## Tractor Earl Bender Saturday Morning

Mr. Bender, was well known throughout this area as an abstractor and insurance man in Eastland, was born Jan. 13, 1889 at Gorman. He was the son of the late William Wesley Bender and Susan Jordan Bender. The family moved to DeLeon and back to Carbon in 1905. He graduated from Carbon Schools in 1909 and went to the University of Texas in the summer. That fall he taught school at Pleasant Hill and in 1910 went to Tyler Commercial College. He then taught at Hankins Normal at Gorman for three years.

He went to the University of Texas in the summer of 1912 and stayed there five years, graduating in June 1917. He entered the Army Sept. 21, 1917 and was in the 345th Field Artillery, spending two years over seas in England, France and Germany and returned home June 19, 1919. He was appointed County Clerk July 26, 1919, and served until Jan. 21, 1923. He was commander of the American Legion Post in Eastland from 1920 until 1921, and joined the Rotary Club in February, 1924. He served on the city commission for four years, from 1926 to 1930.

He is a lifelong member of the Methodist Church, having served on the Board of Stewards and was church treasurer for 23 years. Mr. Bender went into the abstract business in 1923 and into the insurance business in 1926. He married Willie Kathryn Arnold in 1922 and she survives him. Other survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Pat Miller of Eastland and Mrs. John T. Goode of Odessa; eight grandchildren; and one brother, I. C. Bender of Waco.

## LEADERS IN AGRICULTURE GIVEN AWARDS AT FFA ANNUAL EVENT

The Eastland FFA Chapter held its annual Parent - Son Banquet on Friday night, April 21, with Don Rux, State FFA vice president from Olin, as the main speaker for the event, attended by some 125 persons.

The highlight of the event was the awards presentation, honoring the outstanding individuals in the various categories of vocational agriculture and the Future Farmers of America. One of the awards, the Honorary Chapter Farm-er Degree, was presented to Mr. Ben McKinnis and Mr. Grover Hallmark.

This award recognizes the outstanding individuals in the community who have contributed most to the FFA and vocational agriculture during the current year. Mr. McKinnis, Agricultural Representative for Texas Electric Service Company, has been very instrumental in the Eastland County Livestock Show for many years, serving as Catalog Chairman and Beef Cattle Superintendent this past year. Mr. Hallmark, vice president of the Eastland National Bank served the Eastland County Livestock Raisers as secretary this year, was acting treasurer at the Eastland County Show, and was very instrumental in the sale of the county show projects.

International Postal Rates To Increase May 1

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, Acting Postmaster J. D. Collier has announced.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's. The rate increases for both surface and airmail — averaging 13 per cent — were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office, Mr. Collier said. This was the first general increase in international rates since July, 1961.

The increases are: Airmail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 13 cents a half ounce to 15 cents.

Air mail to the rest of the Western Hemisphere remains 15 cents a half ounce, except for Canada and Mexico.

Airmail to Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15 cents a half ounce to 20 cents.

Airmail letter rates to the rest of the world remain unchanged at 25 cents a half ounce.

Aerogrammes and air post cards increased 2 cents each from 11 cents to 13 cents.

Items sent by air, other than letters and parcels, such as small packages, books, periodicals and other printed matter increased 10 cents per piece to all countries except Canada.

Most letters going by surface transportation to all nations excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11 cents to 13 cents. Post cards raised from 7 cents to eight cents.

Most printed matter, including publication increased one cent a piece. For 2nd class publications to Canada only, the one cent increase will be deferred for six months to become effective November 1, 1967. Also, the present bundling rate which permits postage to be computed on the bulk weight of packages of publications addressed to Canadian post offices will remain in effect until November 1, 1968, at which time it will be discontinued.

Surface parcel post rates to all nations increased 20 cents a parcel, an average of 7 per cent.

"Postage rates for surface first class letters and air letters and surface 3rd class type printed matter to Canada and Mexico correspond to U. S. domestic rates, which are set by the Congress, and are not being changed at this time," Mr. Collier said.

