DR. STEVENS SAYS:

Qualities of Greatness Are Three in Number

Using as his examples Washington and Lincoln, Dr. John Stevens told the Teacher Appreciation Banquet audience Friday night, "It's often difficult to judge greatness."

Citing the two men's differences (one was poor, the other rich; one educated the other uneducated; one had limited military experience, the other was a war hero), Dr. Stevens, assistant president of Abilene Christian College, pointed out their similarities: honesty, dedicated to service and self-respect.

Mrs. Ruby Frazier Named Outstanding Teacher Here

INTRODUCTORY SPEECH By DONALD KINNAIRD

It was early when she reached the school. She was surprised to see the little boy hovering near the door. "It is locked," he offered disconsolately as she tried the knob. She began to fumble for her keys. . . Immediately the little face brightened. . . "You are a teacher; he announced with both surprise and pleasure. What makes you think that? She asked, amused and not a little pleased to think that her station in life should be regarded with such delight. The little boy hesitated a moment, but said very softly and with respect, YOU HAVE THE KEY. . .

It is the purpose of this assembly tonight to honor the people of Eastland who have the Key and to especially recognize one who has been singled out by her colleagues. Thrust into a strange world, a good teacher is the best thing that can possibly happen. A teacher is courage with Kleenex in its pocket, Sympathy struggling with a snow-suit, and Patience with papers to grade. Teachers spend twelve hours a day searching for truth, and the other twelve searching for error. They are indispensable, invincible, and nearly inexhaustible.

Teachers take a lot of live wires and see that they are well grounded; so as to avoid future short circuits and blow fuses. The good teacher possesses: The education of a college president. The grace of God and the persistence of the Devil. . .

promotes physical and mental well-being and is constantly alert to the needs for guidance and the discovery of special talents and interests in her children. She stimulates, encourages, and directs learning which is the soul substance of the art of teaching. This gracious lady began her career in 1926 at Common School District No. 23 at Boone Prairie in Robertson County. She remained there for four years and then moved to Flynn School district in Leon County where she taught for one year. This was the year 1931 which was a milestone in her life as she was married on May 28th in Lake Charles, La. She taught from 1931 until Dec. 19, 1941 at Rones Prairie School District in Gaines County.

She then left the teaching profession for a while to have her lovely family. She has two fine daughters who both are graduates of Eastland High School. Each of her children had many honors bestowed upon them while in Eastland School system. Her children are both married now, and she has two grandchildren. The recipient of our award tonight moved to Eastland 24 years ago; and she and her fine husband have honored our community with their presence until this date. 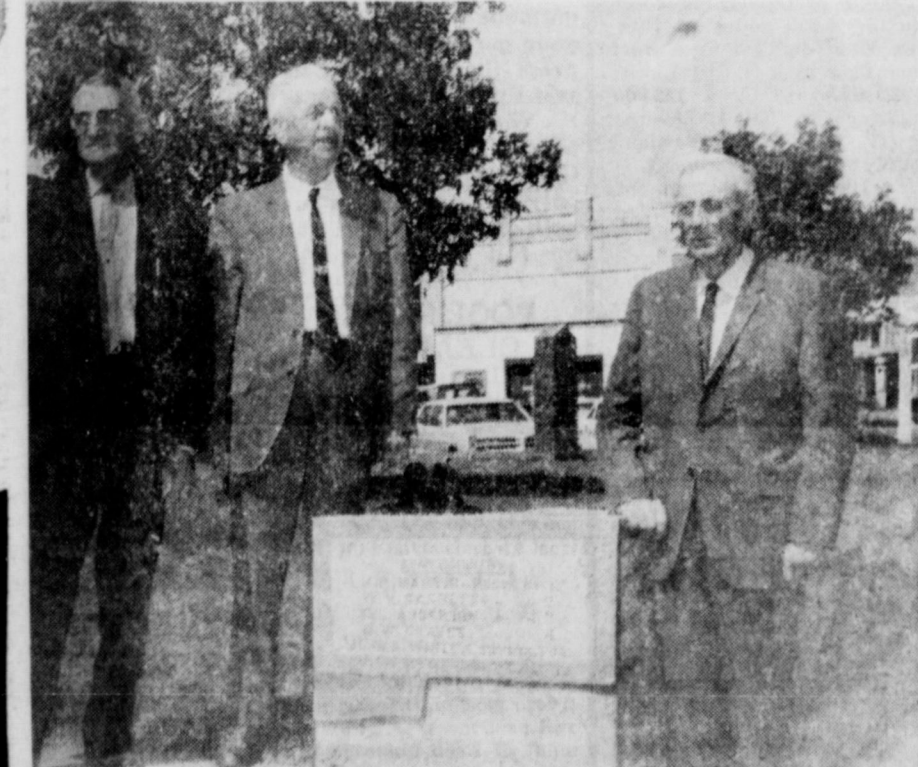

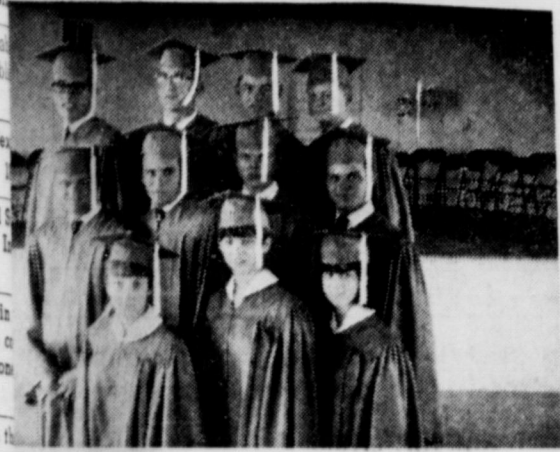

For Applicants**

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced that the deadline for applying for the new cadet-warden force is May 17.

The period from May 15 through May 17 was designated for processing young men seeking to qualify for the 50 positions created to beef up the summer water patrol.

Robert G. Mauermann, Deputy Executive Director for the Department, said the response has been such that it might be desirable for some of the cadet candidates to report either May 16 or 17 to avoid "a long line" on opening day.

The applicants will be interviewed and tested at the Department's five regional offices at La Porte, Rockport, Waco, Tyler and San Angelo.

Those tentatively accepted will be screened further by written examination plus the standard tests as to character, habits and previous employment.

Successful cadet candidates must agree to accept employment as a game warden trainee with beginning appointment effective September, immediately after the summer cadet program has been terminated.

This requirement, according to the Department, precludes applications by such as college students seeking summer jobs.

The cadets will be used on mobile teams assigned to Texas waterways that now are patrolled by the Department under the new water safety law.

They will be used primarily in a boat maintenance-operation capacity and serve on location under a regularly commissioned state game warden.

The pay will be \$397 per month from June 1 through August 31 and the cadets will be issued one-piece, "flight suit" duty-clothing.

They must be between 21 and 30 years of age, must have a high school education or the equivalent and be able to pass rigid physical examinations, particularly as to eyesight so vital in service of this nature.

Looking over his native Eastland after nearly 50 years has been Charles M. Martin, 79, of Silver City, New Mexico.

His father, the late H. K. Martin, was the first postmaster in Eastland.

Mr. McGough, whose family were county pioneers, best known today in connection with McGough Springs, site at which they settled, southeast of Eastland, and Mr. Martin are neighbors at Silver City. They are widowers and "Play a lot of golf," they say.

Leaving New Mexico together, the two traveled as far as Odessa, where Mr. McGough stopped to visit his daughter and Mr. Martin came on through to Dallas where he attended the 50th reunion of his military unit. In service almost nine years, he was discharged a Lt. Col.
