## Ambulance Personnel Are Trained, Dedicated

They are highly qualified -- these girls and young men who run around in the ambulance these days. Despite the fact they are young, and most of them are female, their qualifications are unmatched locally.

Training to become an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) is not easy, it takes a lot of hours, a lot of hard work, and is very involved.

DeAnna Rasco, EMT, is coordinating the ambulance service at this time from West Plains Medical Center.

Mrs. Rasco, along with Tyree Stevens, respiratory therapist for West Plains Medical Center and Royce Harris, all attended EMT training for three months last year.

Other EMT's Larry Rasco, Misti Prater, and Wayne Wauson, attended EMT training for three months in Bovina during the first part of 1983.

They are joined by Sue Alexander, EMT and operating room technician for West Plains Medical Center; Faye Houston, LVN and Richell King, LVN.

Except for Mrs. Rasco, who is employed by West Plains Medical Center, the others are volunteers on the ambulance.

All hold full time jobs and 'man' the ambulance 24-hours a

day, seven days a week on a voluntary basis.

They are willing to give up their free time, time for vacations, weekends and holidays to make sure local residents have an ambulance ready to roll at a moment's notice.

"We are dedicated to this," said Larry Rasco, president of the local EMT organization. We want to help in some way and this is the way we have chosen to help the community where we live.

"Our community needs our service and we all give 100 percent to this. We want people to have quality care, and we don't allow anyone to work with us who is not thoroughly trained."

Training to become an EMT

involved 120 hours of classroom work; 40 hours in the emergency room of a hospital (most of the local EMT's spent their emergency room hours at the hospital in Clovis); along with four ambulance calls (most of these were in Amarillo).

They also have to have updated training, with 100 hours required every four years.

Rasco and Ms. Alexander are also CPR Instructors as well as instructors in Multi-Media. Sue Alexander also holds the National Certification in EMT.

Ms. Alexander, who is in the operating room at the hospital, said she is on constant call at the hospital, but can make emergency runs on the ambulance. Mrs. Stevens, who is respiratory Con't Page 6, Col. 4

## Cruelty To Animals Filed Here Friday

On Friday evening, following the discovery of two dead horses, a mare and a colt, about two and a half miles north of Muleshoe on SH 214, charges of 'Cruelty To Animals' were filed against a local man, and 29 horses were taken into protective custody.

Gail Gallagher and Carol King

from the Humane Society in Lubbock filed the charges against L. F. 'Les' Bruns following an investigation conducted in conjunction with the Bailey County Sheriff's office.

Bruns was arrested Friday evening on the Cruelty To Animals charge and released from custody on a \$500 bond.

Ms. Gallagher said the Lubbock Humane Society had been contacted by the Bailey County Sheriff's office on Thursday, but before they could arrive on Friday morning, the two dead horses were discovered in a ditch near Muleshoe.

Following an autopsy at the Muleshoe Animal Clinic, Ms. Gallagher said the charges were filed on recommendation of the veterinarian who did the autopsy on the animals.

According to the autopsy report, the animals had starved to death, said Ms. Gallagher.

The Humane Society officials said the local sheriff's office reported receiving several calls about the horses during the last three weeks, prompting the call to the Humane Society to conduct the investigation.

The charges against Bruns constitute a 'Class A Misdemeanor' covered by Section 42.11 and carries a penalty as follows:

A fine not to exceed \$2000; or confinement in jail for a term not to exceed one year; or both fine and imprisonment.

Also, according to state law, within ten days a hearing will be held on the courthouse steps, said Ms. Gallagher, and the animals will be auctioned. However, according to the Humane Society officials, the owner of the animals or any of their representatives cannot buy the animals.



