MONDAY HAS been declared a day of national mourning for former President, General Dwight David Eisenhower and Eastland County will join in this period of national bereavement at the loss of a great hero and leader.

If there ever was a champion for young men, this man from Abilene, Kans., would have to be it. It was in October, 1953, that we, as if a steel marble in the pin-ball machine of life, found that circumstance and happen-change would put this Eastland County G.I. (a former peanut shaker) at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave., Wash. D.C. as a member of the White House Army Signal Agency. The outfit's job is simple—provide communications to the President and his staff, wherever it's needed, and then as now, it's a world-wide undertaking. You'll remember the time—post Korea, Geneva for peace talks, a heart attack in Denver, and on.

As a public schooler, we'd worshipped the military leadership of Ike in Europe. In '52, we heard him promise to "Go to Korea, if elected." He was and he did, and we remember that we heard many say, "What at this country doesn't need is a military power. Remember Germany."

And so it was in 1953 when chance brought us into his direct employ, it was with enormous awe—we were all eyeballs, wobbly knees and jangled nerves as we first went to the Chief Executive to take a message. This is not to say, by any means, that we were ever on an "Ike" and/or "H" basis. It was "Is this to be classified, Mr. President?" "No, just regular, Sergeant."

What impressions of this "militant" man?

The military side of Ike ordered the Inspector General Corps (the I.G.'s) to get the proper clearance and proceed, when a dispute got up to him, after the commander of our outfit refused admission to the inspectors to our basement, bomb-shelter headquarters, because the security clearances weren't up to snuff. The Boss ruled: "You will be inspected like every other G.I., even though you work in the White House." And so we were.

The all-so-human side showed when the President and Mrs. Eisenhower sat in the front row of the White House movie projection room, and he roared and rode leather at the western films he saw. He slumped and dozed on the nights when Mrs. E. insisted on musicals and love stories. (The on-duty, but un-busy G.I.s sat in the back, and kept their mouths shut, shut, shut.)

The warm side showed the night the FBI came up with a bomb treat and the First Family and all allied officials came into the shelter to wait for the checkout. Our outfit worked shifts, changing at 3, 11 and 7. It fell our lot to be on the evening shift, and the men had been wondering what they should do when shift change time came. Ike solved it for us, when he looked at us and ordered: "Sergeant, don't let these men go out of here until this thing's settled." It was, of course, a morbid hoax, and about midnight the shifts changed—the evening shift never bellyached about a late relief again, and that's something for a soldier.

Many political seers say that Ike listened too much to his advisors during his second term—we've seen the opposite extreme since.

It was a good political slogan, and remember the look-a-like Ike Babies in every newspaper. They said and we all said—and meant: "I Like Ike."

Drew Pearson at CJC Tuesday Nite

Cisco Junior College's Spring Current Affairs Series will close with the appearance of Columnist Drew Pearson on Tuesday, April 1, at 8:00 p.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on the CJC campus.

The three - program series opened with Sander Vanocur of NBC-TV News on February 5. The second scheduled program was to be Pierre Salinger, but the program was plagued with difficulties and finally was cancelled.

Drew Pearson, by judgment of his colleagues as well as public prestige, is Washington's top reporter. Even his critics admit, with some reluctance, that Pearson is the one man covering Washington who gets stories that others can't get and who dares to print and broadcast what others are too timid to touch.

This is why Pearson is the Washington reporter most sought after, yet the most feared—because Washington knows he is relentless in his search for news, crusading in his zeal for good government, and impervious to pressure.

He has criticized and fought government officials, members of Congress, important business leaders, whenever he felt they were not acting in the public interest. They have denied and threatened, evaded, and sued—but Pearson has been proved right so often that the warning "Pearson might find out about this" has a sharp impact on secret conspirators in government through out the nation.

In the lean years of the Hoover Administration an anonymous book, "Washington Merry-Go-Round," created a tremendous stir in the nation's capital. It was packed with inside stories told on heretofore sacrosanct politicians and members of society. When the authors of the book were revealed to be Drew Pearson and Robert S. Allen, Allen was dismissed by the Christian Science Monitor, Publication of the sequel "More Merry-Go-Round" led to Pearson's firing by the Baltimore Sun.

Through this Pearson-Allen partnership, however, began a new era in journalism—for the two men, both without jobs, teamed up to write the daily "Washington Merry-Go-Round" column, which has been whirling in the nation's newspapers since December 13, 1932. Bob Allen later bowed out and Pearson for years was the sole author of the column. Finally, Jack Anderson came in as the junior partner.

In 1943, the "Washington Merry-Go-Round" reached another pinnacle in news-writing accomplishment when it won the 1942 Sigma Delta Chi Distinguished Service Award in Journalism for general excellence of performance in Washington. Sigma Delta Chi is a professional journalistic fraternity which counts among its members the na-

tion's leading editors and newspapermen.

