Major league magnates are still scouting for the Jewish ball player that will stand out in the big leagues and prove to be a "gate attraction."

The owners agree that one good Jewish star will bring the games and build up a following.

This is especially true in New York city, where there are two million or more Hebrew people.

However, as the season progressed, Cohen failed to keep up his good work. He slumped in batting and slowed up in the field.

Cohen finished the 1928 season sitting on the bench, and within two years was back in the minors.

Some of McGraw's other candidates for Jewish popularity were Harry Rosenberg, young Coast league star, who failed to live up to Coast records.

However, Phil Ball, owner of the St. Louis Browns, has the current Jewish star in the Browns' regular shortstop, Jim Levy.

Levy is an ex-marine and only played one year in the minor leagues, being with Tulsa in 1930.

His playing on the marines ball team attracted a scout of the Browns who signed Levy upon his release from the marine corps.

Levy stepped into the regular St. Louis shortstop berth at the beginning of the 1931 season, and has been on the job ever since.

He is considered one of the best fielders in the majors. Levy only batted .209 in his first season in the big leagues being out-hit by all other American league shortstops.

At the start of the 1932 season, Manager Bill Killefer of the Browns decided to experiment with Levy's batting and advised Levy to try hitting left-handed.

Instead of right-handed, Killefer figured Levy's speed would also enable him to beat out more hits, with the added start by batting on the left side of home plate.

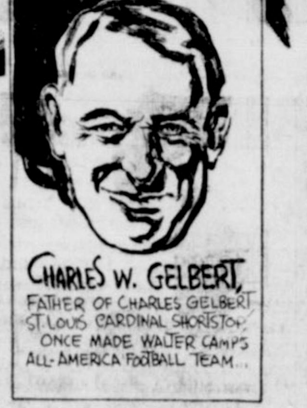

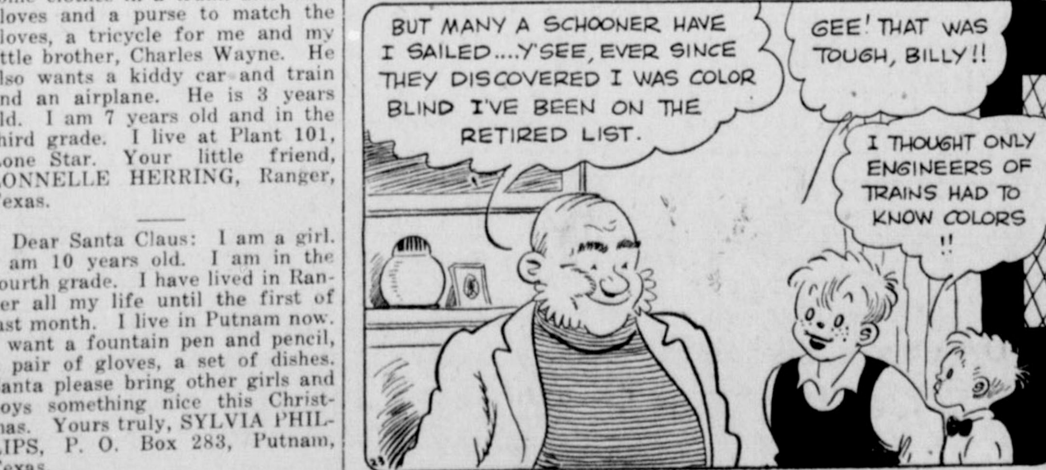

Weekly Sunday School Lesson GOD'S GIFT TO MAN

Text: Luke 2:8-20.  
The International Uniform Sunday School lesson for Dec. 25.

Inevitably we contemplate Christmas in terms of giving.  
There is a stage in life, in childhood or even in youth, when Christmas and birthdays are thought of in terms of receiving, but as childhood develops into youth and youth develops into manhood and womanhood with the responsibilities of home and of family life, one of the great and happy discoveries is that "it is more blessed to give than to receive."  
Those who at one time may have been selfish in thinking of themselves become nobly unselfish in the sense of devotion to their children and the willingness to sacrifice for their children. Life takes on a new meaning of responsibility and giving.  
It was through such an experience as this that Jesus taught the men and women of his day to understand the character and the heart of God. He appealed to the fathers who listened to him with the question whether they would give a stone to the son who asked for bread or a serpent to a child asking for fish, and this made very pointed his inquiry whether God would not be as gracious and as kind toward his children.  
It is from this standpoint and in this spirit that we must contemplate God's gift to man. All that is good in ourselves, all that is loving, and all that is generous has its highest level, its source and its fullness, in God.  
Christmas is, therefore, the day of our celebration of the giving of all our gifts. The New Testament represents God as pouring out the richness of his own love and his own life in the coming into the world of Jesus of Nazareth.  
Here was a life that in every way encompassed the spirit of the giver. As it was through love that God gave him to the world, so it was in the goodness and perfectness of love that his life became manifest among men.  
We think of him as the Babe of Bethlehem, but he glorified his birth and his babyhood because of all that he was and all that he revealed in the fullness of his life on earth.  
It was not by chance that he came into the home at Nazareth or that he was born of Mary. In the brief glimpses of her that we have in the New Testament we see a rare and pure soul fitted to be the medium of the divine life; her heart attuned to the music of devotion and the highest aspiration
