ground. I promise if you give me just one more chance. God, I'll be the most careful driver in the whole world. All I want is one more chance. Please, God, I'm only 17.....

6 Arrested In County

An early morning arrest of three Ranger youths this week led the Ranger Police Department to begin putting together pieces of information on the selling of and possession of dangerous drugs in the city and surrounding area towns.

The three youths, were apprehended at 4:15 a.m. Tuesday after they had taken a newspaper rack at the Handy Spot Grocery on Highway 80 west of Ranger.

Ranger policeman Bennie Moseley stated the youths saw

him as he was patrolling the area and drove away. Moseley said he stopped the youths near the Ranger Airport and found the paper rack inside the car.

Patrolman Moseley said after he saw the rack, he also found a box in the auto which contained what he thought to be narcotics.

Moseley took the youths to the city jail where they were charged with theft of over \$50 in Judge M.D. Underwood's JP court.

The box, found in the car, contained a bottle of pills, a small box of marijuana seed, heroin, a rawhide cord, large tablespoon, a mortar and pestle, a hypodermic needle, industrial mercury, and a hand made smoking machine.

The three youths were transferred to the county jail at mid-morning Tuesday. No formal drug charges had been filed on them Wednesday.

Tuesday night, the Ranger Police Department, along with the Sheriff Department and the Police Department of Eastland arrested three other county youths and formal charges were to be filed sometime Wednesday.

Numbers plus quality equal success, so goes the old coaching theory. Jacksboro's Toby Wood gets a chance to prove said theory this fall when his Tigers make their '71 debut.

Back on hand are 16 seniors, 14 lettermen and a large group of an undefeated B-team. "We'll have some size and some depth," says Wood, "but we lack good over-all speed."

"Overall, however, it looks encouraging." Part of that encouragement comes from the fact that there are seven offensive regulars back who were either All-District picks or were dealt honorable mention last year.

Leading that group is team captain Lee Cook (6-1, 180, Sr.) who will be handling

the starting quarterback job for the third year. Last year the All-State candidate rushed for over 1,000 yards (6 yards per carry), threw for 1,800, hitting on 58 percent, and tossed 12 TD passes.

Joining Cook as the team captain will be fullback Bill Brown (6-0, 190, Sr.) who sat out the first half of last year recovering from surgery.

Manning the running back spot will be Roy Leach (5-11, 155, Jr.) and Monty Garner (5-8, 150, Sr.).

In the forward wall Wood welcomes back such veterans as end Ronnie Colbert (6-2, 200, Sr.), tackle Randy Jackson (6-1, 215, Sr.) and guards John Dikes (6-2, 195, Sr.) and Richard Milton (6-3, 190, Jr.). Milton was an All-District pick as a sophomore and could develop into one of the state's best.

Although not a starter, senior Reggie Foster (6-0, 190) saw a lot of action at end last year and will figure into the picture this fall. A newcomer at the split receiver spot, speedy B-team grad Clippy Williams (5-11, 165, Jr.) could help.

Defensively, Brown, Milton and Billy Dennis (165, Sr.) return at linebackers with Dikes and Jackson at guards. Cook will again work at safety and Leach will return at a halfback.

Taking up some of the slack at tackles will likely be B-team grads Geverne Lewis (6-3, 201) and Perry Applewhite (6-0, 195).

"A great deal hinges on how well our defense comes around," Wood points out. "If it does we could be a good ball club."

Mr. Stubblefield was born on July 22, 1894, in Jewel Community of Eastland County. For many years he owned and operated the Carbon Trading Co., in Carbon.

P.L. Crossley, 76, of Lubbock, a former Eastland resident died at 10:10 p.m. Friday in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. Funeral was at 10 a.m. Monday at St. John's United Methodist Church in Lubbock. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery at 4 p.m. Monday.

Mr. Crossley was born August 4, 1895, in Geneva, Ala. He moved to Eastland from Alabama in 1926 and married Mava Crouch Dec. 25, 1922, in Dublin. He was district clerk of Eastland from 1932 to 1938 and was a member of the State Legislature from 1939 to 1943. He was Eastland County Judge from 1944 to 1950.