In addition to "Washington Merry-Go-Round" and "More Merry-Go-Round," Pearson and Allen co-authored "Nine Old Men." Pearson and Constantine Brown wrote "The American Diplomatic Game" and in 1958 Pearson and his junior partner Jack Anderson wrote "USA—Second Class Power?"—the story of why and how the United States was then losing the race with Russia in developing guided missiles and space satellites.

MEDITATIONS ON THE RESURRECTION There Is a Way Up From Down by the Rev. Len Layne

Think! In a great many ways we are down and need to be set free that we might go up. True? I think you must agree. Far too many of us are slaves of tobacco, alcohol, dope, marijuana, tranquilizers, LSD, money, prestige seeking, self love, and sex. Most of us are victims of some kind of slavery. We might as well admit it. We need something done for us. We need to be set free.

I heard that a college student said not long ago that he and many other youth of our land want complete freedom in sex. "Just leave us alone to have sex as we wish," he said. A woman said, "I don't love anyone but myself, and all I want is to be left alone to my self adoration." A young man said, "There is not but one satisfying thing and that is the admiration and the applause of the crowd, and I'll do anything and whatever to get that admiration and applause." A business man said, "Money is the only thing in the world that brings freedom. If you've got money you are free of God, people, the community, institutions - the whole bit. I'm after money and if anyone gets in my way he'd better look out."

Where has wisdom gone these days? Do we believe that the only way to individual human freedom is to have more and more freedom to indulge in those things that put us deeper and deeper into slavery? Do we believe that moral law that was built into the very structure of the universe from the beginning is gone just because we have told it to go away? Do we believe that there are no destructive effects from irresponsible sex just simply because we say there aren't any? Do we believe there is no human suffering wrought in this world because of alcohol just simply because we say that alcohol is an innocent part of our society and does no harm? I say, my friends, where has wisdom gone?

We need to be set free from our slavery, and we are kidding ourselves allday long about what will do it. We are saying that education will do it, but education isn't because it can't. We are saying the doctors' chemicals will do it, but they aren't because they can't. We are saying the psychiatric conference will do it, but it isn't because it can't. These people and these things are not setting us free from our slavery because it takes something with redemptive power to do it, and these people and things have no redemptive power.

There has never been but one means by which the human being can be set free from his slavery. That one means is the redemptive power of God's love. There has never been but on way to that redemptive power that sets us free. That is the way of belief and faith. Almost two thousand years ago God made it easier and simpler than ever before for human beings to believe and have faith.

He appeared in human history himself as a human being. That human being is called Jesus Christ. All we have to do today to experience God's redemptive love is to believe in and have faith in the Living Lord. He is the Living Lord because he rose from death and lives eternally. The Living Christ, our way to God's redemptive love, is completely available to all.

What did you say? Did you say you do not believe in the resurrection of Jesus? That gives me to hear you say that because belief and faith in the Living Lord is your only way ever to be set free from that which enslaves you. There is no other way. Turn to the accounts of the resurrection in the Gospel record. Read them and pray that you might believe.

Clyde W. Graham Is Appointed Head of ASC Service in Texas

Appointment of Clyde W. Graham to head the work of the United States Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service, Texas, was announced today by Administrator Kenneth E. Grant.

He will transfer from Washington, D.C. to Temple April 20. Graham, a 1943 Texas A&M graduate in Agricultural Engineering, was in the U. S. Army Air Force from January 1943 to September 1946 when he joined the SCS as a field engineer in Indian, Texas.

He holds a Masters Degree in Public Administration from Harvard University awarded in 1958. He is a native of Knox City, Texas.

Local Post Office Honors Eisenhower

The U. S. Post Office here will be closed Monday in Memory of General Dwight D. Eisenhower, a former U. S. President who died Friday in Washington, according to the local postmaster.

The post office will operate Monday on the usual Sunday or holiday schedule, the announcement said.

The Post Office Flag was lowered to half-mast soon after Mr. Eisenhower's death in tribute to the world leader. It will fly at half-mast until after the funeral next Thursday in Abilene, Kansas.

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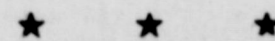

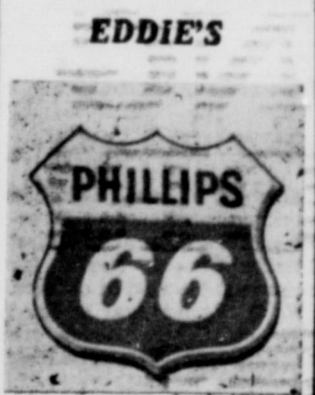

Called for Federal Jury? Read This, Be Prepared

It is early fall when the first letter arrives. The envelope is marked "Official Business, United States Government".

