Methodist Present 'New' Organ



COMPLETE REBUILDING of the magnificent pipe organ at First United Methodist Church has been completed and is in regular use, according to the pastor, the Rev. Len Layne. Originally purchased from the First Methodists Church in Corpus Christi in December of 1929, (at a price of \$25,000) the organ was brought to Eastland and put into service in time for the Easter Service in 1930. The renovation cost approximately \$9,000 and the instrument is presently valued at some \$45,000 today. The work took about seven weeks and included refinishing and reworking the complete system. A new modern Keyboard was added and thousands of other parts replaced. Musicians call it one of the finest instruments in the nation today. Organist for the church is Mrs. Olen Odum Jr. of Cisco, and choir director is Herman D. Asup.

The Whole Picture Points to Hanna

(An Editorial)

On pondering the State Representative's race in this district, one can't help but remember incidents which affect a decision in this contest.

Pitted for the office are incumbent Burge Musgrove and Former Businessman Joe Hanna, both of Breckenridge.

In one way or another, most of the incidents have been explained by Musgrove, but still, there's those remembrances that they did happen, and one wonders if they were all "just coincidences"

For instance, you recall:

- The "Ernie's Chicken Shack" affray, in which a high school youth was injured while in the company of the Incumbent.
- The Fund Solicitation Letter to Austin Lobbyists, signed by Burke.
- The Interscholastic League fiasco which called down the wrath of noted educators across the state, when Burke proposed drastic changes.
- The fumbling of the bill which would, had it passed, moved the 11th Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland. In an earlier episode of the same maneuver, a delegation of Eastland Countians had to go to Austin to help block the bill. Representatives are sent to take care of such things, not make arrangements for local delegations to do the job, we hold.
- The voting of an absentee legislator—"Solon Voted 11 Times by Fellows" the Houston Post said in an article dated March 23, 1969: "Other members of the House of Representatives cast votes for state Rep. Burke Musgrove on the voting machine Thursday while the young Breckenridge legislator was said to be out of town."

Then too, there's the law suits on notes and the Gorman Hospital District confusion.

These and others may all be incidents, explained, unexplainable, relevant or insignificant. Individually, either might be excusable, but taken as a whole, the picture brings puzzlement and prompts one to think of an alternate.

Voters have that alternate in Joe Hanna, a non-politician, married and the father of three children. A World War II fighter pilot, he served 13 years on the Breckenridge school board.

Soft-spoken, but direct, Hanna impresses one as a "do-er" who will work with and for his people.

And so it is, after examining the whole picture, that this newspaper joins in endorsing Joe Hanna for State Legislature.

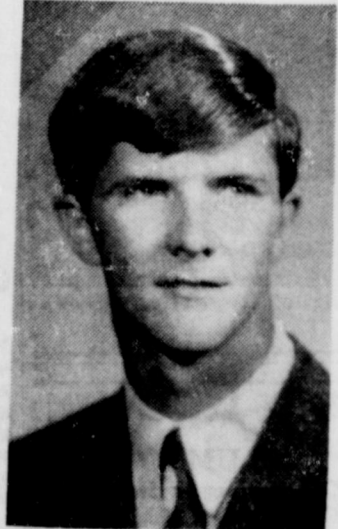

Presbyterian Church Here Marks Anniversary Today

Sunday at 5:00 p.m. the First Presbyterian Church in Eastland will hold a special service in the church sanctuary at the corner of Walnut and Valley in observance of the church's fiftieth anniversary. Actually, the church's history goes back to 1882 when a First Presbyterian Church in Eastland was organized. But

the active life of the church was not continuous, and the present First Presbyterian Church is the result of a re-organization begun in 1919 and completed in April, 1920, when a corporation charter was granted by the state of Texas. The building at Walnut and Valley was completed in 1921 and extensively remodeled

in 1954.

The church is a member of the Presbyterian of Brazos and the Synod of Texas of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.; and according to present plans, on January 1, 1971, it will become a member of the new Presbytery of Central Texas, a presbytery of both the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., and the Presbyterian Church in the United States (Southern). The pastor and people will be simultaneously members of both Presbyterian denominations; and the division brought on by the Civil War will at last be healed—at least in our area.

