Around Muleshoe

Local police received a call at 7:44 a.m. Friday to go to the home of Francisco Vasquez on East Third Street. On arrival, Muleshoe City Police Chief Johnny Richards, Lt. Jerry Hicks and Detective Hal Bynum found the 36 year old resident dead. He had moved to Muleshoe in 1972 from Big Springs.

He was pronounced dead at the scene by Bailey County Judge Glen Williams. It was determined that he died around midnight to 1 a.m. Friday of natural causes.

Services are pending contact with his family in Mexico.

A memorial fund has been established at the Muleshoe State Bank by the Class of '75 in memory of Maribeth Dillman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Neal B. Dillman.

Contributions to the fund may be made at the bank.

Mrs. Edna Johnson, 61, of Anchorage, Alaska, died November 10. She was a sister of Mrs. Roy Wrinkle of Muleshoe.

Funeral services are scheduled for 10 a.m. tomorrow, Monday, at Elliott Memorial Chapel in Abilene.

Late Thursday afternoon, the Farwell School Bus, pictured at left, slammed into a pickup, shown at right, at an intersection near Oklahoma Lane. Six persons were injured from the two vehicles. Three were hospitalized, and three were treated at hospitals and released. Law Enforcement officers, ambulances, fire departments and the general citizenry flocked to the site of the 4:35 p.m. crash. Emergency vehicles were hampered by onlookers and anxious parents who virtually blocked all entrances and exits to the location of the two vehicle wreck.

School Bus - Pickup Wreck Hospitalized 3

Tragedy was narrowly averted around 4:35 p.m. Thursday, when a Farwell school bus with only two persons, including the driver, was involved in an accident with a pickup near Oklahoma Lane.

According to DPS records from Farwell, the report concerning the accident was received at 4:40 p.m. in Farwell. Ambulances, officers and fire department personnel were immediately dispatched to

the wreck site one half mile north of the Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church.

Six persons were injured in the accident, including four persons in the pickup. Driver of the bus, Marianne Price and her daughter, Tonya Steele, were both taken by ambulance to Cannon AFB Hospital at Clovis to be hospitalized for treatment.

Jesse Ratana, driver of the pickup, was treated and released. His wife, Antonita Ratana, was brought by ambulance to West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe for emergency treatment before being transferred on to a Lubbock Hospital.

Carmelita Ratana, two and Mickey Ratana, one, were treated and released at a hospital.

Although initial reports indicated children were pinned inside the bus, and fire departments took 'Jaws of Life' to the scene from Muleshoe, the two victims in the bus had been removed by the time firemen arrived.

Shortly after the accident occurred, the accident site was packed with anxious parents. An activity bus from Bovina had headed south on the highway toward Oklahoma Lane minutes before the accident was reported. The Bovina bus passed the accident a few minutes after it occurred.

Also, numerous law enforcement officers, who had just left a funeral in Bovina for retired Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter, were in the area and immediately responded to assist with

City, County Receive Mixed Drink Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said sales of mixed drinks in Texas during the third quarter of 1980 pushed the yearly total during the first nine months to more than \$700 million.

Bullock said mixed drink taxes were collected during July, August and September to total more than \$24.2 million. There were \$22.1 million and \$23.6 million collected during the first and second quarters.

He said his office is mailing checks totaling \$7 million to 212 Texas counties and 366 cities as their share of the 10 percent gross receipts tax on mixed drinks for the third quarter.

Bullock said continued growth in the sales of mixed drinks for the remainder of the year could push total sales in Texas this year to nearly a billion dollars.

The state's General Revenue Fund will receive \$17.2 million of the tax money collected during the third quarter.

Texas cities and counties receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized mixed drink sales.

Cold, Dry Weather Invades This Area

Icy temperature, no higher than 35 degrees, provided a cold, damp setting for Friday night football, following the same type of weather during the day on Friday, when the high temperature failed to break the 40 degree mark in this area.

Despite low clouds, no moisture fell during the day on Friday, although a light drizzle fell during the early morning hours.

While this area had only the snappy, cold temperature, up to three inches of snow was record around Dumas and to the north and west from there.

The first major cold snap for this year was predicted to end on today, Sunday, with a gradual warming trend moving in. In the meantime, football fans who planned to travel to Lubbock for the traditional rivalry between the Texas Tech Red Raiders and the SMU Mustangs were warned to take an extra blanket to the ball game.

By Friday night, the temperature was slowing sinking downward, mark-

ing the first major cold spell for the area, although no measurable precipitation was predicted by National Weather Service.

Early Childhood Class Slated In Local School

In the near future, Muleshoe Independent School District will begin an Early Childhood Class for three and four year old handicapped children.

This class is scheduled to begin January 5, 1981, at Richland Hills Elementary, according to Mrs. Harold Horne.

To be eligible for this class, the child must be tested to determine the handicapping condition. The most common handicap for children this age is speech, said Mrs. Horne.

Other handicaps include deaf, blind, physically handicapped, mentally retarded, emotionally handicapped, and developmental delay.

'Cat Defense Checks Mules Running Game

Friday night, the football season ended for the Muleshoe Mules. It ended on a football field in Littlefield, before a packed house of Muleshoe and Littlefield football fans.

With the temperature in the mid-30's at gametime, and a light wind blowing heaving smoke from a nearby industrial plant across the field, the Mules lost the battle to the Littlefield Wildcats, 35-0.

