Pies and cakes will be offered for sale. The proceeds from the sale will be used to meet the yearly budget of council.

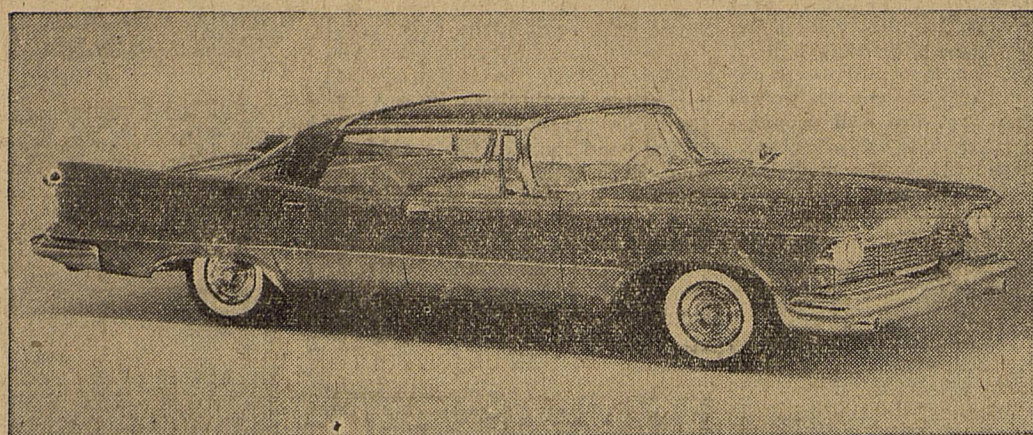
The public is invited to come to the bake sale and to view the exhibits which will be displayed. Prizes will be awarded to the best educational exhibit and individual exhibits.

## Pecan Show Slated For Cisco Dec. 6

The Fifth Annual Eastland County Pecan Show at Cisco Dec. 6 and 7 is open to growers in Eastland and adjoining counties according to Oscar Schaefer of Cook, president of the County Pecan Growers Association.

The pecan growers organization together with the Cisco Chamber of Commerce will jointly sponsor the show.

Pecan growers with only one tree are eligible to show their nuts the same as the grower with a large orchard, Schaefer said. Each owner is limited to one entry of each pershell or improved variety of pecans. There is no limit however to the number of entries of seedling or native pecans.

Rules and regulations, classes and premiums were recently worked out according to Schaefer by Doss Alexander, Pioneer, B. E. Freeman, Ranger, and Kent Word, Cisco, along with County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper.

Cash premiums will be paid for the first two places in each class provided there are at least three entries in the class.

Classes of improved varieties are expected to be seen in the following: Burkett, Mahan, Western Schley, Texas Prolific, Eastern Schley, Kincaid, Barton, Stuart, Comanche, Success, Van Deman, Jersey, Williamson, Delmas, Curtis, Onilwen, San Saba Improved, Halbert, John Garner and Squirrels Delight.

There will be classes for the seedlings and for the new Government cross pecans that growers are testing out. Judges will be from Texas A & M College. The show will be in the Home Supply Bldg. in Cisco.

The meeting here is held in conjunction with annual roll call meetings and elections of subordinate lodge officers and will kick off the roll call sessions over the district. Funds collected at local roll call meetings go to the Thanksgiving and Christmas funds for the Pythian Home at Weatherford.

Browne, an Abilene attorney, will make the closing address to the delegation and Robert Warren, district deputy from Abilene, will be in charge of the meeting. All sessions will be at the Eastland castle hall, 107 Commerce St.