Mr. Crossley moved to Lubbock in 1952. He was the Past Grand Master of the Eastland Masonic Lodge, and a member of the Texas Bar Association.

He was the adult probation officer in Lubbock.

Survivors are his wife, one son P.L. Jr. of Midland; three daughters, Mrs. Mava Lou Elliott of Irving, Mrs. Jeanne Boyd of Dallas, and Mrs. Elaine Morris of Atlanta, Ga.; one brother, Claude of San Antonio; two sisters, Mrs. C.W. Blacklock of Ranger, and Mrs. O.C. Hampton of Dumas; ten grandchildren; one great grandchild.

Dee Woodard, 64, six-year resident of Eastland died at noon Tuesday in Eastland Medical and Surgical Clinic after an apparent heart attack. Services were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in Arrington Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiating.

Graveside rites were held at 2 p.m. Thursday in Corsicana. Born Aug. 25, 1907, in Navarro County, Mr. Woodard moved to Eastland in 1965, from Sundown. He was a retired rancher and a member of Eastland Masonic Lodge.

He was married May 2, 1929, in Corsicana.

COST OF LIVING

The cost of living council announced on October 28, that the regulations which made the 90-day program a "freeze" will be modified to make the system more effective. Donald Rumsfeld, director of the council, stated that there will be no automatic ending on November 13 of present freeze rules on wages, prices, and rents. They will be changed only by the introduction of new regulations, thus preventing a gap that would occur if present rules were allowed to end before new ones had been instituted.

Rumsfeld noted that, as stated in the President's executive order of October 15, the provisions of the Economic Stabilization Program which have been in force since August 15 will continue until they are specifically modified by the Pay Board, Price Commission, or the Cost of Living Council. However, changes will occur only through explicit action taken by competent authority. It is anticipated that initial modifications to the freeze rules will be announced prior to

If no transactions occurred in that period, the ceiling will be the highest price, rent, salary or wage in the nearest preceding 30-day period in which transactions did occur. No person shall charge, assess, or receive directly or indirectly, in any transactions, prices or rents in any form higher than those permitted hereunder, and no person shall, directly or indirectly, pay or agree to pay, in any transaction, wages or salaries in any form, or to use any means to obtain payment of wages and salaries in any form, higher than those permitted hereunder, whether by retroactive increase or otherwise."

