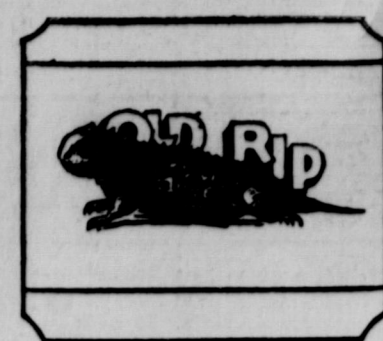

Plans Complete for Pecan Budding School

Plans have been completed for the annual Eastland County pecan budding and grafting school on Tuesday, April 13, with the morning session to be held in the cafeteria at Cisco Junior College and the afternoon period in a pecan grove in the Leon River bottom. County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper will teach the school. Demonstrations and lectures on when and how to bud, when not to bud, types of budwood, forcing the bud into growth, difference between budding and grafting, latest techniques in grafting, cold storage dormant budwood, seasoning budwood and other subjects are on the agenda for the morning part of the all day affair. After a Dutch lunch in the cafeteria at noon the group will go to the Kent Word pecan grove, three miles south of Cisco, for a practice session. A limited supply of cold storage pecan budwood, pecan knives, plastic tying material and other items will be available for those desiring them, Mr. Cooper said. The school has been taught annually for the past decade by Mr. Cooper, and although principally for citizens of Eastland County, interested persons from other counties are invited to attend, women as well as men. Over 100 people from 18 different counties attended the propagation school last spring. Those attending from Cisco will include Jim Smothers, Cisco Chamber of Commerce manager, and representatives from the agriculture committee, headed by Sam Kimmell and composed of Anton White, Sutton Crofts, Rudolph Schaefer, Tommy Toland, Don Kincaid, Harry Donica, and J. Local Bomb Found Dud -- Whew!

Q. When is a bomb not a bomb? A. Not until you know for sure! The U. S. Army inspected and retrieved a World War II bomb in Eastland this week -- and in so doing, set a lot of minds at ease. The weapon wasn't lethal, but no one around here knew that until the G.I.s came on the scene and found out for sure. The bomb was plowed up near the high school track field about a week ago by a dozer, being used to do leveling there. The site is at the west end of Hill St., just below High School Hill. Youngsters became curious about the object and called it to the attention of H. T. Wilson who lives across the street. He in turn mentioned the bomb's presence to School Board President Truitt Gregory. The two contacted City Manager Lewis Tiner, who disclaimed any knowledge of the bomb, but went to work immediately to see about getting someone who deals in such things. Several attempts with the airplane camp near Abilene failed to yield any assistance and the call went out to the Army. Thursday Paul McKinley and Annibal Comasho, both Specialists from the 47th Ordnance Detachment at Fort Hood, appeared and were taken directly to the bomb. The fanned, aerial bomb was about 28 inches long and some ten inches around, and according to the ordnance specialists, exactly the same as high explosive models used earlier. Graciously, McKinley asked the city manager if he would like to leave while they inspected the device and disarmed it, if necessary. Mr. Tiner, being a reasonable man, assured them that he had just as soon leave them with the bomb. And did. Luckily, the soldiers determined that the bomb was sand filled, rather than TNT-filled, and returned it to Fort Hood -- with many thanks from all and sundry. Cheerleaders Elected; Sherry Butler To Lead

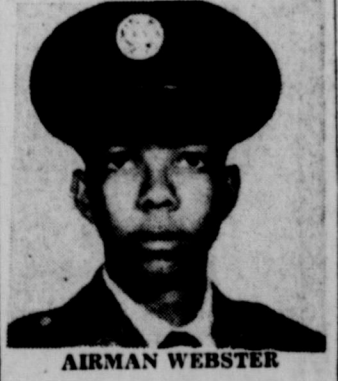
