## John Nevill Is Manager Of Eastland Southern TV

John Nevill has been named Eastland manager of Southern Television Systems.

Nevill, a 1958 graduate of Sonora High School, is a veteran of seven years service with the United States Navy, where he worked with the electronic firing system on the Polaris submarines.

The family moved to Eastland from Mount Pleasant, South Carolina. Nevill and his wife, Nelda, have three children, April, five; Kellar, three; and Gleam, one. They live at 607 South Mulberry and attend the Baptist church.

John's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Nevill, live in Sonora where he is a carpenter and she is editor of the newspaper, the Devil's River News.

Nevill said that work on the tower east of town, part of the preliminary work necessary toward building a new system in Eastland, is practically complete. He added that the wind and the rain had delayed the work several days.

The Herb Jackson Construction Firm of Austin, is expected to begin work on the new cable system inside Eastland April 1.

Nevill explained that work will be done section by section inside town, to shorten time of service interruption as much as possible. "Patience, please", Nevill said, "but please cooperate with us, too. We will make the service interruptions as short as possible but we still want you to call us if you are having difficulty with reception when your section of town is not out of service."

A work schedule will be announced, Nevill said, so that each resident may know when to expect his service to be discontinued temporarily.

Nevill said, "The actual work of the new system will be inconvenient, but when we are finished the quality of reception in Eastland will be greatly improved. We will be better able to give Eastland residents the TV service they expect and deserve."

James Blair Lewis, 60, long-time Eastland resident, died at 4:30 a.m. Monday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, after an illness of six weeks.

Funeral was held at 11 a.m. Tuesday in the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Eastland, with the Rev. R. G. Flagg, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Eastland Cemetery under direction of Arrington Hamner Funeral Home.

Mr. Lewis was born Aug. 4, 1908 in Corsicana and had lived in Eastland for 45 years. He was a veteran of World War II.

Survivors include a brother, Jack Lewis of Abilene; one cousin, Mrs. Samuel D. Young of El Paso; and one niece, Mrs. Lynda Jackson of Dallas.

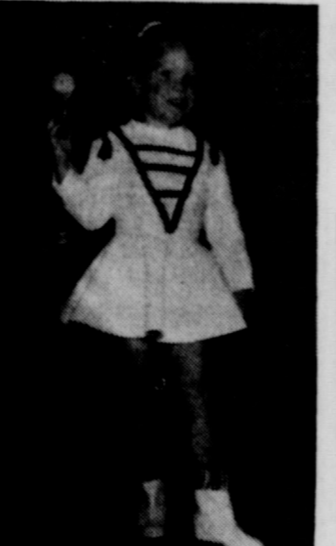

## Jaycees, Public Set To Officially Open Airport In Ceremonies Saturday

Saturday will be a Red-Letter day for the Eastland Airport and the Eastland Jaycees.

A formal ceremony is set to begin at 2:30 p.m. at the Airport, north of town, at which the Eastland Jaycees will officially declare the first-rate facility completed and ready to serve Eastland's needs.

Jaycee President Wade Freeman extended an invitation to the public to come out and participate in the important event. Coming in for special recognition will be the Cecil Ruby Construction Co. which will be represented by Vice President Jack Dalstrum.

A ribbon cutting ceremony, with a twist, is planned. A Ruby Co. plane will snip the ribbon officially opening the runway, with its propeller, Freeman said. The company was instrumental in assisting the local young men's club in bringing the airstrip up to top standards. The major project for the club was launched during the administration of Club President Dick Dixon. The Ruby Co. contributed thousands of dollars worth of material and used its own equipment to put the runway in top shape, and extend it up to its present 4,000 feet.

An appropriate plaque will be presented to the Ruby executive by the Jaycees in an expression of appreciation for the assistance rendered.

Rex Morgan is chairman of the committee in charge of the opening, has announced that a special coffee will be held following the Airport ceremony, to be at the Jaycee Hall on the South side of the square, to which the public is also invited.

