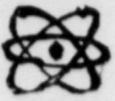

She was born January 18, 1894 in Oklahoma. A former resident of Indiana, she had lived in Eastland before moving to Corpus Christi 22 years ago. She was a retired secretary and was a member of the Second Avenue Baptist Church in Corpus Christi.

Her husband, Joe B. Blankenship, died in 1959.

Mrs. Samuel Butler, 78, longtime Eastland civic leader, died at 9:25 p. m. Monday in Eastland Memorial Hospital following an illness of one year. She had been a patient in the hospital for two months.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Wednesday at Arrington Hamner Funeral Chapel, with the Rev. R. G. Flagg, pastor of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, officiating. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery.

Born Bula Biles on Sept. 19, 1889 in Roanoke, Denton County, Texas, she married Dr. H. D. Whittington of Eastland Jan. 1, 1912. After his death, she married C. U. Connelley, founder of Eastland, who died in 1936. She married Samuel Butler in Austin in 1939. He preceded her in death in 1947.

She had lived at 603 South Connelley since 1912. She was a member of the Protestant Church, Eastland County Historical Society, Civic League and Garden Club, and the Board of Directors of Eastland Memorial Hospital.

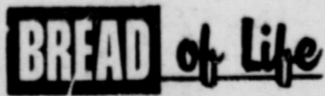

Over 6,000 Expected To Vote In County Primary Election Saturday

9 Boxes Will Be Used In County

Polls will open at nine locations at 8 a. m. Saturday, May 4, for the 1968 Primaries in Eastland County. Democrats will be voting at eight boxes and Republicans will cast their ballots at one

Eastland—Jeannette Harris, election judge; courthouse. Olden—C. J. Langitz, judge, community center. Ranger—Calvin Brown, City Hall. De demona—L. E. Clark, community center.

Gorman—Odie Brightwell, City Hall. Carbon—A. E. Guy, insurance office. Rising Star—G. A. Dunn Jr. City Hall. Cisco—J. V. Heyser, City Hall.

The lone Republican polling place will be at the City Hall in Eastland with Mrs. Gordon Wadley as presiding judge, assisted by Mrs. Don Russell. Mrs. H. J. Bulgerin is county Republican Chairman.

There are 8,416 registered voters in Eastland County and best educated guessers are that upwards of 6,500 may turn out for the Saturday election. (This is the first time Eastland has had a complete list of registered voters, since over-all voters were not registered prior to this year. In 1966 there were only 3,126 registered voters.)

Voters have an interesting ballot to confront Saturday, particularly with the three "straw vote" propositions: liquor-by-the-drink, pari-mutual betting and the creation of a dairy commission.

The Democratic voters have a choice between ten candidates for governor and a long list of other races.

Only contest for the Republicans will be that for governor for which three candidates are listed. One of the most spirited races, based on campaign activity, appears to be the State Representative Post. Incumbent Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge, completing his first two-year term, is opposed by Byron Richardson of Callahan County and Bob Mann of Palo Pinto County.

Two county commission posts are up for re-election and contests present in each Commission Precinct One (Eastland, Ranger) pits Incumbent Danny Woods, completing his first four-year term and Johnnie W. Morren of Eastland. Incumbent Rising Star commissioner Buck Collins is challenged by Delbert Tarver.

21 Miles of FM Roads Due Seal Coating in This County

Some 21.2 miles of Farm-to-Market road in Eastland County will be given routine maintenance this summer as the result of a contract let recently to a Fort Worth firm for seal coat and hot mix cold laid asphaltic concrete pavement in this adjoining county. Resident Engineer R. P. Haun has announced. The work in this county will

consist of liquid asphalt and gravelling on three separate stretches. This type of work is a routine project, Mr. Haun said.

Projects include 9.7 miles of FM 571 from FM Road 8 to the Chaney Community in the Southeast part of the county; 1.5 miles of FM 583 (Williams Road) from the Brown County line to SH 36 in the extreme south part of the county; and 10 miles of FM 2214 from FM Road 570 to FM Road 571, south of Lake Leon.

The McElroy Transport Co. of Fort Worth was low bidder at \$351,527 for the 171.4 miles of work. The project is estimated to take some 60 working days, but a starting date is not given.

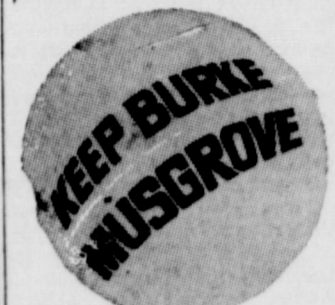
