

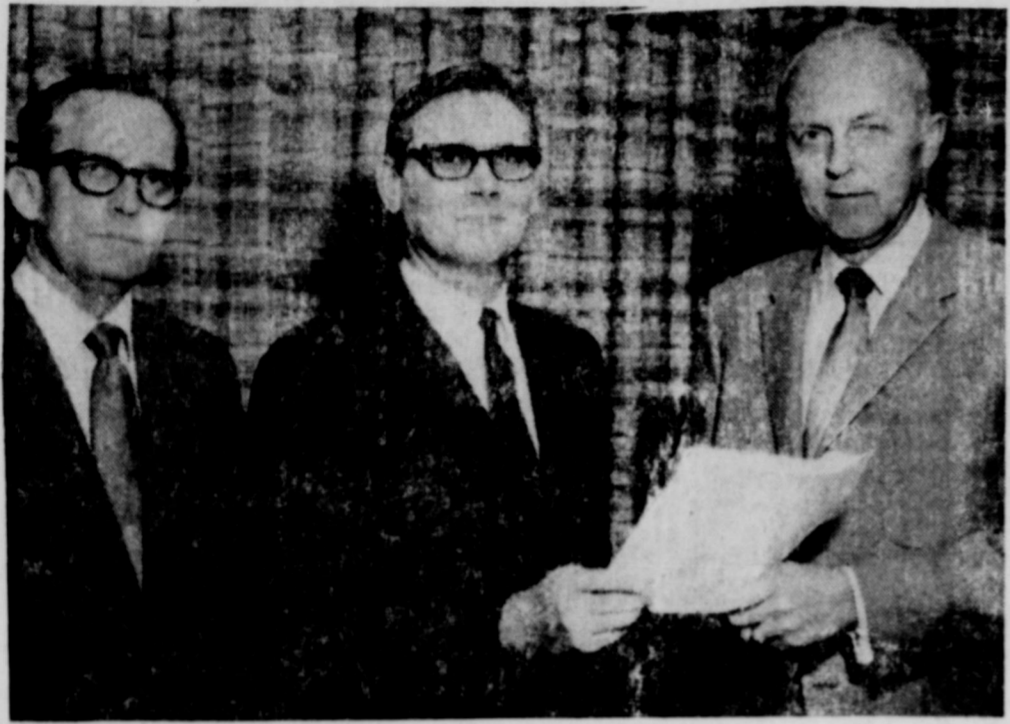

Another Important Industry Announced By Foundation

Texas Electric Service Co. Donates Leon Plant Site to

Eastland Industries, Inc. To Do Aluminum Die Casting

Texas Electric arrangements were being completed Friday by Texas Electric Service Company to deed to the Eastland Industrial Foundation the company's Leon Plant site and some of the facilities there to enable the foundation to conclude

negotiations for a new industry. Burl B. Hulsey Jr., president of Texas Electric Service, announced that the property including about 400 acres of land and the lake on the Leon River, would be given to the foundation in a "mutually beneficial" transaction.

The foundation is completing negotiations with Eastland Industries Inc., which will make use of the existing power plant building to manufacture cast products.

"We feel that this plant and operation will benefit the entire Eastland and Ranger area," Hulsey said. "It will provide substantial employment in the area and hopefully will attract related industries."

Hulsey pointed out that the Leon plant has not been used for generating electricity in recent years and machinery and equipment have been removed.

Eastland Industries Inc., Eastland County's newest industry, will be in full operation in three weeks and has major contract orders committed for Dec. 15, the new firm's president said Friday.

Establishment of the industry in this county was announced by the Eastland Industrial Foundation Friday afternoon at a coffee attended by some 40 business and professional leaders.

Foundation President H. T. Wilson announced that Texas Electric Service Co. is contributing the major portion of its Leon Plant facilities to the Foundation for industrial expansion, and that the newly forming corporation will begin immediately, moving in men and equipment.