Reasonably sure that the United States Government has no official business with you, except to send you those forms you ordered from the National Archives, you put the letter in your purse to read when you have more time to think about genealogical research.

Later that morning, you pour a cup of coffee and get out the letter. It is not from the Archives.

It appears that your name has been selected at "random" from the voter registration list of 16 counties in this area of Texas and you are therefore being considered for jury duty in the Federal Court, Northern District of Texas, meeting at Abilene.

Your cooperation in completing and returning the questionnaire herein enclosed would make the government most happy and, incidentally, prevent you from being jailed or fined.

Eager to spread happiness in official circles, you complete the form and let your husband check it, just to be sure you have spelled your name right.

Another letter comes Jan. 6 and there is no mistaking what it is: it is certified and the postal department is anxious to have your autograph on certain papers of their own selection.

You scan the letter — idea seems to be that the government has examined you and found that you are not exempt from jury service nor entitled to be excused upon your re-

quest unless the facts in the previously returned questionnaire have altered. (Apparently this means that if you have died in the interim, you are not expected to serve on the jury.) You are hereby summoned to appear — 9 a.m. — Monday, Jan. 20 — Federal Building, Abilene — and you will be expected to serve for the term of court which commences that day.

There is also another form to be completed and given to the court when you appear. You fill it out and file it under "Jury", making sure each member of the family knows where it is.

Jan. 20, you drive to Abilene and enter the federal building, making sure your driver's license is handy, just in case someone asks your name and you can't remember what it is.

You join more than 50 others in the courtroom. A federal marshal explains that each name was put on a card

and a clerk (secretary? junior marshal?) drew cards one at a time to decide where you would sit. The marshal reads names and the jury panel is seated, number one on the first row, first seat to the judge's right. Twelve people are on the first row, second row, and so on. You are near the back and the man on your right says this means you won't get on a jury at first. He was right.

Everyone rises and the judge enters. A marshal begins, "Hear ye, hear ye, the court" He hardly pauses before he begins to pray. Caught off guard, you are slow to bow your head.

The judge explains many things. That rising is not a sign of respect for the judge, but for the court. It just happens to be a good time to have everyone rise when the judge enters. No one says, "Let us pray" or even "Please pray" because praying is a free choice, even in a federal court. The judge said, "If you choose to pray, bow your head and pray silently. If you do not choose to pray, just stand there and be silent".

The jury for the first trial is selected. You remain, waiting to be told what to do. Finally, they tell you to do whatever you wish between then and Jan. 27, when you will once more appear in court.

This second trip, you are more at ease, you know where to go when you are called, you bow your head immediately prior to the praying.

You are number twelve, a sign you are to be on the jury. But then the lawyers for the civil suit call off a list of names. Anyone knowing any person on the list is to raise a right hand. One person on the list is a former Eastland resident. You raise your hand. You are not selected for the jury.

You are dismissed for one and a half hours and, by now, you are so at home around the place you are late getting

back. You must explain this to the marshal. Well, you say, you went out to the Scarborough Library, that glassed in section of the library at a college there, to do some research. Funny thing, by the way, when you first got the questionnaire, you thought it had something to do with research. Co-incidence, huh? Well, anyway, you got a sandwich and some coffee and ate in the library. You didn't know if this was allowed, but no one was there except a Stamford woman who had a grandchild Friday and a young boy cleaning up, he doesn't take library science, but they let him work there anyway. Isn't that nice? And they didn't say anything to you about eating there. So you had to wait for the microfiche reader, and finally you got it, and then you forgot the time. Then you go outside and some students had double-parked behind your car and you had to go and get them to move that car and is this reason for being late?

The marshal looks glaze! and nods. You go into the court. This time your number is two. You are about to be on a federal jury. The judge comes

in and tells the jury panel to go out. Thirty minutes later the panel is asked to return. The criminal case is off; all the accused persons have entered pleas of guilty. You are dismissed. You are to go home and your checks will be mailed to you.

You start outside. The marshal stops you and you become nervous again, like a new-comer. "Just wanted to tell you", he says. "That the library is open 'til ten tonight. You can get in a lot of research, if you like".

