### More Light From The Same Power

COLLEGE STATION — Thrifty minded families are finding that it's the "little things" around home that help trim the rough edges from their tightening budgets.

With this in mind, Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist, offers homemakers several tips on how to get more light from the same amount of electric power.

Mrs. Claytor points out that colored electric light bulbs absorb

up to one-third of the light they produce and should not be used, except for decorating purposes.

Replace dark or dingy lamp shades with white or some other light colored shade. Dark colors absorb light; light colors reflect.

Use one high-wattage bulb, Mrs. Claytor says, instead of several smaller ones. For example, she adds, a 100-watt bulb furnishes 50 percent more light than four 25-watt bulbs, yet uses the same power.

Scientists at a recent meeting in Dallas told how plant breeders checked on the growth of grass roots by using the Geiger counter and radio-active fertilizer. They learned how deep the roots had gone and how long it took them to get there.

Three months after a late March planting, roots of Costal Bermuda had gone down eight feet, Pangola roots had gone six feet, and the common Bermuda and Dallas grass, four feet. Deep-rooted plants better survive the periodic droughts that occasionally plague our agriculture.
