WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Public Works Administrator Ickes today announced a loan and grant of \$4,853,000 had been made to the Willacy county water control and improvement district No. 1 in Texas.

DENVER, Colo., Dec. 9.—In a daring daylight holdup of a downtown beer parlor, five heavily armed handits today seized more than \$10,000 in cash and fled through a hail of gunfire which was believed to have killed one of their number.

BEER IS BEING sold illegally in some places in Eastland county, according to the findings of the Eastland county grand jury, which made a special report Friday afternoon to Judge George L. Davenport of the 21st district court, to put those violating the law in this respect on notice that they are violating the law and may expect to be prosecuted if they continue to do so.

SOME DISPENSERS of beer in Eastland county, the report states, seem to have secured federal licenses therefor, and there seems to exist some confusion concerning same. Nevertheless, the law is being violated and it must stop or those guilty must suffer the consequences, the grand jury said in its special report.

THE SPECIAL report, which is signed by S. E. Hinton, foreman, and R. E. Sikes, secretary, follows in full:

WE, your grand jury for the December term, A. D., 1933, after having been in session for five days, beg leave to make the following special report:

WE HAVE made a rather extensive investigation relative to the situation in Eastland county concerning the reported sale of beer. From the evidence before us there would seem to be no question but that beer is being sold in some places in violation of the law. Several of such dispensers of beer seem to have secured federal licenses therefor, and there seems to exist some confusion concerning same. However, it appears clear that the law as it now exists in Eastland county is being violated in this respect, and we are making this report in order to put all such parties on notice that they are violating the law, and may expect to be prosecuted for such violations. As long as the law exists, good citizens should scrupulously obey same, and the others should either obey the law or be punished for infractions thereof, and we hereby recommend to all peace officers in the county, both state and county officers, and city officers, that they be on the lookout for violations in this respect, take due notice thereof, and make proper reports of the evidence obtained in this connection to this grand jury when it next convenes, along with any other evidence of law violations which may come to their knowledge.

WE DESIRE to commend Grady Owen, the district attorney; Virge Foster, the sheriff, and his department, and the bailiffs of the grand jury and all peace officers in the county for their hearty co-operation and assistance in making this investigation, as well as in connection with all other law violations. They have worked with us in every respect, and already had the groundwork laid for our investigation when we convened, and quickly and efficiently produced before us the evidence and witnesses on which this report is based, along with the witnesses and evidence of other law violations. We appreciate their thorough co-operation, and hereby extend them our thanks and commendation.

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 9.—The new Ford V-8 for 1934 was on display Saturday in more than 7,000 Ford dealerships throughout the United States. Edsel B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company announced today.

As revealed here by Henry Ford and his son to several score newspaper correspondents, special writers and photographers, the new Ford has greater power, more speed, quicker acceleration, and smoother performance, more miles per gallon, especially at higher speeds, and quicker starting in cold weather, plus refined body lines and a new built-in system of clear-vision body ventilation.

The improvements in engine performance are the result of the use of a new dual down-draft carburetor and dual intake manifold which increase the engine's power approximately 12 per cent and provide a remarkable improvement in pickup.

"The new car is the best car the Ford Motor Company ever built," the Ford president said. "Basically it is the same car as the hundreds of thousands of other Ford V-8s now on the road.
