RED CROSS, an Eastland United Fund agency, spent \$120,077,865 in fiscal 1968-69 to provide health and welfare services for the American people. Here's some interesting notes on voter turnout: Italy registers best with 92 per cent; France, 90; Germany, 87.8; Britain, 80; The state of Utah, 76.1; Minnesota, 76; Idaho, 72.6; Indiana, 71.8; West Virginia, 69.9; Ohio, 63.5; and Texas 48.7 per cent. Eastland? That's up to us.

E. E. McALLISTER, Eastland County Soil Conservation Service Supervisor reports findings of the 1970 Conservation Needs Inventory reveals that:

1. About 2 out of 3 acres in Texas need one or more conservation measures.
2. Most land needing treatment needs conservation treatment every year.
3. About 4 out of 10 acres of grassland have been invaded by brush. This, coupled with other grazing management problems, makes grassland improvement one of the State's foremost conservation problems.
4. Half the State's non-irrigated cropland needs crop residue management, annual cover crops, or terraces.
5. Some 44 percent of the irrigated cropland needs an improved irrigation system to prevent erosion and water loss.
6. Most water used in Texas falls on privately owned land, then flows into streams, lakes, reservoirs.

Protecting watersheds with conservation treatment means cleaner water; less sediment in streams, lakes and harbors; more dependable water supplies; abundant wildlife; and a better Texas.

For District Title Mavericks To Meet Hamilton Tuesday Night In Brownwood

The Eastland Mavericks and the Hamilton Bulldogs each ended their regular season Friday night with impressive victories, and set the stage for a championship playoff game in Brownwood Tuesday night. Officials of both schools met Saturday morning in Brownwood to make final arrangements for the game. Coach Shirley Frazier announced that the game will be played in Brownwood High School Gymnasium, which seat 1,800, at 8 p.m. and that tickets will be \$1 for adults and 50¢ for students. He stressed the fact that no reserved seats will be sold and that tickets may be purchased on a first-come first-served basis at the door. The Mavericks and the Bulldogs each have 9-1 records in District 8-AA. Friday night, Eastland downed Comanche 80-63, and Hamilton beat Cis-

co 71-44. Daryl Thomas scored 23 points and Randall Tredwell scored 22 points to lead the Mavericks in their victory over Comanche. Jerry Sills scored 21 points for Hamilton in their victory over Cisco. The playoff game in Brownwood will be the fourth meeting of the two teams this season, with the Mavericks leading the series 2-1. Eastland overpowered Hamilton 60-47 in the DeLeon Tournament early this season. The Bulldogs came to Eastland and edged the Mavericks 52-51 in the first district game, and the Mavericks took the second district game, in Hamilton, 67-69. The teams are tied in district victories, so the playoff game is necessary to determine the 8-AA Championship. The 8-AA Champion will play the 7-AA Champion, either Merkel or Coleman, Tuesday week,

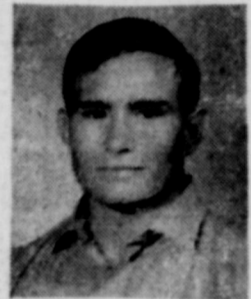

Big Peanut Producer Plans Revealed for Coming Year

The Texas Peanut Producers Board held a full Board meeting in Pearsall, Texas on January 26, 1970 and voted to take the following action:

To promote and sponsor the annual Texas State Peanut Queen contest. The Queen will represent growers throughout the State in connection with promotional activities.

To write the committee of Judges of the National Peanut Council nominating Dr. A. L. Harrison of the Yoakum Experiment Station for the Golden Peanut Research Award.

To support the National Peanut Council by contributing one-third of the funds charged to the Southwest peanut growers groups. The remainder of funds will be paid by the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association and the Oklahoma Peanut Commission.

To write a newsletter at the end of each fiscal year to each peanut producer in the State

of Texas participating in the program, informing him of the activities and progress of the Board.

To send a news release to local papers in peanut producing areas after each Board meeting, giving an account of action taken.

To sponsor a peanut booth at the State Fair in Dallas.

To enter into a promotional program with Agricultural Products people of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

To hold 20% of the assessed funds in reserve for emergency purposes.

