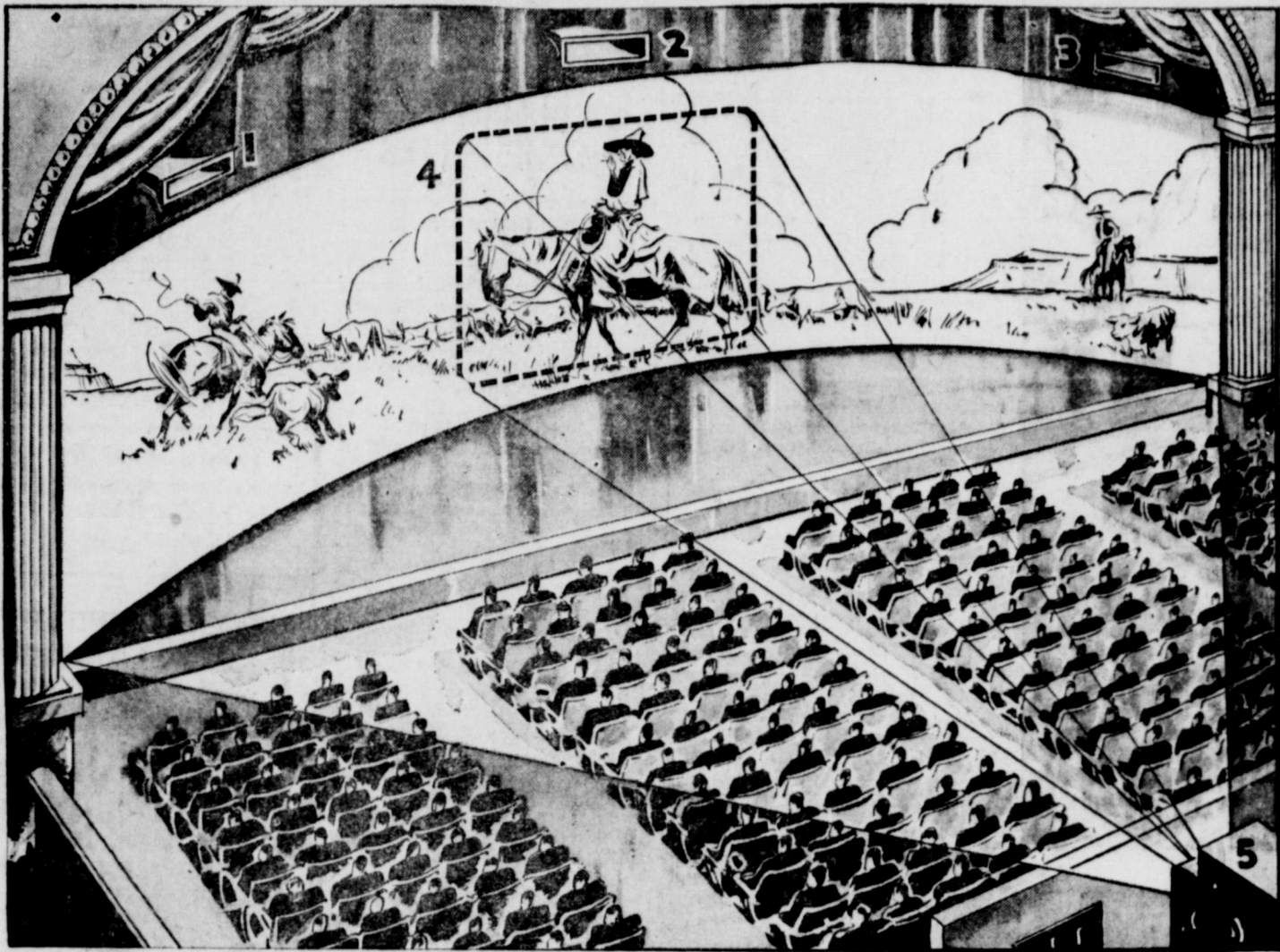

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS—CinemaScope, the panoramic-screen process making its bow in Eastland at the Majestic Theatre Sunday, April 11 is illustrated above. Three dimensional sound effect is made possible by the three "sound boxes" (one, two and three), illustrated at the top of the screen (but in actual practice coming from behind). Dotted lines (4) show the size of the conventional screen as compared to the new wide concave screen. The projection machine (5) shows how the process is made possible by a new lens which condenses the scene in filming and expands it to giant screen in projection.

Cancer Crusade Gets Underway Throughout Area

American Cancer Society volunteers from the Rio Grande to the Red River began the 1954 Texas Cancer Crusade this week.

Travis T. Wallace of Dallas, president of the Society's Texas Division, emphasized that the Crusade has two purposes.

"It will give vital information about cancer to the public and will raise funds to advance the society's programs of research, education and service," he said.

Official goal of the Texas Crusade is \$700,000. The national goal is \$25,000,000.

Gov. Allan Shivers, opening the Crusade on a network broadcast earlier this week, pointed out that cancer is expected to kill more than 9,000 Texans this year. He urged everyone to support the Crusade and to learn as much as they can about cancer during April—designated by President Eisenhower and Gov. Shivers as Cancer Control Month.

