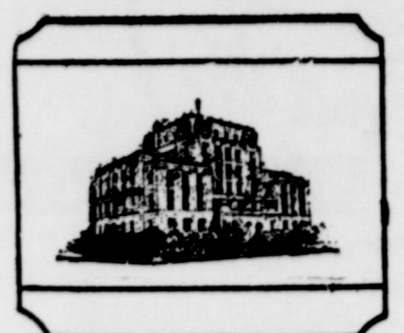

The Eastland Mavericks racked up another win here Friday night with a score of 41-6 over the Ballinger Bearcats. This makes the total number of points for Eastland come to 379 as for the opponents 32.

Eastland started the first drive as they received the ball on their own 43 yard line. With a combination of King, Lund, Rexroat they carried the ball down to the Ballinger 30 where McClesky fumbled and Ballinger recovered.

Ballinger tried to get moving but were stopped and had to punt on 4 down. Randy Rexroat received the punt on the Eastland 40 yard line and ran 60 yards for the touchdown. The extra point try by Eidson was blocked, and with 6 minutes left in the 1st quarter the score was 6 for Eastland and 0 for Ballinger.

The Mav's kicked off and Ballinger received on their 31. With a combination of the QB and Johnny Hoffman, 175 pound fullback carrying the ball they racked up three first downs in a row down to the Eastland 30. On second down Ballinger fumbled and Eastland recovered. On the next series of downs the Mavs could not move the ball and were forced to punt on their own 35 yard line. With the end of the first quarter the score 6 Eastland, Ballinger 0.

Ballinger received on their own 24 yard line. The Bearcats ran for five yards and then had 2 incomplete passes and on fourth down were forced to kick again. Eastland received on the Eastland 26 a fine run by Howard King from the Eastland 40 to the Ballinger 15. Then Tony Thomas carried from the 15 to the six to Ballinger. Howard King then tromped over for the TD and Craig Lund on a quarter back keeper carried over for the 23 yard line. A pass from Lund to Rexroat made for a 31 yard pass play and then a 30 yard pass play from Lund to Bob Mace who took it in for the touchdown. Lund carried for

the 2 point conversion to make the score 29-0. Again Eastland kicked off and Ballinger took the ball and carried down to the Eastland 37 where it was tough going and Eastland took over on the Mavs' 28. With Lund at quarterback, Rexroat carried to the Ballinger 46 and then with 2 first downs in a row and on 1st and 10 quarter back Craig Lund passed to Bob Mace for a 29 yard pass play and the touchdown. With the extra point no good the score stood at 35-0, with 1 minute left in the third quarter.

With the start of the fourth quarter Ballinger had the ball on their own 30 yard line and moved to the 29 yard line of Eastland. Then with a pass from Ballinger Quarter back Billy Jernigan to Johnny Hoffman for a 29 yard completion and the touchdown. The try for PAT was no good.

Eastland received the Ballinger kickoff on the Eastland 39 yard line and with Lund passing to Rexroat who carried down to the Ballinger 43 yard line. Then Lund turned to Butch Eidson for a 343 yard pass play to carry it to the 1 foot line of Ballinger. Ron McClesky took the hand off from Craig Lund and carried in for the TD with the extra point no good. With two more exchanges of the ball during the 4th quarter neither the Mavericks or the Bearcats could muster a drive that would be good enough for a score.

In the other District 8AA games, Winters beat Hamilton, 35 to 24; Coleman stomped Clyde 42 to 0; and Cisco lost to Comanche 36 to 27.

Next Friday night the Eastland Mavericks travel to Winters to meet the Blizzards. Reserved seat tickets will go on sale Wednesday morning at 9 a.m. at the High School Business Office. No Phone Calls or mail orders will be accepted.

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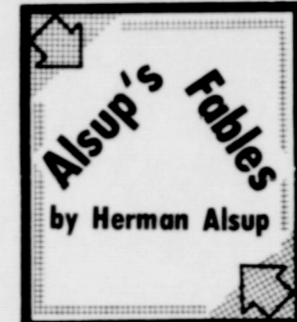
### Maverick-Blizzard Tickets Go On Sale Wednesday

Good morning! You have just received an extra hour sleep so if you haven't set your clock, run it back one hour right now. Daylight saving time is now over for another year.

This past week I was asked by a local merchant to say something about urging those people who are paid from tax money to make a greater effort to trade at home. And as a merchant and taxpayer I can understand this man's concern.

When you help pay someone's salary you cannot help but feel some justification in feeling that the money should go back to the taxpayers as much as possible.

But when you back off and take an objective view of the question it is doubtful that a person who is paid by the taxpayer has any more obligation to trade at home than does anyone else whose paycheck depends on the local economy.

Anyone who draws a paycheck supposedly does so for services rendered and consequently earns the right to spend the money as they receive their money from public or private sources.

