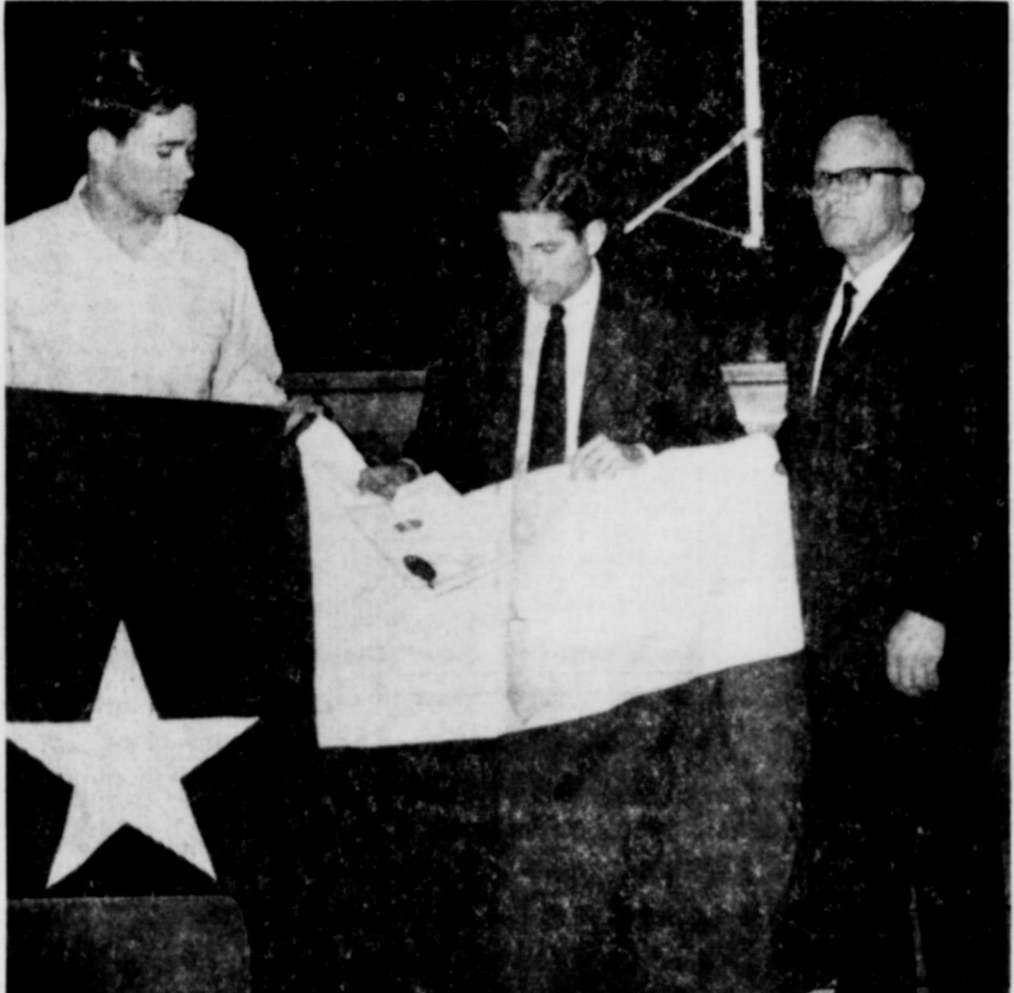

The term projects, results of more than five months work, vary in subject matter according to interests of the pupils. Covers are designed to accent the contents.

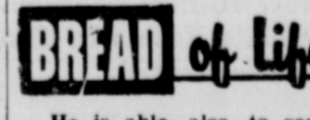

C-C Answering Service Gains New Subscribers

A total of six firms have signed up as subscribers for the Chamber of Commerce's new telephone answering service, according to President J. T. Gregory.

ELIGIBILITY HEARING IS FRIDAY AT 11 A.M. 91ST DISTRICT COURT

A hearing on a petition to prevent the name of Truman P. Kirk from appearing on the Democratic first primary election ballot next May has been re-set for 11 a. m. Friday in 91st District Court with Judge E. H. Griffin of 90th District Court at Graham presiding.

The case was originally set for Thursday but was changed due to the illness of Judge Frank Sparks of the 91st court. Mr. Kirk reported that he has retained Bryan Bradberry of Abilene as his attorney in the case.

"I want to express my sincere thanks to all who have called, come by and written to me reaffirming their support since they read of my opponent filing a law suit seeking to disqualify me," Mr. Kirk said. "And I want to tell all my friends in Eastland County that I feel confident that when the court has an opportunity to consider all the facts that my legal residence and my candidacy for district judge will be upheld by the law."

The eligibility of Mr. Kirk was questioned by the filing Friday of a petition asking a temporary injunction to keep his name off the ballot. The petition was filed for Candidate Earl Conner Jr., by Eastland Attorney Virgil Seaberry.

