AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT. Agony claws my mind. I am a statistic. When I first got here I felt very much alone. I was overwhelmed with grief and I

expected to find sympathy. I found no sympathy. I saw only thousands of others whose bodies were as badly mangle d as mine. I was given a number and placed in a category. The category was called "TRAF-

FIC FATALITIES." The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheedled the car out of Mom. "Special favor." I pleaded. "All the kids drive." When the 3:30 bell rang I threw my books in the locker. I was free until 8:00 tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot excited at the thought of driving a car and being my OWN BOSS. Free. Free.

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off - going too fast. Taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my FREEDOM and having fun. The last thing I remembered was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard a deafening crash and felt a terrific jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly, I awakened. It was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out all over. Strange that I couldn't feel anything. Carroll Shelton took over the Maverick reins.

Stinnett went on to win State that fateful '56.

Patrolman Moseley said after he saw the rack, he also found a box in the auto which contained what he thought to be narcotics.

Moseley took the youths to the city jail where they were charged with theft of over \$50 in Judge M.D. Underwood's JP

The box, found in the car, contained a bottle of pills, a small box of marijuana seed, heroin, a rawhide cord, large tablespoon, a mortar and pestle, a hypodermic needle, industrial mercury, and a hand made smoking machine.

The three youths were transferred to the county jail at mid- morning Tuesday. No formal drug charges had been filed on them Wednesday.

Tuesday night, the Ranger Police Department, along with the Sheriff Department and the Police Department of Eastland arrested three other county youths and formal charges were to be filed sometime

Patrolman Moseley described the manner in which the narcotics are used. He said the pills were crushed in the mortar and some type of liquid, usually milk, is added to the pills. The mixture is placed into a large spoon, the type found in the box of other drugs, and is

heated to a body temperature. The rawhide cord, Moseley said, is used as a tourniquet to force a blood vein to rise up so that a needle with the heroin can be injected into the body.

COST OF LIVING

The cost of living council announced on October 28, that the regulations which made the 90-day program a "freeze" will be modified to make the system effective. Donald Rumsfeld, director of the council, stated that there will be no automatic ending on November 13 of present freeze rules on wages, prices, and rents. They will be changed only by the introduction of new regulations, thus preventing a gap that would occur if present rules were allowed to end before new ones had been in-

Rumsfeld noted that, as stated in the President's executive order of October 15, the provisions of the Economic Stabilization Program which have been in force since August 15 will continue until they are specifically modified by the Pay Board, Price Commission, or the Cost of Living Council. However, changes will occur only through explicit action taken by competent authority. It is anticipated that initial modifications to the freeze rules will be announced prior to



HIGHER TEMPERATURE STORAGE IS EFFECTIVE TENDERIZER

COLLEGE STATION. Storage of carcasses at higherthan-usual temperatures immediately after slaughter is an effective beef tenderizer, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research shows.

Standard procedure, R.L. West of the Texas A&M University Animal Science Department said, is to move the fresh carcasses into cold storage of about 30 degrees.

He said one side from each of 12:00 - Pecan Queens' Lun- 27 steer and 21 slaughter cow 60-degree cooler for 12 16, or 20

hours immediately after killing before being chilled down to 30 to 32 degrees. Companion sides from the animals, designated as controls, were chilled at 30-32 degrees for the entire 48-hour period of the experiment.

Tests revealed that steaks from steer carcasses stored for 20 hours at the higher temperature were significantly more tender and rated higher in overall eating satisfaction than those from the control



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
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