And while this is their legal right, common sense should dictate that people should support each other for the common good of all.

The paychecks of a great many people in Eastland depend upon the economic soundness of the Eastland business community. This is true for people who are paid by tax monies as well as those who draw their checks from private businesses.

Every dollar taken from Eastland and spent elsewhere helps create jobs for people in other towns and helps pay taxes there, but does nothing to help meet the local payrolls or pay taxes.

It becomes very short sighted to think that it is not anybody's business where you spend your hard earned money, if in the end it means that your job is eliminated. And for those on public payrolls this can come even sooner than for others. If jobs are eliminated, our school enrollment falls and so does our number of teachers. If the amount of city or school taxes declines it means that some cuts must be made some place and quite often this is done in the payrolls.

If Eastland is to grow and prosper, it takes the efforts of all of us to at least make an effort to trade at home first. No one expects anybody to pay two prices for everything just to trade at home, but all too often no effort is even made to check first. Some people seem to have the idea that if it doesn't come from out of town it cannot be any good--and this seems to be true even if it is the same brand at the same price.

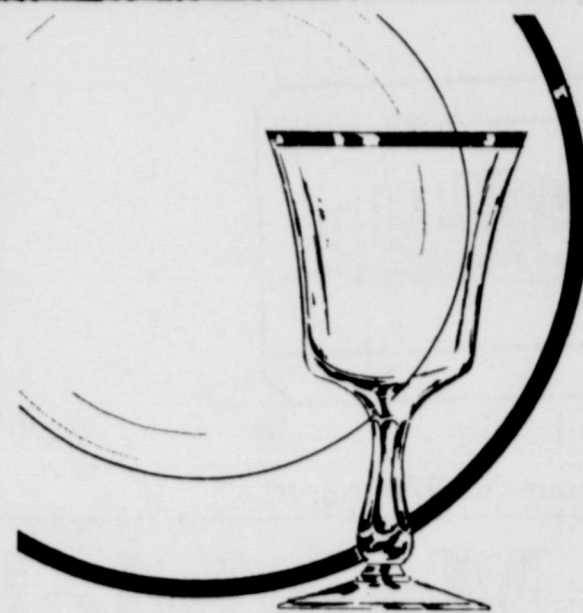

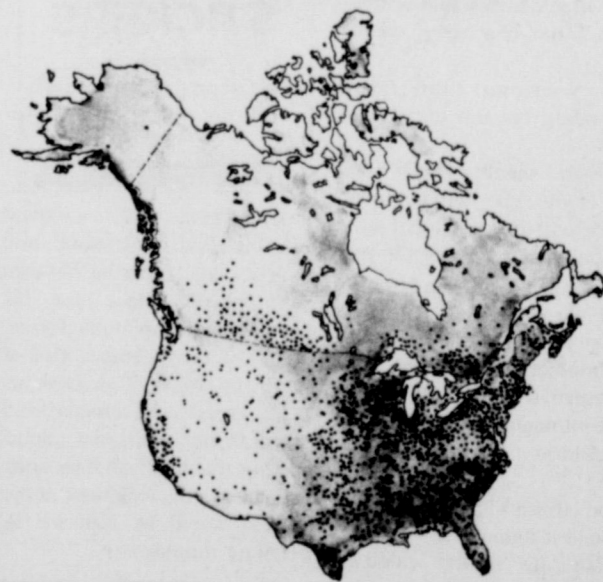

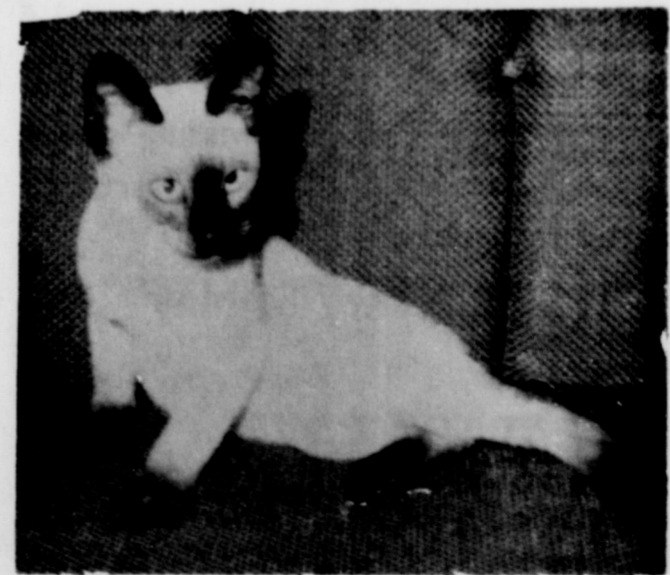

## Gordon Pot

by DeMarquis Gordon

Don't put the gardening tools away for the winter. November and the winter months are a prime gardening season.