Eastland Industries Inc. President Bob McNally announced that the firm, a die-casting operation, will initially employ 15 to 25 people, and expand from die-casting to machining and eventually, onto chrome plating. To be located in the now vacant power-plant building, the company will work two ten-hour shifts daily, and will begin accepting application for employment at the Chamber of Commerce office soon.

The gift from Texas Electric consists of the rail spur, some 400 acres of land, and Power Plant Lake the power plant building, the utility retaining some 25 acres and its transmission facilities.

Eastland Industries Inc. Vice President Fred Crane will be in charge of production, stated that three top people will be brought in to help set up the plant and begin the training program for the locally-hired men.

The materials manufactured by the firm will be distributed world-wide and are components utilized by electrical firms, a to industry and many others, excluding "aerospace" which both men said they will try to stay out of.

The products are not defense type items. "We want to be a part of Eastland," Mr. McNally said. "There'll be no absentee ownership here. We want to start small and grow as big as you want us."

Others introduced by Foundation President Wilson were Tesco Eastland Division Manager Frank Sayre and Chandler A. Robinson of Tesco's Area Development Dept. of Fort Worth, who were instrumental in bringing the industrial prospects to Eastland County.

As the company grows, the officials stated, employment will come from throughout the area.

First discussions with the Eastland foundation began about a month ago, Mr. Wilson said.

Both Mr. McNally and Mr. Crain complimented the courtesians on their assistance and especially pointed out the work of Larry Blalock, owner-manager of Aztec Mobile Homes, which the Foundation helped locate in Eastland, and who is now Eastland's second largest employer second only to the important Hollywood

Eastland Mavericks Whip Comanche TidBits For The Eighth Big Grid Victory

The Comanche Indians might have had ideas about upsetting Eastland two years in a row, but the Mighty Mavericks dispelled any of these ideas very quickly Friday night as they slaughtered the Indians 2-0 in Maverick Stadium.

The victory left the Mavericks undefeated for the entire season and in first place in District 8-AA with a 3-0 record. Together with Cisco's being upset by Hamilton, the victory practically assured Eastland of the district championship. The only way the Mavs can lose now is to be beaten by both Cisco and Clyde — which is very unlikely.

The Mavericks showed another one of their typical team efforts Friday night. They started out playing solid defense and their offense im-

proved in each quarter. Eastland's first score came midway in the first period as QB Craig Lund fired a 20-yd. touchdown pass to wingback Randy Rexroat. Attempt for extra point failed.

Early in the second period, the Mavs were driving again when they were stopped by a fumble on the Comanche 2-yd. line. However, note Indians' last play, Maverick tackle Phillip Harrison smashed into the quarterback, dropped the Comanche quarterback, Max Parker, for a safety. Eastland led 8-0 and Comanche kicked off from the 20.

Again in the second quarter, Lund fired another touchdown pass, this time to 3-4 end Bob Mace, with the play covering 32 yards. Ruben Gaeta ran for the two point conversion, and the Mavericks went 1-0

the dressing room with a 16-0 halftime advantage.

Early in the third quarter, the Mavericks increased their lead to 22-0 as Tailback Gaeta scored on a 14-yd. TD run. Attempt for extra points was stopped.

Still in the third period, Comanche punter and appeared to trap the Mavericks deep in their own territory as the ball was killed on the Eastland six. However, on first down Maverick Fullback Randy Lowrance broke loose for a fantastic 93 yard run, finally being hauled down from behind on the Comanche 1-yd. line. Lowrance got the touchdown on second down and James Edison kicked the extra point, making the score 28-0.

Defensive stand-out of the game for Eastland had to be Linebacker Alex Jimenez. He made three important interceptions stopping Comanche drives. In the fourth period, he returned his third interception 12 yards for a touchdown. Edison tacked on another extra point and Eastland led 36-0.

The Mavericks scored again in the final period as Randy Rexroat added his second TD of the night on a 24-yd. run. Gaeta added the xtr point, increasing the score to 44-0.

