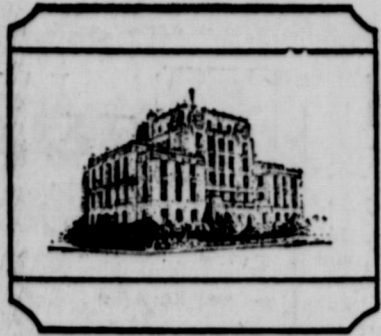
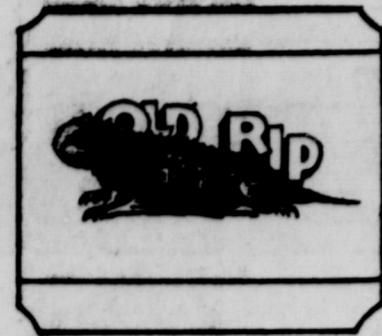

## Annual County Cancer Meeting Follows The 'Best-Ever' Crusade

"The key to the treatment of cancer is early diagnosis," Dr. Eugene Johnston, Abilene oral surgeon, told the annual meeting of the Eastland County Unit of the American Cancer Society in Eastland Thursday evening.

Dr. Johnston pinpointed the "face of the enemy" with vivid slides and details of the ravages of the savage disease and emphasized the importance of early diagnosis through regular checkups and examinations.

In what obviously will be the most successful Cancer Crusade this county has ever seen, reports show that almost \$5,000 has been collected.

Approximately 50 people from throughout the county attended the meeting in the Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church, presided over by County Chairman Sam Kimmell of Cisco. The Rev. Lester Davenport, host pastor, gave the invocation.

During the report session, Mrs. R. E. Grantham of Cisco, reporting for Public Education Chairman Mrs. Austin Flint, told that cancer films have been shown to over 1,473 people in schools, civic clubs and other groups.

Crusade Chairman Mrs. Ann Justice of Eastland reported on the recent crusade, explaining that with the control of cancer, the Cancer Society can close its doors forever. Actual county total to date, she said, is \$4,807.55, which includes a memorial fund, and it is hoped that with the donations not yet reported and others to be given the county total can surpass the magic \$5,000 mark.

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## Senior Elaine Berger Earns Advance Credit

On Friday, May 14, Elaine Berger, an Eastland High School Honor graduate, was given notice that she has received advance credit for Freshman English at the University of Texas for the 1965 fall semester.

The advance placement comes as a result of her scores on the English composition examination and the writing sample given by the College Entrance Examination Board testing program.

All freshman who wish to attend the University of Texas are required to take the English composition test, and those who score 500 or better on the 800 point test are eligible for advanced placement.

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## City's Average 25-Man Payroll Exceeds \$85,000.00 Annually

The City of Eastland has an annual budget of some \$230,000, but with expenses of approximately \$187,000, there is not a lot left for frills. City Manager Lewis Tiner told the Lions Club last week.

The manager outlined the city's operation, explaining its revenue, expenses, bonded indebtedness and plans for the future.

Operating under "home-rule" (which permits just about anything not otherwise prohibited by the state), the city utilizes the commission-manager - type government with the five commissioners electing their chairman or mayor.

There are 25 full-time employees in the six divisions who are paid an average monthly salary of \$254. There are three in the office; three in the fire department (who

each work about 120 hours a week); five in the police department, each working six days a week; three (two full-time and one part-time) in the cemetery; three in sanitation; and five men and the superintendent in the water and sewer department.

The city operates out of two funds: water and sewer general. Major revenue in the W&S is from sale of water, amounting to some \$120,000 annually, and biggest expenses from this fund are some \$5,000 monthly paid to the Eastland County Water Supply District, and 1,510 monthly on old bonds.

The general fund's revenue comes from some \$6,800 annual taxes (40 per cent of which goes to retire old debts); some \$12,000 yearly in franchise taxes; and about \$100 a month from parking meters.

Big - item expenses are: salaries, \$85,000; ECWSD, \$60,000; tax bond payment, \$24,000; and water and sewer bond payments, \$18,000.

The city's debt consists of some \$15,000 in old water and sewer bonds which will be paid off in about 11 months, the manager said, and about \$57,000 in 1941 and 1946 tax bonds, which will probably be paid off in about 30 months. Last year, \$24,000 were called in.

One of the biggest booms to the city has been the sale of water to the Great Western Drilling Co. for waterflooding project at Lake Eastland, which averages about \$900 profit a month, he said.

Major project upcoming is the laying of a six-inch water line from Madera St. to Daugherty St.