A full house on both sides of the football field watched a scoreless first half as the two teams tried each other out. Littlefield defensive players most effectively shut off the running game of Felix Norman, and held Charles Walker to approximately one half of his usual game yardage.

In the second quarter, following the scoreless first quarter, a Mule fumble in Wildcat territory set up the Wildcats first touchdown of the game, and the momentum went to the Wildcats.

Littlefield QB Eddie Gregory found Michael Williams in the end zone on an 18 yard touchdown pass, and Jim Burks booted in his first of five extra points for the game.

Following a bad snap to Mule punter Wesley Rasco, and the ball being downed by Rasco on the one, Gregory went in on a quarterback sneak for the 'Cats second score.

At halftime in the game, the Mules were facing a 0-14 deficit when they went into the locker rooms.

Following halftime activities, the teams again took to the field and the Wildcats managed two more scores in the third quarter. The first was set up on a long pass which covered 45 yards to the one, then Williams went in from the one.

The second third quarter touchdown was a 25 yard pass play from Gregory to Marty Drake.

Late in the third, Bobby Perez intercepted a Gregory pass in the end zone to

shut off another possible 'Cat touchdown.

In the fourth, Joseph Ayala caught a Gregory pass between two Mule defenders and his 14 yard touchdown was called back on a penalty, but the Wildcats managed their fifth touchdown of the game when Williams slammed over from the two.

During the game, the Littlefield defense held the Mules to a total of 118 yards, which racking up 252 yards.

Also, the Wildcats had 18 first downs to five for the Mules and had 40 yards in penalties to 25 yards for Muleshoe.

Muleshoe punted seven times to four times for Littlefield. Mules quarterback Monty Hysinger completed six of 13 passes for 58 yards, and Littlefield quarterback Eddie Gregory completed six of nine passes for 121 yards.

Leading rusher for Littlefield was Michael Williams with 100 yards and Charles Walker was the Mules

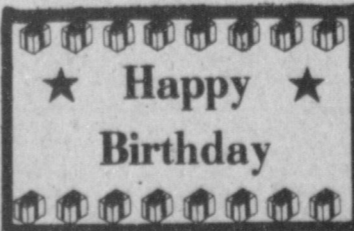

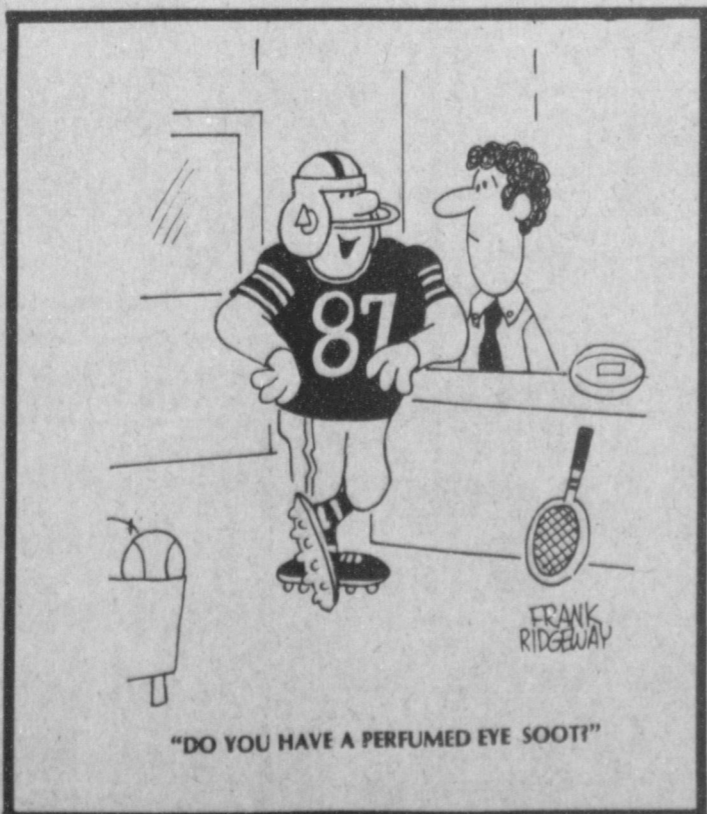
The Mules dominated the home field Thursday. Scoring six touchdowns to Friona's two, the Freshmen won 42-14.


Look Up and Live!

Cotton harvest is here and the Coop urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.



In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.

We have had line torn down with cotton harvesting equipment this year. Also, some incidents have resulted in injury to the operators; but, fortunately, no fatalities so far.

If some piece of equipment does contact these 7200 volt overhead lines, it's important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (Area Code 806) 272-4504 whether the line is broken or not.

Safety has always been one of the first rules of any well-run farm operation. An increasing number of vehicles on the farm, as well as in town, are using gasohol and ag safety specialists have asked that some special precautionary steps be taken since gasohol (10% alcohol - 90% gasoline) is 35 percent more volatile than gasoline alone. 1) Be sure and use a vented gas tank cap. Check it to make sure it works properly.

2) Never smoke while refueling.


3) Don't refuel when the motor is hot if your tank is mounted anywhere near the engine.

4) Check gaskets, hoses and seals for any sign of leaks on a regular basis and always keep in mind the increased volatility of the fuel.


