for Eastland County. It is the No. 1-A Guy Parker, five miles south of Eastland in Section 30 Block 2, H&TC Survey. Daily potential was 54 barrels of 33 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water, pumping from 24 perforations at 1,319-1,323 feet. Casing was set at 1,368 feet, with total depth of 1.373.

Rose E. Day, separate estate, of Eastland No. 1 Holcomb Heirs will be a regular field project one and one-half mile northeast of Eastland. Slated for 1,550 feet with rotary, it spots 150 feet from the north and 600 feet from the east lines of the south half of the southwest quarter of Section 1, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Three locations in the regular field were staked by John W. Pope of Eastland, all on the Guy Lyeria lease six miles south of Eastland and in Section 30, Block H&TC Survey. All are slated for 1,999 feet with rotary.