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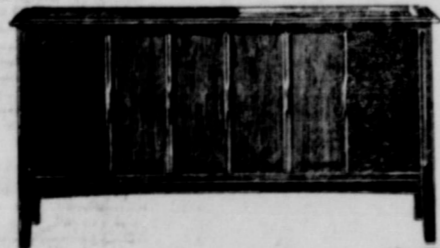

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SCHOOLMENS RESOLUTION

The following resolution was unanimously passed by area school administrators at a meeting held this morning in Cisco:

WHEREAS, The University Interscholastic League of Texas has for many years promoted a program of interschool activities for Texas Public Schools that has distinguished itself as one of, if not the one most outstanding organization of its kind in the United States and

WHEREAS, The League as it now exists does operate under an Constitution and a set of rules made by the participating schools of the League and subject to annual change as the demand arises and

WHEREAS, Certain Legislators of the Texas Legislature now in session have introduced legislative bills for consideration that would seriously jeopardize the current and future operation of the League . . . the undersigned school administrators of the 53rd Legislative District composed of Stephens, Shackelford, Callahan, Eastland and Palo Pinto Counties go on record as being unalterably opposed to House Bill No. 737 by Representative Swanson of Houston and House Bill No. 1093 by Representative Musgrove of Breckenridge, or any other Legislative Act that would propose to usurp the authority now vested in the schools of Texas that belong to and participate in the Interscholastic League as it now functions.

Musgrove Says His TIL Bill Has Already Served Purpose

State Rep. Burke Musgrove's bill to strip the Texas Interscholastic League of its powers has attained its goal, the lawmaker said in this county this week.

"My purpose was to prove to the TIL that the legislature does have control, because tax money is involved," Musgrove said. "I've been told time and time again that the Interscholastic League doesn't come under the legislature's jurisdiction. When citizens feel they are being wronged,

but have no source of appeal to the TIL, then they bring their problems to me."

School administrators from Musgrove's own 53rd District met in Cisco Thursday and passed a resolution opposing his bill.

The point that Musgrove objects to is the "transfer rule" which prevents youngsters from being eligible from participating in sports when their parents move to another school district.

Most school men and TIL backers vow that the "transfer rule" ended the old "recruiting" practices which at one time in the state's history made professional games of high school athletics, the representative says.

The TIL is certainly not perfect," says a county superintendent, who asked that he not be named, "but it is certainly an improvement over what we've had in the past."

Musgrove says that the TIL should "up-date" itself, with a local governing board to evaluate every case on its own merits, rather than deprive a youngster of participating, because of the blanket "transfer" rule.

A letter from C. C. Miller, chairman of the TIL's legislative council, was read to schoolmen, and it read in part: "Musgrove's bill would place League activities 'in politics.'"

Visiting around the county after attending the noon Cisco meeting with schoolmen, Rep. Musgrove said that all he wants to do is to get the League to examine itself and stop discriminating against youngsters who are penalized just because their parents have to move. "I'm not saying that there won't be some recruiting under a new system, but I am saying that some plan can be worked out if the League seriously tackles the problem and tries to find a solution.

The TIL is the second "sacred cow", Musgrove has attacked. He introduced a bill to abolish the Texas Railroad Commission. He dropped that bill later saying that he really didn't want to do away with the TRR, just wanted to change its name.

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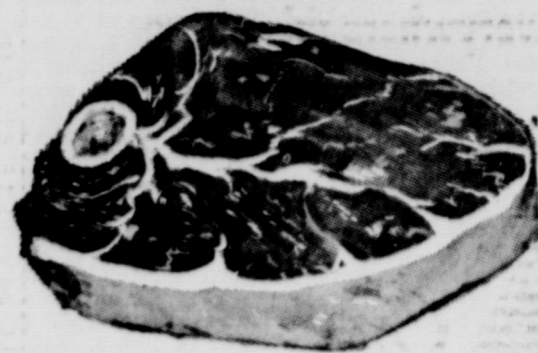

Long Lines Due For Late Buyers Of Car Licenses

AUSTIN — With the deadline for motor vehicle registration only a few days away, a Texas Highway Department spokesman today predicted long last-minute lines and warned motorists of the problems involved in failing to get their license plates in time.

"Registration is going somewhat normally," the Department spokesman said. "The majority of drivers seem to be registering their vehicles the last two weeks."

Motorists have until midnight next Tuesday (April 1) to get their license plates and get them on their vehicles. There can be no extension of the deadline since it is set by law.

What happens if a motorist fails to get his license plates in time? He still must obtain plates and at a 20 per cent increase in fee as a late penalty. If he should drive his car without the new license plates, he can be fined up to \$200 for current license plates.

Motorists may obtain license plates at county tax offices and sub-stations throughout Texas. State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his title as evidence of ownership. Besides the vehicle title, motorists will need last year's registration receipt, current address and correct

ZIP code to obtain license plates.

It is more important that the correct residence address appear on 1969 registration records. Texas motor vehicle registration records are being computerized. This will result in greater registration convenience next year.

In 1970, vehicle owners will be mailed a special pre-prepared registration form, which eliminates most of the time-

consuming typing by the registration clerk. Motorists will need only to bring the form to the county tax office or registration station, pay the fee and have the form validated with the new license numbers.

This will minimize waiting in long lines next year. But to avoid standing in line this year, motorists should obtain their registration plates as quickly as possible.