Details of the petition, which named County Democratic Chairman A. E. Crawley of Ranger, all of the various election judges and Kirk, are outlined in part as follows: "Defendant Truman P. Kirk is not qualified and eligible under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas to be elected District Judge of the 91st District Court of Eastland County, Texas, in 1968. Section 707 Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas provides that the lawyer to be elected judge of a district court shall have resided in that district for two years preceding his election, and Article 1884, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, provides that a lawyer to be elected as district judge shall have been a resident of such district for two years next before his election. The 91st Judicial District consists only of Eastland County, Texas, and defendant Truman P. Kirk is not qualified and eligible to be elected judge of the 91st District Court of Eastland County, Texas, because he will not have been a resident of Eastland County, Texas, for the period of time required by such provisions of the Constitutions and Laws of the State of Texas. 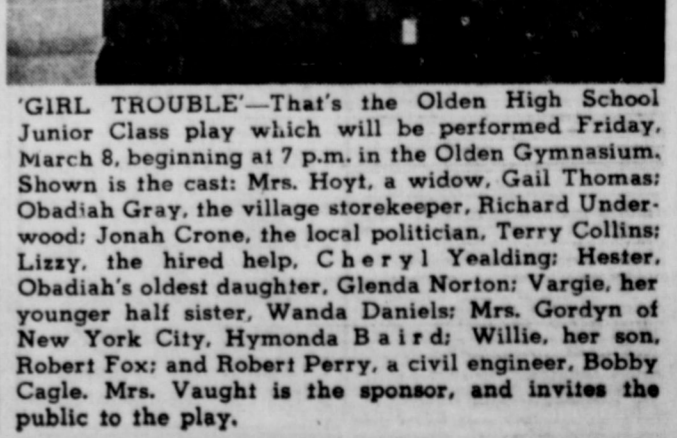

THE GORDON SPOT

As I travel over the county I see more and more damage caused by the ice storms this winter. The ice broke and entered shade trees as well as fruit and nut trees. Earl Walker's pecan orchard at Chasco was one that was heavily damaged. At least one-half of the limbs on many of the trees were broken. Evergreen trees also received heavy damage. An extremely heavy coating of ice on the dense foliage broke any of the larger branches. Prompt attention and proper treatment of the damaged trees will help prevent permanent disfigurement and

possible premature death of the trees. It is best to hire a trained person to do the job if the ice damaged tree is large or the breakage has occurred high in the branches. However, many people will be doing their own work.

While the tree wounds are still fresh, much of the repair work can be done with a sharp pruning saw and an asphalt tree wound paint. An excellent temporary tree wound dressing is orange shellac. This is sometimes hard to find, but is usually available at nurseries and garden centers.

There are three simple guidelines to follow when removing the broken branches. The damaged branches should be removed flush with the branch. Stubs will only lead to a proliferation or sucker growth later on.

To prevent tearing the bark and causing additional damage to the tree in removing heavy limbs, make the first cut with the saw from the bottom side of the limb about 12 inches from the main branch. When the saw starts to bind make the second cut from above about eight inches from the main branch. After the branch splits off remove the remaining stub with a saw flush with and parallel to the main branch. Lastly, apply the tree wound dressing to the exposed surface to prevent the entrance of disease and insects.

The extension publication "Modern Pruning Methods" is available in our office and will be helpful when you do your pruning.

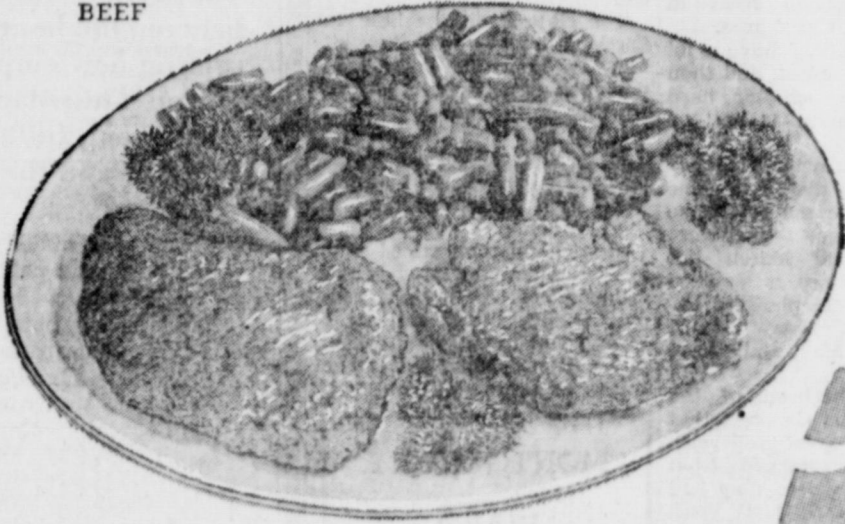

Crop Outlook Is Bright If Weather Stays Right

Ever-weather watchful as is the custom of farmers in this area, everywhere, those in this area are particularly anxious because of what appears to be the makings of an ideal season ahead.

