





Most home gardens in Eastland County are off to a good start. But insect control may be required some time during the growing season to keep them healthy and productive.

Not all insecticides are recommended for home garden insect control. Poor insect control may result from the use of the wrong insecticide and perhaps a bigger problem could come from insecticide residues on the treated vegetables.

The Food and Drug Administration has set certain restrictions on the use of insecticides applied to edible crops. Observance of these restrictions will protect the consumer from harmful resi-

Information on controlling insects in the home garden and a list of insecticides which are widely used and are generally available are included in L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden.' Gardens should be checked

frequently for insect infestations, and if they are found, control measures should be applied before the situation gets out-of-hand.

A copy of L-642 is available from the County Extension Service Office.