In case of bad weather, the entire program will be at the

Gov. Preston Smith, invited for the ceremonies, telephoned Tuesday to express his congratulations to the club members for the fine civic work, and to regretfully report that other commitments would keep him from attending.

The Airport is located adjacent to the new Aztec Mobile Home Corp., now a building. Aztec Owner L. M. Blalock has recently stated that the airstrip and facilities were among the things that influenced his favorable selection of Eastland for the site of his vast firm.

## Rev. Williams to Lead in October Holy Land Tour

A ten day tour of the Holy Land has been planned for this Fall, beginning on October 20th, and ending on October 30th, 1969. During this period a comprehensive tour of all the Biblical sites in the area surrounding Jerusalem will be made.

Departure will be by Air France from JFK Airport in

New York, on the evening of October 20th, after connecting with another Air France jet in Paris, we will arrive in Tel Aviv the evening of the 21st, where we will be met and transferred to our hotel in Jerusalem. The following days will be occupied with visits to Jerusalem, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Mt. of Olives, Bethlehem, Jericho, the Jordan River and the Dead Sea.

On the 5th day we will journey to Samaria, Galilee, Capernaum, and Nazareth. The 6th day will be spent along the Coastal area to Haifa. The 7th day will be a free day in Jerusalem with an evening departure for Athens, Greece. The 8th day will be spent in Athens, the 9th day in Corinth, and the 10th day will see us on our way back to New York.

A pilgrimage to the Holy Land is something that you dream of but never think could possibly come true. Now, it can become a reality. The host for this tour is Rev. Eugene F. Williams, minister of the First Christian Church, Eastland, Texas.

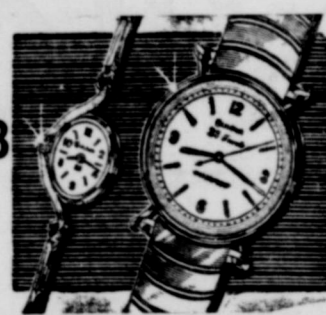

## Federal Aid Important, Say Agency Man, Superintendent

Federal aid to education was labeled "a necessity" by Travis Smith, a member of the Texas Education Agency, speaking for members of the Eastland Lions Club at their luncheon meeting at the White Elephant Restaurant Tuesday.

Introduced by School Supt. Wendell Siebert, Mr. Smith explained that his work is primarily with the Title One program, and that his division has had the primary responsibility of trying to tie all the programs together.

"Contrary to what Mr. Siebert and other administrators might think, we have worked hard to simplify this business of making application for the government programs. What we've done is make it possible for a district to apply for all the programs at one time," he explained.

President E. O. Moore presided and guests included John Nevill, new Southern Television Systems Eastland manager, Joe Weaver of Cisco and Gene Frost, new member. Jeff Glazner will have the program next week.

Supt. Siebert explained that public hearing on the controversial Governor's Committee's report began on the House floor Tuesday. This is the bill which would, if passed, reduce the number of school districts in Texas from some 1,200 to 350. Heading on two other education bills, one by Texas State Teachers Association, (a watered-down version of the governor's bill) will begin next Tuesday.

In evaluating the federally-financed programs, Mr. Smith said that the pre-school, remedial, Title One, and Title Two (library books and audio visual aids purchases) were "well worth the money" to public education. Mr. Siebert agreed that the local system would be crippled if federal programs were to be stopped.

"We're scheduled for \$16,000 under Title One, \$750 for Title Two, \$1,400 for Title Three and we get five cents for each meal we serve in the lunchroom (from \$6,000 to \$7,000 a month) plus about from \$4,000 to \$15,000 in government commodities. The monthly cost of our lunchroom program is about \$4,000 and we're probably the only district in the county that's presently operating in the black on lunches," Mr. Siebert said.

