

HELSINKI, Feb. 26 .- The Finns admitted today that the fort at Koivisto had been 'abandoned" to Russians and that troops had retreated to new positions before Viipuri.

Heavy snow along the Mannerneim line apparently had slowed the Russian advance down, with only occasional artillery fire and airplane raids reported. #### **Arnold Wanted More**

Official recognition, of a sort, was given Thurman Arnold's sweeping campaign into illegal combines among contractors and unionists in the building trades when the House appropriations committee praised the assistant attorney-general for his work.

The committee acknowledged the obvious fact that Mr. Arnold's drive against building trusts has already saved the country considerable sums and predicted that continuation of the drive will mean "savings of hundreds of millions of dollars to the consuming public."

And after this charming eulogy, the committee promptly cut off something like \$50,000 from Mr. Arnold's appropriations request, although the sum allocated was \$41,000 more than original budget estimates.

The committee knows it is true that building costs for the small home owner will fall substantially if Mr. Arnod can continue and oroaden his campaign. Billions of United States dollars have been spent far more carelessly than Mr. Arnold is spending his comparatively small allotment. It would have been better to give the assistant attorneygeneral what he needs and let him return it a hundredfold by reducing building costs.

Quail May Be Purchased For the past several years the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster of the area will be made Commission has cooperated with such order is placed with Texas sportsmen and their clubs Game Department. who were interested in purchasing quail to stock certain areas that Dallas Newspaper have a low quail population. There have been about 20,000 trapped in Mexico each year and sold to the sportsmen at one dollar each, this being approximately the actual cost of trapping and shipping one bird. As in past years the Game Department will give one quail to every sportsmen who buys one as long as the supply holds out. At this rate the actual cost will be about 50 cents per bird.

The Department will not make less than a shipment of two crates to an order. Therefore any group may get together and order jointly if less than a crate of 25 birds is desired by one person.

It is necessary, however, for one to order birds that the place on which the birds are going to be released must be inspected by an employee of the Game Department for favorable habitat before birds are shipped. of Representatives will have a new scoreboard for the. 1941 legislative seasoon.

Like a parimutuel board at race tracks, it will be operated mechanically, to show results.

On the board the names of the representatives appear in rows. Like the old electric board that has been in use in the house for 18 years, it will record all votes, but will make the permanent record by perforations. The old board photographed the vote for a record.

Smaller boards on either side will advise members of the status of the voting just as the speaker now is advised by a small recording board on his desk. Whether this will be an advantage remains to be demonstrated. It may cause a rush of votes to the popular side or it may give a member the advantage of refusing to go on record, if he sees the proposition will be decided the way he wishes without his vote.