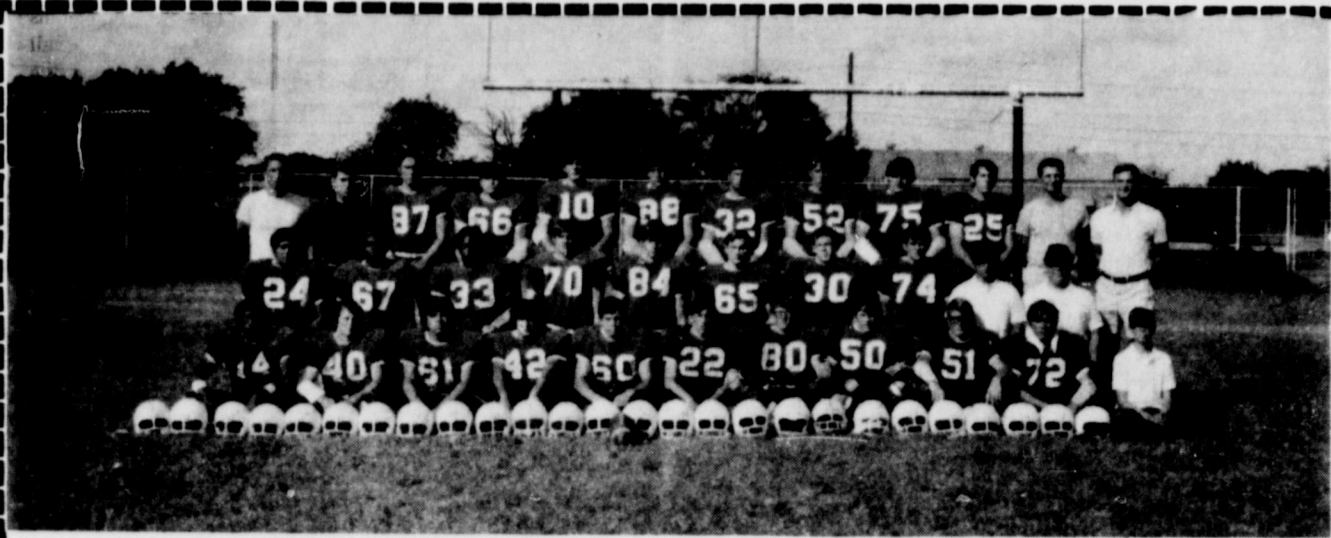

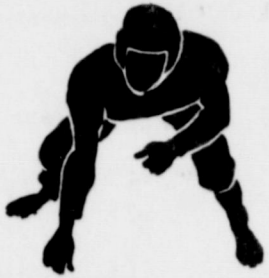

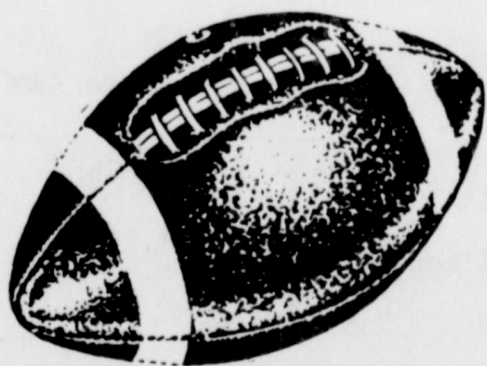

HIGHER TEMPERATURE STORAGE IS EFFECTIVE TENDERIZER

COLLEGE STATION. -- Storage of carcasses at higher-than-usual temperatures immediately after slaughter is an effective beef tenderizer, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research shows.

Standard procedure, R.L. West of the Texas A&M University Animal Science Department said, is to move the fresh carcasses into cold storage of about 30 degrees. He said one side from each of 27 steer and 21 slaughter cow carcasses was stored in a 50 to 60-degree cooler for 12, 16, or 20

hours immediately after killing before being chilled down to 30 to 32 degrees. Companion sides from the animals, designated as controls, were chilled at 30-32 degrees for the entire 48-hour period of the experiment.

Tests revealed that steaks from steer carcasses stored for 20 hours at the higher temperature were significantly more tender and rated higher in overall eating satisfaction than those from the control sides, West said.

