The year of 1971 has been a good, normal and peaceful year for us. The job is going on well. All we and our dears and nears have been generally in good health. God has been kind enough to keep all troubles, physical, mental, natural or circumstantial away from us and we have been enjoying the life to maximum which I have learnt.

In the beginning of the year when Indian Parliament had new elections, I had sought ruling Congress Party ticket and ran around for a month. Some how I missed the ticket and so did not contest. However, I am in queue and hope to make it some time.

At the festival of lights in October, as usual we visited the parents and other family members in U.P. for a week. Now for a week from Christmas to New Year we are planning a sight-seeing trip to visit half a dozen places in South India.

You must have read and listened about the political affairs of this part of the world going on recently. I think your news papers particularly The New York Times and your several senators particularly Mr. Edward Kennedy have done a good job in explaining the real situation. Bangla Desh was treated as a colony of West Pakistan for last 24 years. When they demanded independence, Pakistan did the worst mass murder unparalleled in human history. About 10 million people of all religions, including Muslims, came to India as refugees and we did our best to take care of them.

There was unfortunate war with Pakistan for a few days. But now Bangla Desh becoming free and Pakistan losing its rich colony, I think now Pakistan will behave properly and will remember the lesson which we

Four Eastland Mavericks of the 1971 Quarter-Final Championship team have been picked for All-State AA honors by the most prestigious newspaper picking -- and what is expected to be the state-wide Associated Press listing.

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram names Quarterback Craig Lund and Back Howard King to the All-State First Team; End James Eidson to the First Team Defense; and End Bob Mace to the Second Team Offense squad.

Head Coach Shirley Frazier reports at mid-week that the Star-Telegram listing is generally very nearly always the All-State listing, and a telephone check with the Star-Telegram sports desk Wednesday morning revealed that the list released by that paper on Dec. 23, was compiled by Writer Gerald Garcia there.

State Champion Jacksboro grabbed two spots on the All-Star-Telegram's team. Kirbyville and Refugio joined Eastland with three top berths each.

Earnest Bean of Kirbyville was named AA Player of the Year.

The four Eastland honorees are seniors.

The 1971 Mavericks carried the Black and Red banner further this season, to the Quarter-Final Crown, than it had ever been taken before, losing to Jacksboro who went on to win the state's crown.

Individual statistics on the Mavericks are being compiled and will be released in this newspaper soon.

There's one Eastland Countian who's seen 100 years come and go, who has nothing but optimism about the future. She's Mrs. Minnie Williams,

who came here in a covered wagon, and celebrated her "Century and One" Monday. A birthday month is always a key one for a person, but Mrs. Minnie has mixed feelings about December. It was in that month in '28 that she lost a son and her husband.

Offering no specific clue to her long years except that she enjoys living, Mrs. Minnie looks forward to 1972 and the years ahead.

She celebrated her 101st birthday, Monday, Dec. 27th at Eastland Manor Nursing Home with a beautiful cake, lots of pretty gifts, but most important of all, to her were her friends.

Mrs. Minnie was born December 27, 1870 on a farm in Mississippi to Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Rose. She had one brother who was three years older, George Walter Rose. Mrs. Minnie and her family lived there until she was about four years old, when the family uprooted and took a train to Fort Worth where Mr. Rose bought a team of horses and a covered wagon and made his way to Breckenridge, where he bought a farm.

Life was simple but hard, just as it was for many other families in those days: early to bed, early to rise, and make the best of what you had.

The family hauled water for three miles and tried to farm the land.

Her parents sent her to town to stay with her uncle so she could get her education. She graduated from school at the age of 14 and at that time all she would have had to do to become a teacher, was to take an examination. Instead of taking a test to teach as many of her friends did, she met William Williams.

Many years have come and gone and today Mrs. Minnie happily likes her home at Eastland Manor. She finds many things to keep her busy such as Fancy work (tating, weaving, and crocheting) and visiting with her many friends.

When asked if she would prefer to live back in the old days, Mrs. Minnie says, "You can't go back, so you must go forward." She says she is all for progress and thinks the world is no worse today than 50 or more years ago, but publicity is given more to bad things than the good things that happen,

and she believes it's unfair. Mrs. Minnie says she wonders if the Lord intended for us to explore other planets, yet she thinks it's a wonderful achievement and wants progress to move on.