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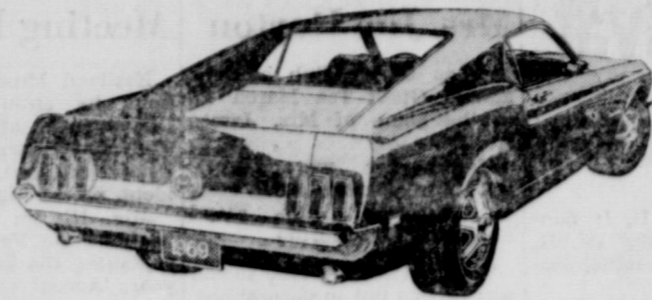


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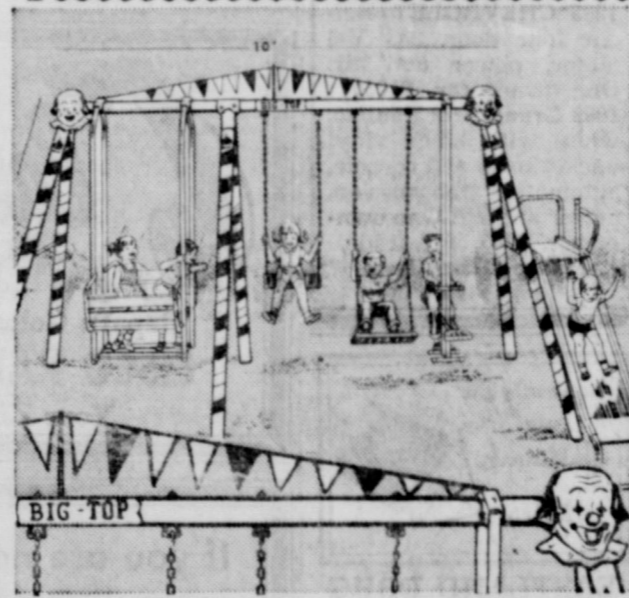

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### Great Plain Plan Helps Aaron with Long-time Dream

A dream came true on the Johnnie Aaron farm with the help of the Great Plains Conservation Program. In 1943 Aaron bought 286 acres of land two miles south of Eastland, on the Leon River. Aaron could see the possibilities but where to start and how was the question. Ninety acres of the place was inundated 1 to 3 times each year by flood waters. The upland was stricken by drought each year due to a cover of woody vegetation of oak and mesquite trees.

"When I started operating the bottom land was shaded with hackberry and elm trees and bloodweeds were 10 and 12 feet high," Aaron remarked.

Aaron started to work clearing land and put 70 acres of bottomland into cultivation. He planted small grain, grain sorghum and alfalfa on the land. Aaron said, "I tried 15 consecutive crops without harvesting a single one in the river bottom. One crop of speltz had an estimated yield of 70

bushels per acre. A combine pulled in one afternoon and the next morning, when harvest was to start, the crop was covered with water."

In January, 1963, the Great Plains Conservation Program was activated in Eastland Co. Aaron immediately made an application for assistance through the Soil Conservation Service for a G.P.C.P. contract. On March 15 of the same year he signed a cost-share contract with the Department of Agriculture. The contract was based on Aaron's conservation plan developed with the assistance of a soil conservationist from the local work unit. By the middle of May two acres of critical area located in over-flow area had been shaped and sodded to coastal bermuda. 70 acres of former cropland had been sparged to coastal bermuda. A cross fence of 1465 feet was completed. During the following two years 1964 and 1965 Aaron completed an additional 21 acres of pasture planting, 123 acres of range seeding, 3630 feet of cross fencing and 1070 feet of pipe line for livestock watering. "Converting the bottomland to permanent pasture has put a new complexion on the destructive floods. Overflows are beneficial to coastal bermuda. To make the job more complete, a small watershed program on the South Leon River would prevent my fences from washing out every time we get an overflow," commented Aaron.

Aaron hired heavy equipment to root-plow mesquite on the 123 acres of range land. He piled the brush and grubs by hand. He prepared a seed-bed with his own equipment and seeded it with a grass drill to mixture of sidecoat grama and K.R. bluestem.

The place now carries 45 animals units where 15 were run before the program was applied. The cattle are rotated on 6 pastures of coastal bermuda from May through November. 2500 bales of hay are put up each year. "I sell enough hay to pay my fertilizer bill. The rest I store for feed in cases of emergency," says Aaron. He made one cutting on his coastal in 1968 and it averaged 104 bales per acre. The cattle are run on reseeded native grasses during the winter and spring months.