A few minutes later the Mavericks had a first down on the Comanche 33-yd. line. Tailback Bobby Williams picked up 7 yds. on first down and caught a 26 yd. touchdown pass from Lund on second

down. Ruben Gaeta plowed across for the final two points, and the Mavericks had crushed Comanche, 52-0!

Next week: Cisco's Lobos play in Maverick Stadium a 7:30 p. m. Friday.

Deposits at Eastland National Bank hit an all-time record high at the end of the third quarter, President H. T. Wilson has announced.

Deposits stood at \$9,687,696.91 as of Oct. 21 call date, with total assets of the Eastland bank recorded at \$9,818,107.10. Loans were down some at \$4,847,119.78.

Three months ago, on June 30, loans were at \$4,975,249.85; deposits at \$3,509,115.55; and assets at \$9,153,412.86.

Six months ago, on April 30, loans were reported at \$4,372,216.10; deposits, \$8,662,567.31; and assets at \$9,356,165.41.

A year ago, Oct. 30, 1969, loans were at \$4,159,830.00; deposits, \$7,898,164.82; and assets \$3,534,642.91.

Vassarrette plant. Mr. McNally, who called himself primarily a finance and administrative manager, said that his company has the three qualities, which he considers necessary for success: money, talent and desire.

"We're shooting for a million in sales in from 6 to 9 months," he said.

"We'll be making our own dies in about six months," Crain said.

Maintenance type people, and hopefully mechanics, will be hired first, Mr. Crain said, to help install the equipment, and to get gas and air lines in. The "second" shift, from about 3:30 to 11 or 12 midnight should appeal to farm-oriented men who might want a little extra income, he said.

Junior Loboes Drop 26-14 Game To Mavs' King

King, who has been playing with the Maverick varsity, scored on runs of 55 yards, 56 yards, 63 yards and 90 yards to put all of Eastland's scores on the board. He is big, fleetly runner whose name will doubtless be heard many times in this region in years to come.

In two other games on the tripeheader program, Cisco won the 7th grade contest, 22-to-6, and Eastland won the 8th grade game by a 6-to-0 score by virtue of a score in the final moments of the game.

(Cisco scored in the first and fourth quarters in the JV game, while Eastland scored twice in the second and once each in the third and fourth periods.

An ordinance of the City of Eastland, Texas, vacating that portion of South Green Street lying between west Plummer Street and West Olive Street, and making West Olive Street between South Green Street and So. Mulberry Street open only to west-bound traffic, and authorizing the quit-claiming of such vacated street to the abutting land-owners, and containing a severability clause.

Whereas, undue traffic congestion exists periodically on West Green Street from South Mulberry Street to its dead-end at South Green Street and on South Green Street between West Commerce Street and West Plummer Street, creating driving and parking problems and hazards to vehicular and pedestrian traffic on said streets necessitating a more adequate provision for traffic control and movement on said streets, and

Whereas, closing South Green Street as to that portion lying between West Olive Street and West Plummer Street will relieve the public from the charge of maintaining same and the owners of the lands abutting such portion of such street are willing for same to be closed, and

Whereas, it would be to the benefit of the public to provide for such one-way traffic on such portion of West Olive Street and to vacate such portion of South Green Street, NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1. That after the effective date of this ordinance all vehicular traffic on West Olive Street between South Green Street and South Mulberry Street shall proceed in a westerly direction only and it shall be unlawful for vehicular traffic thereafter to proceed in an easterly direction on such portion of West Olive Street.

Section 2. That that portion of South Green Street lying between West Plummer Street and West Olive Street, and that the Chairman of the Board of City Commissioners be authorized and endowed to execute a quit-claim on behalf of the City of Eastland, Texas, quit claiming such vacated street to the owners of the abutting land.

Section 3. That if any provision or part of this ordinance should be invalid, the remainder hereof shall nevertheless be valid, all parts hereof expressly being declared to be severable each from the other. Passed and approved this 20th day of October, 1969.
