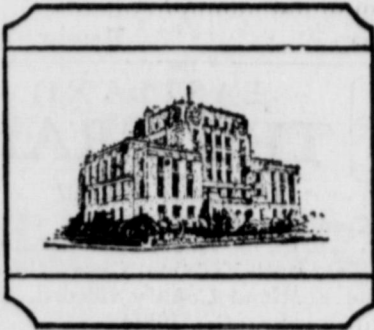

They recognized that the rung of the ladder of success was never meant to rest upon, but only to hold man's foot long enough to enable him to put the other foot somewhat higher.

They realized that success is for those energetic enough to work for it, hopeful enough to look for it, patient enough to wait for it, brave enough to seize it and strong enough to hold it.

The next to join the group of Golden Deeders came to Eastland in February, 1964. Upon arriving he unpacked, and put his shoulder to the wheel of progress in our community.

He is quick to realize that very much of what we call progress today consists in getting rid of false ideas, false conceptions of things, and in taking a point of view that enables us to see the principles, ideas, and things, in the right relation to each other. He realizes that you can't do today's job with yesterday's tools and be in business tomorrow.

In his work he is ever conscious of the fact that the world is moving so fast, that the man who says it can't be done, is interrupted by someone doing it.

This young man is a Deacon in the First Christian Church and has served on the church board many times. He has the distinct honor of being the District President of the Christian Men's Fellowship for this area, which includes Abilene and Brownwood to mention a few of the cities in the district.

He is a member of the Rotary Club, Director of the Chamber of Commerce, and President of the Chamber of Commerce, as well holding numerous other positions of leadership in our community.

This dynamic young man is unselfish with his time and serves our city on the city commission. The awards which have been given to our local radio station as a direct result of his efforts are many. In 1966 the Cisco Jaycees, granted KERC recognition for outstanding services rendered to this area. The National Federation of Music Clubs have for the past three years awarded our radio station an award for their participation in National Music Week.

Good Number Attends Banquet in Spite of Rain

'Something to Live For Is Needed' Speaker Says

In the finest manner of declaration, Dr. Guy Newman told the Eastland Chamber of Commerce audience the danger this country now faces, and closed with a bright hope for the future.

Few speakers could incorporate the Preamble to the Constitution and the entire Gettysburg Address in their talk without appearing stilted. Dr. Newman used both flawlessly and kept listeners hanging on his every word.

Opening with his famous "canabil" story (how one denomination is tough, another good wine-soaked, and how difficult it is to clean Baptists), Dr. Newman saluted our town, calling it not large, not small, just a good size for progress. He also saluted the honor students, stating that he had "dropped out," and started back to school at 30 with an eighth grade education.

Complimenting again, he said that for the coming exciting age, "I know of no community doing more than Eastland to prepare for the Golden Future."

Recalling the horrors of 1941's attack on Pearl Harbor, Dr. Newman cited the changes since that date: "The world is in reverse," he said, "Japan was our enemy then. Today she's our ally and China is our enemy" our gross national product was \$350 billion then, today it's \$800 billion — Russia was our ally then and Germany our enemy; today the roles are once again reversed. France, whom we saved in two wars, couldn't be cooler to us. And Britain is broke."

"Our nation's problems? Affluence doesn't necessarily bring influence," he said, adding his own opinion of the administration's continued deficit spending budget.

Dr. Newman said of Eastland: "There aren't 300 municipalities in America which are in as good fiscal condition as is Eastland."

The No. Two problem in this country: The decline in moral values.

"We have everything to live with — what do we have to

live for" is the question the speaker posed as his key point. "We haven't kept our moral values in line without technological advances."

Telling of an interview with Gen. MacArthur in 1962, he said the general pointed out "We don't understand mentality of our enemy." If America is to endure—we must have a rekindling of our spiritual, moral and ethical life.

Hope for our country: "God has always provided leadership when it was needed."

Dr. Newman closed with Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

Area Lakes High, Fields Soaked As County Gets Six Inches Rain

More than six inches of rain fell over Eastland County during four days, Jan. 17-20, leaving lakes full, farm and ranch land soaked and county roads in bad but passable condition. And the forecast called for probable showers to continue over the weekend.

The most rain was reported in Cisco where the four-day total was 6.4 inches. Morton Valley reported an even six inches, and several communities south and west recorded up to six inches.

Eastland received a total of 5.6 inches, according to D. G. Fambrough's rain gauge on North College Street.

In Ranger, the rainfall total Saturday morning was 4.2 inches.

Lake Leon was running about two feet above spillway level, according to reports. Lake Eastland was full. Virtually all county stock tanks were full and running over.

Lake Cisco was expecting a modern record water level as some five feet of new water

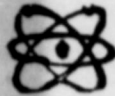
had poured into the lake, and all creeks were till running into the lake. The smaller Lake Bernie above Lake Cisco was full and spilling into a creek connecting the two.

The Leon River, which heads in the Scranton Community southwest of Cisco and crosses the Rising Star Highway four miles south of Cisco, was out of its banks, which meant more water for Lake Leon.

County roads were open in all areas, but damage was

evident in many places. One commissioner reported that several weeks would be needed to restore his road beds and make bridge repairs.

One of our Golden Deeders tonight came to Eastland in September of 1961. He recognizes that it is good work well done that holds the fabric of civilization together and gives a sense of significance to the individual life.

He is a graduate of Cisco Junior College and Hardin-Simmons University. While he served in the armed forces he was stationed at the White House and was in the White House Signal Corp.