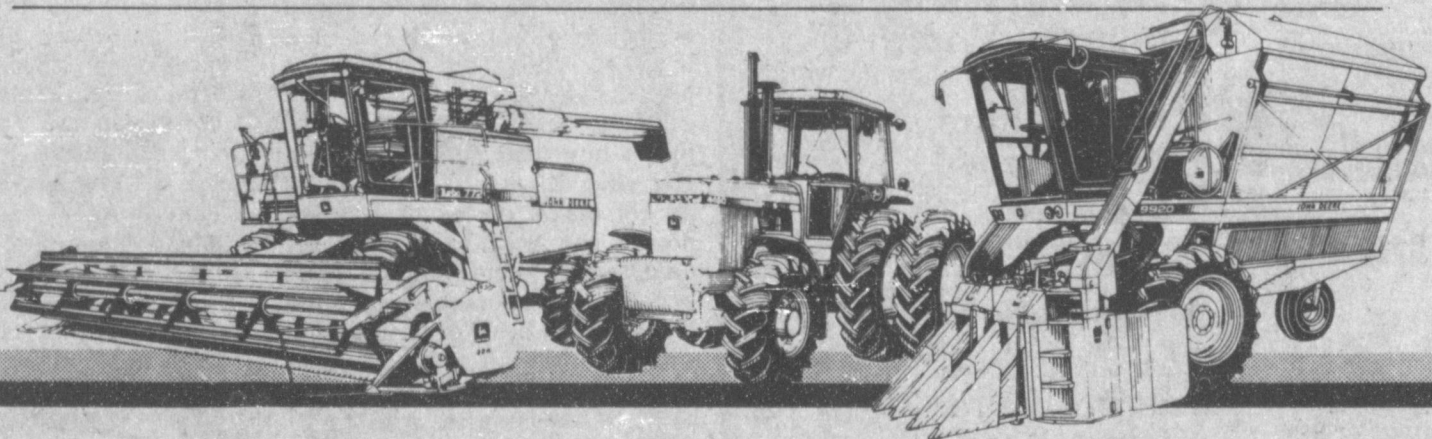

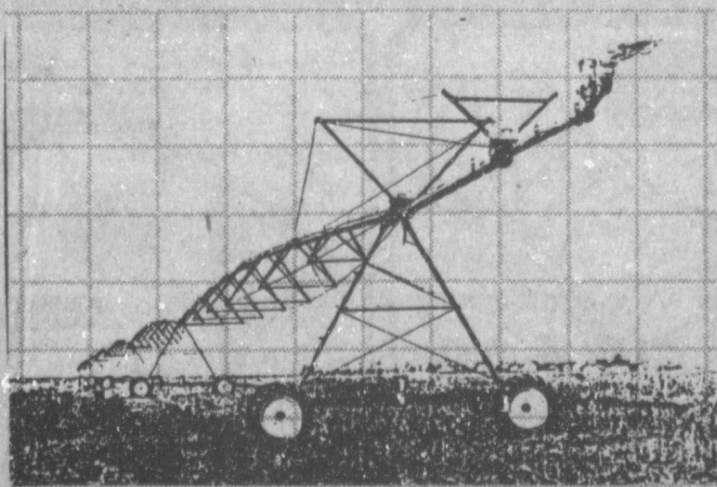

# Texas Folklife Festival

## Scheduled At San Antonio

Texas is a child of two worlds, old and new, and the best of both.

It was as if East did indeed meet West, they married, and from their union the Texas legacy was born, the wealth of which far surpasses popular images of 10-gallon hats and rhinestone cowboys, hard hats and oil barons.

This legacy of the true Texas, the one created over generations, is brought to light and life at the Texas Folklife Festival, August 2-5, sponsored by The University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

At the Festival, nearly 6,000 participants from across the state

represent the more than 30 ethnic groups who settled and built Texas. They come to share with more than 100,000 visitors that hallmarks and keepsakes of their culture: artifacts and arts and crafts; traditional tunes and folk dances; "vittles" and haute cuisine; tall tales and true stories.

Having fun at the Festival is easy and visitors are encouraged to do so, but the event is more than "festive," and its mission more than merriment. In the tradition of festivals of old, the Texas Folklife Festival has a broader significance.

An extension of the Institute's educational programs, the Festival pays tribute to the courage and resourcefulness of our Texas ancestors, who left the security of a world entirely familiar to start a new life in one completely foreign.