The first step: Find out which is the front of the set. Look for the glass window - this is usually the front. The back will be found at the extreme rear.  
SOME COMMON TROUBLES:  
No picture or sound: First, find the on-off knob and move it to the ON position. If this doesn't correct the trouble, insert the plug in the wall outlet. If this doesn't help, pay your power bill.  
Sound OK, no picture: Are you looking at the FRONT of the set?  
Waving picture: Be polite; wave back.  
Squiggles: Locate the Vertical-hold knob, often called the Upsy-Daisy, and turn until squiggling stops or changes to a Sputter-flutter (See: Sputter-flutter).  
Sputter-flutter: Turn Vertical-hold knob until trouble is corrected or becomes a squiggle. (See: Squiggle.)  
Vertical bars: Make sure you're not tuned to a prison movie.  
Horizontal bars: Have you wandered out of the house and into a saloon?  
Double image: You've had enough.  
For some repairs it's necessary to remove the back of the set and if you intend to perform such repairs, you should keep a few things in mind:  
1. There are places within the set where you can get a shock of 25,000 volts even when the set is turned OFF. This shocking statement is a fact!  
2. Glass tubes, when dropped on the floor, seldom bounce.  
3. When attempting repairs for the first time, it is often prudent to service a neighbors set, rather than your own.

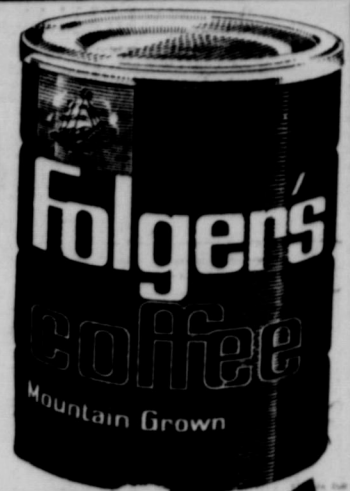

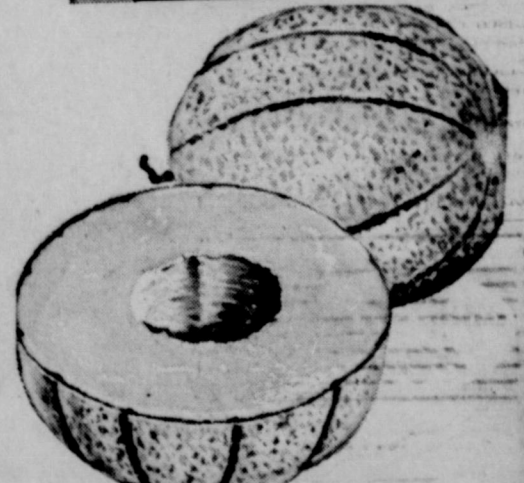

## BROWSING with BEV.....

Knits have really been popular this year and are predicted to be even more popular in seasons to come. They are especially suited for the person who travels. We have seen knits that are looped, lacy, ribbed, brocaded and don't forget the ever popular jersey knits.

There are two types of knits: Single knits and Double knits. Here's how to tell the difference: Single knits are usually light weight and it is difficult to tell the right from the wrong side—both look almost

alike. Single knits usually need to be underlined or lined, sometimes both. Double knits are usually more firm than single knits. They are knitted using two sets of yarns. There is a definite right and wrong side to double knits and usually they do not require an underlining or lining.

In selecting knits, remember the lengthwise rib is the straight grain of the fabric, so make sure the lengthwise rib is fairly straight and not twisted out of shape. In selecting a pattern, choose one with few

details. Pre-shrink knits, except those that are bonded, before cutting the pattern. A new process—which involves compressing the fabric and making it highly resistant to shrinkage in normal laundering—has been developed to keep cotton knits from shrinking when machine washed and dryer dried. Investigations by the Good Housekeeping Institute show that new processed knits which are released under the descriptive names of "pac-knit" and "perma-knit"—shrink about 1 percent, whereas conventional knits shrink about 10 percent. The computations were based on the knits being machine washed and dried 20 times each.

To open the tubular knits, cut along a lengthwise rib close to the fold. Do not cut along fold. Press as much of the fold out as possible, usually not all of the fold will press out so lay pattern pieces to where the fold will be less noticeable. In cutting your pattern, lay your fabric as flat as possible and avoid stretching the fabric. Remember, knits stretch more in width than in length.

The sewing machine tension should be medium to light. Use 12-15 stitches per inch or a small zig-zag. Use cotton mercerized thread with cotton knits and synthetic thread with man-made fiber knits.

While sewing knits, use seam tape on shoulders, waist and at other points where you do not want the knit to stretch. Use iron-on interfacing under buttonholes and zipper, to stabilize the material and keep it from stretching.

In cutting and sewing jerseys, place pins in the seam allowance so pin marks won't show. Use a short stitch, about 14-15 per inch and a sharp fine needle. Sew at a slow, even speed to keep material from puckering.

In pressing knits, lift and lower the iron in the direction of the lengthwise rib—do not stretch or pull fabric while pressing and do not steam-press.