At one time he was the Military Editor for the Abilene Reporter-News. He came to Eastland from Abilene and has been editor of our local paper for six one-half years. He has molded public opinion here in Eastland through his editorials time after time. Public opinion and public sentiment are very important.

With public sentiment nothing can fail without it, nothing can succeed. Consequently, he who molds public opinion goes deeper than he who enacts statutes or pronounces decisions.
He makes statutes or decisions possible or impossible to execute.
Our Editor was nominated for the outstanding young man award in 1966. He is a member of the First Baptist Church there he has been very active. He is a past president of the Lion's Club, Director of the Chamber of Commerce, and member of numerous civic organizations.
He received the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation Award from Mr. Homer Garrison, Director of the Department of Public Safety. This award was presented to him for a series of articles in which he pointed out the public's responsibility for Law Enforcement.

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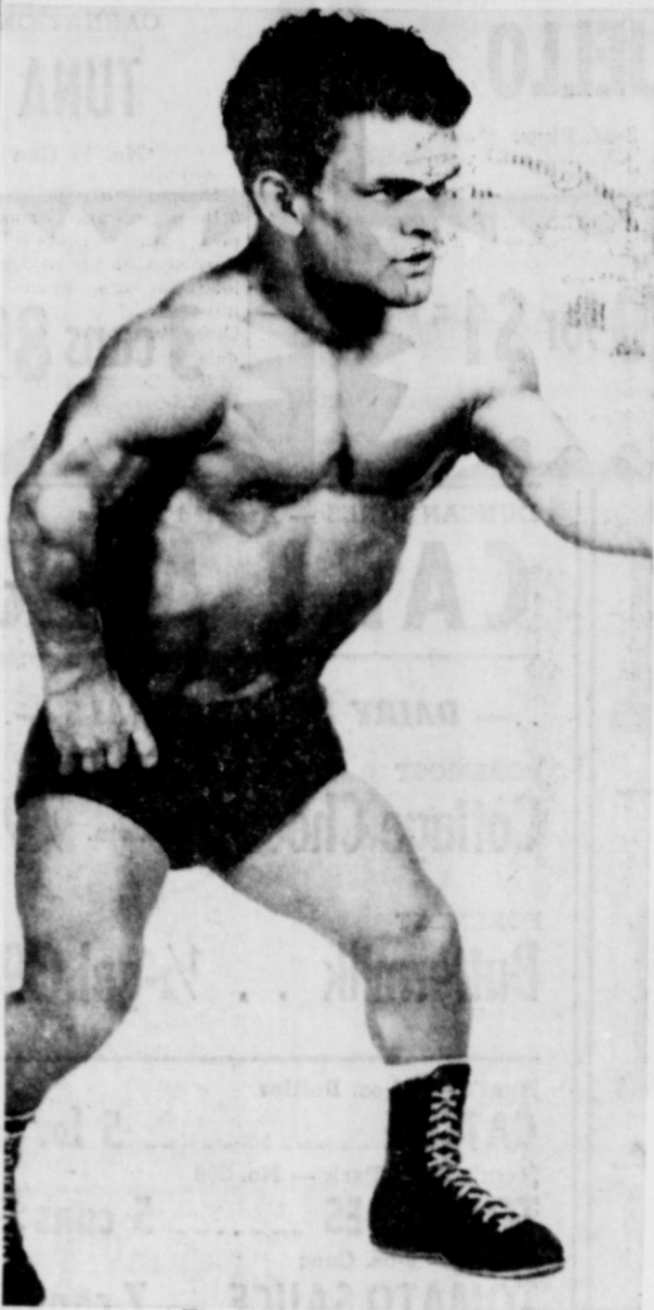
WRESTLING MATCHES WILL BE HELD IN RANGER JANUARY 25

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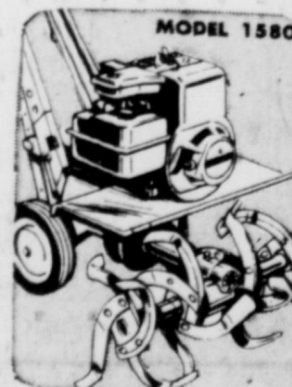
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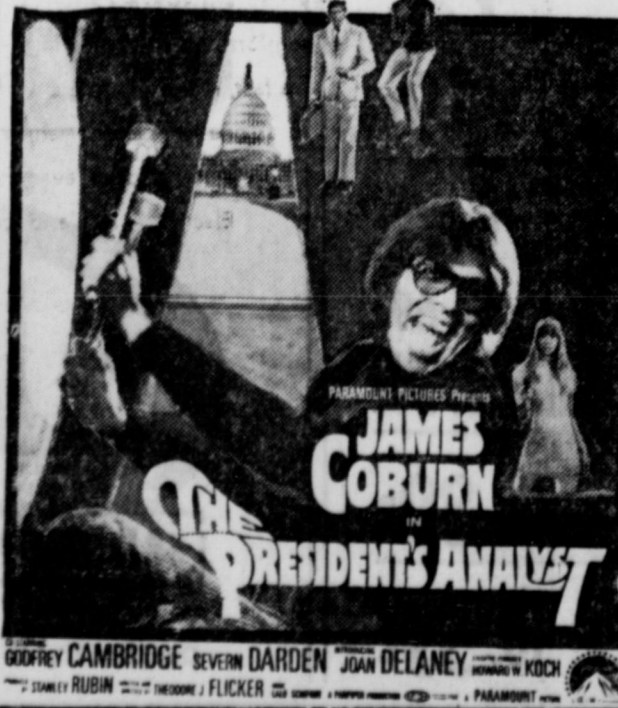
