New State Legislation Will Be Explained

Are you interested in education? What about the future for your child and your school? Wonder where your school taxes are going and what they're paying for? Like to know more about the curriculum reform law (House Bill 246, passed in 1981, and now implemented) and House Bill 72 passed in the Special Legislature this year?

in the schools, but we need to let the people know about things where we have no choice but to implement the changes."

For instance, there is no 'social promotion'; students will receive no credit if they have five unexcused absences from a class; there is no longer exemptions from final examinations, including seniors; new classrooms will have to be added to take care of students who are not allowed to be promoted, and other changes.

Superintendent Fuller said the 45 minute overview will be followed by a question and answer session. School board members and the administration will be dividing up into classrooms, and persons may visit each of the officials to question them concerning the legislation, and how it may affect their particular student.

They can explain the new career ladder for the teachers, and the testing required under HB72 for all teachers. Four levels will be used for the career ladder and under the system, it will be up to the teacher as to how far up the ladder they want to go.

A tough Idalou defense had done their homework Friday night and held the Muleshoe Mules scoreless to take a 2-3A district win, 17-0 on their home field in Idalou.

It looked at the very beginning of the game that it just might go another way as the Wildcats took the opening kickoff and on their first play from scrimmage fumbled the ball away.

Muleshoe Mule quarterback and defensive back Todd Jones recovered the fumble on the Idalou 10, but the Mules failed to punch the ball over the goal line and Idalou took over on downs.

Again in the first, Lester Burks recovered another Idalou fumble on their own 48 yard line, but one more time the Mules failed to put any points on the board.

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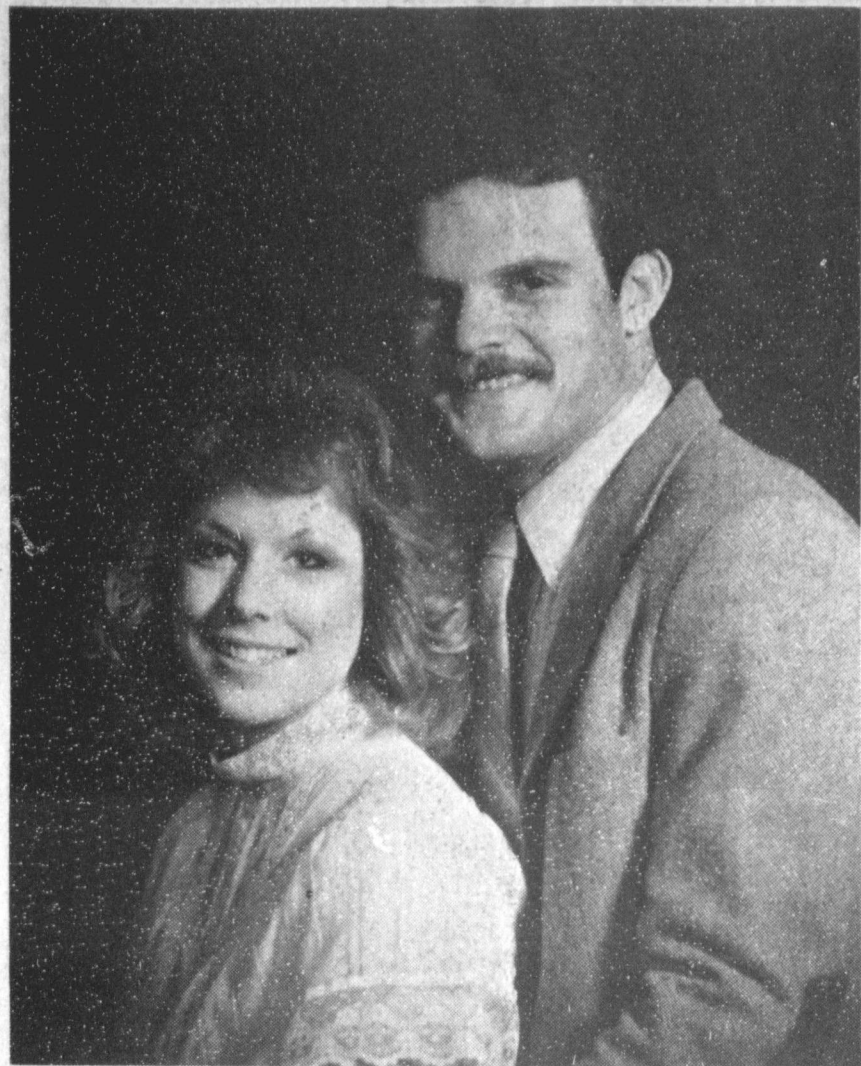