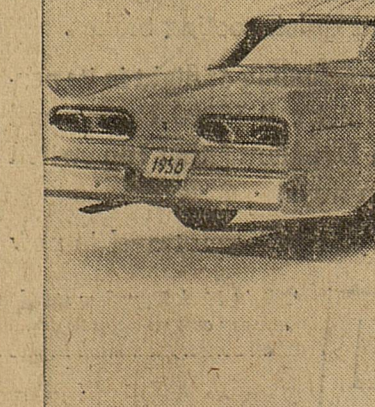

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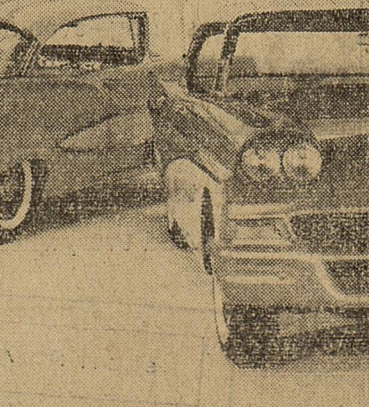

## Longer, More Luxurious Imperial Now On Display at Blevins Motor Co.

The new 1958 Imperial cars are now on display at Blevins Motor Co. in Eastland.

They are longer, and more luxuriously fitted than the 1957 Imperials. They have new interior fabrics and colors and new exterior design features, including a new grille.

Available as optional equip for the first time are an Auto-Pilot pushbutton driver assist, a dual air conditioning unit, a new type of electric door lock and a limited-slip differential.

Auto-Pilot, pushbutton automatic driver assist, allows the driver to select any turnpike cruising speed he desires by means of a dial on the instrument panel. When the car has attained this pre-selected speed a warning backpressure develops on the accelerator pedal.

Completely automatic throttle control can be arranged by pushing a button recessed in the speed selector. The driver can then remove his foot from the accelerator pedal. Automatic control is ended by a touch on the brake pedal.

Body lines of the 1958 Imperial create the shape of sleek wedge. A new six-section grill dominates the front of the car above a massive bumper which includes inset parking lights.

Dual horizontal headlights are set under front fender projections. High rear fins flow forward into a low belt line to the tips of front fenders.

Imperial's exclusive curved side glass and bigger bubble windshields, combined with curved side metal, create a sleek image. A new Flite Sweep deck lid, featuring a chrome spread eagle edged in gold, is optional equipment.

The cars are available in a choice of four series. The Imperial series is offered in a four-door sedan, two-door hardtop, four-door hardtop and convertible.

The Imperial LeBaron series is offered in a four-door sedan and a new four-door hardtop.

The cars are available in a choice of 20 solid colors and 56 two-tone combinations. Luxurious interiors in shades of blue, green, grey, beige and red are offered in Diamond-Glow and Monaco jacquard interior fabrics and natural leathers or metallic vinyls.

New integral front seats on all models provide greater legroom for rear-seat passengers and gain an inch of headroom for front seat passengers. The cars are two inches longer.

## County F-M Road Work Is Outlined

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$338,000 for improvements on farm-to-market roads in Eastland County during 1958, Robt. J. Milligan, district engineer at Brownwood, has announced. This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

The State Highway Commission, at its October meeting, approved this appropriation of \$338,000 to improve already existing farm-to-market roads in this county. A total of \$20 million was allotted to 183 Texas counties for farm road improvement in 1958. This \$20 million will be spent for shoulder widening, seal coat jobs, additional surfacing, and for widening of structures and roads.

The two projects in Eastland County will be under the supervision of the local highway district personnel. Gordon Smith is resident engineer.

## Revengeful Hounds Seek Onesided Win Over Mavs

Eying their record of four wins and four losses, the Eastland Mavericks swung into serious workouts Monday to prepare themselves for their battle Friday night with the amazing Throckmorton Greyhounds.

Throckmorton, loser of only one game, a close 6-14 setback to Albany last week, would like nothing more than to rub the Mavs' faces into the sod of Maverick Stadium. The Hounds remember all too well the terrible drubbing they took from Eastland last year. The Mavs ran up a 65-0 count in 1956 and the Hounds are working hard to hang one on Eastland.

Last year the Mavs made an amazing 565 yards against Throckmorton, 516 of it coming on the ground. The 65-0 win was the highest score a Maverick team has scored in years.

If the Mavs could upset Throckmorton and get by Clyde, it would mean a season record of six wins in four losses, not bad at all considering the fact that one of those wins was over Ranger.