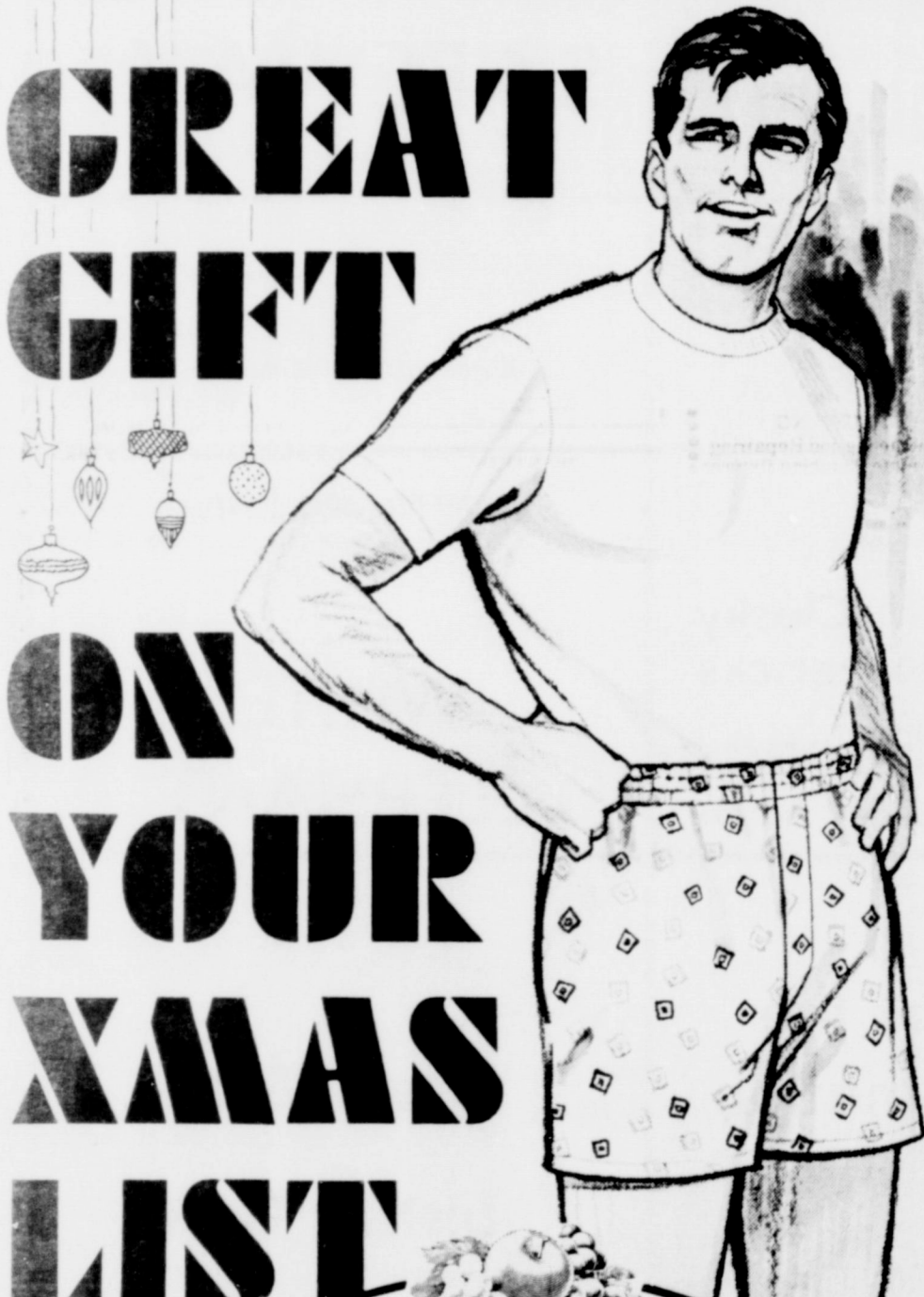

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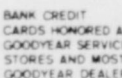
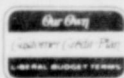

Guests introduced included Dwain Towell of Breckenridge and Harold De Haun of Brownwood.

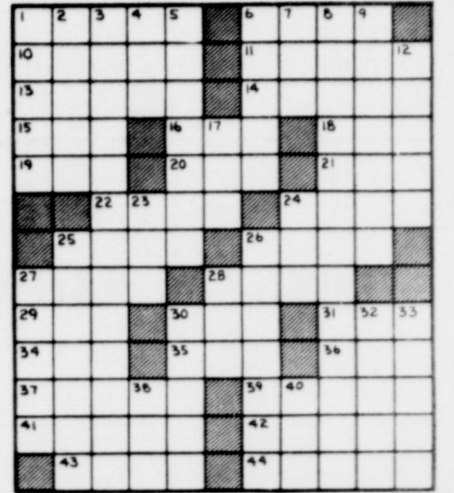

During district play the Mavericks rolled over seven teams. Of the seven, only Coleman could be considered a close game. The Mavs had captured the District Crown and lacked five games making it to the State Playoffs. From this time on you either won or the season was ended.

The following week the Mavs gained the Bi-District Championship in a second half comeback against Stamford. This earned them the right to play another week and meet Coahoma for the Regional Championship. The game, which Eastland won 56-30, proved to be an offensive battle. By defeating Coahoma the Mavs not only won Regional, but they were number one in their area. Coahoma was the only team left that Eastland had not played or beaten in this area. Now the Mavs find the time for the Quarter-final playoff

growing shorter. On Friday a big pep rally, in which all the schools in district 8-AA will be represented, will be held to boost Maverick spirit. Up to this point the Mavs had had only one serious injury, that being to Ruben Gaeta. But now, the starting quarterback is hurt. The possibility of his playing is good, but the probability of his being at top efficiency for this week's game is not. About seven hours after the pep rally the team and the fans will either be happy or sad. A win means the Quarter-Finals Championship and another week of practice. Then they would get to try for the Semi-Finals Championship. A loss means the end of the season. Only time will tell.