Among the several pastors serving the congregation through the years was the Rev. Eugene H. Surface who served from 1955 until his death in 1967. The Rev. Edward C. Hart, son of Mrs. Nina Hart, 1313 S. Seannan, entered the ministry from this congregation and now serves as a teacher in Beirut, Lebanon. The present or, the Rev. Robert W. Marsh, came to Eastland two years ago, after having previously served pastorates in Pea Ridge, Arkansas, and Fort Worth, and as a U.S. Army chaplain.

The following Ruling Elders, together with the pastor, comprise the Session—the local church's governing body: Cyrus Frost, Jr.; Jack Germany; Richard L. Johnson; E. C. Johnson; E. G. Rice; Virgil T. Seaberry, Jr.; and H. Tom Wilson.

The Service Sunday afternoon will be one of thanksgiving and rededication. The pastor will speak on "A Look Back and a Look Ahead." And the service will include numbers by the String Ensemble: Nancy Frost, violin; Nettie Wilson, Cello; Mildred Pickrel, violin; Winifred Hittson, viola; and Ben Karnes, organ.

Members, former members, and friends of the congregation are invited and encouraged to attend. A covered dish supper, with Mrs. E. G. Rice and Mrs. Richard L. Johnson in charge, will be held in the church dining room following the program.

In Time of Emergency Usual Fire Precautions Vital in Nuclear Attack

Fire, the great help and hazard to mankind, would prove so again during and after a nuclear attack.

While a nuclear attack might start many more fires, and make it less likely that regular firemen would be available to fight home fires, the same techniques of fire prevention and firefighting would be as useful during a nuclear emergency as at any other time.

Normal fire prevention rules would be of special importance in a nuclear emergency. They include familiar common sense precautions such as not allowing trash to accumulate, especially near heat sources; exercising extreme caution in the use of flammable fluids such as gasoline and naphtha, including storage of such fluids outside when possible; care in the use of electricity; repairing of faulty wiring and avoiding of overloaded circuits, and repair of faulty heating systems.

Special Fire Precautions
These special fire precautions should also be taken in a time of nuclear emergency, especially by those using a home shelter:

1. Keep the intense heat rays of nuclear explosions from entering your house by closing doors, windows, and venetian blinds. If windows are not fitted with venetian blinds, cover the inside or outside of the windows with aluminum foil, or coat the glass with whitewash, household cleaning powder, or even mud.

2. Unless local authorities advise otherwise, fill buckets, bathtubs and other containers with water for use in emergency fire fighting.

3. If you have taken refuge in a home fallout shelter, stay there unless you hear an explosion that breaks windows. If you do, check to make sure nothing in your home is burning, and there are no other fires near your home that might endanger you.

If a fire does occur, fight it promptly. A home might be saved by knowing how to fight fires, and by having on hand some basic firefighting tools. These should include a garden hose (preferably already connected), a ladder with sand, or water with water, and a fire extinguisher. Keep vaporizing-liquid extinguishers as general enclosed.

Three Ways to Put out a Fire:
1. Take away the fuel.
2. Take away the oxygen (smother).
3. Cool it with water, sand, or extinguisher.

Ordinary fire fighting methods:
• Getting the fire out of the house.
• Putting out the fire with water, sand, or extinguisher.
• Smothering a fire with a rug or blanket.

Special types of fire fighting:

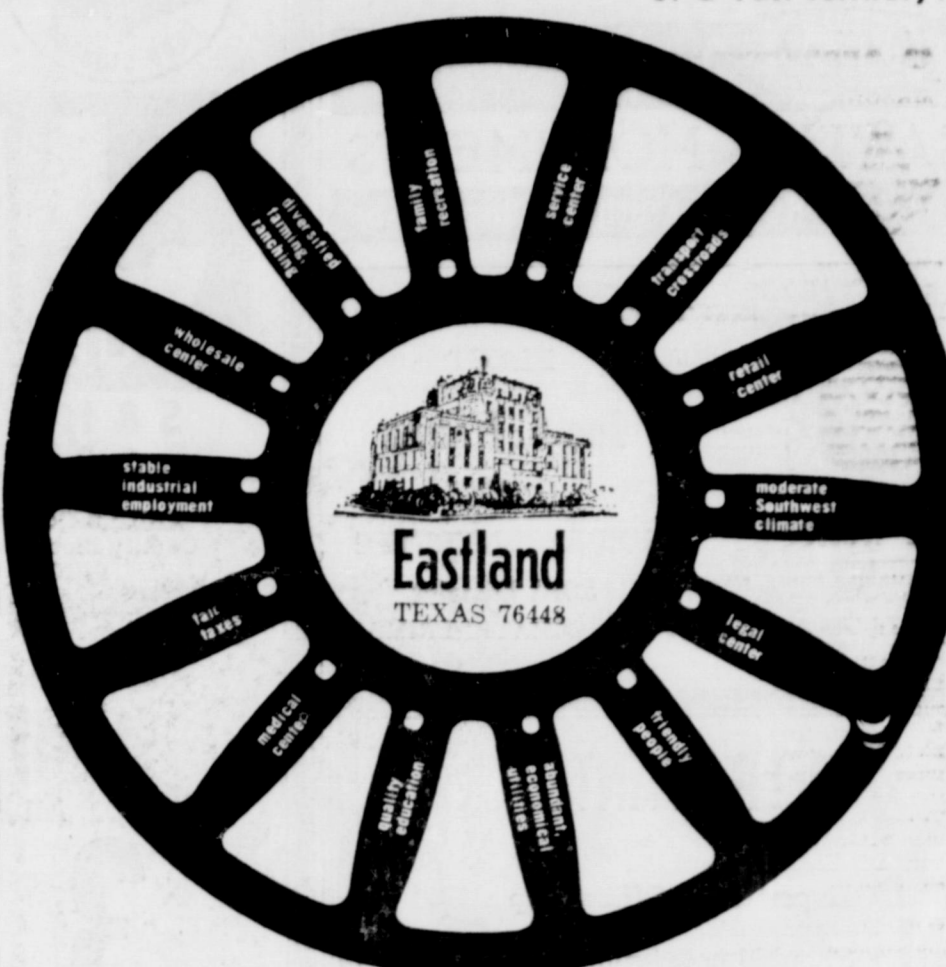

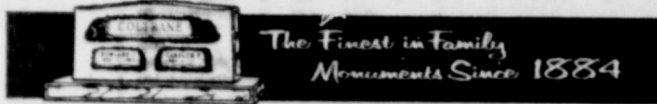

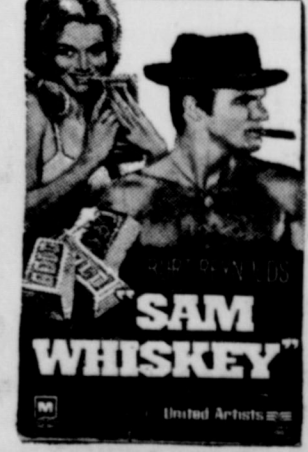

To the Residents of Lake Leon Election day will soon be here. I just wonder how many of you feel like I do-- I do not see any reason why we should drive twelve (12) to eighteen (18) miles to vote, in the county and state election when we drive six (6) to ten (10) miles to vote in a trustee election.

I doubt if any of you pay any tax in the Gorman school district.

We pay our school tax in the Olden school district, therefore we vote for school trustees in Olden, and we can not be denied that right. I don't know when this deal that we vote in Gorman was set up. I believe you will find in the election code that it had to be done by our commissioners court and I don't recall our present commissioners court doing this.

If the Commissioners Court did set this up, then they can at a regular or special meeting, correct it. I also think you will find in the election code that any order of Commissioners Court that creates an election precinct that contains two or more justice precincts or parts thereof, is

void. I think you will also find in the election code a division of a county into election districts when not for the convenience of the voters but to the county commissioners; continued control of county politics will not be upheld. The election code also states no election precinct shall be formed out of two or more justice precincts or commissioners precincts, and this applies to congressional, senatorial and state representatives districts.

Most of the Lake Leon residents can drive six (6) to ten (10) miles and vote either in Eastland, Olden or Ranger.

And it does not cost the State of Texas or Eastland County one dime more for them to do it.

I think that we should insist that our commissioners court call a special meeting before election day, and correct this matter.

I have been told by some that they would not drive to Gorman to vote that they would forfeit their constitutional rights, for something that should not exist.

Now I am not throwing anything at anyone. But I do

think our respect for all of us around Lake Leon. This matter should be corrected before election day.

There's one thing for sure: The Eastland County Bar Association is certainly due a lot of appreciation for its part in saving the County Courtroom.

