Steel's 100th Anniversary

This year the steel industry is marking its Centennial. Steel plants across the land are planning programs and ceremonies to focus attention on the 100th Birthday of our most basic industry.

Were it not for two inventive geniuses—an American and an Englishman—the "Steel Age" might not have begun a hood. Available now. 1306 South

While steel has been made in small quantities since Oak ancient times, the inventions of William Kelly of the United States, and Sir Henry Bessemer of England, made it possible to produce large tonnages of steel speedily and economically

It was Kelly and Bessemer, thousands of miles apart, who developed almost simultaneously the process of blowing air through molten iron to remove certain impurities. Although Bessemer was honored by having the steelmaking process named after him, it is generally conceded that Kelly, a native of Pittsburgh, conceived the idea in FOR RENT: Three room furnish-1847. A good researcher, Kelly was a poor businessman and ed air-conditioned house. Close in, neglected to patent his process.

Bessemer, who had received his English patent on the process in 1855, applied for and obtained his American patent in 1856. As soon as Kelly learned of the Bessemer patents he filed claim of priority of invention. In 1857 Kelly was granted a patent on the process after demonstrating the priority of his claim. Further evidence of the validity of Kelly's claim came when both patents ran out in 1870. Kelly's patent was extended while Bessemer's U. S. patent was denied.

The Bessemer converter was slow in being introduced, but once it was put to use its tremendous impact on steelmaking was quickly evident. Where only about 3000 tons Witt's Babccek Bessie White Legof steel was made by the Bessemer process in 1867, by horn pullets. These are proven 1888, the year Kelly died, production by this process was nearly 3,000,000 tons a year.

As the steel industry grew, so grew agriculture, manufacturing, transportation, construction, communications and other elements of our industrial life. It might be said that here in America the Kelly-Bessemer process became the key for opening a new and better life for all of us.

little tin shed to atoms. The blast broke some windows in downtown Eastland. Tom Earnest was driving from Ranger to Eastland on the other side of Olden said he saw the smoke shooting upward from that dist-

Needless to say, after that blast, the Mavericks brought the game to an end as rapidly as possible, and themselves to find out

what had happened. The players of both teams were saddened to learn that a fine young boy had so tragically lost his life in the accident.