By experience he has found coastal makes good winter grazing if it has 12" or more height to it when frost kills it and then supplemented with conserved cake. Since the job has been completed Johnnie Aaron said, "It would have taken a long time to meet my objective if it had not been for the Great Plains Program."

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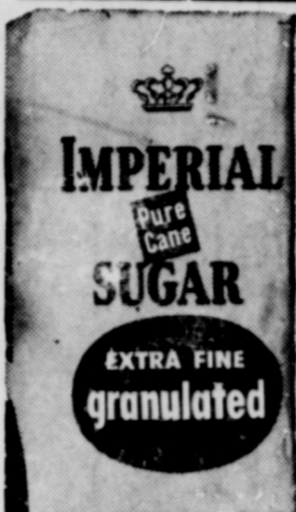

## Coastal, Weeping Love Keys To Pastures Here

What is Pasture Management and its purpose? It is the proper treatment and use of pastureland to prolong the life of desirable forage species; maintain or improve the qual-

ity or quantity of forage; provide soil protection and reduce water losses.  
The two most common grasses found on our pastures in Eastland County are Weeping lovegrass, Coastal Bermuda, a vigorous growing warm-season perennial sod-forming grass which reproduces from both rhizomes and stolons but not from seed. It was developed and released from the Coastal Plains Experiment Station, Tifton, Ga., as an intraspecific hybrid, of a vigorous strain of Common Bermuda called Tift and a tall growing strain of Common Bermuda from South Africa.

Weeping lovegrass is a perennial warm-season bunch grass that was developed in South Africa and can be planted by seeds at the rate of about 3 lbs. per acre.  
High quality green pasture is the most economical method of beef production. The type of grass, rate of fertilizer application and specific management practice necessary for improved pasture programs will usually pay good dividends. Although there are differences among grasses in their actual response to fertilizer, they require four major plant nutrients which are nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, and calcium.

One should not attempt to establish improved pasture plants on low-fertility soil without application of fertilizers, and it should be recognized that soils too poor to grow desirable plants produce low quality forage.  
Rotational grazing is recommended for improved pastures, and a stocking rate to graze-off the forage in three to five weeks will usually give the highest yield of beef. For rapid recovery, a stubble of 6 inches should be left on Coastal Bermuda and 6 to 8 inches on Weeping lovegrass. Coastal and Weeping love should not be grazed until it reaches a minimum height of 8 inches and should be maintained at a minimum height of 6 inches.  
A 6 to 8 inch stubble height will produce about 8 to 10 thousand lbs. of forage per acre whereas a 2 inch stubble height will hardly produce enough forage per acre to pay for the fertilizer applied.

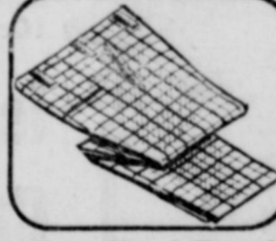

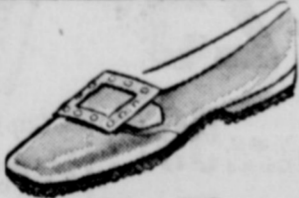

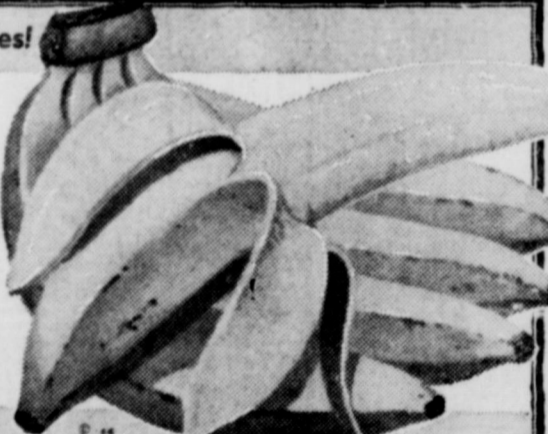