This is the money making project for the year and the money from these donations will be used in a number of projects.

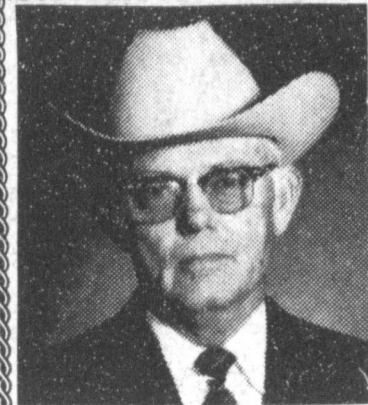

go from \$12,110 to \$16,200; and after that, they have the potential to go as high as \$33,800 in salary by moving up the four levels on the ladder.

Teachers, when hired, will be on one year probation, and may after the first year, be required to go back to school, or into a remedial program recommended by the school. Unqualified teachers will not be able to go from one school to the next in the future, without first being certified as to requirements.

The superintendent suggests that all interested persons be prepared to ask questions about any phase of the new legislation, and they can be informed as to what the school can and cannot do under the legislation.

Video tapes will be available, and a Spanish interpreter will be available for those persons who find difficulty expressing themselves or understanding the English language.

"We are reaching the point in the schools that we have a school we can be proud of," added the superintendent, "many districts are having many problems implementing the new legislation. I keep hearing this as I attend the many meetings required. Please attend the forum and learn what we have to do as mandated by the legislation."

Crane Season

Is Scheduled

Sandhill crane hunters will again have three zones in which to hunt this fall.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission added a third zone, Zone C, last year, increasing the open area for sandhill hunting to include much of South and Central Texas.

The same zone boundaries will be in effect in 1984-85, and each of the three zones will have its own season dates, which are as follows: Zone A, Nov. 10-Feb. 10; Zone B, Dec. 1-Feb. 10; and Zone C, Jan. 12-Feb. 10. The daily bag limit is three per day, six in possession, in all three zones.

A Special permit, issued free of charge by the TP&WD, is required of any person to hunt sandhill cranes in any zone. The permits are issued upon written request to Ron George, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

Ron George, in charge of the department's sandhill crane program, said crane hunting is an increasingly popular sport in much of West Texas. "The birds can be hunted in much in the same manner as geese, using rag decoys in grainfields," George said. "Sandhill cranes also are fairly good table fare when prepared correctly."

