Fire Engine Ordered.

The Committee having the matter in charge met representatives of several different companies who furnish fire fighting machinery Monday, and decided on an Automobile fire engine, built by the Webb Fire Apparatus Co. of Vincennes, Indiana. It is a 70 horse power machine, has a capacity of pumping 600 gallons of water per minute, with two lines of hose with a pressure of 150 pounds to each hose. It carries a 30 gallon chemical tank with 200 feet of hose. The engine is to be delivered here within 60 days and was bought subject to approval.

Legislative News Letter.

Special Correspondence.

Austin, Texas, March 31st. During the past week the Legislative caldron has simmered but never once reached the boiling point. Not a single bill has been sent to the Governor for signature by the special session up to the present time, except the appropriation for continent expenses which covers the pay roll of the House and Senate. The special session has already cost the tax payers of the state \$20,000 and the mill is still grinding at the rate of \$1300 per day. It must be said to the credit of the Legislative branch of the government that they have worked and worked hard and both the sub-committees and main bodies have blood on their hands and lots of it; they have slain a number of bills outright and Oslerized others, but the bill factory is running overtime with the yard full of raw material. There is now over 150 bills to consider and an average of ten bills per day is being introduced. Our Legislative plant now has a capacity of less than one bill per day. It will require at least six months to give bills of hand a separate burial or blowing into them the breath of life as the solons may elect.

The voice of the people has been heard in the Legislative halls, over 50,000 tax payers of the state having petitioned for a cessation of legislation and the press of the state has joined in the chorus "Appropriate and Vacate." It must be said to the credit of the Legislative branch of government, however that they cannot pass the appropriation bill until the Governor submits it. The bill is being held up by administration and used as a club to force other legislation. The House laughs good naturedly at the "big stick" but the Senate huris back defiance. The insurgents are thoroughly organized in the House and anything they may lack in number is more than made up in ability and in the Senate, they have always had an overwhelming majority. The feature of the week in the House was the killing of two pet measures of the administration, the Full Rendition bill which was laid beneath the daisies on a vote of 68 to 55 and the Two Cent Fare bill which met a tragic death

in the committee room. The Senate sent the Nine Jurorbill to the cemetery and spent a considerable portion of the week peppering the state with experimental stations but the House reduced the number to four stations. The Bank Deposit Guarantee bill is perhaps the most important piece of legislation now on the docket and will be taken up this week. It will have a rocky road to travel in the House but it is in the hands of experienced pilots. In the Senate the bill has few friends and if it survives the multitude of amendments which are lying in wait for it in the upper branch of the Legislature, it will deserve a position on our statute books.

The directors of the Artesian Well Company have made a deal with J. J. Cole for him to take the well and finish it up and when he gets it done the well will belong to him. Mr. Cole will leave in a few days for Roswell, New Mexico, and will bring more machinery and his sons Robert and Albert back with him, then he will go on with the well until he is satisfied. He has confidence in finding artesian water, oil or something else, or he would not have made such a deal.

The Committee is still at work on the railroad bonus and feel certain of raising the amount asked for. This will be good news to our people as well as those along the proposed route. There is some more money yet to raise and if the committee has not seen you call at either one of the banks in town and subscribe what you will give.