Each of the ethnic and cultural groups brings to the Festival a bit of what their ancestors struggled to recreate on the Texas frontier--home, as it was in the old country. For example, the high-arched facades on which are painted elegant Middle Eastern motifs herald the Lebanese area; the cozy establishment with the Tudor trim is the handiwork of the proprietors of the British Pub; and the graceful windmill and whitewashed island skyline draw visitors to the Greek booth.

The international menu, which includes both exotic and down-home dishes, attests to the culinary creativity of people all over the world. Visitors may try Jewish falafel (pita bread with stuffing), Spanish gambas al ajillo (shrimp in garlic), Irish stew, Mexican favorites, sausage, egg rolls, shish-ka-bobs, breads of every kind, and much more.

Festival performers aim to do more than entertain. Representing nearly every corner of the globe and all kinds of music, they turn the Festival's 10 stages into a whirl of excitement and a colorful exhibition of culture and tradition.

Explanations of the history and significance of various songs and dances are an important part of the program, and many groups invite visitors to dance or sing along. For instance, the Filipino dancers, known for their exquisite costumes and choreography, encourage visitors to attempt the intricate and spirited tinkling dance, performed by stepping in and out of two bamboo poles as they are beat together in time with the music.

Though most people can only imagine what life was like across the ocean hundreds of years ago, much of the rustic, frontier lifestyle of early Texas endures in rural areas throughout the state and in our memories. In the "Back 40" area of the Festival, recollections of life in the country and living on the land come readily and vividly to mind.

The smell of smoke, grass and hay; the sight of gingham and sunbonnets, cotton overalls and straw hats; the look and feel of

the rough-hewn furniture and buildings; the sound of boisterous children playing and industrious adults going about

their chores--all these take visitors back to the early days of Texas.

As illustrated by the Festival,

no matter how modern we become those who came before will always be a part of us. The many groups who founded the Lone Star State have handed down their cultural heirlooms--arts, crafts, music, dance and food--over many generations, and they are a priceless part of the Texas legacy. The Folklife Festival offers today's Texans, natives and newcomers alike, the opportunity to share remem-

brances of Texas' proud past, and more fully appreciate its rich heritage.

Tickets for the Texas Folklife Festival are \$5 for adults and \$1 for children ages 6-12; children under 6 are admitted free. **A&M Press publishes a cowboy's memoirs**

**COLLEGE STATION** — A yearning for the days when ranching and cowboying were a way of life instead of another business — when values were as important to pass along as skills — has prompted an old cowboy to collaborate on a new book just published by the Texas A&M University Press.

Longtime West Texas rancher Ted Gray of Alpine told his stories to freelance writer Barney Nelson and the result is "The Last Campfire," (\$12.50, 171 pages) with illustrations by Michael Capron.

Gray began his ranching career during the Depression and gradually earned his own land and cattle while working for the Kokernot 06 Ranch near Alpine.

The desire to pass along a lifetime of knowledge prompted Gray to contact Nelson about working together on his memoirs — a desire for the book to be Gray's "last campfire" around which old cowboys pass along their wisdom, wit and philosophy.

**Breakaway utility poles tested at A&M**

**COLLEGE STATION** — Within a year, safety demonstrations using new breakaway wooden utility poles developed at Texas A&M University may be conducted in three states by the Federal Highway Administration.

As part of the FHWA-sponsored research, crash tests by the Texas Transportation Institute headquartered at Texas A&M showed that the breakaway pole performed as designed when struck by a vehicle, said Dr. Don Ivey, TTI associate director and principal investigator on the program.

The pole slipped free at its base, rotated about the knee or hinge connection to the electric lines, and settled to the ground after the automobile passed underneath, leaving the utility lines intact.

About 2,000 people die each year in the United States from injuries received when their vehicles strike utility poles, Ivey said.

About 100 utility poles, designed to prevent deaths and injuries when hit by vehicles, will be demonstrated in candidate states.

**Texas A&M group studies problems of elderly citizens**

**COLLEGE STATION** — A recently formed interdisciplinary group at Texas A&M University is studying ways that engineers, architects, social scientists, home economists and medical educators can cooperate in building a better life for the elderly, especially in housing.