Wallace pointed out how the money contributed in Texas will be used in the cancer control program.

"At least 25 per cent will go for advanced scientific research," he said, "and much of that will be used by Texas scientists and institutions.

Sixty per cent will stay right here in Texas, to provide professional and public education, service to cancer patients and to maintain tumor clinics and information and service centers. The remainder will go to maintain the society's national program."

Eastlanders blossomed forth with the sun Saturday in an effort to push the Civic League and Garden Club's clean-up drive to a successful close.

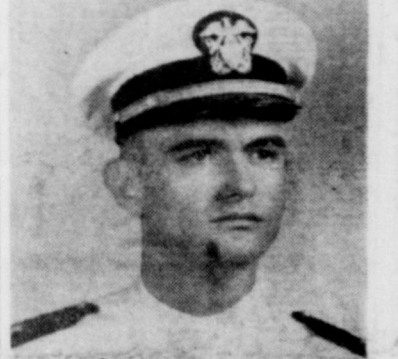
City trucks began picking up trash Friday and were to continue the rest of this week.

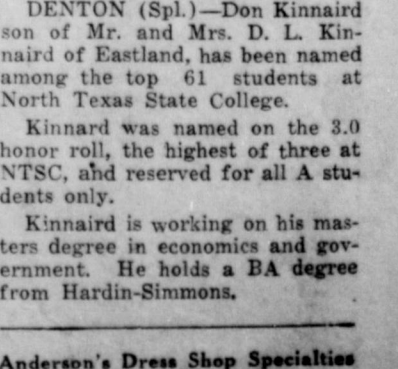
Don Kinnaird On Honor Roll At North Texas

HANDY HOME HINTS

PAN-BROWN CHOPS
Pan-brown your pork chops easily in a shallow pan, adding canned baked beans or lima beans, our two tablespoons of maple syrup over the top. Then bake in the oven of your range at 350 degrees for one hour. Serve with a tomato aspic salad.

WASH-DAY BAG
A mesh bag can be almost as important on wash days as plenty of good hot water from your automatic gas water heater. Fragile items, or small ones that can get lost easily in the washing machine can be placed in one of these bags or a pillow case for safe washing. Then you'll be able to get cleaner clothes and brighter colors, using hotter water.

FINEAPPLE BAKED APPLES
Try serving baked apples with centers filled with diced pineapple, topped with whip cream and a touch of cinnamon before serving. The shallow pan should be set in the automatic gas oven at 350 degrees for one hour, or until the apples are tender.

APPLE SAUCE SPECIAL
Here's a taste treat: Take peanut brittle and roll it with a rolling pin. Add as much or as little as you like to hot applesauce. After a brief stirring, remove pan from the top burner of your gas range. Serve in dessert dishes and top with a scoop of vanilla ice cream.

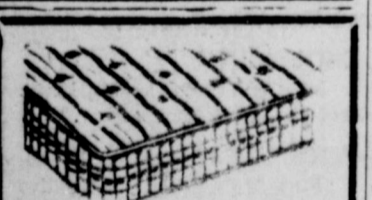

Selections from the King James Version of the Bible and correlative passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy comprise the Lesson Sermon entitled "Unreality."

Scriptural texts to be read include the following from James: "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning" (1:17).

Readings from Science and Health will include the following: "Spirit imparts the understanding which uplifts consciousness and leads into all truth... Understanding is the line of demarcation between the real and unreal... This understanding is not intellectual, is not the result of scholarly attainments; it is the reality of all things brought to light" (3:95-16-17, 21-22, 26-28).

"The Golden Text is from Romans: "The night is far spent, the day is at hand; let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light" (13:12).

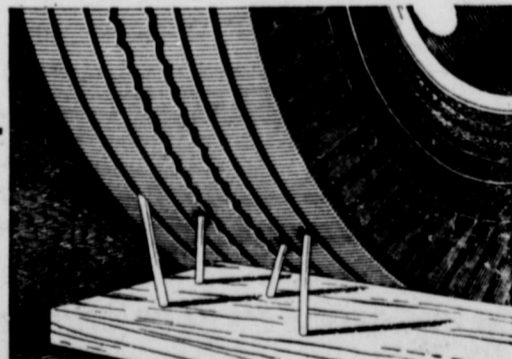

CHRYSLER DEVELOPS GAS TURBINE



Something really new in passenger car motive power is Chrysler Corporation's experimental gas turbine engine, now undergoing road tests in a production model Plymouth car at the 4,000-acre Chrysler engineering Proving Grounds, largest in the world, near Chelsea, Michigan. By means of a revolutionary new heat exchanger, or regenerator, Chrysler engineers have designed for the first time an automotive gas turbine that combines outstanding performance characteristics with fuel economy comparable to that of today's piston engines and exhaust temperature cooler than that discharged by the average car. Chrysler emphasized, however, that development of the new gas turbine does not mean that such an engine is ready for general use.

Whether there ultimately will be commercial production of gas turbines for passenger cars depends on the long-range solution of many complex metallurgical and manufacturing problems, and there is no indication now how long it will take to solve these problems. 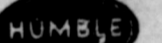