Her birthday party was a success and she talks with everyone. She was so busy visiting and enjoying everyone's company, that she did not get her gifts open until Tuesday. Mrs. Williams says she has no secret for long life, but it is great to be 101 and she looks forward to another year.

New Telephone Rates Introduced By Bell

An adjustment of long distance telephone rates within Texas, announced on July 31 but deferred because of the wage-price freeze, has been authorized by the Price Commission in Washington. The new rates went into effect at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday, December 29, according to Southwestern Bell.

The new telephone rates feature reduced charges for most One-Plus Calling and increased rates for operator-assisted calls within Texas. According to John E. McGowan, Manager for Southwestern Bell, the adjustment should increase the company's intrastate revenue in Texas by about 2 percent.

Also introduced along with the new rate for One-Plus Dialing were:

SOS Club

The SOS Club will not meet any more until after the first of the year, then the club will continue their regular meetings.

A new one-minute initial period of "night" (11 p.m. to 8 a.m.) One-Plus Dialed calls which do not require the services of an operator:

New rates for all operator-assisted calls (station-to-station, person-to-person, credit card, third number, coin and "collect") during all calling periods;

New rate periods (day, evening, night and weekend) on One-Plus calls. These time periods are the same as those in effect for calls going outside Texas.

Mr. McGowan also pointed out that two holidays - Labor Day and July 4 - have been added to the list of days on which reduced rates apply for One-Plus calls within Texas.

The new One-Plus rate also is available in cities which are not now equipped for One-Plus Dialing when a station-to-station call is charged to the telephone from which the call is made. The rate does not apply on collect calls, credit card calls, calls charged to a third number or calls from coin telephones.