This season is an ideal time for planting and transplanting trees and shrubs in the landscape. In late fall the nurseries are restocking with new plants. You will have a good supply to choose from.

November and the Thanksgiving season is the time to look around us at our natural beauty, the beauty of the autumn colored cloaked on blackjack, sweet gum, red oak, sumac, and maples, and thank God for a bountiful harvest in a land rich with beauty and goodness.

Examine closely any plants brought in the house for the winter as they may carry scale, an assortment of bugs, an occasional cutworm and other pests.

The cleaning operation should start with a yard bath for your plant. Sturdier plants can be sprayed with a garden hose and the more tender varieties may require a sink spray.

Dusting all surfaces of the plant with a n all-purpose dust such as rose or tomato dust will aid in the control of pest problems. Another method is to hold the soil in the flower pot and dip the plant head first into malathion and water mixture. Then turn it over and dip in the entire pot. The malathion and water mixture should be the same ratio as you would mix is spraying the mixture onto the plant.

With cold weather approaching you may have an insect problem in your home. Some of the most troublesome pests are earwigs, crickets, pillbugs, and certain cockroaches.

Using insecticides as a preventive measure is not recommended because of the possibility of an adverse effect on the environment. Use insecticides only when you know you need them.

A chloradane or diazinon spray applied to the outside foundation of your home will keep out most of these unwanted invaders. To control pests inside the home, use an approved commercial household formulation of insecticide.

Spraying is the best method of killing the pests. Treat the outside walls and foundation from sill to sill and about five to six inches of soil next to the foundation. Be sure to give

## A NATIVE SON WRITES FROM VIETNAM

Editor:  
Presently, I'm in Nha Trong, near the middle, on the coast of Viet Nam. I've been up here for 5 days and I'll go home tomorrow. I came up Monday to go to the dentist and had a couple of teeth filled. I guess by the time I get home, I either won't have any teeth or the Army will really have them butchered up. I have to come back down here Oct. 3 to have 2 teeth pulled and 1 filled. I really dread that, but guess that will be better when I get them out. Then today and tomorrow I've been to a conference. It was so boring I left at noon and tried to get a flight. Needless to say, I missed the flight by about 10 minutes. So I have to hang around here till tomorrow and fly out. I'm stationed at a little town called Ban Me Thot. It is about the size of Eastland - except it has about 60,000 people in it. Most are Montagnards and live in grass hooches. We have about 70 men in our team now. Last 2 months we have lost over 100 men that weren't replaced. We work under the CORDS plan, in that, we advise in Community Organization and Rural Development.

Our town is about 25 miles from Cambodian border and about 75 miles (I think) from Plei Ku. We have a col. as a province senior military commander. The weather here is Nha Trong is still very bad - rain all time - very hot and sticky. The salt is bad too as we're on the coast of South China Sea. Up at Ban Me Thot - right now it is very pleasant. Since we are in the highlands - it gets cool at night and is pleasant in the day. In Feb. they say it is cold - but in late March temp. will get up to 115 degrees maybe more. I dread that. Everywhere you look - you see ghost towns where Americans used to be. It is really bad now as most facilities have been pulled out with troops - but the larger towns have PX-etc. Rumor is that we are to get a small PX soon. I hope so. The biggest disappointment is the waste over here. The U. S. Gov't. will let the stupid gooks (Viet names) tear down good Army barracks, and buildings and use the wood to build a worthless shack or burn it for firewood - then the barracks and turn them over to the VN Army. Stupid isn't it? Last year we (U.S.) spent 4 billion on non-military aid in Viet Nam. Next year the same amount is projected. That doesn't cover our own military spending or military aid we give to the Vietnamese.

The Viet Name Army has gotten so independent that they will not accept helicopters, jeeps, weapons, planes or trucks unless they are brand

new. And our gov't is handing it over to them, hand over fist, "so they will be our friends" ha! The drug problem in my unit is good - so far as I know - we only suspect 2 people - but no proof. The other units around do have problems, but I can't tell its worse than in Germany. When U. S. officials come over here, they must stay in the Palace in Saigon or else in the Generals Briefing Room - because if they can't see the waste in this country, our gov't is in sad shape. In fact, it scares me that our gov't

Several pounds, would tend to lie on the surface or bury only partially.

The meteorites would in any case be solid, not porous, and somewhat heavy. They are silicate minerals impregnated with some metallic iron.

We urge people in these regions to be on the lookout. We do not suggest deliberate searches because our prediction of the location is admittedly not accurate.

No meteorite has ever been reported from Stephens County. We would like to see one found. Nothing is discovered from this possible fall, some might find one

might nevertheless find an old stony meteorite. These are generally brown crusted from weathering.