Knits need proper laundering. Use warm—not hot—water and low to moderate setting on the dryer. This will result in less shrinkage. When using an automatic dryer for cotton knits, do not dry them bone dry. Remove the garments just before they are completely dry and pat and pull them gently into shape. The acrylic or nylon knits can be dried completely in a dryer with relatively little shrinkage. They will wrinkle badly if left in a dryer which has been turned off, however. Wool knits are rarely machine washable. They need special soap for cold water and they need to be blocked and dried flat.

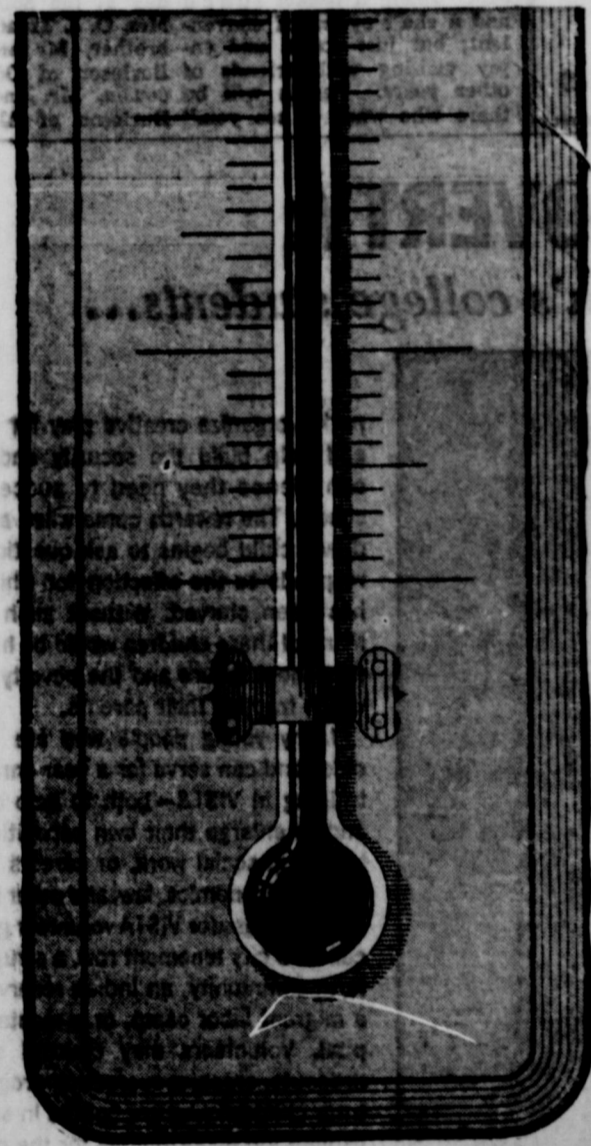

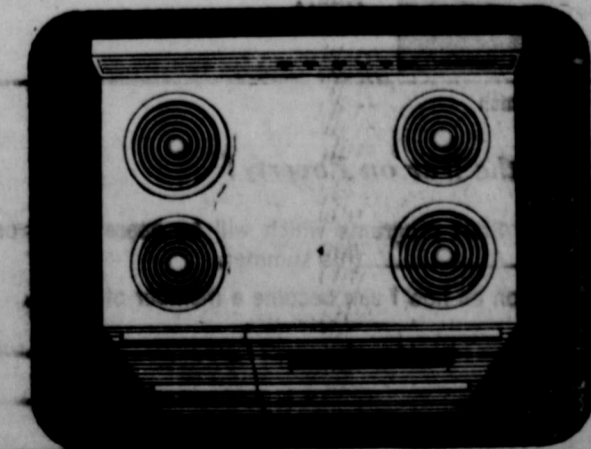

# THE WAR ON POVERTY: a message to the Nation's college students...

Inspiring causes have always fired the imagination of students.

Head Start volunteers will read to children, take them on outings to zoos and



parks, organize creative play for them, and help build the security and self-confidence they need to succeed in school. The rewards come when a withdrawn child begins to ask questions or responds to the affection for which he has been starved. Without such help, many of these children would be headed for school failure and the poverty cycle which trapped their parents.

Many young people who are 18 or older and can serve for a year enroll for training in VISTA—both to help others and to enlarge their own capacities for teaching, social work, or careers in sociology, economics, law, and other fields.

Home base for VISTA volunteer groups can be a city tenement row, a struggling farm community, an Indian reservation, a migrant labor camp, or a mental hospital. Volunteers may counsel school dropouts, organize recreation programs, tutor children who are behind in school, explore job opportunities for the poor—in short, do whatever is needed to help people find their way up from poverty. Volunteers become respected members of the communities where they work.

The pay is nominal—living expenses plus \$50 a month paid at the end of service. But the opportunities are great: you can help pave the way for an America in which the democratic ideal is big enough to encompass everyone.