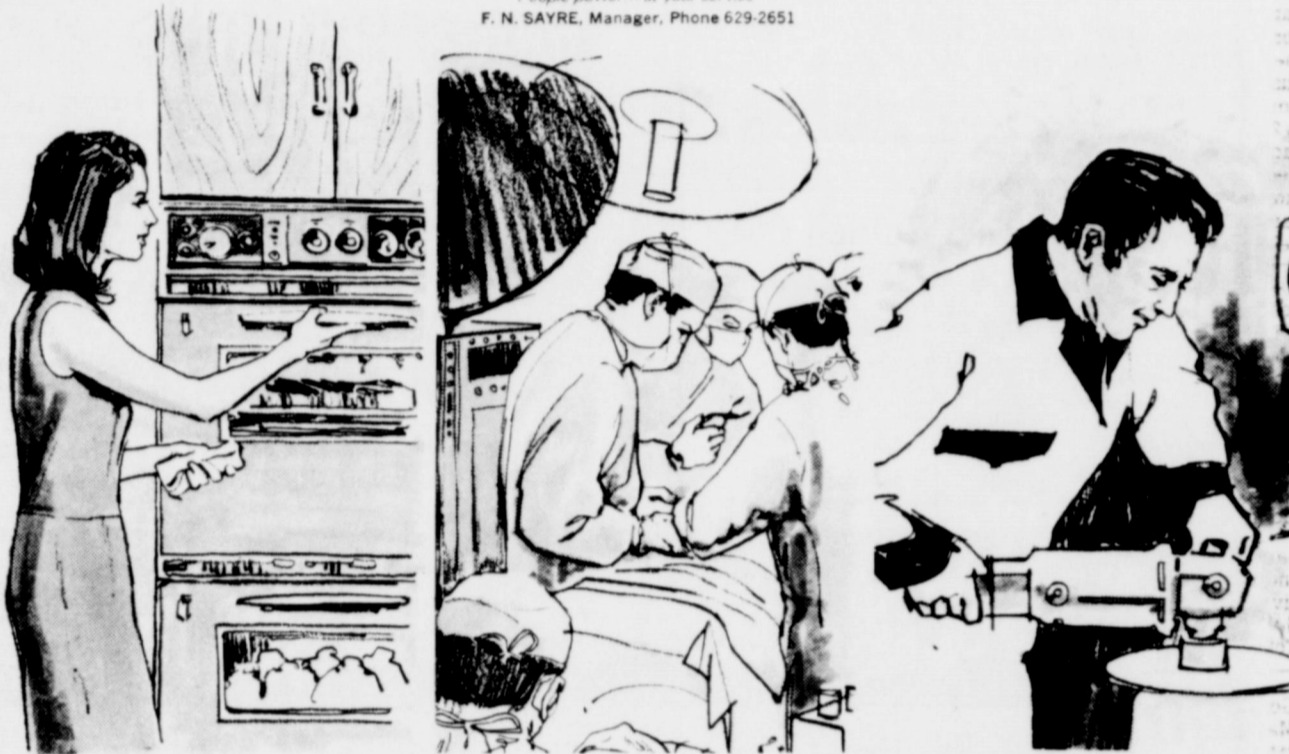

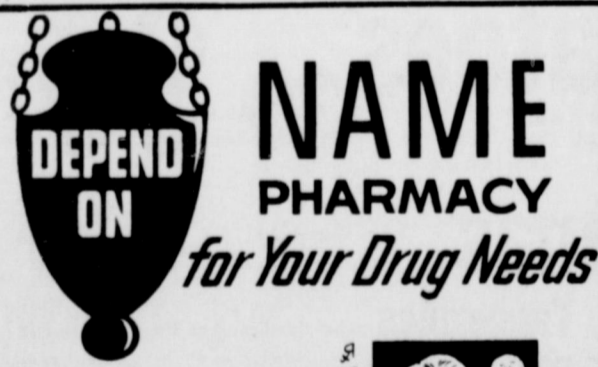

Gordon's Pot
by DeMarquis Gordon

Cattle producers in Eastland County should be alerted to the fact that an outbreak of cattle scab (psoroptic mange) has occurred in the High Plains of Texas. A state and federal quarantine has been placed on 34 counties effective December 11 and 14, respectively.

Scabies is caused by tiny parasitic mites which live on the skin and cause scab formation. It is highly contagious and spreads easily from animal to animal by direct contact or infested brushes, or grooming equipment. It is not transmissible to other species of animals.

The mites cause an intense itching and scab formation with a loss of hair in affected areas. Animals become weak and may die if not properly treated.

Officially approved treatment consists of the use of toxaphene or lime-sulfur dips at 10 to 14 day intervals. Toxaphene is cheaper than the lime-sulfur which must be heated. Treated animals must be withheld from slaughter for 28 days following treatment with toxaphene to avoid residuals in the meat.

Livestock owners who notice any abnormal skin conditions in their animals should contact their local veterinarian for a closer check.

Yards and gardens are all too often neglected during the winter months. Long dry periods without supplemental watering may cause severe dying back on the growing tips of plants.

Drying is especially serious on evergreens and late winter or early spring flowering plants since they have rapidly developing flower buds and require a steady supply of moisture.

It's a good idea to water thoroughly at four-to-six-week intervals throughout the dormant period.

Shallow rooted plants and plants in containers are especially vulnerable to moisture stress during the winter. If such plants are ex-

posed to prevailing winter wind, they will require close attention to assure adequate moisture. Plants located beneath the roof overhang are often damaged by lack of moisture during cold weather.

During cold weather irrigate early in the day so that foliage may dry before nightfall. The most efficient time to apply water is when air is calm. This will reduce evaporation losses. Plant damage including lawn failure is generally blamed on insects, diseases or cold injury. But such damage is often due to excessively dry soil during the winter months. Mulch applications and proper watering practices are just as important in the winter as in the summer. Even though the grass is brown and trees have shed their leaves, plants still need moisture. The water hose is still an important tool during winter months.

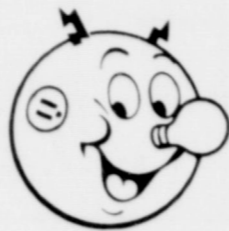

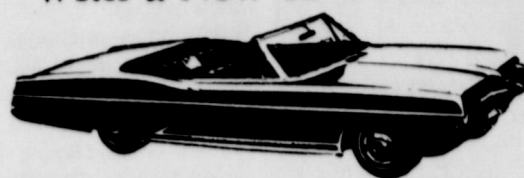

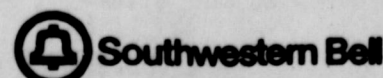