We are relying chiefly on observations of Morris D. White from 7 miles northwest of Cisco; J. W. Harper one mile west of Morton Valley (near Eastland); and Roy Gomez and Louis Martinex at Anger. They were the observers nearest the end.

It was surprising that the reports of detonations were not received from regions near the path end. The meteorite was traveling at supersonic speeds and should have created a shock wave. Only Mr. Harper reported a sort of boom, more like a loud pop, after the visual sighting.

Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Carte of Dudley (western Callahan County) saw the meteor beautifully. We interviewed also Richard Walker at Fort Worth. Combining their measured observations indicates the meteor first attracted general attention when it was about 35 miles high over the neighborhood of Stephenville. It traveled in a roughly northwestern course.

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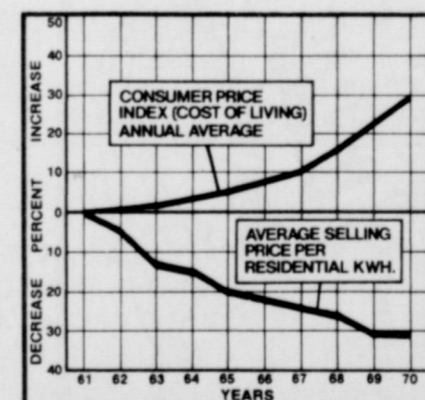

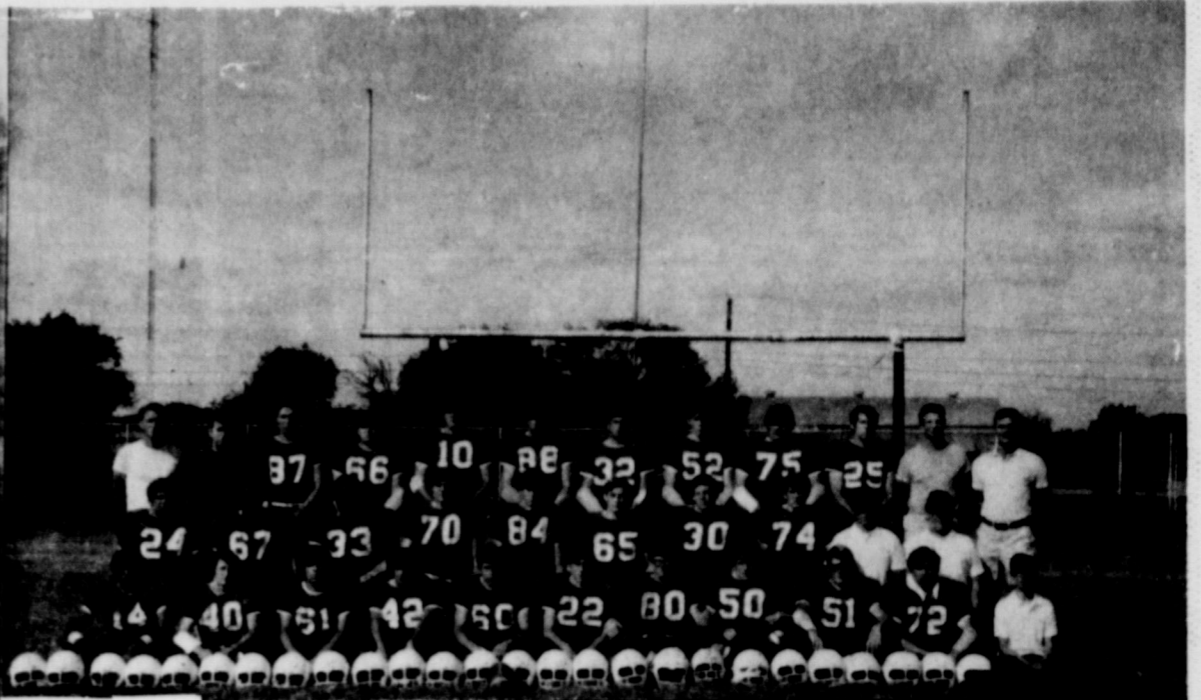

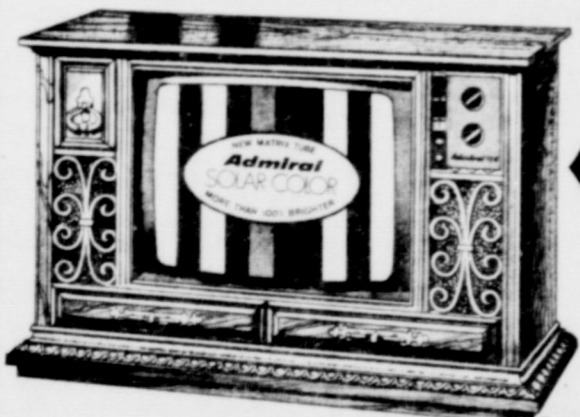