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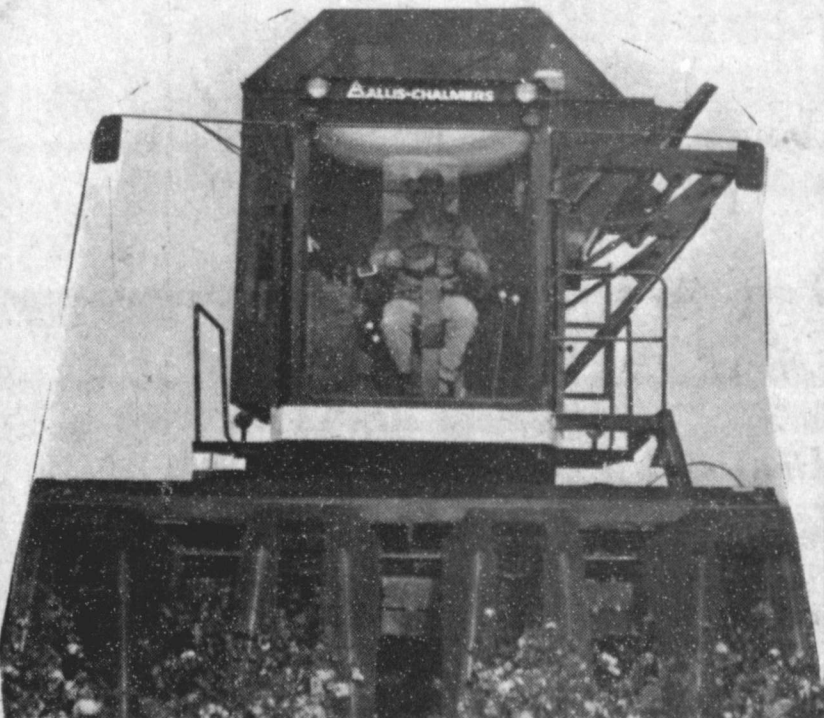

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Winterize Vehicles For Safer Driving

Major V.J. Cawthon, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "Vehicles should be winterized by replacing worn windshield wiper blades, weak batteries, tires with thin threads, and leaks in the exhaust system. Motor vehicle condition is of prime importance to traffic safety this winter!"
Many accidents and deaths are caused by driving too fast for existing conditions and

losing control of the vehicle. When temperatures drop below the freezing point, drivers must guard against reduced visibility caused by frosted windows and windshields. To prevent this condition, idle your

car long enough for it to warm up and for the defroster to become effective before starting to drive.

COLLEGE STATION — Unlike other states, Texas has retained its mystique of heroes, cowboys and the open range, a Texas A&M University review of children's literature set in the Lone Star State indicates.

Children's literature about Texas has continued in a historical and rural setting while other children's books evolved into realism, she said.

- * Do not hunt alone, and try to give snakes advance warning of your presence.
- * Never try to surprise or corner a snake.
- * Do not reach blindly into

Since getting a snakebite victim to the hospital quickly is the most important step in first aid, know in advance where medical help is located and how to reach it. Also keep a snakebite kit available. This kit should contain a constricting band, a scalpel or knife, and a suction cup. It MUST NOT CONTAIN ASPIRIN, which adversely affects blood coagulation.

Also, the South Plains Red Cross recommends that all hunters and campers be trained in First Aid. These courses are scheduled several times each month throughout the region. Persons wishing to sign up for these courses may call the South Plains Red Cross at 765-8534 in Lubbock.

1985 Farm Program Have Deadlines Set

Danny Noble, County Executive Director of the Local ASCS office, has released several items which will be of interest to all county and area producers. Included are the following:

1985 FEED GRAIN AND COTTON PROGRAM

To participate in the 1985 feed grain program, a producer must limit the planted acres to not more than 90 percent of the farm's feed grain base and devote 10 percent of the base or .1111 percent of the planted acreage to ACR (Acreage Conservation Reserve)," said Noble.

"Also, to participate in the 1985 upland cotton program, a producer must limit the planted acres to not more than 70 percent of the farm's cotton base and devote 2 percent of the base or .2857 percent of the planted acreage to ACR PLUS 10 percent of the cotton base for diverted acres for payment.

"For both programs the sign up period is October 15 to March 1, 1985. Producers may request 50 percent of the projected 1985 deficiency/diversion payment when they sign up. A producer who accepts an advance payment, then later does not comply with the program, must refund the advance payment with interest PLUS liquidated damages.

"Contracts signed by program participants will be considered as binding and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with

program requirements.

