
### **Appeals Court Denies Motions** In Allen Action

Latest ruling in the year old Riedel-Allen case came Friday morning when the 11th Court of Civil Appeals over ruled motions of rehearing which had been filed by each

Mrs. Patsy Riedel filed su against Ivan J. Allen in February 1967 asking several thousand dollars damages in the November 1965 shooting death of her husband. She was awarded !260,00 by a 91st District Court jury.

Allen sought reversal of the decision. The Appeals Court remanded the case for a new trial January 19. Mrs. Riedel filed for a rehearing Feb. 1 and Allen filed a similar motion Feb. 5.

A dissenting opinion on the Riedel motion was written by Judge Esco Walter. Either party is entitled to file another motion for rehearing in the same court within fifteen