To fund the University of Texas A&M \$4120.00 for Peanut Weed Control Evaluation & Demonstrations. The cost to producers for weed control and yield losses from weeds vary, but it is estimated that on the 304,900 planted acres in 1969, this amounted to not less than \$1,824,000.

To fund the University of

Texas A&M \$6,050.00 for Lesser Cornstalk Borer and Burrowing Bug Control in Peanuts. Some years losses to the Lesser Cornstalk Borer alone are as much as \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

To fund the University of Texas A&M \$10,000 for Control of and Factors Affecting Foliage Diseases of Peanuts. The reduction in yield and grade of peanuts from foliage diseases may be as much as \$200.00 per acre on irrigated peanuts, and \$100.00 to \$50.00 on dry land peanuts if adequate control methods aren't followed.

To fund the University of Texas A&M \$10,000 for Identification & Evaluation of Factors Affecting Performance of Peanut Planting Seed. Estimates of losses due to poor quality planting seed range from 2% to 4% of the annual value of most crops. These estimates apply to peanuts grown

in Texas and represent a loss of \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 annually.

To fund the University of Texas A&M \$10,000 for Breeding Peanut For Increased Yield & Disease Resistance. A variety of peanuts resistant to foliage diseases would eliminate a control program and increase producer income considerably. Higher yielding varieties would increase producer income.

To fund the University of Texas A&M \$10,000 for Long-time Fertility Studies on Peanuts. Previous fertility research in Texas has not been conducted in a manner where conclusive results could be obtained.

Not to exceed \$10,000 on any one project with the University of A&M at this time, and all projects of more than one year duration will be contingent upon the availability of funds.

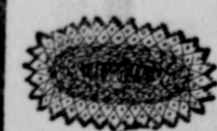

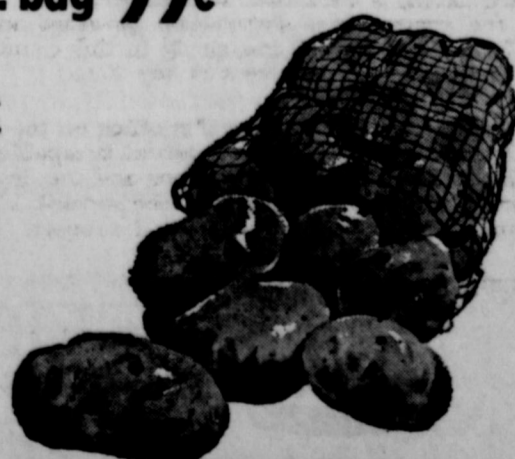

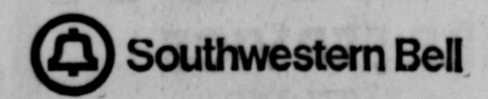

\$5 Million-Plus Peanut Crop Off Record 33,799.1 Acres

Eastland County's 1969 peanut crop is worth \$5,512,402.25 according to ASCS Office Manager Gilbert Meredith, whose office has just completed a compilation of marketing records for the year.

That five million figure represents 43,172,325 pounds of Eastland County protein gold nut meats harvested this past year. Acreage in the county is set at an all-time high of 33,799.1 acres, and yields are mighty good, even though below the record average 1,474 pounds per acre in 1968.

The year 1969's average per-acre yield most nearly equaled that "big year" of '66, when the average was 1,266. Of course, the uncooperative weather turned out a 937-lb. average in 1967.

"I predict we'll never see another three-digit average in this county," Meredith says.

That five million dollar crop was figured on an average of 13 cents per pound — most heavily down the middle in gradings.

What's responsible for the increase?

Agricultural officials differ somewhat in opinions. On the one hand, rain is a big factor as it always has been and always will be. Rains at the right time.

Irrigation gets credit, but ironically the year 1969 proved less productive for the irrigators than for the dry-land planters.

Herbicides? Sure they get credit for increasing yields. But then on the other hand...

Fact is, all the USDA boys agree: many factors are involved in producing a good crop. It takes all these things and the investments are heavy. The payoff on that big 1969 crop represents a lot of money invested in good seed, fertilizers, pest and weed controls and any number of crop helpers.

Isolated instances throughout the county prove that over-all averages don't always tell "all" the story. Some raisers aren't bragging about 1969.
