E.I.F. — AND HOW IT GROWS

A town walks forward, one step followed by one step, followed by several thousand steps.

It is never possible to mention each person connected with any event; those who dreamed, worked, took disappointment in stride, and worked again. It is never possible to know exactly what made possible the third step, the nine hundredth step.

Briefly, this is the background of the Eastland Industrial Foundation:

1946: Hollywood - Maxwell (later to be Hollywood-Vasarette) opened a clothing manufacturing plant in Eastland.

1956: The factory had expanded to three buildings, with more than two hundred employees and a two and a half million dollar annual payroll.

The company found it impossible to continue operating in three separate locations. One building large enough to accommodate everything was needed.

An Abilene contracting firm agreed to put up the \$60,000 facilities on North College Street. Eastland would lease the building, then sub-lease to the manufacturing company.

The Chamber of Commerce Industrial Fund Committee was composed of Grady Pipkin, chairman; Virgil Seaberry, Jr., Dr. J. C. Whittington, Frank Sayre, Ben Hamner, L. E. McGraw, Carl Johnson, H. L. King, Tom Wilson, Henry Pullman, Hubert Westfall, and Herb Tanner. This committee undertook to raise \$12,500 by selling Industrial Fund Certificates.

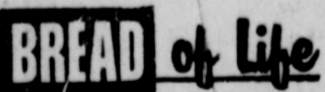
The money would buy the lease, with an option to purchase the building effective Oct. 1, 1966. Individuals and businesses contributed to the fund. The building was completed and Eastland kept the company here.

February, 1964: the Eastland Industrial Foundation, an organization separate from the Chamber of Commerce which would, however, work closely with the Chamber's committee, was organized. The Secretary of the State of Texas signed the certificate of Incorporation under the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, Feb. 19, 1964.

Purpose of the foundation was "to promote industrial development for the city of Eastland and its trade territory."

Any person, firm, or corporation could join the foundation.

In summation, "It could have been better — but then again, it could have been a lot worse."

The Mavericks won two-thirds of their games — taking victories in 16 outings and losing eight. The Mavericks had a little less luck, and wound up with a six win, 16 lost season.

The Mavericks scored a total of 1,451 points to their opponents' 1,270. Holding bright prospects for next time out is the individual scoring statistics. Funeral services for Mr. Reynolds were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at the First Methodist Church with Dr. Bob Evans, pastor officiating. Masonic graveside rites were held in Oakwood Cemetery under the direction of Rust Funeral Home.

Mr. Reynolds was born July 2, 1889 in Briscole and was married to Edna Ratliff Aug. 4, 1912 in Florence. He was a well known farmer and stockman in this area. He was a member of the First Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife of the home; one son, Jesse Jr. of Cisco; two daughters, Mrs. Christell Gaines and Mrs. Evelyn Graham, both of Cisco; five brothers, Raymond of Fort Worth, Jack of Ranger, C. E. and Ollie, both of Cisco, and I. D. of Stephenville. Also surviving are eight grandchildren, and three great grandchildren.

Mr. Pierre Salinger, former press secretary to two presidents and U. S. Senator, will be guest speaker at Cisco Junior College's second presentation in its Spring Current Affairs Series next Monday evening, March 3. The program will be at 8:00 p.m. in the Harrell Fine Arts Auditorium on the C.J.C. campus.

Sander Vanocur of NBC-TV News opened the college's Current Affairs Series, and Drew Pearson, nationally known syndicated columnist, will be the final presentation on April 1.

Salinger was Press Secretary to Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson, and he served as a member of the United States Senate when he was appointed in 1964 by Governor Edmund G. Brown to serve out the term of the late Senator Clair Engle of California.

Mr. Salinger was born June 14, 1925 in San Francisco. He was graduated from the public schools of that city and took his Bachelor of Science degree in history from the University of San Francisco. He left a position as copy boy at The San Francisco Chronicle to enlist in the Navy in World War II. He became commanding officer of a subhater (SC 1388) and won the Navy and Marine Corps Medal for heroic action.

In 1959, Salinger became Press Secretary to then Senator John F. Kennedy. Salinger was in charge of press operations for Kennedy through the long and vigorous campaign and became the presidential Press Secretary in 1961. In this office, Salinger was present at conferences be-

tween President Kennedy and other world leaders, including the historic meeting with Khrushchev in Vienna in 1961.

Following the close of his Senate term, Mr. Salinger became Vice-President of the National General Corporation. He resigned that position to become Vice-President of the Continental Airlines, Inc., Continental Air Service, Inc.

In spite of his busy schedule, he found time to write the recent best seller, With Kennedy. Mr. Salinger's Cisco Junior College lecture will concern "The Kennedy Years—Before and After."

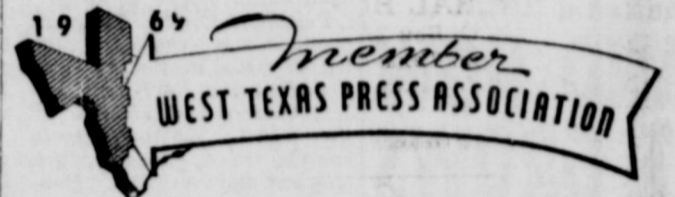

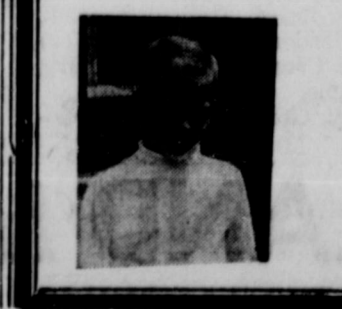

March, 1964: A Dallas financial concern took the Hollywood-Vassarette property in Eastland, in a foreclosure action. The Chamber committee retained its option and the Dallas firm offered to let the property be sold in 29 months ahead of time.

May 1964: The Chamber committee, acting with approval of Chamber directors, transferred its fund certificates to the newly-organized Foundation.

September, 1964: The Foundation had purchased the Hollywood-Vassarette building and grounds as its first major investment.

1965: The Foundation had grown to 56 members and had obtained other land for development.

February, 1969: The Foundation shareholders elected J. T. (Buddy) Carter to the board of directors, replacing Fullen who did not seek re-election. Perry was re-elected to the board. Wilson was selected president, Perry vice-president, Sayre secretary, and Carter treasurer.