1. The Eastland County Court must have adequate facilities for cases now determined by such Court of the prime functions of a courthouse. Such facilities include space and furniture for the judge, the jury court reporter, bailiff, attorneys and litigants, and in general.
2. The present courtroom is expressly (and beautiful) and an adequate courtroom and requires no further by the County for such purpose.
3. The present courtroom also serves the district court for keeping persons called for jury duty when the main in the district courtroom and is most convenient for such purpose.
4. It would be most impractical to attempt to use room of the 91st District Court for both the district courts.
5. The probability exists that when the district court and land County will also serve one or more other jurisdictions of the county court will be enlarged county courtroom facilities will be more needed than

The peanut market was somewhat different in Rising Star in the year 1919 from the market today, although it was a very important and outstanding new industry for this area.

S. H. Nance, then one of the biggest buyers of peanuts in this section, said that peanuts were being hauled to Rising Star from as far away as 25 miles.

"Our buyers are paying prices that are attracting much attention," Mr. Nance said. He made the statement that 25 or 30 freight care loads of peanuts would be shipped out of Rising Star before the season was over.

Other local buyers were Nance Cash Grocery, Higginbotham's, F. C. Gray and T. L. Pelfrey.

The Eastland County Farm Bureau was organized June 25, 1921. Headlines in the Rising Star X-Ray read: "Eastland County Farm Bureau links our county with other counties of state in the Farm Bureau organization."

Eastland County farmers who had previously signed up in the Farm Bureau met in Rising Star for the purpose of perfecting the county organization. The meeting was opened by J. H. Allen who gave an address on Farm Bureau plans and purposes. D. M. Jacobs and A. G. Norton

followed with interesting and informative talks.

About 25 members signed up at the meeting following the perfecting of the organization.

Officers for the organization were W. P. (Pete) Roach, president; J. W. Pulley, vice-president; Thomas Evans, secretary; and W. H. Hughes and E. L. Swope members of the executive committee.

Blake had a big day in May, 1921. It was "Blake Get Together Day."

On school closing day and Farm Bureau Day. The school rendered a good program to a large crowd.

H. I. Stapp was professor of the school, and Miss Beulah Harpole of Cross Plains and Miss Hazel Wigginton of May were teachers. The school term was said to be one of the best in the school's history.

tory. There were 180 pupils enrolled and promotions were 100 percent.

Trustees of the school were Ed Smith, Blake Jones, and Ed Kilgore.

The Farm Bureau speaker was the Hon. W. R. (Bill) Chambers. Other speakers were Jim Allen, Lawrence Moore and George T. Barnes.

The MrMann Gasoline Plant at Pioneer was totally destroyed by fire about 6:30 p. m. June 17, 1924.

The fire originated from a blown out gasket in a hot oil line. Gas escaped into the engine room and was ignited by a spark from one of the generators. The night engineer with his assistants were in the engine room at the time and were severely, but not seriously burned when the explosion occurred.

A number of explosions followed and the entire plant was in flames. The men managed to run through flames out of the engine room and spread the alarm.

Employees and citizens of Pioneer did what they could with the chemical outfit at the plant. The Rising Star Fire Department was called but by the time they arrived the fire was almost out.

The fire made a brilliant light and could be seen for many miles. Numbers of people drove out from Rising Star to see the fire.

Brownwood North and So. Railroad to May, Texas, was discontinued in 1924.

The road was not on a paying basis. Officials stated that during the past three years the company had lost \$101,000 on up-keep and operation of the road.

Since jitney service had become effective between May and Brownwood as a business enterprise, railroad operation was almost a total loss.

During some weeks of the year the total business of the railroad ran \$15 to \$20 on freight and \$5 on passenger. So the death of another railroad came about.

An employee of Barron Trucking Co., Mr. Robinson was pronounced dead at the scene after he was involved in a one-truck accident 27 miles west of Weatherford near the Santo junction around 12:10 a. m. Thursday.

Born Jan. 16, 1918 in Thurber, he married the former Johnnie B. Davis. He had been

a resident of Ranger since childhood and was a veteran of WW II.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Bannie A. of Dallas and Sp5 Dannie W. with the U. S. Army in Germany; four brothers, Frank of Ranger, D. C. of Smithville, James A. of McCamey and George of Hurst; four sisters, Mmes. John Clark of Longview, M. E. Hyche of Crane, J. T. Harris of Breckenridge and Edwin Varner of Wibby, Wash.; three granddaughters.