With a bounty of winter moisture already, the prospects for a bumper year are bright, according to County Agent De Gordon.

"The small grains are in, and with all the seasoning, it should be a good year," he said. Commenting on the moisture, he said, the prospects are excellent, but hurried to add that a lot can happen in the months ahead.

Evaluating the fruit crop prospects, Mr. Gordon said that overall, he doesn't believe the total crop has been hurt yet, although those trees which were in full bloom during the last freeze, probably

were damaged. He said he had had reports of many peach and plum trees in bloom in the Cisco area.

"Of course if we have a lot of warm days ahead, and then get hit with another hard freeze, it's going to be too bad," he said.

Peanut planting will probably be later this year, he guesses because the soil is so cold. Last year some were planted by late March but the agent guesses it will be April 15 before planting begins this year. Many wait of course until May and June he said.

Robbie Roberts on of the Gorman Peanut Co. said that he looks for a good crop year. He had just returned from the Southeast where they had a bumper crop last year "like ours two years ago."

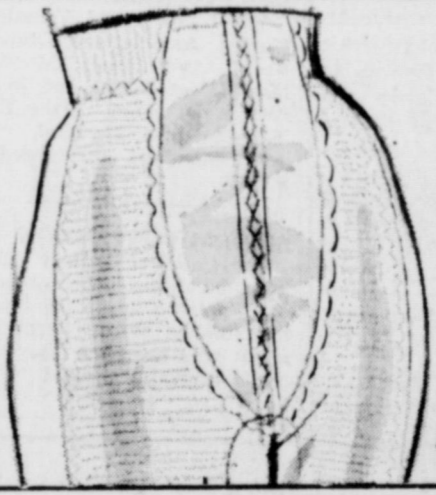

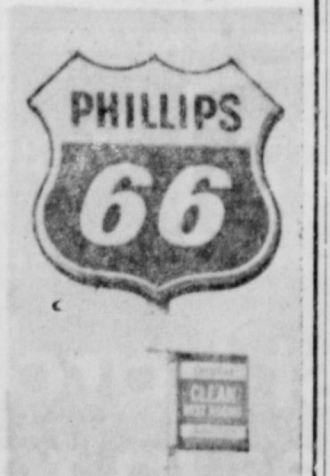

Continued From Page ONE connection, plaintiff shows the Court that defendant Truman P. Kirk is a married man, and that his wife Evelyn Marie Kirk, and family live and reside in Abilene, Taylor County, Texas, and have lived and resided in Abilene, Taylor County, Texas, for more than the past two years; Kirk is not and has not permanently separated from his said wife; that Article 5.05 of the Election Code of the State of Texas provides that the residence of a married man not permanently separated from his wife is where his wife resides; that in 1967 defendant Truman P. Kirk rendered for taxation in Taylor County, Texas, certain property in Abilene, Taylor County, Texas, certain property in Abilene, Taylor County, Texas, which he designated as his home-stead; that in 1967 Truman P. Kirk registered as a voter in Taylor County, Texas, and under the laws of the State of Texas was eligible to register as a voter only in the county of his residence; that in 1967 defendant Truman P. Kirk to be elected in 1968 to hold the office of District Judge of the 91st District Court of Eastland County, Texas, his name should not appear on the ballot as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for such office in the Democratic primary to be held on the first Saturday in May, 1968, and the defendants who are members of the Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee should be enjoined from placing his name on such ballot as such a candidate in accord with Article 1.07 of the Election Code of the State of Texas.

"The ballots for such primary must be printed in the very near future in order to allow absentee voting in such primary as provided by law. That unless said Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee is enjoined from placing the name of defendant Truman P. Kirk on such ballot, such name will appear thereon, and plaintiff will suffer great and irreparable damage in having to campaign against an ineligible candidate for the nomination sought. That it is necessary that a temporary injunction be issued as prayed for as promptly as possible and before the printing of such ballots.

"Wherefore, premises considered, plaintiff prays that the Court set a time for hearing on the issuance of a temporary injunction, that notice thereof be given as required by law, that defendants be temporarily enjoined from having the name of Truman P. Kirk placed on the ballot of the Democratic primary to be held on the first Saturday in May, 1968 as a candidate for nomination as the candidate of the Democratic Party for District Judge of the 91st District Court in the 1968 general election, that defendants be cited to answer herein, and that upon final hearing said injunction be made permanent, and for such other relief to which plaintiff may be entitled in the premises."