Working from surveys of senior citizens, the Interdisciplinary Group on Gerontological Research will sponsor graduate level studies dealing with specific problems the elderly say they have in house design, said Dr. Robert Stone, Texas A&M's Dean of Medicine and director of the College of Medicine's Institute for Health Care Technology which is funding some of the research projects.

Many of the elderly in nursing home or single-person apartment settings prefer designs different from those taken for granted by the rest of the population, according to a pilot survey of senior citizens in a Baytown health care facility.

Several research projects by industrial engineering graduate students are being funded by the institute — including a study of layout and dimensions of kitchens for the elderly and wheelchair-bound, a review of cooking devices and related work areas preferred by the elderly, a comparison of chair and sofa design for comfort and limited movement, and an examination of how washer-dryer design could be improved to reduce bending and increase access by people in wheelchairs.

therapist, can be called off the floor to make emergency ambulance calls, as well as transfer calls, and is usually requested to go, especially when an R.N. is required.

Response time for the ambulance is very good, but the operators said it will even be getting better. For instance, Friday afternoon, the ambulance had a call to the Lazbuddie vicinity.

From the time the ambulance left the hospital at Muleshoe, along with a 17 mile, plus, drive, then return the patient to Muleshoe, total time for the trip was 21 minutes.

Along with the ambulance drive, the patient had an IV started checked for vital signs, and with Dr. Bruce Purdy on the radio giving instructions for the attendant, Richell King, and driver, Larry Rasco, the patient, who was critically ill, was safely transported to the hospital and to the intensive care unit.

The ambulance is in constant contact with the hospital when it is in use, and the driver and attendant(s) can get immediate instructions as well as relay the condition, symptoms and vital signs of any patient aboard.

Work for the ambulance attendants does not end when the patient is taken off the stretcher in the emergency room of the hospital. With instruction from the attending doctor, the ambulance personnel continue to help with emergency treatment, including CPR, and monitoring vital signs.

"The doctors have been wonderful to us," said Rasco. "We work with them, and they are all willing to work with us. This way we can give even more to quality care for the patients we are transporting."

Another area continuing to help with the ambulance service are the local law enforcement officers. In the past, the officers, who are already on duty and in their patrol vehicles have always assisted with ambulance calls.

"I would like to personally thank all the law enforcement officers who block traffic, help us load patients, show us addresses, as they usually arrive at the site of an emergency first, and

continue to assist us and work with us. We certainly appreciate the police and police dispatchers who really go all out working with us," added Rasco.

Bystanders are also utilized by the ambulance crew. Under supervision, they help lift patients, get the stretcher and help with crowd control. "We find that people are willing to help," said Mrs. Rasco. "They just need to be asked to help, and we show them how to help."

In one recent case, in an accident in a feedlot, five men who were there were instructed how to help lift a man who was suspected as having a broken back. The men helped load the man after he had been secured to a board.

He was taken to West Plains Medical Center for emergency treatment, then transferred to Lubbock. Hospital personnel in Lubbock said the care given the man initially, before he was moved the first time, probably saved his life.

The attendant? DeAnna Rasco; along with Carver Light. Mrs. Rasco was given the job of driver for the transfer to Lubbock, with attendants, Faye Houston, LVN, and Tyree Stevens, respiratory therapist.

Along with learning how to treat a patient with kindness, the EMT's learn CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation); Obstructed Airways; Emergency Childbirth; Extrication (taught by Wayne Wauson); Mechanical Aid Breathing; Splinting and Bandaging; Radio Communications; Signs and Symptoms (Medical Emergencies); Trauma Treatment; Impaled Objects; Eye Damage Treatment; Burns and Poisons, and other medical emergencies.

They are seeking other potential volunteers, and ask that any EMT persons interested in helping with the ambulance, contact Mrs. Rasco at the hospital or Larry Rasco.

Since the changeover to West Plains Medical Center, various items of equipment are being added to the ambulance, items which will help save lives as the ambulance personnel make their runs. However, all items will have to be approved by the commissioners of Bailey County, who own both ambulances and

subsidize the operation as they did when it was operated by Ellis Funeral Home.