Eastland will probably be without the services of big Wayne Watson, who is still nursing a bad leg injury. Other than that the legs are in fairly good shape (if you don't want to count the lads who were lost for the year earlier in the season because of injuries).

Individual records show that Ed Pullman continues to pace the Mav attack. Against Albany he made 110 yards in 21 attempts for a 5.2 yard average. That gives us an average of 5.9 yards a try for the year in 131 tries. His total yardage gained is 765 yards, or almost 100 yards a game.

Bill Newwood gained 61 yards in 19 tries for an average of 3.2 yards a try.

In 19 trips against the Lions for a 3.2 yard average. For the year he has gained 424 yards in 106 attempts for an average of four yards a try.

Larry Hollis had a bad night offensively against Albany, ending up with only one yard to his credit in five tries. His average for the year is still 6.6 yards a try, however. In 63 carries he has netted 416 yards.

Clinton Humphrey has gained 84 yards on the ground in 69 carries for 1.2 yard average. He has completed 21 of 57 passes for a total of 434 yards. It might be noted that Hollis was on the receiving end of six of those passes. (Continued on Page Five)

Clyde forfeited to Wylie, giving the Dogs an easy win, but little chance for Mr. Schulle to fatten his lead.

Albany's Jerry Atwell didn't set the world afire himself. He got just two points in the Lions important victory over Throckmorton's Greyhounds. Schulle now has 72 points to his credit and Atwell 63.

Bob Neely of Throckmorton, who got the Greyhounds only points against Albany, climbed from a tie for fourth to third place. He has 54 points to his credit. Throckmorton's Chigger Hibbetts and Jerry Grable are tied for fourth place honors, with 48 points each and Saul Pullman of Eastland is next in line with 42 points, despite the fact the Mavs had an open date Friday. This week Albany will set Clyde at Clyde and Throckmorton invades Eastland. A Mav victory would greatly boost the stock of Eastland.

### Louisiana Favorites



Louisiana is rich in food products and combined in this dish are three favorites.

The shrimp represents the livelihood of generations of fishermen who have sailed from Louisiana Gulf ports. The shrimp boats and nets are still big business, since this is one of our most popular seafoods. A prominent crop is the rice grown in the Southwestern part of the state. It represents a good portion of all the rice grown in the U. S.

An especially delightful section of Louisiana is Avery Island, near New Iberia, where Tabasco is made. Tabasco peppers have been flourishing on the family owned island since before the Civil War and it has been almost a century since Tabasco was first commercially sold. It is unique because of the flavor of the peppers and that it is not cooked like other sauces. Its processing consists of aging like fine wine.

Louisiana, and Avery Island in particular, has much to offer the palate, as this recipe indicates.

#### Tabasco Shrimp Iberia

- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 3/4 teaspoon Tabasco
- 1 1/2 cups chili sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons lime juice
- 2 pounds shrimp, cooked
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 3 cups hot cooked rice

Melt butter in chafing dish. Add garlic and cook about 5 minutes. Add Tabasco, chili sauce, salt and lime juice; stir in shrimp. Cook, stirring occasionally, until heated through. Gradually stir in cream; heat to serving temperature. Serve over hot cooked rice. YIELD: 4 to 6 servings.

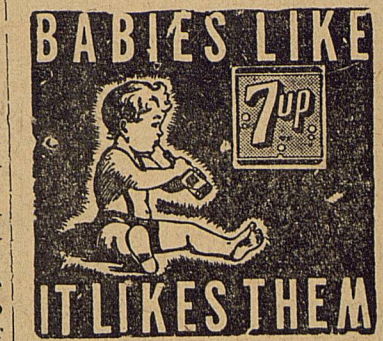

Only 23 of 63 passes have been completed against Eastland and the Mavs have intercepted eight, losing four of their own in the same manner. The Mavs have lost 12 fumbles and recovered 15 of their opponents.

Eastland has punted 24 times for a 31 yard average and their eight opponents have booted the ball 22 times for the same average. Eastland has been penalized 40 times for 440 yards and Mav opponents have drawn 52 penalties for 415 yards.