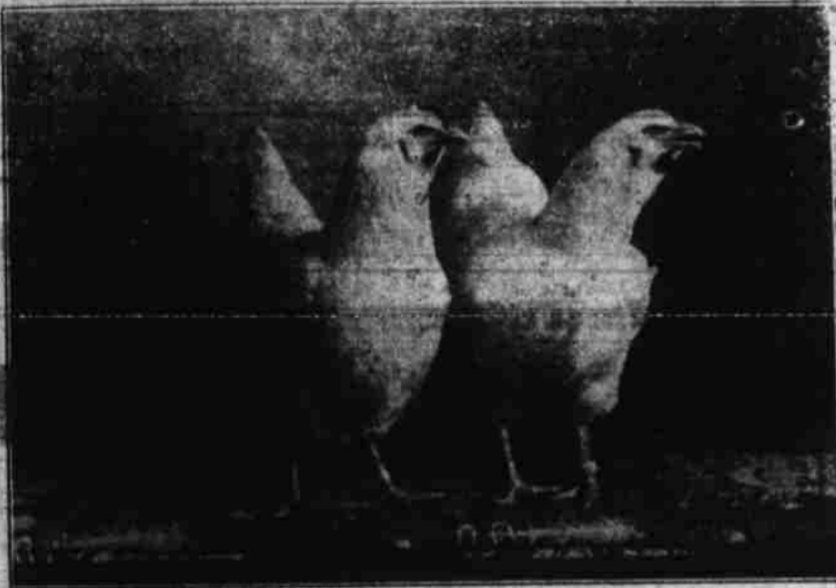

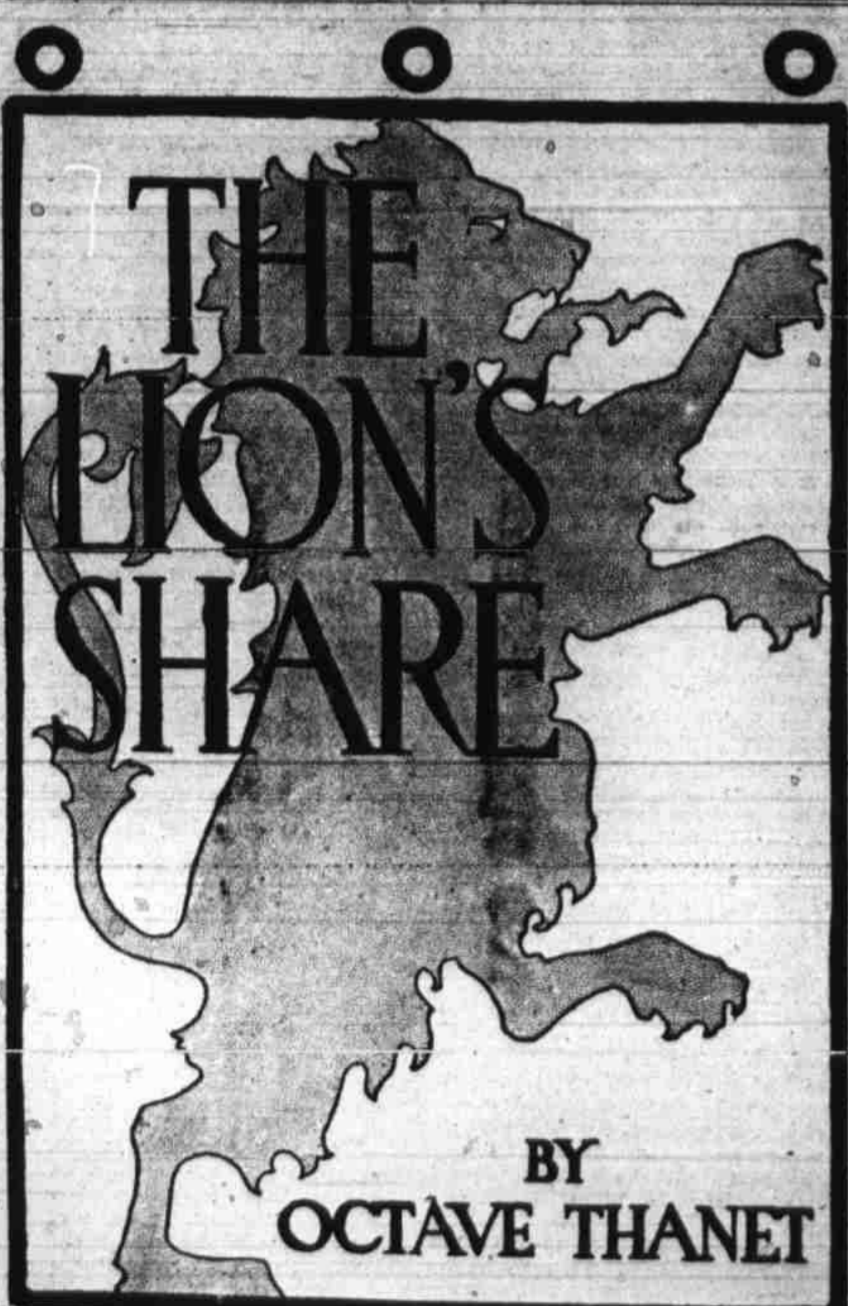