"Land designated for ACR must have been devoted to a small grain or row crop in two of the last three years and must be protected from wind and water erosion throughout the year. Cross and offsetting compliance do not apply for the 1985 program. Haying is not permitted in 1985 and grazing is not permitted from May 15 through October 14, 1985," he stated.

FmHA State Directors Advise On Farm Credit

All of the Farmers Home Administration's state directors and farmer program chiefs are reviewing plans to put into action President Reagan's farm credit initiatives to help farmers experiencing severe financial stress, J. Lynn Futch, FmHA state director for Texas said today.

J. Lynn Futch and Robert Hopper, farmer program chief for Texas, returned over the weekend from a day-long strategy session in Washington with FmHA National Administrator Charles W. Shuman and other national and state FmHA officials.

"There can be no question about the commitment of the Farmers Home Administration at all levels to put this plan to work to help those farmers with sustainable operations who are caught in a financial squeeze through circumstances beyond their control," Futch said.

Based on the agency-wide discussion of loan and guarantee details, final procedures for operation will be completed in the FmHA National Office in a matter of days. Once any legal questions are resolved, the agency then will publish the instructions and distribute them to field offices for action.

YIELD NOTICES

"We are in the process of mailing 1985 Base and Yield notices," added Noble. "A producer only has 15 days from the date of the notice to file a written appeal on the base or yield."

INTEREST RATE

The loan interest rate for October is 11.750 percent.

COMMUNITY COMMITTEE NOMINATING PETITIONS

"Nominating petitions were mailed October 4. If you wish to nominate anyone for the community committee, fill the petition out according to the instructions and return to the ASC office by October 29, 1984," concluded the county executive director.

Under the President's plan, FmHA will be able to set aside up to 25 percent -- of a maximum of \$100,000 -- of a qualifying farmers loan without interest for five years.

For farmers in financial distress who do not have FmHA loans, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a new loan if their lender is willing to write off enough of the farmer's debt to put the loan in a secured position and achieve a positive cash flow.

The key in both approaches is to restore the farmer to a positive cash flow situation. Essentially, that means to restructure the debt and reorganize the farming operation, if needed, to establish the financial strength needed to meet all farm operating costs, family living expenses, machinery upkeep and service all debts.

Futch said FmHA borrowers will be advised of their eligibility to participate during the annual review of their loans.

Edolphus Towns, Rep. (D-N.Y.), on black farmers' plight:

"If the decline continues at the current rate, there will be virtually no black farming by the end of the century."

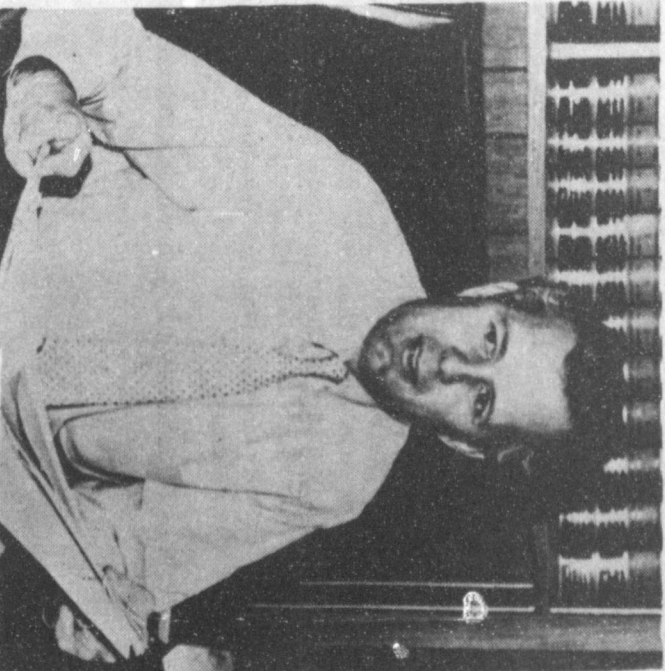
