Black: Indicates substantial sturdy disposition, people who disdain show and display, yet discreet and modest, and look to better things of life.

Blue: The more quiet, reserved, even-tempered, reliable, traditionally kind to strangers and loyal to friends. They are not out-in-front people, nor are they pulling up the rear.

Brown or Tan: Cordial, deep-thinking folks, neighborly and well-meaning.

Actually, color preference goes in cycles. There was a time when it was difficult to sell green-colored cars. This was after World War II when people were tired of anything.

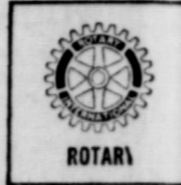

Judge and Mrs. McCloud, a public school teacher, and their two daughters, reside in Colorado City.

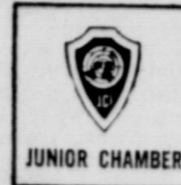

You Must Register to Vote!

THE YEAR 1970 is an extremely important year, politically speaking. There is an election for everyone this year. Almost every public office is involved... except the presidency. And every one of us has a stake in the outcome of these elections.

But elections mean more if we take part personally. To participate, we must first register to vote.

Registering to vote is relatively painless. First you obtain an application form, usually from the county tax collector's office. A person in your local TSTA association, perhaps the faculty representative in your building or the legislative chairman, may obtain a quantity of application forms and distribute them.

After filling in the form, mail it or take it to the place designated on the form. But do it before midnight, Jan. 31.

Remember, anyone can pick up a blank registration form for you. But the completed forms may not be returned in bulk. Only you or members of your immediate family may return the completed application.

In this county, the county tax collector has already sent out application forms to sub-stations in Cisco, Ranger, and Gorman.

But registering to vote is only the first step. A qualified voter should (a) know the candidates and issues; (b) express his own views to the candidates on the issues; (c) individually contribute financial aid to and/or work for candidates of his choice; and (b) most important—GO TO THE POLLS AND VOTE.

Without the last step, all other steps are in vain. Certainly the best educated group of citizens—teachers—should register to vote, and register their opinions at the ballot box.

Meantime, the most urgent step is to REGISTER TO VOTE. Remember the deadline: before midnight, January 31.

A graduate of TCU and the University of Texas School of Law, he began his legal career in Fort Worth in 1918. The following year, he was appointed Haskell city attorney, then was elected county attorney in 1922.

In 1927, he was appointed 39th District attorney at Haskell, serving until Jan. 1, 1931, when Gov. Dan Moody appointed him to the vacant bench of the 39th court.

In 1935, Gov. Jimmy Allred appointed him to the 11th Court and Gov. Coke Stevenson made him chief justice ten years later.

He and his wife, the former Helen Shook of Haskell, have three children and seven grandchildren. The children are Mrs. James R. Jennings of 866 Rivercrest in Abilene; Mrs. W. E. Sikes of Brownwood; and Tom Grissom of Fort Worth.

Just because he is retiring he doesn't plan to forget his way to the courthouse. "I'll still be available for appointment," he said.

As for his successor, he said "I wouldn't want to dictate a successor, but I consider Judge McCloud an excellent judge."



the new amount will arrive the first week in April on the usual day for the delivery of benefit checks. A separate check for the amount of the increase for the months of January and February should reach the beneficiary during

the last week in April. Mr. Register estimated that the total Social Security payments to retired or disabled workers and their dependants and for survivors in Texas for 1970 will amount to \$1,283,000,000.

Refiguring the benefit amounts for the 25,000,000 now on the rolls in the United States is a tremendous task and it must be done without disrupting the regular monthly payments.

As of the end of December, these monthly payments totaled 2.2 billion and the monthly total will go up by 345 million as the 15% increase becomes effective.

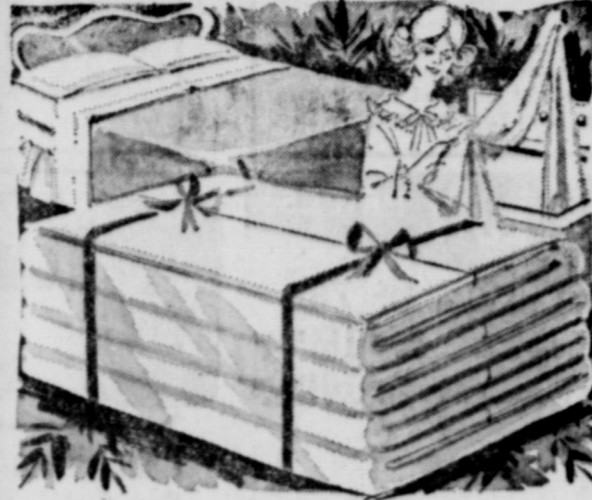