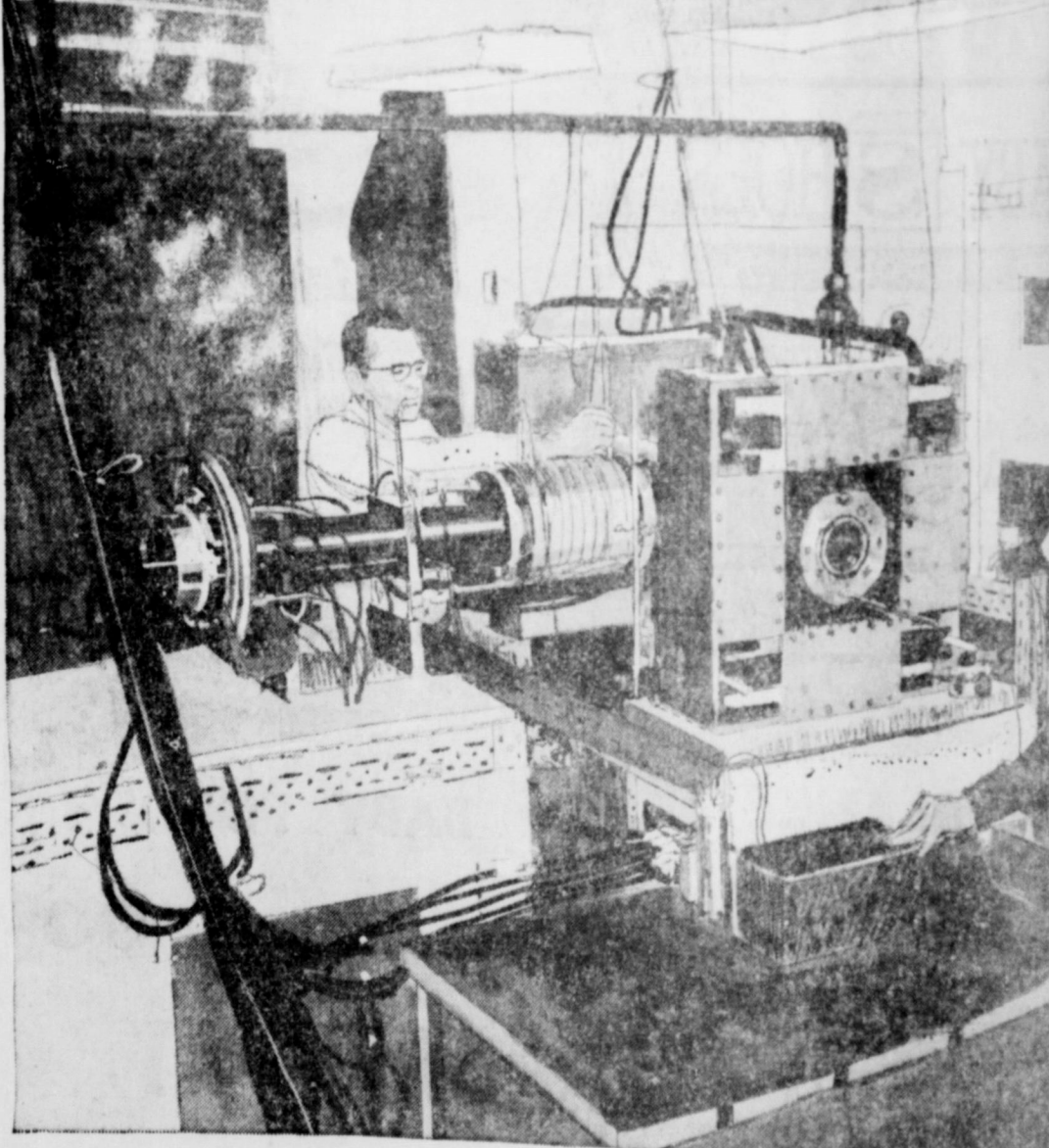

Probing the Mysteries of Atomic Fusion



Research, Education and Electric Power

Participation in long-range atomic fusion research is one of the ways Texas Electric Service Company is preparing for the future. We are looking to the time when new fuels will be necessary to generate a vastly greater supply of electric power than is required today.

For the past ten years, Texas Electric Service and nine other investor-owned electric utilities operating in Texas have cooperated in sponsoring this research now being conducted in laboratories at the University of Texas.

Although difficult basic problems in the fusion process and its application to the production of electric power are far from

solved, the research is progressing and at the same time contributing to the education and inspiration of young students — tomorrow's scientists.

This research program has provided the opportunity for more than 3,000 high school science students in the past seven years, and to meet and talk with some of the world's leading scientists.

More of the science meetings will be held, and more students exposed to the knowledge being acquired in research. We feel this is important not only to Texas Electric Service Company but to the future of the electric power industry and of the nation as well.

and rural life more desirable and satisfying as well as more profitable and stable for rural families. The program is sponsored by the electric utility companies operating in Texas and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Thirty-six communities in the district have entered the program. Those who are participating for the first, second, or third year are in division I. Communities that have participated for at least three years are in division II. Nimrod and Scranton are in division II. They have

turned in books describing their improvements during the year. Cash awards will be given by the electric utility companies to the top communities in each division. Scranton was selected as one of the four finalists in division II and was visited by the district judges last Wednesday. Naturally we hope both of these communities place in the top seven of the district. However their greatest award is the improvement made in the communities whether they win or lose in the contests.

Plans are being made for the annual spring pecan field day. This field day will be held on May 16 in Ranger. The morning session will be held in the Paramount Hotel and the afternoon session will be held in the Chester Marr's pecan orchard in the Chaney community. Guest speakers will be Tom Denman, Horticulturist at the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station in Stephenville and George Madden, Research Horticulturist at the U. S. Pecan Field Station in Brownwood.

Most home gardens in Eastland County are off to a good start. But insect control may be required some time during the growing season to keep them healthy and productive.

Not all insecticides are recommended for home garden insect control. Poor insect control may result from the use of the wrong insecticide and perhaps a bigger problem could come from insecticide residues on the treated vegetables.

The Food and Drug Administration has set certain restrictions on the use of insecticides applied to edible crops. Observance of these restrictions will protect the consumer from harmful residues.

Information on controlling insects in the home garden and a list of insecticides which are generally used and are generally available are included in L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden."

Gardens should be checked frequently for insect infestations, and if they are found, control measures should be applied before the situation gets out-of-hand.

A copy of L-642 is available from the County Extension Service Office.

**Deadlines Announced For Notaries Public Qualifying**

All qualified notaries public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the county clerk's office between May 1 and May 15, 1967, County Clerk Johnson Smith has announced.

Mr. Smith emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the county clerk approve notary bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

Each person applying for a commission as Notary Public must be at least 21 years of

age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas and resident of the county for which he is appointed. This form may be secured from the county clerk's office.

Any person not now a notary public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term should apply to the county clerk's office before May 20, 1967, Smith said.

The county clerk quoted from requirements in explaining the new process of having notaries appear in person, when he said: "...upon receiving notice from the Secretary of State of such appointments, the county clerk shall forthwith notify all persons so appointed to appear before him within fifteen (15) days from the date of such appointment and qualify as hereinafter provided."

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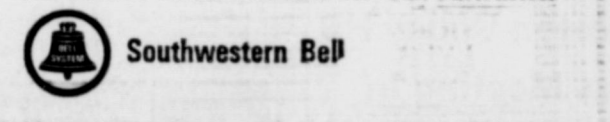
