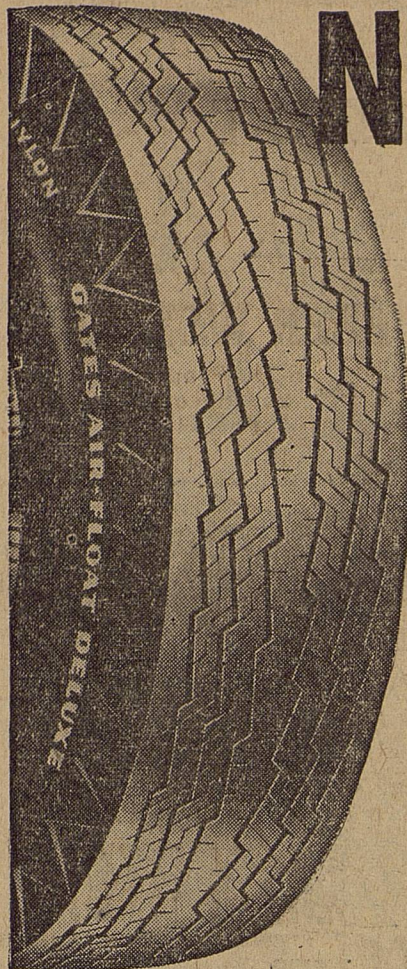

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Frank Judkins was a lawyer in Eastland in the 1920's. Of the 52 members of the Eastland bar, he was probably the best jury speaker. He was close to six feet in height, heavy-set, with dark clothes that were not too well pressed—a jury would have resented a dandy. He had rather luxuriant hair, with one lock that curled over his brow.

In addressing a jury, when he made a strong assertion, he would thrust out his jaw, his dark eyes would flash and that lock of hair would shake like the mane of an angry lion. While the prosecuting attorney was questioning the State's witnesses, Judkins would sit with half-closed eyes and would smile, now and then in disbelief at some statement, and would placidly chew tobacco. But when it came time for him to cross-examine, he underwent a complete change. Gone was the air of Semi-sleepiness and his eyes became alert and when he uncovered a chink in the witness' story, he would lean forward and his questions would crackle.

He would maneuver, in the course of the case, to place the accusing witness or the prosecuting attorney on trial and would picture his client as the victim of emity, conspiracy or the ambition of the district attorney to make a "record".

On one occasion, Judkins defended a man who was accused of having gone into a man's place of business and beating him over the

head with a club. (They were on opposite sides in a bitter political fight.) The injured man had bled copiously but his wounds had healed completely by the time of the trial. The selection of the jury and the taking of testimony required two days and, throughout that time, Judkins slowly whittled on a stick with a pocket-knife. The State rested, Judkins then placed the defendant on the stand and that individual identified the stick which Judkins had as the one used in striking the complaining witness. The stick did not impress the jury as being a very dangerous weapon—they overlooked the fact that the lawyer had been whittling on it for two days before their very eyes—and they returned a verdict of acquittal.

Once, when Judkins was going to introduce a State candidate, he was asked by a newspaperman for an advance copy of his remarks. He replied, "I never know what I am going to say until I start speaking."

He addressed a jury without notes, finding his inspiration in the zest of conflict, with a man's liberty of life at stake. He studied the faces of the jurors and when he found it necessary, he elaborated a point, and when he saw he had won acceptance of a contention, he passed on to another.

Judkins did not stride up and down nor did he bellow, although his naturally powerful voice rang out. He waxed sarcastic, indignant or emotional, depending on whether he was tearing into the testimony of an opposing witness or denouncing the conduct of the deceased who had forced his client to kill him, or picturing the happy little home to which the jury should return the prisoner. Which the jury usually did.

As a newspaperman looking for "good copy" and as an individual, I liked Frank Judkins very much.

June 30 Last Day to Apply for Social Security Disability

More than one hundred thousand severely disabled people in communities all over the Nation will receive their first social security disability insurance checks in August, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the Abilene Social Security office, which services this county as part of its sixteen county district.

But many other eligible disabled workers 50 to 65 years of age, some of them no doubt living hereabouts, have so far failed to make application to the social security office. Those who have been disabled for work for a long time must apply before June 30, Tuley pointed out, or they will lose their rights to these new benefit payments.

Any severely disabled person who has worked under social security for at least 5 years and who has been disabled for 6 months or more should get in touch with his social security office right away, the social security district manager said.

If he is between 50 and 65 years of age, he may be eligible to have his social security record frozen to protect his future right to disability payments, and also his and his family's rights to old-age and survivors insurance benefits.

"Unfortunately there is a lot of misunderstanding," Tuley said, "as to how disabled a worker has to be to get social security disability insurance benefits or to have his social security record frozen. The rules in the social security law for deciding whether a person is 'disabled' are different from the rules in some other Government and private disability programs."

To be found "disabled" under the social security law, he said, a worker must have a disability which, in the words of the law, makes him unable "to engage in any substantial gainful activity." It must be the kind of physical or mental condition which shows up in the medical evidence, including his doctor's report, hospital reports, or special tests. It must have lasted for at least 6 months and be expected to continue for a long

and indefinite time.

In general, he said, "substantial gainful activity" means the performance of a substantial amount of work with reasonable regularity in employment or self-employment. A person does not have to be completely helpless to qualify under the social security disability provisions, Tuley emphasized. Consideration is given to all of the facts in the individual's situation, both medical and non-medical.

A person might work occasionally or intermittently and this would not necessarily mean that he was not to engage in substantial gainful activity. Both the nature of the work and the amount of money he earned would have to be considered.

A post card or letter mailed immediately to Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas, stating, "I want to file disability claim", bearing a signature and mailing address will keep any interested reader from losing out because of the deadline.

Motorists Play Dangerous Game of Cops & Drivers

"Too many motorists play the game of Cops and Drivers!" So said J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

The safety expert asserted that drivers and pedestrians who are always cheating in traffic are the real accident makers.

"Fortunately," he said, "most motorists and pedestrians obey traffic laws and regulations most of the time. If they didn't, our accident rates would soar to even greater heights."

Statistics show that traffic law violators figure largely in traffic fatalities. In four out of five fatal accidents one or more driver violations are reported.

"Many of these violators feel that only suckers obey the laws. They know all the angles and short cuts. You know these characters—the ones who always overdrive the posted speed limits. They jump the red lights at intersections. They weave from lane to lane and sneak by on your right if you slow down at an intersection. They never really stop at stop signs.

Citing the record, Musick said the most frequent violations reported in fatal traffic accidents are excessive speed, failure to yield the right of way, failure to keep to the right of the center line and disregard of an officer or traffic control device.
